Last week's "Letter to the Editor," in which several counties were named and the salaries of the commissioners and judge were given, prompted many inquiries as to just what the salaries were in surrounding and adjoining counties.

With the help of an interested subscriber, I am able to give you those figures this week.

Counties, positions and salaries follow:

Irion - Commissioners salary, \$1800, Judge, \$3120.
Sterling - Commissioners salary, \$1397.55, Judge, \$8471.

Schleicher - Commissioners salary, \$4,200, Judge \$6948.
Kimbell - \$3360 for commissioners and \$6,000 for county judge.

Sutton - Commissioners, \$600, Judge \$6900.

Menard - Commissioners, \$3300, Judge, \$7200.
Val Verde - Commissioners, \$4217, Judge, \$10,285

Terrell - Commissioners, \$1500, Judge, \$5090.

All salaries quoted are on an annual basis, giving the average commissioners salary \$2,546.82, and the average judge's salary at \$6,751.75 per year.

All inquiries were by telephone and there is room for error, but this is what our survey turned up for your information.

Alma James brought in a letter from a former Ozonan, Thelma Mann, who is now Mrs. George Schechter of Los Angeles. Her story about a call to Ozona from one of the radio stations there was interesting to me, and I will pass it on to you.

Mrs. Schechter tells of lying in bed around 2 a. m. one morning listening to a 24-hour "conversation station." She said that each night between midnight and 5 a. m. they make a call or two to small towns around the country.

She said she couldn't believe her ears when the announcer said "for our kooky call tonight, we are going to call Ozona, Texas." The operator evidently got the DPS communications building. Mrs. Schechter said it sounded like a youngster who answered the telephone and he gave his name she thought as "Jim Roundtree." She also

said that he apparently knew little about Ozona. After the call, she related, some man in Los Angeles called in to say "That young man in Ozona was much too modest. I drove through that town once, stopped to buy gasoline, and inquired about all the big, expensive homes there, etc. (He referred to them as feudal castles, Mrs. Schechter said)

She said that after that phone call, she got out of bed and called the station herself to tell them about Ozona. She said she didn't know the significance of the Davy Crockett statue, but that right after she hung up, another Texan called and cleared that up.

I am told that most will remember Miss Mann, if I mention that she was the daughter of the Mrs. Mann who was housekeeper for Mrs. Lemmons for many years.

It really is a small world, isn't it.

Wildcat Slated For South Part Of Crockett Co.

American Quasar Petroleum Co., Midland, will drill the No. 130 Jean Scheuber, an 8,900-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 11 miles southeast of Ozona, 2 5/8 miles northwest of the one-well Angus (Strawn gas) field, three miles east of the 7,890 foot Pennsylvania gas production in the Davidson Ranch multipay field and the DePaul (Strawn gas) field.

Location is 467 feet from the south and west lines of 30-KLTCRR, Abst. 4604. Ground elevation is 2,438 feet.

It is also 1 1/2 mile southwest of the firm's No. 1-38 Jones, in 38 JJ-TCRR, scheduled 8,000-foot wildcat.

Bob Childress Elected To Mohair Council

Bob Childress of Ozona, was selected as one of the new directors of the Mohair Council of America at its annual meeting held in San Angelo January 31.

Walter L. Pfluger of San Angelo, long-time West Texas ranchman and well-known mohair producer, is the new president, succeeding Noel C. Fry of Del Rio, the 6,000 member mohair promotion organization.

James T. Hunt of Sonora, secretary-treasurer of the Council for the last three years, was elected vice president. Fry, who retired as president after serving three terms, was elected secretary-treasurer. Pfluger will continue to serve as the Council's general manager.

In other business, the membership unanimously approved a change in the Council by-laws allowing for four additional directors to be selected by four supporting organizations. They are the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, the Texas Angora Goat Raisers Association, the American Angora Goat Breeders Association and the Texas Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association.

The new directors approved an overall budget of \$372,000 for 1973-74, depending upon whether a mohair incentive deduction is made on 1972 sales of mohair. If an incentive payment deduction is made, the budget will be increased to \$400,000.

Contract Let For Road Work In Crockett County

A contract for seal coat work on 153.6 miles of highways in the San Angelo district was awarded by the Texas Highway Commission during its meeting here.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer J. A. Snell. The contract includes work in Concho, Coke, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Menard, Runnels, Schleicher, Sterling, and Tom Green Counties.

Strain Brothers, Inc. of San Angelo was awarded the contract with a low bid of \$375,314.90. The work will take an estimated 75 working days to complete. James R. Evans of San Angelo is the Highway Department engineer in charge.

The project in Crockett County includes 7.84 miles of R. M. 33, from the intersection of State Highway 163 to 8.0 miles east, and 77.335 miles of R. M. 865 from the intersection of 163 to the intersection of R. M. 33.

Two Plays To Be Performed Friday By Dallas Group

Tomorrow night, Friday, the Ozona United Methodist Church will sponsor a performance of "Aria Da Capo" and "The Last Word." This bill of one-act plays, featuring the works of Edna St. Vincent Millay and James Broughton, will be staged by the Alpha-Omega Players of Dallas, Tex.

Edna St. Vincent Millay, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for poetry, wrote "Aria Da Capo" in 1921. This play--both comic and serious--has become something of a modern classic, and is even more frequently produced now than when it was written. Called by critic Edmund Wilson "... a spokesman for the human spirit," "Miss Millay was actually a professional actress at one time, and "Aria Da Capo" is a blending of her poetic vision and her love for the theater.

James Broughton is a poet of our time. "The Last Word" has been described as a "reflection of the terse style and unique vision that has established him as one of America's leading experimental filmmakers." His awards include the special jury prize at the Cannes Film Festival, and he currently teaches at the San Francisco Art Institute.

Curtain time for the Friday night performance will be 7:30, at the church.

Tickets will not be sold but a free-will offering will be taken. The public is invited.

Four Gas Producers Completed In County

Delta-Suburban, Odessa, completed four producers in the 7,890-foot Pennsylvania zone of the Davidson Ranch multipay field of Crockett County.

The No. 1-A Davidson Ranch, 6 1/2 miles southeast of Ozona, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.4 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 77,783-1. Gravity of the liquid was 57.5 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 7,904-feet to 8,225-feet which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons and fractured with 32,700 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 16-KL-GC&SF.

The No. 1-A McMullan, nine miles southeast of Ozona was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 304,878-1. Gravity of the condensate was 55 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 7,859 feet to 8,273 feet, which had been acidized with 2,500 gallons, and fractured with 21,300 gallons and 12,600 pounds.

Location is 860 feet from the north and 1,880 feet from the west lines of 4-F-FC&SF (corrected from 4-KL-GC&SF).

The No. 1-B McMullan, 9 1/2 miles southeast of Ozona, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 940,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 55,-

928-1. Gravity of the liquid was 55.7 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 7,749 feet to 8,305 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons and fractured with 17,800 gallons.

Location is 1,135 feet from the north and 1,493 feet from the east lines of 4-F-GC&SF (correct from 4-KL-GC&SF).

The No. 1-A Scheuber, 7 1/2 miles east-southeast of Ozona, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow 3 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 63,371-1. Gravity of the liquid was 60.6 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 7,981 feet to 8,233 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 44,000 pounds of sand.

It was drilled to 8,317 feet. Contract depth was amended from 8,200 feet to 8,500 feet. Location is 830 feet from the north and 720 feet from the west lines of 14-KL-GC&SF.

The projects had been slated as outposts to the field but the Canyon gas zone of the DePaul multipay field was merged with the 7,890 Pennsylvania, and the wells are surrounded by production.

New License Plates Are Now On Sale

New motor vehicle license plates went on sale Thursday in the office of Crockett County Tax Assessor-Collector Billy Mills, located in the courthouse annex.

County motorists may register vehicles in person by bringing in the entire three-part form, which was mailed out recently by the Texas Highway Department, or they may get plates by mail if they send in the complete three-part form, the registration fee plus one dollar for each vehicle. Plates will be mailed prior to March 1. After March 1, it will be necessary to go to the county tax office in person as 30 days are required for mail delivery.

With the form, a certificate of title and last year's registration receipt are not needed. However, without the three-part form, last year's receipt and the vehicle title are required.

1972 Bond Sales Short Of Goal

December sales of United States Savings Bonds in Crockett County were \$2,140 according to County Bond Chairman Lowell Littleton. Sales during 1972 totaled \$15,434 which represents 51% of the yearly sales goal of \$30,000.

Texans purchased \$17,451, 392 in series E and H Bonds during the month. Total bond sales for 1972 amounted to \$211,662, 879 for 107% of the 1972 sales goal of \$197.5 million.

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In the loss to Coahoma, Tambunga led the Lion attack with 18 points, followed by Papanas with 14. Huff and Sewell had 10 points each.

The Lions were in Big Lake Tuesday night, and will wind up the season here Friday night with Stanton.

This week's play should break the tie for third place in district between the Lions, McCamey, Crane and Stanton. Coahoma heads the district and Big Lake is in the bottom spot at present.

The cost of medical care is high, but I sometimes think Ralph Nader and his raiders should check on the cost of local, state, and national government.

In your latest issue of The Stockman Commissioners salary was reported at \$4350.00 each. A recent Texas Almanac reports our population \$4209 for Crockett County.

Roughly, it costs each citizen of Crockett County about \$4 per year for the four commissioners. The pay scale in oil producing counties were submitted so here is a per capita cost:

Crane, \$8 per capita; Upton, \$7 per capita; Pecos and Scurry, less than \$4 per capita; Tom Green, about \$2 per capita; Ward, less than \$3 per capita; Regan, about \$6 per capita; Andrews about \$4, and Gaines, about \$3.50.

If we pick some of the more populous counties at \$4 per capita for commissioner cost we would get Harris County, Tarrant County, Travis County and Bexar, to name a few.

Who wonders that some Crockett County voters refer to our commissioners as our "Senators?" Let's all fight inflation.

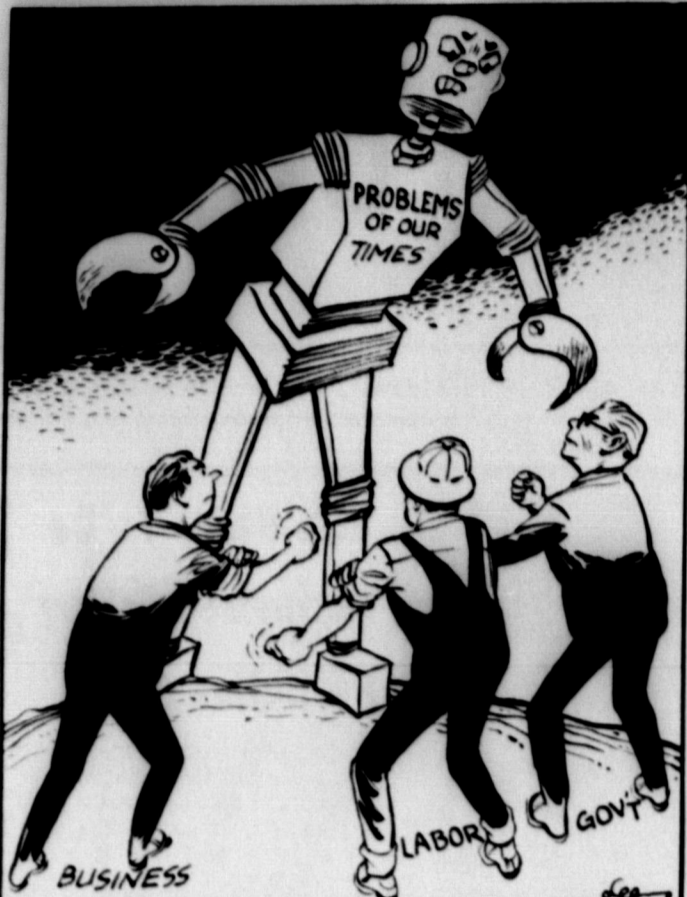

News in Washington -- as everywhere--this past week has been both bad and good. The death of Lyndon Johnson was, of course, a sad shock to all. In brief, his was an active restless life whose ambition, energy and ability took him from boyhood on the Pedernales all the way to the White House. He was an aggressive, courageous, effective leader, and he was dedicated to his country.

President Nixon's announcement of a peace agreement was, of course, what every American has longed for. Hanoi has agreed within 60 days, to release our prisoners and account for the missing. That is our real big all-important objective.



agree on a settlement last December resulted in our major bombing operation -- a language the Communists understand -- which caused them to decide against continuing their slaughter and destruction, and to agree on a truce.

On another front, a move by liberal Democrats in the House, nudged by a left-wing lobby called Common Cause, fell flat on their faces in an abortive effort to destroy the seniority system in committee organizations. It was really an assault on experience and maturity. By forcing a secret vote on each committee chairman recommended, the protesters were able to muster only a small percentage of the votes cast.

FUEL SHORTAGE RELIEF SOUGHT

AUSTIN—Greater oil and gas production to pare down Texas energy shortages is the aim of companion bills introduced in the Texas Legislature this week.

The measures would liberalize unitization requirements for oil and gas fields so as to increase production of oil and gas reserves, according to sponsors of the legislation, Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon and Rep. Dave Finney of Ft. Worth.

They said the legislation would help accomplish one of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's goals: To get the maximum recovery from reserves as one of the means to solve the energy shortage.

A major obstacle, aside from technological aspects, preventing the tapping of part of the 98 billion barrels of Texas oil reserves has been an obsolete oil-gas unitization law that requires 100 per cent agreement from operators and royalty owners in a field to unitize, the lawmakers said. The requirement has been so restrictive that only one of every 10 Texas fields now operates as a unit.

Under terms of the Hightower-Finney proposal, a consent majority of 75 per cent of all interests would be required.

It is believed that several billion more barrels of fuel can be recovered by removing restrictions, the legislators said.

Both legislators warned that their proposal was not a cure-all for energy shortages, but would be a step toward greater energy supplies.

February is "Heart Month". Relation of diet to heart disease is probably the most controversial medical-dietary area today. Both doctors and the public question how fats in the diet affect health or development of heart disease.

Atherosclerosis is a disease in which large and small arteries are narrowed and hardened by deposits of fatty materials and minerals along internal walls. Other names are used to refer to this condition are cardiovascular disease, coronary heart disease, and arteriosclerosis.

Fats in the diet may lead to elevated blood lipids and atherosclerosis. This, in turn, can lead to cardiovascular diseases such as coronary heart disease. The diet is believed to be only one of many factors associated with atherosclerosis. Others include heredity, overweight condition, high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol and high blood lipids, and cigarette smoking. Other important factors associated with the disease are the individual's life style or socioeconomic level, lack of exercise, stress, and such metabolic diseases as diabetes.

Since diet is thought to be just one factor among many, authorities advise against making drastic, self-prescribed changes in diets.

Timely clips: If using only the white of an egg, make a small hole in each end of the shell and shake out the white into a dish. Seal the holes with pieces of scotch tape and the yolk will stay fresh until you want it.

A little bluing added to the water used to clean mirrors will make them sparkle.

Absorbent Artificial Logs Clean Oil Spills

A multi-purpose oil absorbent for oil spill cleanup has been introduced.

Called the Sea Serpent II, the booms (or logs) can protect beaches and shorelines, according to Johns-Manville. They are effective where space is not restricted. A companion product, Water Wiper absorbent sheets, is available for difficult areas under docks or boardwalks.

The logs measure 8 inches in diameter, are 5 feet long, weigh 3 1/2 pounds and absorb 15 to 20 times their own weight. A 2-inch hole running through each polyurethane foam log accommodates a rope for stringing a long boom. Once saturated with oil, the logs can be wrung out and used over and over again.

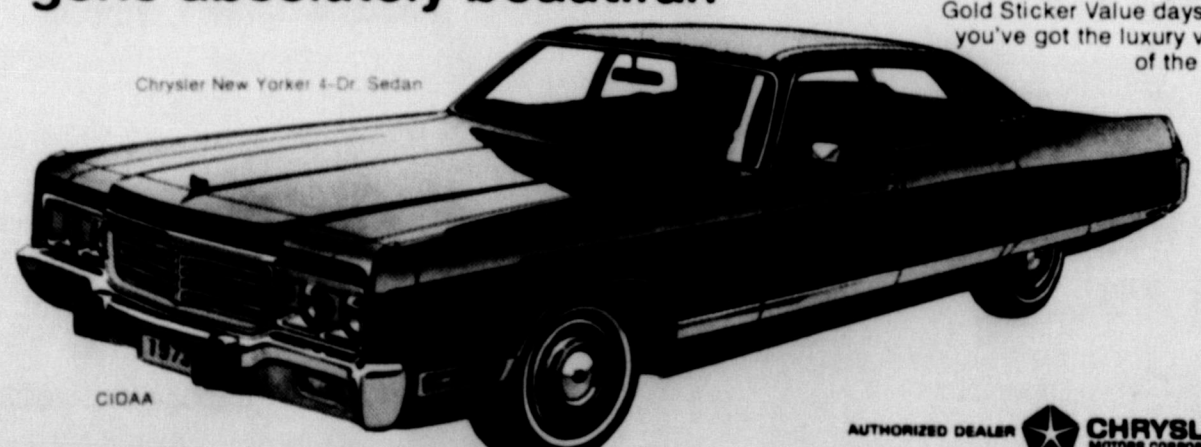

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

With the departure of January, you may feel as I do, that the March winds arrived two months early. Maybe we can now look forward to and hope for calm beautiful weather in March.

February may bring both very cold and warm days, these warm days should be busy ones for the gardener. Planting should be quite simple if the correct soil preparation is made. For balled and burlaped, container grown, or bareroot trees and shrubs, always dig a large hole, much larger and deeper than the root system. To the soil taken from the hole, add humus and manure until you have a loose, pliable soil mixture.

Pack the soil around the roots tightly so no air pockets are left. Water thoroughly to help settle the soil. Be careful not to plant hollies, azaleas, camellias, box woods and other evergreens too deep, which causes the lower roots to die. A mulch is helpful, but do not crowd mulch against the stems of the plants. Leave an air space around the stems to keep them dry.

Be sure to know your plants needs before fertilizing for too much is disastrous. Acidity requirements, drainage needs, types of fertilizer, and water amounts will determine your success.

The one's of you who have a garden spot, or border in your flower beds you might like to try some different varieties of onions for all seasons, and discover a wonderful range of flavors and uses. Their family division or genus is Allium, which includes both ornamental as well as many vegetables. Many catalogs, stores and nurseries list seed, bulbs, and sets.

One favorite is the Egyptian onion which bears clusters of little bulbs on top of 3 foot stalks. Semilar onions are Welsh, Evergreen Long White Bunchion Scallion, Hardy Alliums, and Shallots. The later is very popular for their sweet, delicate onion flavor and are easy to grow.

Common chives make a pretty border for flower beds and furnish foliage for salads, etc. Garlic chives or oriental garlic are attractive too, and have the same uses as common chives.

Garlic itself can be grown as a crop and pest-repellent. Garlic grown in soil enriched with humus or manure, tastes different from store-bought bulbs. Elephant garlic the most unusual Allium can be grown as a handsome novelty, producing large lavender flower heads. Its cloves are delicious steamed or boiled and served with butter. The taste is "garlic", but much milder. It is better to plant these in the fall. Rich, loose soil, moisture and good drainage are the main needs.

Auto Accidents
