District 5AA Golfers In Tourney Here Fri.

Coach Charles Spieker's Lion Golfers will host District 5-AA golfers on the country club course Friday. Golfers will tee off at 10 a.m. Teams entered include the varsity and B teams of Big Lake, Ozona, Crane, McCamey, Coahoma and Stanton. The Lions found it tough going in the dust and high wind in Crane last weekend and shot a team total of 330, falling seven points behind the district leader Big Lake, but comfortably ahead of Crane for second place.

Presently Big Lake leads with 945, after three district tournaments, followed by Ozona with 952, and Crane with 993. The Big Lake B team is in fourth place with 1004, followed by McCamey with 1036 and the Ozona B with 1059. The other teams in the district are far behind.

In Crane Saturday David Williams was low medalist with a 76, Mike Williams had a 78, Rick Webster shot an 87, Craig Williams, an 89 and Jim Montgomery, a 90. Individual scores for the B team were as follows: Lessly Russell, 87; Steve Wilkins, 88; Jack Baggett, 96; Craig Taliaferro, 100; Chris Reeves, 101.

Lion Tracksters Place Second In Eldorado Relays
Ozona's Lions came in second at the Plateau Relays in Eldorado Saturday, after bringing home the championship in every meet they have entered this season. Brady won the meet with a point total of 149, while the Lions had 96 for second place. The Lions got off to a bad start early Saturday morning when they dropped the stick in the 440-relay, a race they expected to win, and failed to get in the finals. Illness and injury also slowed the Lions down. However, there were several bright spots for the Lions in the relay. David Pagan won the Discus with a throw of 162'3" and came in second in the Shot with 49'5 1/2", his best of the year in both events. Mike Schneider won a first place for the Lions in the 100-yard dash with a 10.1, his best effort of the year. He has won the event in every meet and each with a little faster time. 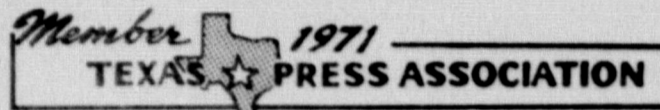

NO LONGER UNDER THE BED

Editor Paul Sims of the DAILY CORINTHIAN, Corinth, Mississippi, recently commented, "Americans have been feuding over the question of Communist involvement in student disorders."

"Curiously," continued Editor Sims, "among Communists there is no such dissension." He then went on to point out that the Young Socialist Alliance, of the Trotsky-Mao Tse-Tung-Chu Guevara variety of marxists, points with pride to its role in violence and rioting, and further gloat that "they are only rehearsals for bigger protests to come"—they hope!

The strategy call for "generating demands" and slogans with which college students and youth can identify; free education; end the draft; student control of education; end ROTC; "end racism"; end the war (in South Vietnam only; they support communist aggression elsewhere).

In all of this, pointed out Mr. Sims, the Communists concur. The Daily World, official mouthpiece of the comrades, has declared that such tactics, implemented through a "united front," are important to the eventual violent overthrow of the government, because "any victory that gives students more control over their lives is a victory for revolutionaries," an activity in which, the Communists say, "we openly participate."

It is difficult, said the Corinthian editor, how Communist participation could be made more explicit.

"At least," Sims concluded, "we should all be spared the perennial accusation of seeing Communists under every bed."

Today the Communists are not under the bed; they are in bed, along with Dave Dellinger, Sidney Peck, Reinie Davis, David Fishin, Al Hubbard, Ron Dellums, Bella Abzug, and any number of others.

And how does one describe that relationship? Coexistence? Collaboration? Or cohabitation?

Drouth Management Is Sheep Field Day Topic

College Station-- Sheep management during drouth periods and control of predatory animals will highlight the Sheep Field Day scheduled for April 1 at Sonora.

The meeting will be held at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research Station and features speakers from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The meeting will draw sheep raisers and industry people from throughout West Texas to learn of the latest research and practical techniques in sheep management, according to Maurice Shelton, professor of genetics in sheep

and Angora goats.

The program starts at 9:30 a.m. with results of performance tests on rams, followed by an appraisal of meatiness in sheep by Dr. Frank Orts of

College Station, Louis L. Farr of Austin, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, will report on that organization's activities.

Wool and mohair will also be discussed, in addition to lamb management and maintenance feeding of ewes. Care of rangeland and feeding of sheep during dry weather will receive special emphasis because of current weather conditions in West Texas, Shelton said.

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Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

If you can grow weeds, you can grow vegetables with the right preparation of soil, care and water. Vegetables need five or six hours of full sun every day so select a spot to meet this need. If you are planning to grow vegetables for the first time, don't try more than you can manage without it being borosome. However, you will certainly want to include some home-grown salad ingredients, lettuce, beets, tomatoes, onions, sweet peppers and radishes.

Begin watering new roses regularly and deep. If you planted bare-root roses, they may be a little slower showing leaf growth than established plants. Keep the soil moist around the roots if rainfall is scant and it surely is here at present. If some canes or stems die, cut each back to a point just above a healthy bud growing on the outside of the stem. Moistened peat moss packed around the base will help to prevent stems from drying out.

If some of the shrubs beside your driveway show no signs of life this spring, automobile exhaust fumes may be the cause, especially your evergreens. Avoid this damage by parking your car a few feet away from shrubs.

If you are looking for white glads to be used for a summer wedding or other event, here are some good varieties with approximate number of days from planting to bloom:

Albania (72), Albatross (63), Chicago White (63) Catherine Coleman (77), Early Snowflake (73), Maid of Orleans (68), Mammoth White (69), and Helen Wills (70). Plant glads at two-week intervals until midsummer to extend the time of enjoying their blooms. Glads are seldom graceful in an accent garden, but can be plant-

ed in groups in a bed of annuals and perennials. To allow for good side cultivation which results in a better quality flower, plant glads in rows in the cutting bed or in rows between vegetables.

Peonies are showing new growth, so if you banked them with dirt in the fall, be careful when pulling it away. When growth is about six to eight inches high, feed with bulb liquid fertilizer for larger blooms. Protect if weather forecast predicts a freeze. If you have non-blooming peonies this may be caused by too much shade, a late freeze, too deep planting, spring transplanting or blight. An excess of nitrogen in the soil may cause small buds to dry though the plant looks healthy. The addition of phosphorus and potash (acid phosphate and woodashes) will correct this condition and probably be full of bloom next spring.

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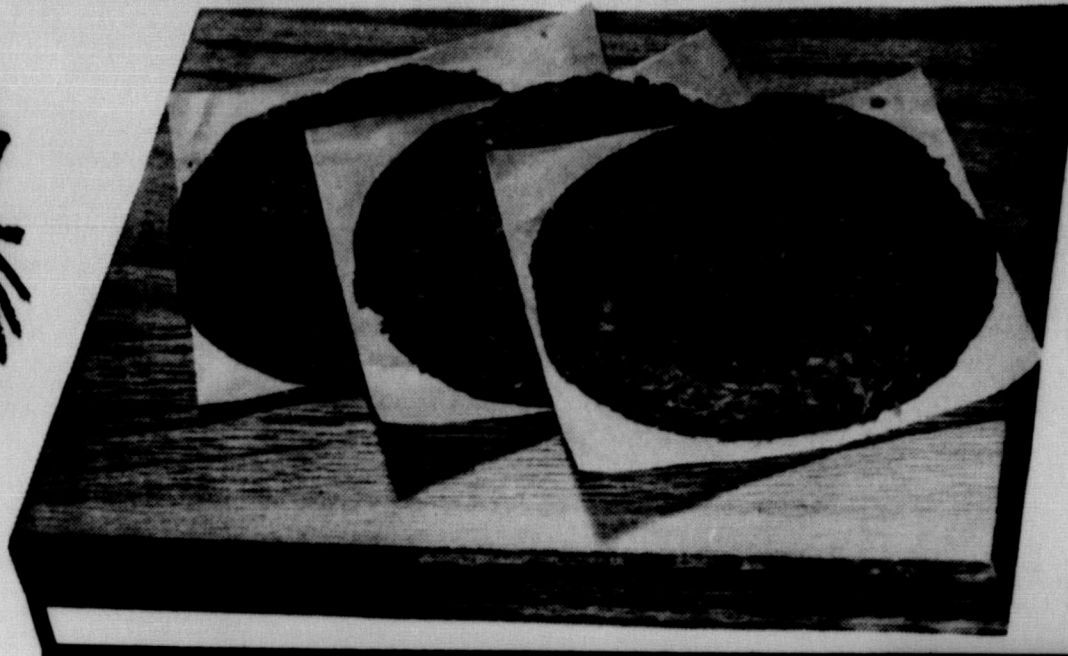

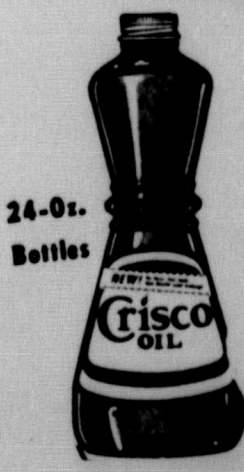

Prugel Attends Fed. Land Bank Meet In Houston

A. E. Prugel, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora, has just returned from Houston where he attended the annual stockholders meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston. The meeting was attended by representatives of 68 Federal Land Bank Associations located throughout Texas. About 450 persons were present for the meeting.

Delegates, alternates, and guests heard President Herbert H. Decker give the annual report to the stockholders and addresses by Fred Gilmore, Deputy Governor of the Farm Credit Administration, Washington, D. C., and Williams E. Pettigrew, Financial Economist for the Fiscal Agency of the Farm Credit Banks, New York.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term loans on farm and ranch property throughout Texas. The Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora makes and services loans in this area. 'TEACHERS OF DESTRUCTION'

If Pulitzer prizes were awarded to reporters and editors other than members of the Liberal Establishment, Alice Widener long since would have been honored. She pioneered reportorial coverage of the New Left and accurately predicted in newspaper columns and in her own journal, USA Magazine, the course of radical disruption and terrorism in the cities and on college campuses. Mrs. Widener's new book "Teachers of Destruction: An Eyewitness Account" (Citizens Evaluation Institute, 62 Ben Franklin, Washington, D. C., \$3) is the definitive account of the formation and operation of the New Left movement since 1965. Her brilliant work is deserving of a top journalistic prize.

Given the political orientation of the Pulitzer Committee, an award for Alice Widener's superb journalistic achievement would be a real surprise, however.

I have followed Alice Widener's writings since the 1960's, when she played a major role in revealing the true nature of the Castro regime in Cuba and in exposing the background of his publicists in the United States.

She also has written brilliantly on monetary issues and on European affairs. With her knowledge of languages and the European scene, Mrs. Widener's work commands respect on both sides of the Atlantic. Her most important contribution, in my judgement, is in reporting on the new revolutionaries.

On March 11, 1968, Mrs.

Widener wrote a front-page editorial for Barron's National Business and Financial Weekly, predicting ten days of radical violence on American campuses. This was the first major report on the notorious Students for Democratic Society. Before the end of April, the SDS plunged Columbia University into turmoil in the first of the revolutionary outbursts on college campuses.

In "Teachers of Destruction, Mrs. Widener tells of attending gatherings of socialist scholars at Columbia, Princeton and other universities. She explains how Marxist professors programmed students to hate America. Her reports are eyewitness reports. She attended the radical meetings, took notes and published her findings. But the television commentators and slick magazines who profess to be so interested in "extremism" paid no attention to her stories. They didn't bother to send reporters to cover the gatherings where a storm of revolutionary campus violence was planned.

Perhaps the most important section of Mrs. Widener's book is the section on the "Source of Funds." She reports that money for New Left activities came from the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions at Santa Barbara, Calif.; the Institute for policy studies in Washington, D. C. (which, in turn, obtained financing from the Field, Milbank, Samuel Rubin and Edgar Stern Foundations); from the Louis M. Rabinowitz Foundation (which originally subsidized the Socialist Scholars Conference), and

from Moscow, Peking, Hanoi and Hanoi. "Teachers of Destruction" is an invaluable handbook, listing individuals, organizations, and institutions that prize the New Left. Everyone wants to understand the world that has been formed in the once peaceful country. Read Alice Widener's book. Factbook.
