## Ozona Lions Eye Track Meet Sat.

Coach John Richey's Ozona Lions will be loaded for bear at the Iraan track meet this Saturday after walking away with their own meet last Saturday. The Lions chalked up 190 points to win Division I of the 19th Annual Ozona Relays. The nearest competitor was San Saba, coming in second with 52 points while Junction had 50 for third place. The Ozona Junior Varsity placed fourth in Division I. Sonora edged Mason in Division II with a 97 point total and Mason was second with 83. Wall won the Division III championship with 94 points, followed by Bronte with 60. Athletes were hampered by the wind all day long. Times might possibly have been much faster but the wind gust of up to 30 miles an hour, seemed to be a big factor in the meet. The Lions' Chuck Romack set a new record in the pole vault with a jump of 13-9 and 3/4, which won him a first place and edged him from seventh in state to sixth. ## Crockett Population Figure Set At 3,885

Crockett County's official population in the 1970 census was 3,885, down 7.7 percent from the 1960 figure of 4,209, the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce reports. The official population of the state was 11,196,730 up 16.9 percent from the 1960 population count, which was 9,579,677. The 1970 census counted 3,745 white persons in Crockett County, 96.4 percent of the total; 110 Negroes, and 30 persons of other races. In 1960, 97.0 percent of the population was white. The census showed 365 children under 5 years; 1,094 in ages 5 through 17; 2,110 people 18 through 64; and 316 who were 65 and older. The population 14 years and over included 1,975 married people, 174 who were widowed, 67 divorced, and 535 never married. Crockett County's 1970 population was classified as 73.7 percent urban, and 26.3 percent rural. There were 1,211 households, with 3,879 persons, including 208 one-person households. In addition 6 persons were living in group quarters. The 1970 census counted 1,705 housing units in Crockett County, 776 of them occupied by owners, 435 occupied by

## Civil Defense Traffic Safety Man Is Speaker

John Lukert, field consultant with the Division of Civil Defense and Traffic Safety of the Texas State Health Department, will bring the program at the meetings of the Rotary Club at noon March 30 and the Lions Club at noon April 1. Mr. Lukert will encourage community awareness and concern toward the life-death importance of well-coordinated Local Emergency Medical Services. He will show a film "Before the Emergency" which dramatically illustrates the value of good emergency care to individuals involved in all-too-common emergencies. The film points out that an estimated 20,000 accident victims die unnecessarily each year as a direct result of inadequate emergency care and at least another 25,000 are permanently disabled from the same cause. The film shows how a Wisconsin town set up outstanding rescue, ambulance, and hospital services and how these saved the lives of many school children in a mock bus accident. The film ends with specific suggestions as to how a city or town can bring its emergency care system up to a similar level.

#### WHY DON'T THEY ATTACK THE ENEMY?

Recently, when the freedom-fighting forces of South Vietnam crossed over the Laotian border to cut off the so-called "Ho Chi Minh trail," a few raucous voices were raised in Washington to sharply criticize the move. The attacks—by four U.S. Senators in particular—were leveled against our President, our armed forces, our Vietnamese allies and friends, and against the frightening thought that we might abandon our long-standing "no-win" policy. But nowhere have we read the slightest murmur of complaint or criticism, on the part of the four leading critics, against the communist enemy. The unavoidable question is: "Why not?"

The South Vietnamese forces found tons upon tons of communist military supplies, weapons and ammunition stashed away in caves, bunkers and tunnels, not more than 20 miles inside the border of Laos from free Vietnam—but hundreds of miles away from the Red supply bases in Communist North Vietnam and Red China. For reasons which we cannot understand, the noisy critics in Washington seem to have forgotten completely that in Geneva, Switzerland, on July 23, 1962, an international pact was signed by the official delegations of 14 nations, to guarantee the freedom and neutrality of Laos. The fourteen nations were the United States, the USSR, Britain, France, Canada, Communist China, Burma, Poland, North Vietnam, Cambodia, India, South Vietnam, Thailand and Laos.

The agreements, solemnly signed by North Vietnam, China, and the USSR, specifically stated, among other things that:

"They will not establish (in Laos) any foreign military base, foreign stronghold or other foreign military installation of any kind," and

"They will not use (Laotian territory) for interference in the internal affairs of other countries."

It is bad enough that the Red enemy is using the territory of Laos to set up supply bases for their weapons of death to be used against the peaceful nations of Cambodia, Thailand and South Vietnam. It is worse that they do so in complete and cynical violation of their own promises not to do so, made only nine years ago. If the noisy complainers in Washington are truly concerned with the preservation of world peace, why do they not attack and condemn the Communists who are not only "endangering world peace, but who are at the same time violating their own international agreements? Let the carping critics take their complaints to Hanoi, to Peking, to Moscow, and to the United Nations—and not to the White House or the Pentagon.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H. 110) Special Election May 18, 1971.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published one week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State, of the number of legal cast at said election for against said amendment if more than one be proposed; and if it shall be from said returns that a majority of the votes cast, in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and the Governor thereof." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment submitted to a vote of qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which the ballots shall be provided for voting in against the proposed constitutional amendment, providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment to the Constitution at any time.

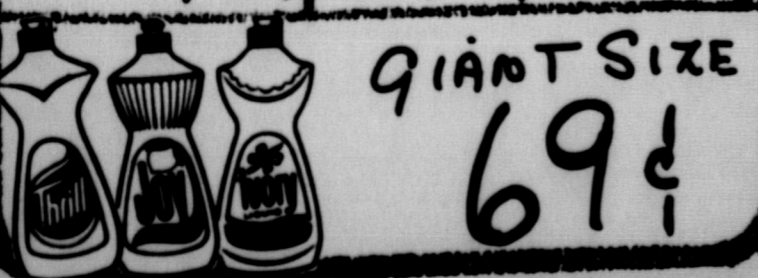

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT SUBJECT Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, and to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum.

(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law.

(c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT SUBJECT Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for other services included in the federal laws as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

(3) Needy blind persons;

(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.

The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants to the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year.

Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 21 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in order to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants to the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT SUBJECT Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Justices serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission, of each group of three appointees no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session.

(2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years.

(3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

(4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor at an amount higher than that of other members of the Legislature standing any provisions to the contrary of Article IV, Section 17, of the Texas Constitution.

(5) The commission shall promulgate rules of ethics to govern the conduct of all legislators, legislative officers and all officers and appointees or elective, of any department, district office, commission, board or any governmental unit or branch established by or under the authority of the constitution and laws of the State of Texas and all officers and appointees or elective of the floor in either House of the Legislature. The Texas State Ethics Commission shall further promulgate rules providing that each member of the Legislature and the members of the above named officeholders upon election and any appointee to any of these offices shall file with the State Ethics Commission a statement under oath setting out a complete financial statement in detail within 10 days after being elected or receiving an appointment. This information shall be privileged information to the State Ethics Commission to be used only by them in connection with a conflict of interests or if there is or has been a violation of any of the rules of ethics promulgated by the Texas State Ethics Commission or any laws of the State of Texas. The Legislature shall enact statutes dealing with unauthorized disclosure or misuse of said privileged information.

(6) The commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet in Austin at least once each year to review existing rules of ethics, legislative compensation rates, mileage allowances and per diem rates, and to make any changes deemed necessary.

(7) All rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances or per diem rates currently in force, as well as all changes and recommendations by the State Ethics Commission shall be promulgated before the convening of any session of the Legislature by filing a certified copy of the proclamation with the Secretary of State.

(8) Each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission shall take effect on the 15th day of the legislative session following the proclamation unless otherwise provided.

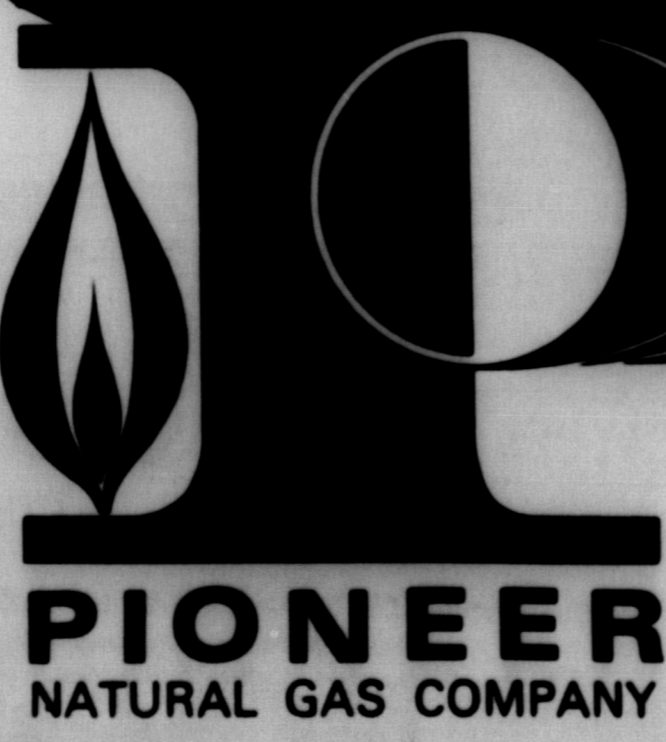

### For Gardeners

From The  
Ozona Garden Club

When the strong and some March winds hit us, they discourage gardeners, but let a beautiful calm and the windy days gotten. While driving out city, observe the flowering fruit trees, and rebuds. Too, make some of the plants, trees etc. that you want own garden. That the little catkins pining to show on stems pussy willow, you can cut to root or cure in cypress. The catkins will attractive while new forming. After a few when roots are strong your cuttings outdoors in place where they can any of water. Pussy willow of the easiest shrubs and also one of the fastest. It is hardy in the upper south, if you buy one of the plants, which grows to about 15 feet. They grow in any fairly good soil, retaining average moisture. Clematis vine is becoming more popular in our area, for they prefer a slightly alkaline or neutral soil. Plant them where their roots will be shaded from the afternoon sun. An east or north exposure may be best, but they do need some shade.

The urge to plant is exceeded only by the great variety of things available for planting. If you don't believe this, get a new catalog and turn the pages or go to a nursery. When planting shrubs, don't forget they grow, so don't plant too close to the house where they will become crowded and ill-shaped. Another fault is planting too many, especially if they are small. The landscape will look a bit barren the first few years, but can be filled in with bulbs, perennials and annuals while the shrubs are growing. From now until the 15th of March, pruning of roses should be finished except for the climbers. Perhaps you read the article that noted roses are one of the easiest plants in the world to grow and thrive in every state in America. According to arboriculturists, the rose has been with us 35 million years. An amusing tale of commercial rose growers is the use of herds of sheep to defoliate the plants prior to harvest. The nimble sheep delicately chew away the leaves without damaging the canes. No machine or chemical has been found as yet that can improve upon them, better not try goats though. Feed pandas liquid fertilizer now for many early blooms. Finish thinning and pruning evergreens and soon the cuts will be concealed by new foliage. If you plant by the moon, it is time to plant vegetables that produce food above the ground. Wait until dark of the moon to plant your potatoes, radishes, beets etc.

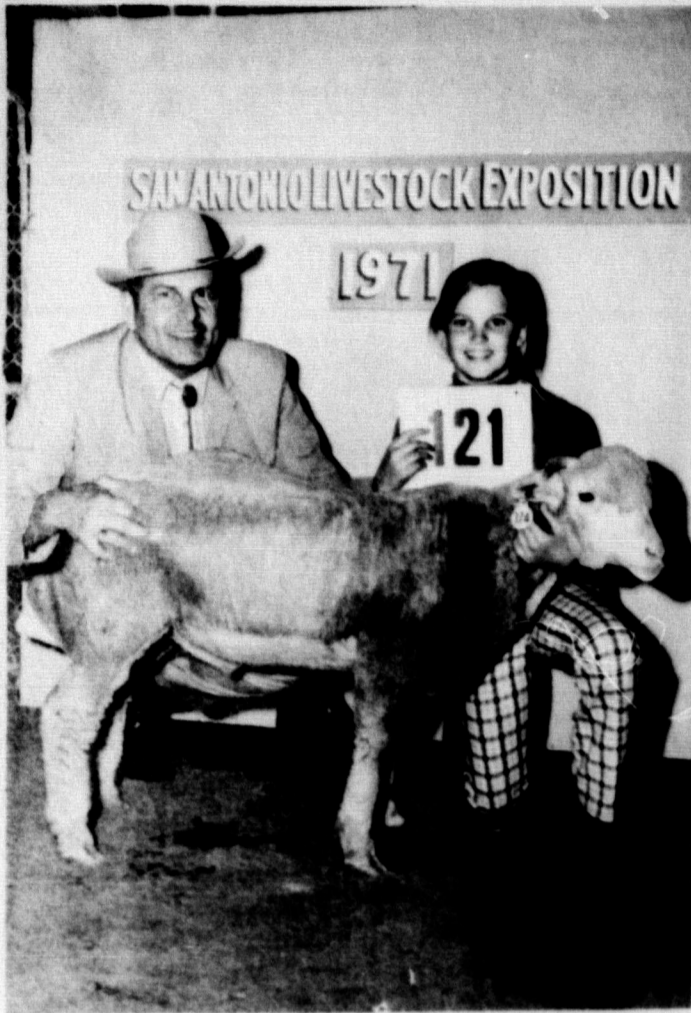

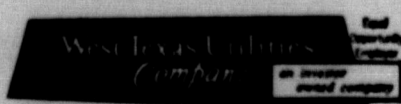
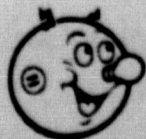
