

Crockett Co. Hospital Approved By Medicare the opening prayer was given by LaVon Pond and the closing prayer by Rebecca Eve-Crockett County Commis-

sioners Court met Monday in regular monthly session and were gratified to receive the hospital report that the facility has been approved by Medicare officials with only five defi-Fred Greer, hospital admin-

ciences. istrator, reported on the Medicare inspection which was held recently at the hospital. He said that the inspectors found only five minor deficiencies where 17 or more

were found a year ago. The inspectors recommended that crash bars be installed on all outside doors, replacement of all hollow core doors to patients rooms as a fire safety measure, replacement of the ceiling with fire-proof material, and a separate storage room for storing surplus

equipment. The court agreed to build a storage room behind the extra beds, equipment etc. All other county reports

were received and approved. Members to all county boards were reappointed for two-year terms and terms began April 1. One exception was the Civic Center board and Mrs. Napoleon Vitela will serve

in place of Jesus Castro. The court purchased another tank truck for the fire department, primarily for fighting grass fires. Stuart Motor was the low bidder. They also purchased a motor grader from the county for use in paving alleys, driveways and maintaining paved county roads.

Buried Monday

Funeral services for Dr. A. Fussell, 87, were held Monday afternoon at 4 p.m. from the Ozona United Methodist Church with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery. Rev. John Berkley, pastor, conducted the services.

Dr. Fussell died Saturday morning at Baptist Memorials Geriatric Hospital in San Angelo after a lengthy illness.

Dr. Fussell was born Jan. 16. 1884 in Rusk County and was the son of Jeff M. Fussell and Sarah Elizabeth Fussell. He attended schools at Laneville and Alexander Institute, later Lon Morris College, at Jacksonville. He was graduated from Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn., receiving his degree in dental surgery in 1908. He was an honor man of his class and received the Morrison Brothers Gold Medal for "General Proficiency," He was a member of Xi Psi Phi Dental Fraternity and a past

president of that organization. After receiving his degree, he returned to Texas and took the Dental Board examination. He became an associate of Dr. J. B. McCauley, president of the board, in general practice in Merkel. He moved to dental office.

He and Miss Vera Carmichael were married in Atlanta, Ga. Jan. 18, 1914 by Dr. H. by National Council Accredited M. Dubois, who later became Bishop Dubois.

In 1919 he moved his family to a ranch near Ozona. In 1924 he opened a dental office in Ozona and practiced until

his retirement in 1944. Dr. Fussell was past president of the West Texas Dental Association, past master of the Masonic Lodge at Cisco, and

a fifty-year Mason. He was affiliated with the Methodist Church early in life and was an active member both

BALANCE IN THE SUPREME COURT

It is impossible to underestimate the ultimate magnitude of the U.S. Supreme Court decisions now being reached in Washing ton. For years the Court has been dominated by extreme, left-leaning jurists who opened the floodgates for pornography and prostitution, encouraged "welfare" racketeering, vastly increased Federal control and power, gravely diminished local and state control, protected the "rights" of criminals while weakening the rights and privileges of law-abiding citizens, and in a thousand ways "radically changed" much of the moral and social structure of the United States. The results which flowed from the Supreme Court decisions cannot be defended the record, the statistics, the news accounts of moral and spiritual decay are all about us to see. Laws which were designed to restrain those who would destroy the ethical foundations of America were themselves destroyed by the "permissive" jurists, who again and again overturned the findings of lower judges, juries and courts.

However, in a whole series of recent decisions, the highest Court in the land has dramatically shifted back toward the center. Perhaps the best illustration was the ruling involving a Louisiana law which holds that an illegitimate child may not claim inheritance to the estate of the father ahead of other heirs. The Court refused to overturn the Louisiana law. Justice William J. Brennan Jr., writing for the minority, complained that the ruling upheld "the untenable and discredited moral prejudice of bygone centuries which vindictively punished the illegitimate's parents, but also the hopeless and innocent children."

Well - that may be, we're not about to judge whether the Louisiana statute is good or bad, but Justice Hugo L. Black, writing for the majority (which included Justices Warren Burger, Harry Blackmun, John M. Harlan and Potter Stewart.) simply declared that the Constitution does not give the Court the power to interfere with states' differing treatment of illegitimate children. Black further concluded that individual states, under the Constitution, have the right "to make rules to establish, protect, and strengthen family life."

This, of course, is what a great many of us ordinary citizens have been saying for a long time. Hopefully, the Supreme Court will continue to turn the power to govern back to the States and

IN YOUR LIFETIME

Ties For Gardeners

Few summer garden features large flower beds, if your garden is small, you can make it want a splash of color, or to brighten a bed of evergreen

Select annuals that will grow in relatively poor soil, such as, bush or trailing porte-

lavender and pentas do well in

shade. Nierembergia (cup flower) is a creeping plant that produces purple, blue or white flowers in full sun or partial shade.

Choose members of the shade-loving family for spots where the sun doesn't linger too long. The Sultanas are especially cheerful for afternoon shaded places and the always brilliant colors of caladiums last all summer.

Now is the time to get new plants from old geraniums. Rooting these cuttings from your winter houseplants is an easy way to increase your stock of plants for outdoor beds this summer. To do this, cut just below a small joint, three or four inches long.

Remove blooms, flower buds and lower leaves, leave only two or three top leaves, Remove stipules (little wings) that may be growing along the stems of the cuttings. Lightly dust the cut end of each stem with bydrated lime to discourage stem-end decay. Insert stem two or three inches into pot of moist, clean, and sharp builder's sand and firm sand around cutting. A sturdy root system should develop in three weeks. Keep all plants





While admittedly such orders do not give blanket auth-ority for unjustified criminal ects, any accusation must be viewed and evaluated in the backdrop of dangers -- real or apparent -- and all the pre ures and tensions that exist when such orders are being executed.

It is recognized the Lieutenant was acting under much stress, in a battle zone known to be extremely hostile. The village of My Lai had been used for weeks by enemy forces as a base from which bloody assaults had been launched against Americans, Snipers and booby traps were in abundance, and when our troops entered the tions may be appealed to the village they were expecting Supreme Court. village they were expecting hostile action from any concealed position. Under these circumstances it is understandable that shots were fired "at anything that moved. " That was the name of the game.

One of the distinctive features of the 1970's is an inward-existen & threatened in the turning attitude on the part of many Americans, On the lunatic fringe there is the phenomenon of the urban or rural commune where young people experiment in group living without formal ties or responsibilities. Strange new cults flourish in some of our major cities. The Manson trial in California lifted the lid on weird beliefs and practices in the midst of our modern society. Everywhere one sees cars and carryall buses with the word"love" printed on the sides, as though the painted symbol would effect an extraordinary transformation in people's lives, In many areas of national life one witnesses a retreat from or avoidance of reality.

This is not to say the United States hasn't had its share or cultists or eccentrics in the past. Groups such as the Shakers, a religious sect that be lieved in a primitive communism, established communal settlements in the 18th century. But such cults never gained a wide following. Today, the hippie style of life is established nationwide. Some of the cultists are what's known as weekend hippies, affluent people who dress up in hippie gear on Saturday and Sunday and return to a straight existence come Monday. Even so, one wonders what is the cause of this

strange charade. In New Orleans recently, 1 saw youthful panhandlers begging for "loose change." 1 was startled to hear one college-age girl ask -- in a no doubt unconscious echo of Depression days -- "mister, can you spare a dime. " The irony is compounded by the fact that this girl -- or others like her -- may have a Daddy who sends her an allowance to live like a hippie in the urban enclaves formed by persons who have dropped out of the producing society.

Perhaps the hippie style of life is the ultimate luxury in an affluent society. In societies where a stern struggle for life is the rule, the hippie is unknown. Dressing in beads, Indian head bands and fringed leather clothes can be regarded as a form of conspicuous consumption.

Whatever the psychological motivation -- and the clothes indicate an inner dissatisfaction with reality, the United States can ill-afford continuing indulgence in the hippie outlook -- the inward-looking attitude in any form. The nation's foreign policy is in disarray today because a very large number of people, in-cluding U. S. senators, believe one has only to chant "peace, peace" and the problems of the country are solved. The liberties of the American people can't be maintained by thinking "peace" but by de-fending them when they are

Some people in our country today have the notion that they an be passive in the face of threats and still enjoy the bles-sings of freedom. If such people are unwilling to fight for their country or pay taxes for defense, they can expect their land to


