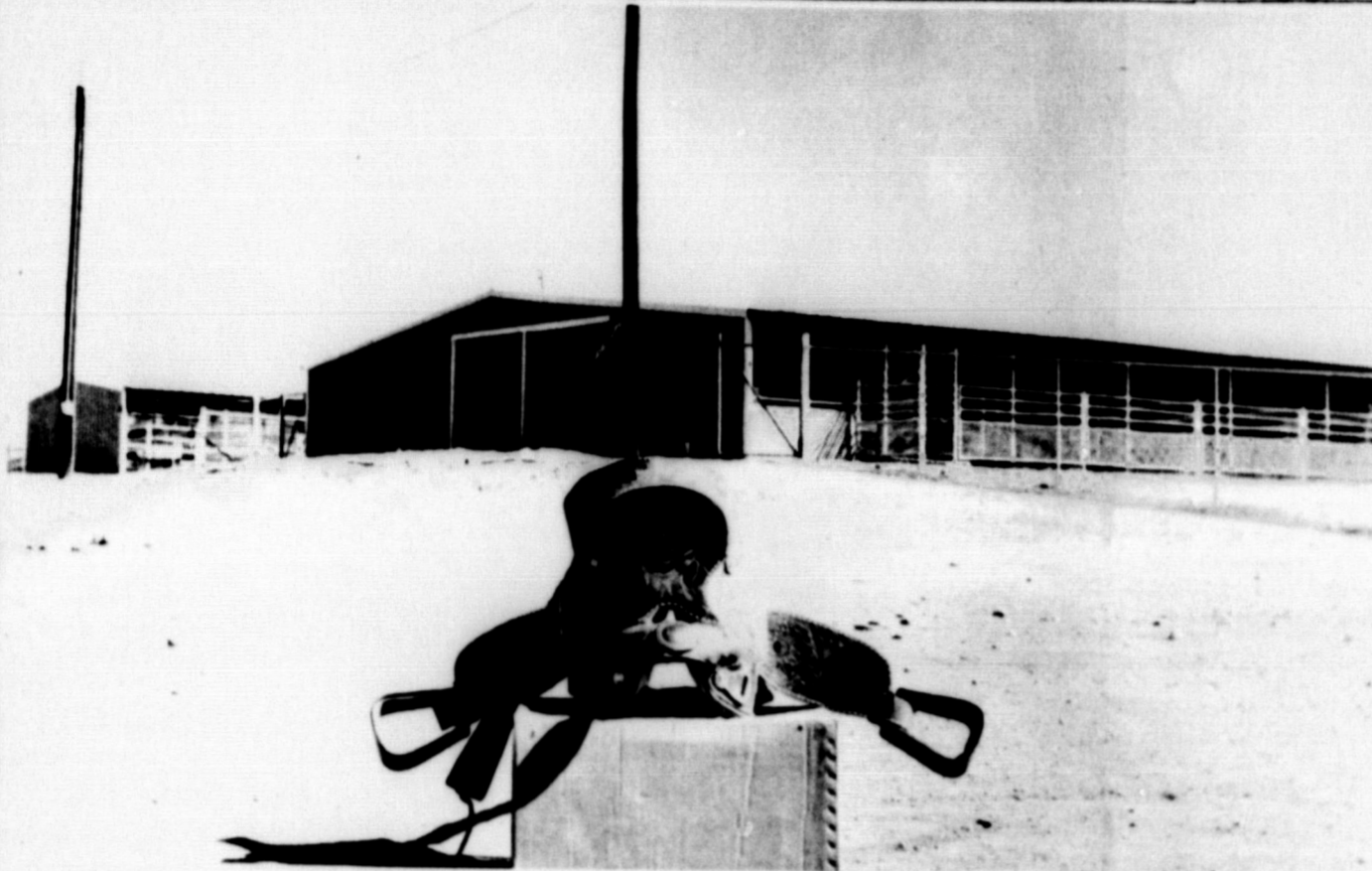

OHS Golf Team, Two Track Stars Represent Ozona In State Meet

The Ozona Lions Golf Team, winner of the Regional Class AA Golf Meet at Lubbock last weekend, will compete at the State Meet in Austin May 7-8 against three other Class AA regional winners for the state title in golf.

In Austin for the State Track Meet will be David Pagan and Chuck Womack, the two Lion tracksters who qualified for State at the Regional Meet in Lubbock. Pagan won the discus event and set a new record in Class AA with a throw of 159'9-3/4" and came in second in the shot with a throw of 51'6". Womack, with a pole vault of 14'2" set a school record in the event and broke the existing record, but came in second behind the winner, Larry Peatrel of Idalou, who had a vault of 14'6". The track meet and golf meet will be held at the same time.

The golf team won the Regional title by one stroke up on Brady. At the end of the first day's play in Lubbock, the Lions were eight strokes behind Brady and ten strokes ahead of Big Lake, the district winner. In the final round of play Friday, the Lions pulled up on Brady to finish with a one-stroke lead and beat the district winner by 25 strokes.

The team score was 633. Individual scores were David Williams 151, Mike Williams 154, Rick Webster 159, Jim Montgomery 169 and Lesley Russell 177. The same five boys will make up the team at the State Meet with the lowest four scores counting.

They will tee-off at 8 a.m. both Friday and Saturday mornings at the Morris Williams Municipal Golf Course in Austin. Golf teams from all over the state, Class B to Class 4-A, will compete with four regional winners in each division.

The regional medalist from Floydada had a two-day total of 147. David Williams was third and Mike Williams, fifth in the competition for low medalist.

The team is coached by Charles Spieker.

The Lion Track team took fourth place at the Regional Meet with 26 points. The only other individual winner besides Pagan and Womack was Mike Wellman who finished seventh in the 330 hurdles with a time of 41.4.

Ozona's sprint relay team failed to qualify when they dropped the stick in the prelims.

David Sewell ran a 15.4 flight of 120 high hurdles and Robert Maldonado ran a 10.1 hundred and a 23.0 220 dash, both boys turning in their fastest times. Dean Shaw failed to show in the mile run.

Track coach John Richey was pleased with all performances, since most boys still have two years on the team.

Horse Judging Team To Compete In State

The Crockett County 4-H Senior Horse Judging team took top honors in the District 6 4-H Horse Judging contest in Fort Stockton Saturday when they bested six other 4-H teams in the district. The win qualified the team to enter the State 4-H Horse Judging Contest at Texas A&M in June.

Mark Tillman was third high overall individual and Kay McMullan was fifth high in the contest. Lida Tillman and Shelley Jones were the other members of the winning team.

The Junior 4-H Horse Judging team placed sixth with Anne Tillman fourth overall high individual and third in placings in the junior division. Other junior team members were Debra Clayton and Cliff McMullan. Sally Bailey was team alternate on the senior division.

Mrs. Frank McMullan, Jr., coached the district winner, assisted by Erby Chandler and P. C. Perner.

Gary Lee Boyd Vietnam Veteran Killed In Crash

Funeral services for Gary Lee Boyd, 24, were held Monday morning from the Ozona Church of Christ with burial and graveside services at Lawnhaven Memorial Gardens in San Angelo with full military rites.

Boyd, a veteran of the Vietnam war, was killed in a one-vehicle rollover 4.6 miles south of San Angelo on U. S. 87 at 11 p.m. Thursday. He was a passenger in a pickup driven by Gary Don Bomar of Ballinger. Bomar was not injured in the crash. Both young men were students at Angelo State University.

According to investigating officer, Highway Patrolman Max Knox of San Angelo, the pickup failed to negotiate a curve, skidded, hit four guard posts and overturned. Boyd was thrown from the pickup and the vehicle then rolled over on him. He died instantly of massive head injuries. The driver was uninjured.

Gary was born March 12, 1947 in San Angelo. He attended Ozona public schools and graduated from Ozona High School in 1965. He was a junior student at ASU.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Homer Boyd of Ozona; a half-brother, Rodney Mace of Houston; his grandmother, Mrs. Sam C. Black of Fort Worth and numerous aunts and uncles.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

Many Americans applaud Martha Mitchell's reaction to the Supreme Court's recent ruling against the neighborhood school concept.

The wife of the Attorney General was appalled by the high court's action in holding that local public schools may be forced to bus youngsters away from their own schools, and make them attend schools across town for the sole purpose of achieving a better racial mixture.

The ruling applies only to southern schools (including Texas). The court declined to pass on whether this concept must also apply to New York, Chicago, Boston, and other cities where today there are as good many schools in which as many as 90% of students are black.

About the same time the court ruled, Senator Abe Ribicoff of Connecticut offered an amendment to a bill which would require the same integration rules to apply to all schools alike, throughout the country. The amendment was defeated.

Following the Supreme Court ruling I joined with others in offering a proposed constitutional amendment which would eliminate race as a factor in the assignment of students to schools. The same amendment would also prohibit the consideration of race as a factor in obtaining jobs.

In other words, the purpose is to assure that all Americans, of all races, be treated alike -- regardless of race.

Re-Entry For Crockett Test; Kincaid Gassor

Tamarack Petroleum Co., Inc., Midland, will attempt to re-open Ellenburger oil production in the Buckhorn (Ellenburger gas) field of Crockett County with the re-entry and deepening from 8,105 feet to 8,170 feet at its No. 2-16 Smith, former gas producer 3/8 mile northeast of the former Ellenburger oil opener which was recompleted as a gas producer, and 1 1/4 miles northeast of Ozona.

It was finalized March 5, 1967, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 5.9 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 13,238-1, through perforations at 7,906 feet on ground elevation of 2,488 feet.

Location is 2,242.6 feet from the north and 822 feet from the east lines of 16-AB-D&SE.

The Ellenburger oil opener, Willis & Craig, (now Tamarack) Midland, No. 1-16 Melissa Childress Smith, was finalized March 16, 1955 for a daily flowing potential of 213.13 barrels of 44.1 gravity oil, no water through a 1/8 inch choke and open hole at 5,130-162 feet.

Texaco Inc., Midland, No. S-D A. R. Kincaid Trust, 3/4 mile northeast of Canyon sand producer in the Ozona (Canyon sand gas and Clearfork oil) field and 5/8 mile north and slightly west of 6,200-foot Canyon production in the Davidson Ranch multipay field of Crockett County, four miles southeast of Ozona, was finalized from the Canyon sand for a calculated, absolute open flow of 106,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 31,250-1.

Production was through perforations at 6,213-6,371 feet, which had been acidified with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 400 gallons and 174,900 pounds of sand. Gravity of the condensate was 3.4 degrees.

Location is 1,920 feet from the south and east lines of 92-GH-C. R. Brooks original grantee.

Horse Club Has Sunday Meeting

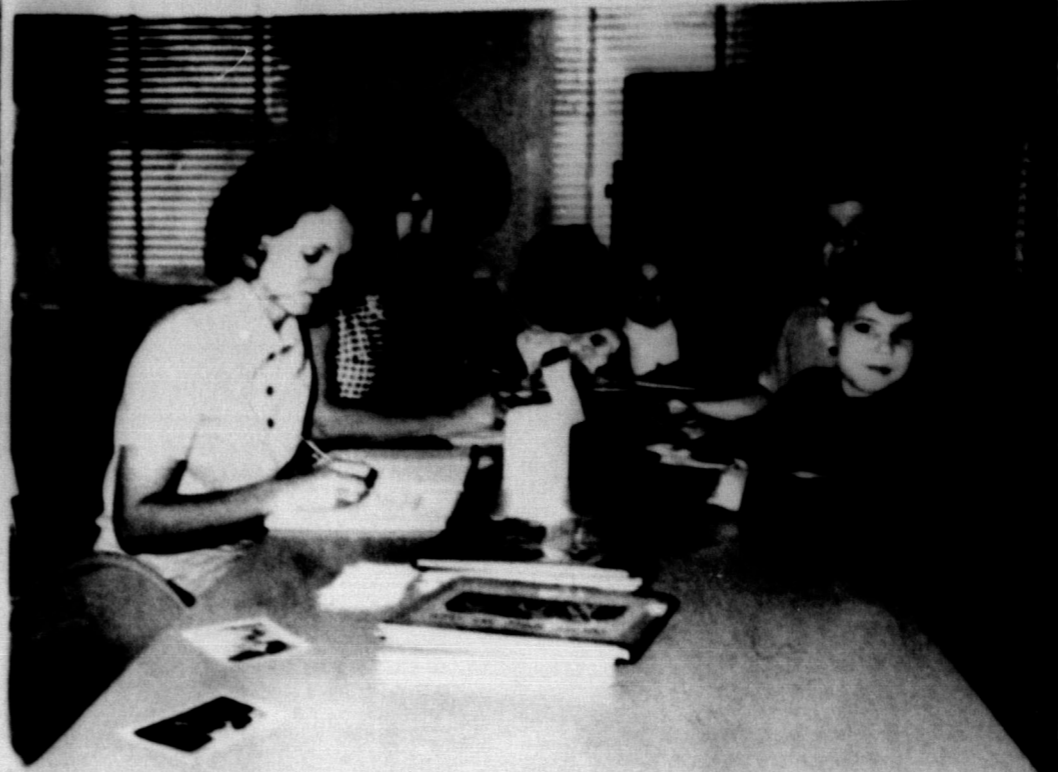
Members of the 4-H Horse Club met Sunday afternoon at the fair park arena. Around 40 members were present.

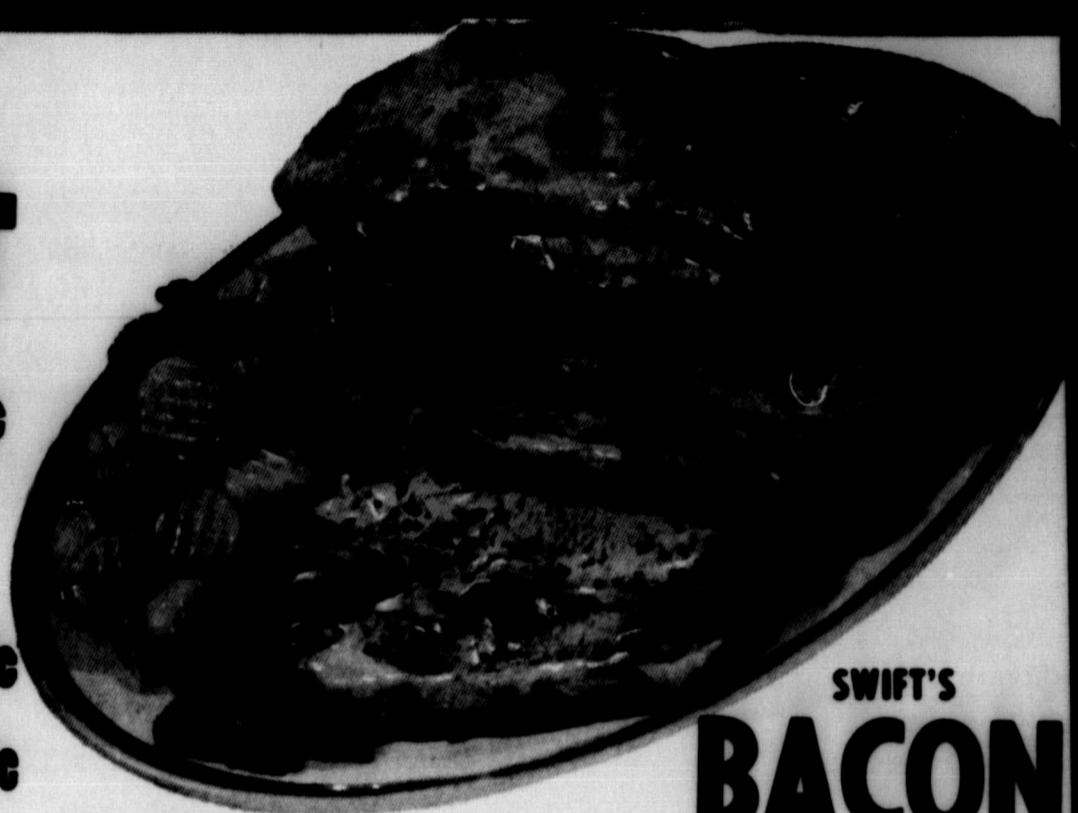

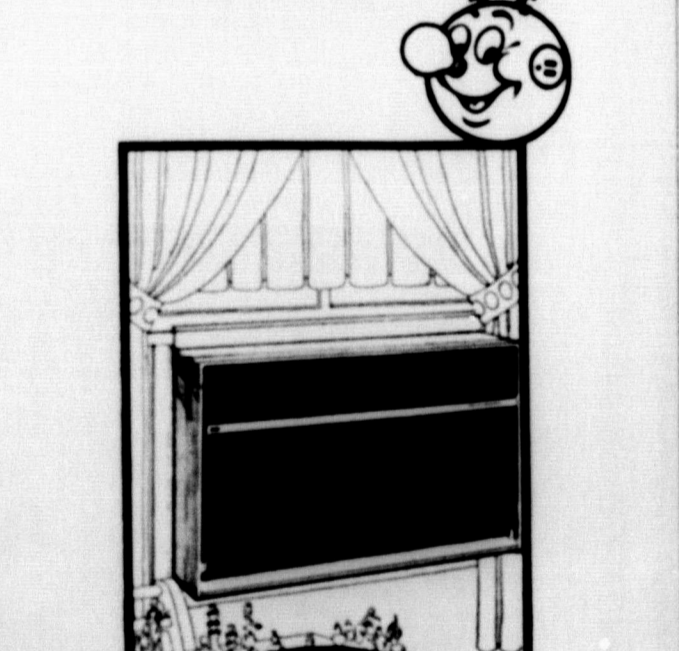

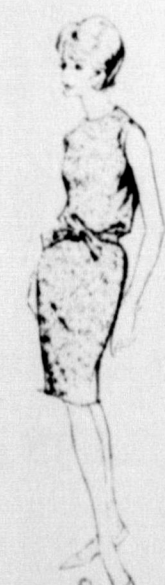
