the past week soaked dry range lands to the saturation point and water was literally standing everywhere by week's end.

Draws, dry creek beds and even ditches were sent running bank to bank, and there was one death due to drowning in the county. Gustavo Sarola drowned Thursday afternoon after he drove his pickup off into Johnson Draw two miles south of Ozona, Several ranchmen in the county found themselves stranded due to high water and many waited hours before being able to return to their homes or dry land.

The largest rainfall reported was ten inches on one of the ranches in the southwestern part of the county, where six inches was common for the three-day period.

The steady downpour began late Wednesday night and by 7:30 a.m. Thursday morning the official gauge at the Water District office contained 1,31 inches. A constant rain all day Thursday saw the gauge reading 2.30 inches at 2:30 p.m., for a total of 3,61 inches in a little over 12 hours. Intermittent rain Thursday night and Friday morning totaled . 92 of an inch at 8:00 a.m. Friday, and throughout the day another . 65 of an inche fell. for a 3-day total of 5.18 in the city. Some gauges around town measured more than the official gauge, and falls were heavier to the west and southwest, but the county enjoyed generally. a soaking rain all over.

A brief drizzle fell Tuesday morning with heavy cloud cover before the sun came out around noon. The forecast was for more rain this weekend and cooler weather.

## **Gas Plant Employe Is Drowned** Rain Swollen Johnson Draw

Gustavo Raul Sorola, 49. drowned in rain-swollen Johnson Draw last Thursday afternoon about two miles south of Ozona.

Sorola, janitor at Ozona Gas Processing Plant, was crossing the draw about 2:15 when his pickup stalled in the high water. His cries for help brought other employes to his aid. He was attaching a cable to the stalled vehicle when the water shifted the pickup and Sorola lost his footing and was swept downstream. He was carried to a wire fence at the crossing and managed to



The more radical elements know precisely what they are doing. They envision prisoners in the role of a revolutionary class, men who will not hesitate to terrorize a community as a means of transforming it. Thus the radical leadership encourages Marxist political consciousness among hardened criminals.

Decent citizens should demand that agencies of governnent adopt a much tougher ine in dealing with politicized criminals and their supporters. The Attica rebellion demonstrates the need for restoring the death penalty. Hardened criminals such as the Attica ringleaders don't hesitate to undertake new. bloody deeds because they are confident that capital punishment is a dead letter in the inited States. If the electric chair had been in use in New York State, the Attica uprising might not have taken place.

Beyond that, state authorities must screen prison populations more carefully, isolating politicized criminals bent on revolutionary activities behind orison walls. And states most certainly must refuse to permit New Left "observers" to negotiate with or represent prisoners.

Prison reforms are needed in of inmates, incarcerated for minor crimes, can be rehabilitated. But much tougher security measures must be applied to Black Panthers and similar types now operating inside prisons, stirring bloody rebellion against lawful authority. ### Tips for Gardeners

Mrs. Balley Post With all the abundance of rain we have had, it's almost unbelievable that this is really Southwest Texas, It's great to go into the fall season with plenty of moisture for garden preparation, planting and

growth on all plants, trees and To keep ahead of the enormous weed crop everyone is urged to act now, and accept the challenge of a real clean-

up to beautify our environment. Several have mentioned trouble controlling nutgrass in flower beds and lawns. The best way is to learn what it looks like, so you will know to remove any you may have at once, or before it becomes a real problem. Nutgrass can be treated with a weed killer, but will take several seasons. If in the lawn, keep pulled out until the turf is thick, and the nuts will become inactive.

Perhaps you have Youpon hollies and have berries on some while others have none. The Yaupon, like other hollies, has male or female flowers, but never both kinds on one plant. The male plant does not produce berries, If your plants have yellow leaves, this may indicate a nutritional deficience caused by the heavy demand of a large berry crop. Fertilize now with a light application of a balanced commercial fertilizer such as 8-8-8 or 10-10-10. In future years if there is a heavy bloom or fruit set, fertilize in the spring and again in early summer. If this

chelated iron should help. At this time of the year, leaves of trees and shrubs tend to fade out to a yellowish color. sometimes brown on the edges. This is caused by heat of summer, and shortage of soil moisture. We shouldn't have that problem now. Nature uses late summer and fall to prepare woody plants for winter so they should not be growing vigorous-ly in the fall so that early cold pells could injure them severely. After the soil drys out, hoe or spade lightly to provide a better condition for water pene-

WASHINGTON **NEWS LETTER** 

Congressman O. C. Fisher

By a cliff-hanger margin of only 5 votes, the House last week blocked, at least temporarily, a move to give unprecented authority to the Great Society's Equal Employment Opportunities (EEOC) Cammis-

That agency, which now has authority to investigate alleged discrimination in employment and then seek voluntary solutions by persuasion and mediation, sought cease- and-desist enforcement powers -- an authority normally exercised only

EEOC also sought power to run herd on employment practices over state and local employees and those who work for

As proposed, the agency would have been empowered to dictate to employers whom they can or cannot hire, whom they can or cannot fire, and whom they can or cannot promote. It would give to this bureau in Washington authority to act as complainant, investigator, prosecutor, judge and jury -- all racked up in one package. And the unfortunate victim -- whether it be an employer or an employee -would be accorded no right of trial by jury.

The bill now goes to the Senate which, judging by past actions on the subject, is expected to restore the powers sou-




