Equipment has been added to the signal lights at the intersection and bet it will work this time.

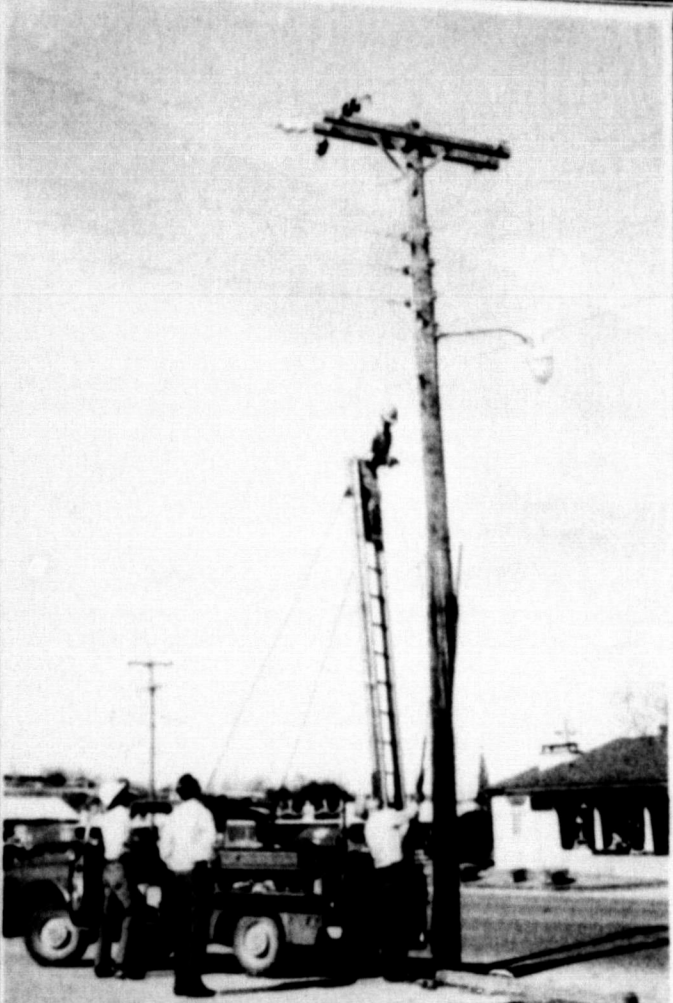

1971 Bountiful Rains Brought End to Drouth

This time last year local and area residents were welcoming the end of one of the driest years in the history of rainfall in the county, while the end of this year brings a record abundance of annual rainfall. The entire total for last year was 11.15 inches, compared with a big 32.16 inches of rainfall for this year.

This is the first time the total rainfall has hit the 30-inch mark since 1941 when a total of 38.08 inches was recorded. The record goes back to 1931 and this year's total is only the second time in the forty years that the county has received 30 inches or more annual rainfall.

Although 1971 was a record wet year, 1970 was not a record dry year. 1951 holds the dubious distinction of being the record dry year with a total rainfall of 7.23, followed closely by 1952 with a total of 8.27.

In spite of the record rainfall this year, the year began with a very dry three months January contributed .07 with February adding .08 of an inch of moisture. Not a trace of rainfall was recorded in March and it was the middle of April before the rains came. April 15 and 16 heavy rains amounted to 4.06 inches, more than the preceding six months totaled.

All Aliens Must Register During Month of January

District Director, Albert G. Vaughn of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has announced that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future. All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month.

Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited Diplomats; and (2) Persons admitted to certain international organizations.

Forms which make the report can be obtained from any Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service Office during the month of January. Also, this year the reporting requirement has been broadened to additionally provide for the Mailing of completed address reports directly to the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. The cards will still be received at all post offices and Immigration Service offices as in the past. Mr. Vaughn said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

The crudely printed paper has leftwing editorials but, in the main, consists of classified advertisements of a non-political character.

values or development of sound new values. Many people feel emotionally dislocated as a result of a continual round of moves from neighborhood to neighborhood and city to city. In the past, the neighborhood school served a constructive purpose in developing community feeling among the young. But government officials oppose the neighborhood school concept. They also are opposed to neighborhoods that aren't racially balanced. All the pressures of society are mounted in such a way to produce alienation.

Many people wonder why there hasn't been more patriotism in recent years. But lack of identification with place unquestionably is a factor in the dimming of patriotism for many young people. If one doesn't truly have roots in a community, if one lacks a sense of place, how is patriotism to develop?

I recall visiting Israel several years ago and being told that the young people in the country's youth movement came out

around the country. They walked over the hills and valleys, discovering Israel and getting its sand and rocks in their shoes and sandals. A studied effort was launched to make young people know their land and to love it.

Perhaps we need something of the sort. But we also need a stabilization of our society and a restoration of the feeling of community. Because of the enormous mobility in American life, all our institutions should concentrate upon creating stability and strengthening community feeling. Neighborhood schools are a must. Decentralization of government is also vital. Perhaps it is time to split up giant cities such as New York into constituent boroughs, undoing the centralization of the 19th century. Community feeling, of course, requires a return to law and order, to peaceful streets where one can walk in safety day or night. European cities are safe. People walk at night in Athens, Greece, without fear of attack. It is essential that this condition prevail in the United States.

A nation is a great community, a complex involving many lesser communities. If we want our greater community to be sound, we must rebuild all the lesser communities. Re-creating neighborhoods should be a great imperative for Americans in the remaining years of the 1970's.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

After the 1971 dust settles and the year's developments are evaluated, it is likely that history will say the change in the complexion and direction of the Supreme Court was most significant. While it will take time to discern the trend and the impact, all indications are the Constitution, after being mauled and distorted during two decades, will come back into its own.

President Nixon's recent appointments of Lewis F. Powell, William H. Rehnquist, succeeded by his choice of

Chief Justice Warren E. Burger and Justice Harry A. Blackmun, should restore the court to its proper purpose and respect in our scheme of government. Certainly that high tribunal's influence on law and order has been vastly enhanced.

The President is entitled to much acclaim for this great achievement. The most recent nomination to be confirmed, Justice Rehnquist, following bitter radical opposition in the Senate, appears to have nailed down the

big transition. Rehnquist, an Arizona product, finished first in law school at Stanford, and in his practice, proved himself to be a brilliant legal scholar. He once referred to radical protesters as "the new barbarians," and at one time opposed breaking up of neighborhood schools to obtain racial balance. As Assistant Attorney General he irritated the Far Left by approving mass arrests of anti-war demonstrators who brazenly tried to shut down the

government by blocking Washington streets last May.

As an indicator of trembling fear of the political walloping of radicals, the press noted that Rehnquist's confirmation was opposed by all the Democratic Senators who are considered to be candidates for the Presidential nomination. But to the credit of the Senate, confirmation was approved by a whopping 68-26 majority.

Tips For Gardeners
 From The

December duties for your plants may have been few, but there are some do's and don't's.

Pamper your poinsettias and Christmas cactus. Check your catalogue to make seed and plant list. Be thoughtful of your garden friends, the birds, keeping water available at all times.

Attend bazaar and garden events where you will pick up new ideas for your landscaping and plants.

Unless you have to move them, don't disturb the roots of ornamentals. Don't be careless and forget to water evergreens if they need more moisture.

Living plants create an atmosphere of warmth whether indoors or out. Many of you received potted plants for Christmas, so extend your enjoyment of them with proper care.

Because of its brilliant color and seasonal bloom, the poinsettia has become a symbol of the Christmas season. Given abundant light and water, they should remain attractive indoors for weeks. Keep them between 75 and 80 degrees during the day and cooler at night. Water them when the soil feels dry. If pot is wrapped in decorative foil, punch a hole in the bottom to allow excess water to drain out.

The Christmas begonia should be given full sunlight if possible, and night temperature should be near 60 degrees.

Beautiful flowering azaleas in colors of pink, rose, red, crimson, white and orchid will brighten any home at Christmas time. Although

azaleas hold up well in the average atmosphere of the home, they should be kept in a cool spot while in flower, especially at night. If you buy an Azalea, get one with many buds and just a few open flowers. Do not let the soil dry out excessively, but if it should submerge the pot in a deep pan of water. Let it remain in the water until bubbles stop rising, then remove and let excess water drain off. After blooming remove all withered flowers and keep the plants in a cool sunny location. When warm water arrives, plant in a semi-shaded place on the east or north side of the house and can receive regular attention. They should have an acid soil consisting of humus, peat moss or leaf mold in the soil.

Other plants you may have received are orchids, chrysanthemums, cyclamen, African violet, Kalanchoe, Jerusalem cherry and forced spring bulbs. Proper care will extend the blooming period and increase your enjoyment of them. Water plants thoroughly when they require it, allowing excess water to drain off. Let soil around the plant dry somewhat before watering again. Give flowering plants plenty of light and keep rather cool at night.

Federal Land Bank Reduces Interest Rate

E. Prugel, Manager of Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora, announced that the Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce its interest rate on variable rate loans to 7%. "This reduction will be effective January 1, 1972 on all variable rate loans and affects more than 177 million dollars in loan volume to more than 5,000 Texas farmers and ranchers," Mr. Prugel stated.

The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July, 1969, let the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. This is the third time in the past year that the billing rate has been reduced. "Continued improvement in

the money market has made this reduction possible and is in line with the Bank's policy of providing farmers and ranchers of Texas credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices," Mr. Prugel stated.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans throughout Texas. The Bank has over 573 million dollars in volume of loans outstanding. The local association makes and services loans in 3 counties. Officers

and directors of the association are Frank Bond, Sonora; James T. Williams Jr. and Otis Deal, Eldorado, and Pleas Childress Jr. and Chas. E. Davidson III of Ozona.

New Almanacs Chuck Full Of Facts Of Texas

Figures from the 1970 U. S. Census, a history of the Texas tidelands and many other new features are found in the 704 pages of the 1972-'73 Texas Almanac, published by the A. H. Belo Corporation, publishers of the Dallas Morning News.

While data from the decennial U. S. Census are expected to be among the most widely used material in the new publication, editor Walter B. Moore said that there are many features not found in the previous edition. Among these are:

A history of telephones in Texas, prepared by leaders in the telephone industry.

A history of grain sorghums in Texas, co-authored by J. Roy Quinby, sorghum researcher who received the Hobbittelle Award for his achievements.

The tidelands history prepared with the collaboration of Judge Price Daniel, formerly U. S. Senator and Governor of Texas; and Attorney General Crawford Martin, both active in the successful program to save this rich asset for Texans.

Election results, listings of county, municipal and state officials, amendments to the Texas Constitution and those to be voted on in 1972, appointive boards and commissions, officials of state and regional civic and trade organizations and many other listings are expected to make this edition widely used as a reference for business offices, schools, public offices and other centers, Moore said.
