1971 Bountiful Rains Brought End to Drouth a total rainfall of 7.23, fol-

This time last year local and area residents were welcoming the end of one of the driest years in the history of rainfall in the county, while the end of this year brings a record abundance of annual rainfall. The entire total for last year was 11.15 inches, compared with a big 32.16

inches of rainfall for this year. This is the first time the total rainfall has hit the 30inch mark since 1941 when a total of 38.08 inches was recorded. The record goes back to 1931 and this year's total is only the second time in the forty years that the county has received 30 inches or more annual rainfall.

Although 1971 was a record wet year, 1970 was not a record dry year. 1951 holds the dubious distinction of being the record dry year with

All: Aliens Must Register During Month of January

District Director, Albert G. Vaughn of the Immigration and Mr. and Mrs. P. C. Perner of Naturalization Service has announced that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the mear future. All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month, Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited Diplomats: and (2) Persons accredited to certain interna-

tional organizations. Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service Office during the month of January. Also, this year the reporting requirement has been broadened to additionally provide for the Mailing of completed address reports directly to the nearest office of the immigration and Naturalization Service. The cards will still be received at all post offices and immigration Service offices as in the past, Mr. Vaughan said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with

Senator Tower, a native Texan, was born in Houston, the son and grandson of Methodist ministers. During his childhood he lived in a number of Texas communities.

At age 17, he enlisted in the U. S. Navy, and during World War II saw combat duty as a Seaman aboard a gunboat in Asian waters. He continues his service in the Navy's standby reserves holding the rank of Boatswain's Mate 2nd Class. the only enlisted reservist in Congress.

Tower received a bachelor's degree in political science from Southwestern University in Georgetown in 1948. He received his master's, also in political science, from S.M.U. in 1953. He did post-graduate work at the University of London in Great Britain, and taught political science for nine years at Midwestern Uni versity in Wichita Falls.

As a U.S. Senator, Tower has made seven trips to South Vietnam and other Southeast Asian nations, spending more time with U.S. troops in Vietnam than any other member of Congress.

Senator Tower makes his home in Wichita Falls with his wife and three teen-aged daughters.

He is a trustee of Southwestern University and Southern Methodist University. Tower is a 32nd-degree Mason and Shriner, is active in Kappa Sigma fraternity, and is a member of the American Association of University Profes-

This is the era of a massive freak population in New York, of rampant crime and violence of the shuttered and locked store where the owner admirs only known customers. New York today is ansafe and only the freaks and criminals enjoy full use of the city streets at all hours.

Ever since the early 1950's, the middle class and akilled working people have been fleeing Manhattan for the Long Island suburbs. They seek to escape the crime and instability of life in the inner city.

Actually, this is a national phenomenon. The old cities of the country are in grave trouble as central areas are abandoned by blue and white collar people understandably fearful of crime and deteriorating property values, Conditions in Manhattan simply re-

present an extreme. Meanwhile, the inner cities fill up with unskilled, increasingly lawless people without the social discipline and selfreliance necessary for city living. Absurdly high minimum wage requirements deny employment opportunities to this population. Welfarism is a way of life for these people -- an ugly, destructive existence, The conditions of parisitism breed violence, extremism and alienation from the mainstream of American life,

But the condition of the slum populations in the inner cities is not the only disturbing social development in our country. Many of the middle class people leaving their old neighborhoods fail to find true communities elsewhere. The mobility of our people is urtful to maintenance of old

Tips For Gardeners

December duties to your plants may have been few. out there are some do's and

Pamper your poinsettias and Christmas cactus. Check your catalogue to make seed and plant list. Be thoughtful of your garden friends, the birds, keeping water available at all times. Attend bazaar and garden

events where you will pick up new ideas for your land-

scaping and plants.
Unless you have to move them, don't disturb the roots of ornamentals. Don't be careless and forget to water evergreens if they need more

Living plants create an atmosphere of warmth whether indoors or out. Many of you received potted plants for Christmas, so extend your enjoyment of them with pro-

Because of its brilliant color and seasonal bloom, the poinsettia has become a symbol of the Christmas season. Given abundant light and water, they should remain attractive indoors for weeks. Keep them between 75 and 80 degrees during the day and cooler at night, Water them when the soil feels dry. If pot is wrapped in decorative foil, punch a hole in the bottom to allow excess water to drain out.

The Christmas begonia should be given full sunlight if possible, and night temperature should be near 60

Beautiful flowering azaleas in colors of pink, rose, red . crimson, white and orchid will brighten any home at Christmas time. Although

azaleas hold up well in the average atmosphere of the home, they should be kept in a cool pot while in flower, especially at night. If you buy an Azalea, get one with many buds and just a few open flowers. Do not let the soil dry out excessively, but if it should ubmerge the pot in a deep pan of water. Let it remain in the water until bubbles stop rising, then remove and let excess water drain off. After blooming remove all withered flowers and keep the plants in a cool sunny location. When warm water arrives, plant in a semi-shaded place on the east or north side of the house and can receive regular atten-tion. They should have an acid soil consisting of humas, peat moss or leaf mold in the






