Open House to Observe Hiway Week In Texas

Governor Preston Smith has proclaimed September 19-15 as "Highway Week in Texas." By official memorandum Governor Smith pointed out that the Texas highway system encompasses some 70 thousand miles of the nation's finest roads and highways.
"These vital travelways are essential to the continued growth of the Texas economy and form the 'backbone' in the Lone Star State," the memorandum said, setting the theme for the annual observance.
Governor Smith cited the Texas Highway Department for more than 40 years of leadership in highway beautification and safety, service and efficiency of the highway system.
He described the Highway Department as "The State's Largest Gardener" which plants more trees, wildflowers and ornamental shrubs than any other organization in the State.
Governor Smith urged "all citizens to lend their support to the highway program and the Texas Highway Depart-

ment."
Highway Department installations across the State will stage special open house and other special ceremonies to mark the observance.
The Ozona Engineering Office and Maintenance Section will hold open house at the Maintenance Section in this area on Friday, Sept. 24, from 1 to 5 p.m. Everyone is cordially invited and urged to attend these ceremonies which will include showing of equipment, demonstrations of its use and displays of methods in construction and maintenance of highways, Scotty Houston, maintenance foreman, and W. F. Dixon, resident engineer, announced.
Highway Week in Texas has been under sponsorship of the Texas Good Roads Association since the first such observance a decade ago.

Screwworm Situation In Texas Worsening

College Station -- Livestock producers over the state are urged to be on the alert for screwworms as numerous cases continue to spread over the Hill Country, Edwards Plateau, Big Bend and South Texas areas. Officials of the Mission Screwworm Program report that 19 cases were confirmed during the week ending Sept. 3, marking this the worst week since the last week in December, 1968. Furthermore, 16 cases were confirmed during the Labor Day weekend, Texas thus far has recorded 138 cases with the U. S. count at 161.
And the situation could worsen, according to officials. Screwworm outbreaks traditionally occur in late summer and fall, so producers should check their animals periodically and treat any wounds found. Spraying of herds is also recommended and operations such as dehorning and castrating should be delayed until cooler weather sets in. All man-made wounds, such as those resulting from shearing, should be treated.
Pets, such as dogs and cats, should also be kept under constant watch, said officials.
Any larvae collected from wounds should be sent to the Mission Screwworm Laboratory for identification. The mailing address is Box 969, Mission, Texas. Collection kits and vials are available from local county agricultural agents.
Counties in which screwworm cases were confirmed last week include Presidio, Maverick, Crockett, Terrell, Bowie, Kinney, San Saba, Uvalde, Lampasas and Val Verde. Two cases were also recorded in Little River County, Arkansas.

T. A. Kincaid, Jr. Named To TAHC

Austin - Gov. Preston Smith has appointed T. A. Kincaid Jr. of Laveria and Ozona to a six-year term as a member of the Texas Animal Health Commission.
Kincaid is being appointed as a representative of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. He replaces Robert W. Hodge of Del Rio, whose term has expired.
The appointment is effective immediately and extends until Sept. 6, 1977.
Also appointed to the commission was Don G. Brothers of Paducah.

Teletype Network Is Operational In Area

The Concho Valley Council of Governments Law Enforcement Teletype Network became operational last week. Crockett County is a member station of the network.
Crockett County's teletype is assigned to the Sheriff's office, but is located in the Department of Communications Building and is operated by DPS personnel.
With the teletype network becoming operational, there should be considerable improvement in communication between law enforcement agencies in the Concho Valley area. Until now, only the San Angelo Police Department has had teletype communications in the 14-county region. Under certain atmospheric conditions and during certain peak traffic loads, radio communications has been extremely unreliable.
By relaying teletype messages, atmospheric disturbances as a factor in communicating will be eliminated and the radio traffic load will be relieved, thus improving communications.
The network will tie into the Texas Department of Public Safety teletype switcher in Austin, connecting it with every law enforcement teletype instrument in the State of Texas. This same switching procedure transmits messages to the National Crime Information Center in Washington, D. C., when certain types of offenses are involved. Cost of operation of the net is being borne by the Texas Criminal Justice Council, paying 74%, and the local users accounting for 26%. This financial arrangement provides teletype service to local users at a cost far below that of any service previously available.

Vaughn Multipay Field Gains 2nd Queen Producer

The Vaughn multipay field of Crockett County gained its second Queen producer and a location northwest extension to that pay with completion of M. C. Vinson, Midland, No. 1-18 Shannon, 12 miles northwest of Ozona, for a daily pumping potential of 50 barrels of 32 gravity oil, plus 14 barrels of water.
Production was through perforations at 895-1,093 feet, which had been acidized with 250 gallons and fractured with 5,000 gallons.
Location is 467 feet from the south and east lines of 18-UV-GC&SF.
The discovery, his No. 1-4 Shannon, was finalized April 28 for 27 barrels of 26.4 gravity oil, plus 40 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 3,500-1, through a 1/2-inch choke and perforations at 1,093-98 feet.

Lions To Eldorado Seeking Second Win

The Ozona Lions head for Eldorado tomorrow night for their second game of the new football season. The Lions will be trying to make it two in a row after winning their first one with Junction last Friday night 7-0.
Eldorado beat Rankin last Friday night 20-19 in the final few minutes of play. The Eagles won it on the passing of highly touted Archie Nixon.
The Lions' secondary will have its work cut out for it and if they can contain the Eagles in the air, they have a good chance to pick up their second straight win.
Ruben Tambunga and Gerald Huff were injured in the Junction game, but will be ready to go against the Eagles tomorrow night. Tambunga received a bruised knee early in the game and left the field early in the second quarter. He was replaced by Timmy Evans, who did a fine job of filling in.
Coach Sewell was pleased with his Lions' first effort, considering the inexperience. The majority of the Lion starters were playing their first game in the starting lineup for the varsity, many with B-team experience.
Tambunga got the only score in the game on a 4-yard power sweep with David Sewell kicking the extra point, and it proved enough for the

victory.
Ricky Webster, another Lion up from the junior varsity, killed Junction's last hope of victory with an interception at the Lion goal line with only a minute and 42 seconds left on the clock. Webster advanced the catch all the way back to the Junction 45-yard line. The Lions ran out the clock to secure the victory.
The Lions had two sophomore starters in the line, Rick Hunnicutt and Gary Mitchell, both doing well for their first varsity game. Mitchell, in linebacker position on defense, led the tackling with 12 and recovered an Eagle fumble. Randy Crawford was the second leading defender with 10 tackles and a fumble recovery.
Timmy Evans led in rushing with 59 yards on 15 carries for an average of just under 4 yards per carry. Huff carried 15 times for 52 yards and Tambunga carried 15 times for 44 yards.
David Sewell hit four out of 7 passes for 35 yards.
Ozona had 9 first downs to Junction's 3; 159 yards rushing to 65 for Junction; 35 passing to 36; lost one fumble while Junction lost 5; intercepted two passes to Junction's none, and had 9 penalties for 95 yards to 3 for Junction for 35 yards.

Students See Atomic Energy Demonstration

Atomic energy and its applications will be demonstrated Sept. 20 at Ozona High School.
A program titled "This Atomic World" will acquaint Ozona students with basic principles of nuclear energy, its sources and role in agriculture, industry, medicine and research.
Orlan L. Hums will conduct the program, part of the Atomic Energy Commission's extensive traveling educational series.
Hums (sounds like seems) will use student terms to explain the structure of atoms, nuclear reactor operation and concepts such as radiation, fission and fusion.
He will use special equipment to demonstrate sources of radiation and how nuclear energy is harnessed to generate electricity. Use of radioisotopes for learning more about life processes and disease diagnosis and treatment also will be graphically portrayed.
A chalkboard talk to Ozona High science classes will give more detail on atomic structure, radioactivity, radiation biology and nuclear science careers.
Texas A&M University will present the program in cooperation with Oak Ridge Associated Universities, a non-profit educational and research corporation of southern colleges and universities.
Hums trained in AEC and ORAU labs at Oak Ridge, Tenn. He has bachelor and master's degrees from Texas A&M.

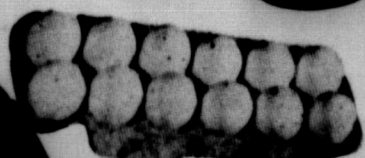

Tips For Gardeners
From The Ozona Garden Club
By Mrs. Bailey Post

If you notice sturdy buds on summer annuals and perennials, this promises a second blooming. And that tinge of autumn you feel early mornings and after sunset is a reminder that fall planting season is about over.

In the meantime, there's some garden uncluttering to be done for your place and our city to look well groomed.

To me, this is the most beautiful and enjoyable season of the year. With very little wind or dust to blight the roses, many lovely varieties are in bloom now, and will be on in cooler weather. They should be fed and given plenty of water for fuller better blooms and rich green foliage.

Repot plants that have spent the summer outside and need new soil or a larger pot. They will get a good start of new growth before taking inside two or three weeks before time to turn the furnace on. Many vacant lots are covered with high weeds which will be a fire hazard later on, if not mowed soon. Too, they detract from the better views of our city and the good name we have of being one of the cleanest small towns in Texas. I understand the county will mow lots if asked to do so by the owner.

Since the bagworms are so prevalent over town, the leaves and litter from under them should be raked and carried off to prevent over-wintering of insects and disease organisms. This will be a real chore, but may prevent another such siege next year.

Success with sweetpeas and snapdragons depends on early sowing of seed. Sweetpeas do best if planted in a trench where the soil has been prepared at least 18 inches deep and enriched with processed manure, well-rotted barnyard manure or rich compost. Place seed 5 to 6 inches deep in trench and cover with 1 inch of soil. You may hasten germination by soaking seed in water for 18 to 24 hours before planting.

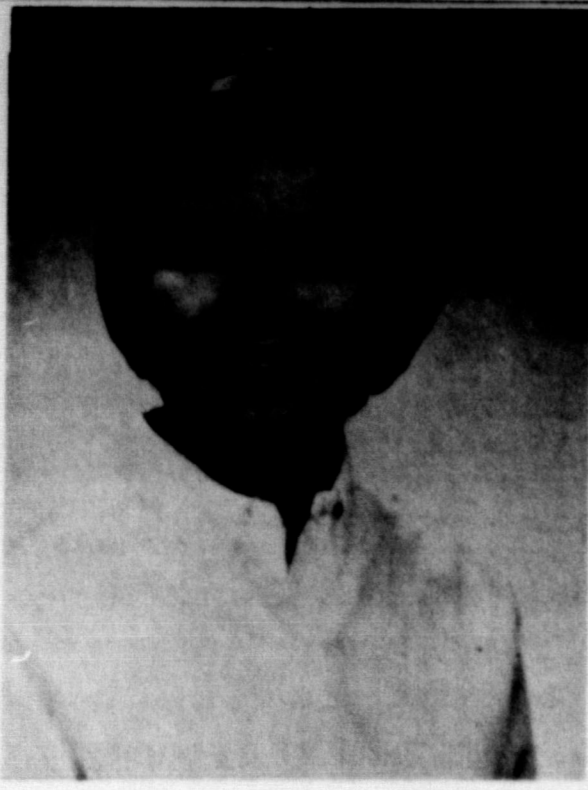
