## 10-Day School Holiday Period Begins Today

Ozona school children will begin a 10-day holiday period today. Classes will be dismissed this afternoon and will take up at the regular time Monday, January 3.

Ozona Elementary schools, both the primary and intermediate, will dismiss after class Christmas parties this afternoon, around 2 o'clock in time for the younger children to get to the park in time for Santa's visit.

Junior high school and high school students will be dismissed at 2:30. Final examinations have been in progress all week at high school and most high school students will be dismissed after their last scheduled exam.

Santa Claus is on his way to Ozona. He is scheduled to arrive by plane this afternoon at 2:30. Santa will be transported to town from the airport by way of a well-polished red fire truck. His visit each year is sponsored by the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department.

Farmers and ranchers with butane-powered vehicles are urged to attend a meeting at the courthouse December 29 at 9 a.m.

Anyone who has any question as to their eligibility to qualify for a decal is also asked to attend.

## DPS Predicts 100 May Die In Texas Accidents

Austin--Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today issued a plea for Texas motorists to join law enforcement officials in a conscious effort to reduce holiday traffic accidents.

Speir said the DPS expects almost 100 traffic fatalities in Texas during the Christmas-New Year holiday season. He estimates that 52 persons will be killed during the Christmas period from 6 p.m. Thursday, December 23 through midnight Sunday, December 26. An additional 46 deaths are expected during the New Year holiday which begins at 6 p.m. Thursday, December 30 and ends at midnight Monday, January 2.

The DPS director cited statistics which show that last year, December led all other months for fatal traffic accidents in Texas. He said deaths for the 1970 Christmas week-end were 14% higher than the average three-day weekend period, with those for the New Year holidays running 51% above average. Deaths for all four major holiday weekends in Texas last year were 26% higher than the average of all other comparable weekend periods.

In an effort to reduce the expected toll, Speir said the Department of Public Safety and local law enforcement officers will be on hand.

## All Voters Must Register To Be Eligible To Vote In 1972

Voters are reminded that in order to vote in the 1972 elections, they must register at the office of Sheriff Billy Mills. Application must be made for a voter registration

certificate by the person himself, his mother, father, son, daughter, wife or husband. Any other member of the family is ineligible to register for another unless they

come under the relations listed. Office personnel emphasized that the record being made at the office at this time is a permanent one, and in order to avoid duplications and inaccurate information, the voter should apply for his own registration certificate, and in person.

All persons eighteen years of age and over prior to March 1, 1972 is eligible to vote provided they are registered. Officials are registering voters daily at the tax office. The laws and rules for registering voters have changed often and probably will continue to do so, but as far as can be determined the deadline for registering is January 31, 1972 to be eligible to vote in elections after that date next year. Applications will be mailed on request.

Those registering now will remain eligible to vote in all elections without further registration, providing they do not fail to vote in three successive elections. If a voter fails to vote in three or more successive elections, they must register again to be eligible to vote in further elections.

#### OUR ENVIRONMENT

The time has come to consider "economic reality" in dealing with environmental problems.

The 180-page Sen. Muskie (D-Me.) bill to attain zero pollution, which was passed overwhelmingly by the Senate, should be rejected by the House. The proposed law calls for a flat ban on discharges into rivers and lakes whether or not they actually degrade the receiving waters. This is neither logical nor practical.

It is not logical because almost all communities would become lawbreakers. Secretary of Commerce Stans has said, "Witness the fact that hundreds, perhaps thousands of American communities pour millions of tons of untreated sewage into the waters every day. By contrast, almost across the board, American industries have launched vastly complex efforts to help clean up the air, water and landscape of the country."

The present legislation is not practical because the cost of attaining zero pollution would be astronomical and divert billions of dollars from worthy objectives such as schools and better housing.

Russell Tram, Chairman of the President's Council on Environmental Quality, has estimated the cost by 1981 to be \$94.5 billion but was accused of "intimidation" for saying so.

It is doubtful that the nation needs 180 pages of new law on any subject, but legislation which completely ignores the social and economic costs to be borne by the American people is clearly undesirable. Realistic practical progress in pollution control can be achieved by carrying out programs based on a balanced consideration of both a better environment and other desirable objectives.

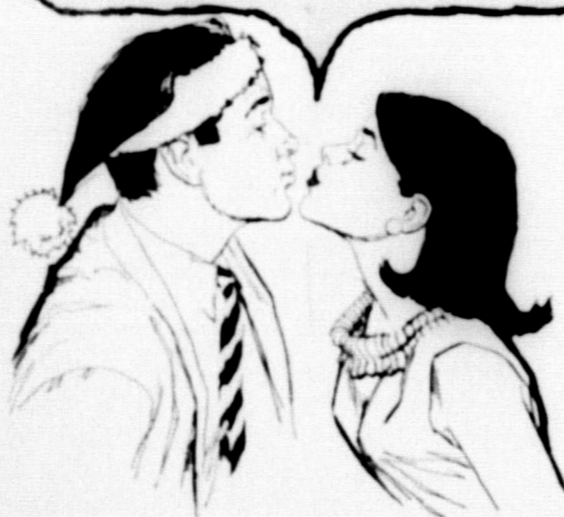
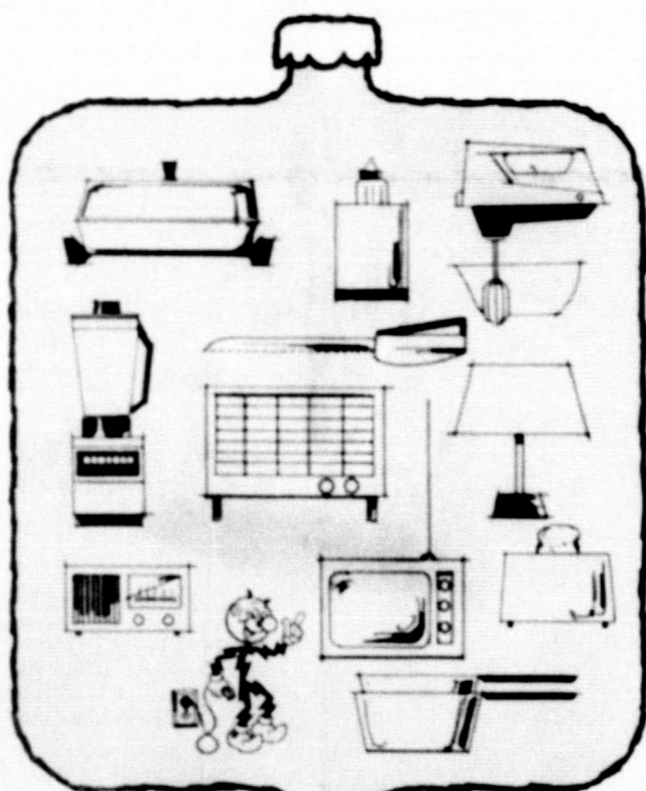
The wreath was made of an actual wheel, taken from a cart and wrapped in greenery. Lights, too, were added.

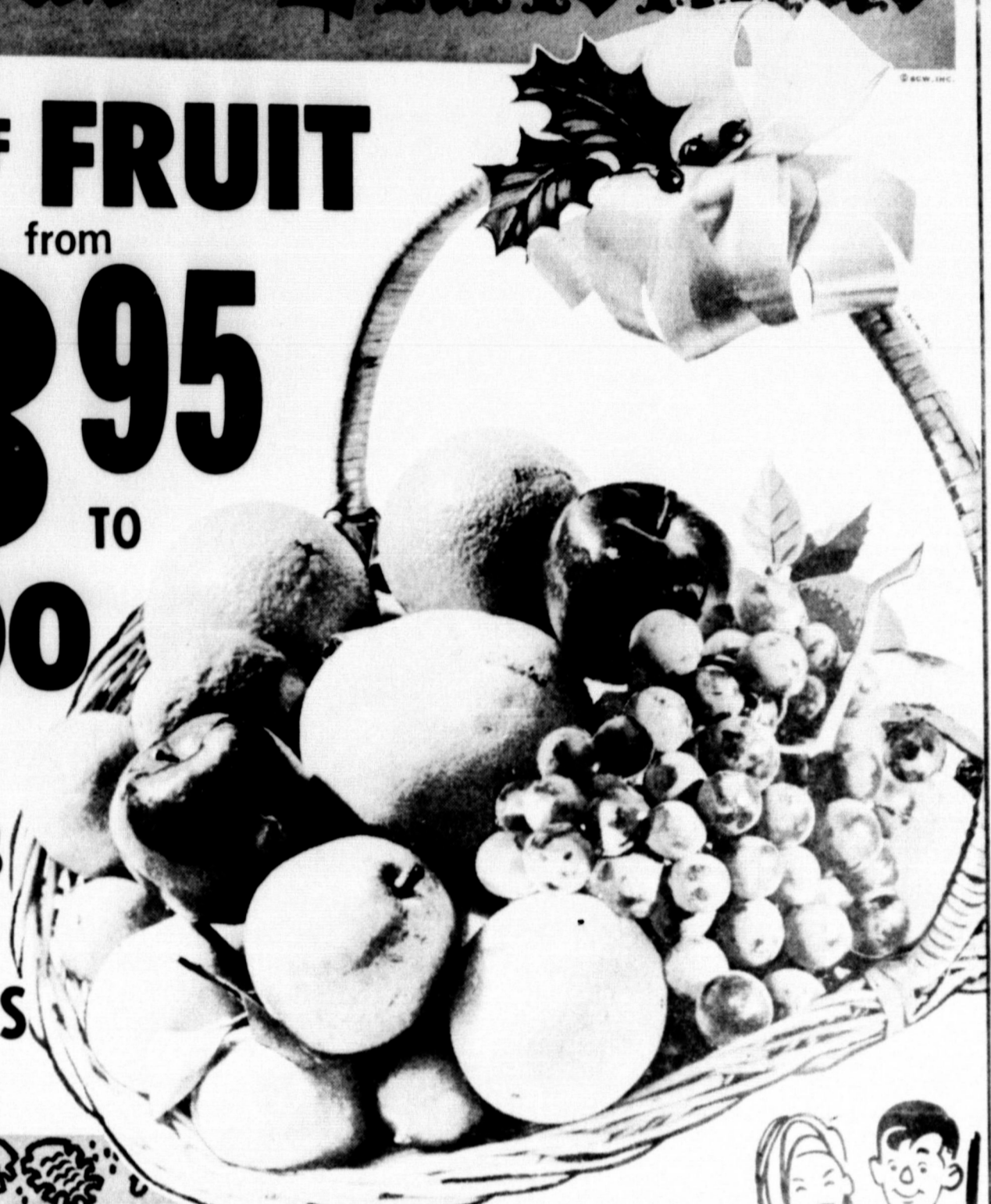

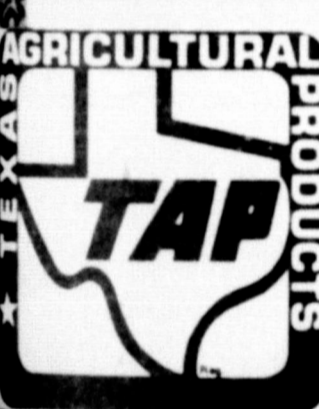

# SENSING the NEWS

### A YEAR OF RETREAT

Nineteen seventy-one has been anything but a cheering year for Americans concerned about their country's economic health and the survival of a free society. It was a year in which both economic principles and fundamentals of foreign policy were abandoned. As the year drew to an end, confidence in the U. S. dollar ebbed rapidly in the world's money markets. The Secretary of the Treasury announced, while on a European trip, that the U. S. government is prepared to devalue the dollar -- once the symbol of America's strength.

It was only a short time ago that the United States was the arsenal of democracy, the builder of a free Europe, the hope of captive peoples in the communist world and the strongest nation on earth. All that has changed in a brief historical period.

The U. S. dollar is no longer in demand because people around the world no longer have faith in the future of the United States. They aren't convinced that our people have the staying power necessary for greatness. They see that the American people won't put their fiscal house in order but, instead, are moving very rapidly towards the type of welfare state that proved so disastrous for Great Britain after World War II.

The nations of the world are aware of the deterioration of America's armed forces at a time when the Soviets are increasing their armaments as fast as possible. They take note of the racial strife in the U. S. 7th Army in Europe and the appalling relaxation of discipline and turn to permissiveness throughout the Army. They are aware that the U. S. government places its hopes on negotiations with the Soviet Union, despite the fact that the Soviets arm while they talk.

The decline of the tough, bold American spirit is mirrored in many ways. And the world gets the picture. Contempt for the United States was evidenced most strikingly by the glee at the United Nations when free China was expelled.

Unquestionably, the most

about-face on Red China. After a quarter-century of containing Chinese communism, the U. S. is now seeking an accommodation with one of the most dangerous and brutal regimes in modern history. Almost overnight, American magazines and television channels are overflowing with articles about the "new" China. It is fashionable now to see no evil, hear no evil insofar as Peking is concerned. It is apparent that the United States is moving

towards appeasement on a colossal scale. America's long role as the major Pacific power is drawing to an end. Red China is likely to achieve by political firmness and image-building what Imperial Japan could not accomplish at Pearl Harbor. Truly, the American nation is in disarray. At home, our unwillingness to work as we did in the past is the root of our economic trouble. Powerful unions represent a state within a state, a counter-authority to

the authority of government. During our period of greatest economic crisis, our seaports were shut down. President George Meany of the AFL-CIO allowed the President of the United States to address the union delegates but treated him in an insulting manner. On docks and in factories and in many areas of work, unions use what can only be described as privileged violence against business, government and workers who do not want to bow

to the union bosses. As Arthur Krock said not long ago: "The picket line is now the supreme law of the land." In the Congress there is a commendable revolt against foreign aid. But the demagogic elements continue to demand that goodies be lavished on the least productive sectors of our society. Favoritism for the idle is politically fashionable and the principal device of those seeking public office.

The United States has never had such need for authentic leadership, but there is little to be found. When President Nixon announced his mission to Peking, which set the stage for the betrayal of free China, only Sens. John Tower of Texas and Peter Dominick of Colorado spoke out strongly in opposition. Many of the congressmen who should have protested appeasement in Ada and the imposition of the instruments of an unfree society -- wage and price controls -- were silent. Hardly any attention is paid to the massive deficits which have become a fixture of the Nixon administration. The liberals are laughing at the changes. Nicholas von Hoffman, the Washington Post's house radical, happily noted this month that the Nixon administration's Family Assistance welfare plan "embodies and makes official one of the wildest dreams of the 1950's."

Many Americans understand what has happened in 1971. They resent the turn towards a regimented economy and abandonment of old friends and good allies overseas. They oppose a guaranteed annual wage for people who are capable of working. They know the United States must strengthen its armed forces or lose its freedom. They know the country must have real leadership. And they are hoping that the nation will find such leadership in 1972 and that national recovery and renewal will begin in the New Year.

desertion--grounds for divorce. Thus: To cut expenses, a man prepared to move to a smaller apartment. But his wife decided it was "not stylish enough" for her, and went home to her parents. After a long impasse, the man finally sued for divorce and won a decree. The judge said the wife's refusal to live with him, for no good and sufficient reason, made her a deserter in the eyes of the law.



Nevertheless, the husband's authority is far from absolute. He cannot insist on a housing arrangement which is simply not fair to his spouse.


For example, one man decided to move in with his mother, although he could well afford separate lodgings--and even the his mother and his wife did get along with each other. A court held, in these circumstances, that the wife had a legitimate excuse for not joining household.

Furthermore, when a man invites his wife to join him in a new location, he must mean it--not just be through the motions. One tankard husband, having dined alone to the West Coast sent back the following "letter" to his wife:

"I have completely gotten my regard for you, if I ever any. However, I am doing it. I must do, even though you ruined my life. I ask you to and make your home with me the law requires."





## NEWS for OUTDOORSMEN

by VERN SANFORD

Several years ago Dave Hawk, who has distinguished himself as a great bass fisherman, was weighing in a string of lunkers. A little woman approached him, looked over the string, and then asked "Don't you ever catch any little ones?"

"They are harder to catch than the big ones," Hawk replied. And therein lies a story of the few men who never seem to catch anything but big fish.

Hawk is one of them. Another is Tex Heth, who guides around Toledo Bend and Rayburn in East Texas. Then there is John Fox of San Augustine. He never seems to take one under four pounds.

It's a strange feeling to sit in a boat with an angler and

both of you catch fish, but the other fellow invariably gets the lunkers. He will catch as many as you do fish-for-fish, but while you are stringing up two-pounders, he will land several in the four-pound class and some that go to six.

You'll be fishing with the same lures, and perhaps even the same make rod and reel. You watch him and try to fish as nearly as possible like he does, yet he continues to haul in the big brutes that you'd give anything just to try to land.

Such men are deliberately fishing for the big 'uns and utilizing all their knowledge and skill for taking braggin' size bass. There are many fishing secrets, and some

fishermen seem to know most of them.

For one thing, these lunker-landers fish practically every day.

They know their waters. They are able to "read" water with an experienced eye. They watch for the natural habitats of big bass. They know, by studying the land adjacent to the water, where the ledges are. Then, they have a pretty good estimate of where the points run down into the water.

They mark big trees protruding in the best fishing water. They conserve their casts. When they toss out the lure, they feel that the big old bass they missed the day before may be lurking there again . . . and he usually is. I've known fishermen to go back to the same spot for days just because they knew one big fish lived there.

A real good fisherman, whom I will not name, once

was guiding a friend of mine. They had caught a tremendous string of crappie and decided they'd try a little cove for some blacks. My friend hooked one and thought it was a log. Because he knew fishing better, the guide realized it wasn't a log but a lunker.

He went back there a couple of days later and latched onto the same bass, but he lost it, too. This went on for days. The big old bass would

grab the plug, spit it out and leave the fisherman empty handed.

No man can stand that kind of treatment, even if he has already caught a boat load of big bass.

This fellow was a plug fisherman, but he just couldn't stand the pressure. He went to a half-dozen bait houses before he was able to get a few minnows about six inches long. Then he went back to that bass hole, made

up a dual rig, put on two of those big minnows and tossed the twin offering out to the bass' home base.

That old bass had just heard the dinner bell ring because he grabbed both of those minnows . . . and our fishing friend set the hooks. That was all for Mr. Bass. I might add, however, that it weighed a little more than eight pounds.

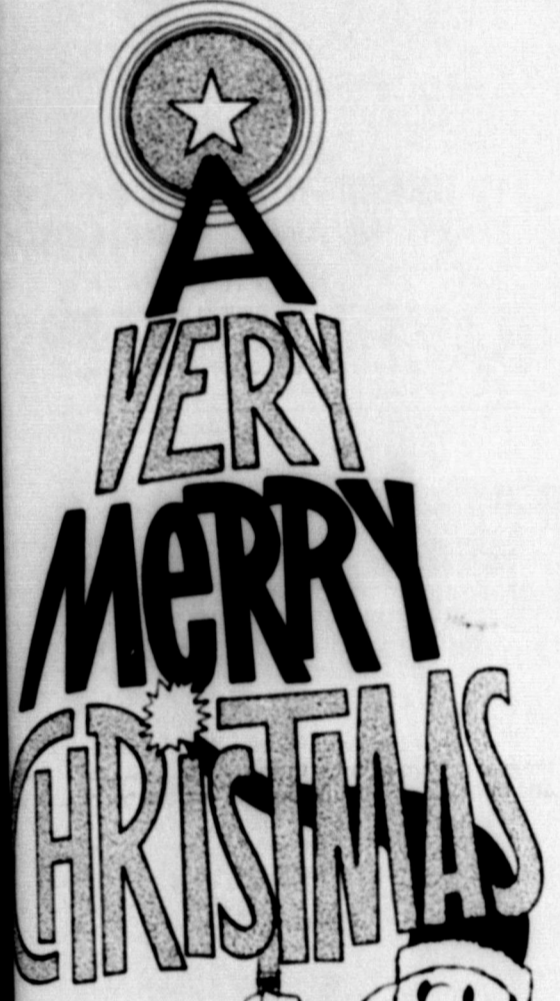
Moral here is that determination does it!

 3 eggs  
 Preheat oven to 350 degrees and generously grease bottom and sides of 13x9-inch baking pan. Reserve 2/3 cup cake mix for filling. In large mixing bowl, combine remaining dry cake mix, butter and 1 egg; mix until crumbly. Press in prepared pan. Bake at 350 for 15 to 20 minutes until light golden brown. Meanwhile prepare filling. In large mixer bowl, combine 2/3 cup dry cake mix, brown sugar, syrup vanilla and eggs; beat at medium speed about two minutes. Pour filling over partially baked crust; sprinkle with pecans. Return to oven and bake for 30 to 35 minutes until filling is set. Cool; cut into bars. Serve three dozen bars. Serve warm or cold with whipped cream.
