Oil Completion For NE Part Of Crockett County

Fortune Drilling Corp., San Angelo, announced completion of its No. 1 Meadows, Crockett Strawn reef oil discovery, six miles no theast of Sheffield, 44 miles west of the Lancaster Hill (Strawn gas) field and 11 miles southeast of shallow production in the Halff multipay

field. It was finaled for a daily oumping potential of 61, 7 barrels of 42 gravity, plus 48 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1, 451-1. Gas volume was at the rate of 89, 500 cubic feet daily.

Production was through perforations at 6, 528-540 feet, with casing pressure of 100 pounds. The section had been acidized with 1,000 gallons. gas and 60 barrels of condensate Casing (42-inch) was set at 6, 625 feet.

A re-entry operation, it originally was drilled by Southland Royalty Co. and abandoned April 8 at 7, 195 faet. Location is 1, 980 feet from the north and west lines of 43-GG-HE&WT.

Dove Season Is Split This Year

Game Warden Ramond Davee advised sportsmen this week that the mourning dove season will be divided into two hunting periods. The first part of the season will open September 1 and run through October 14, and the second part will be from January 6, 1973 through January 21.

The daily bag limit is 10, with possession limit of 20. Shooting hours are from 12 noon to sunset each day. Only shotguns may be used to hunt dove and they must be permanently plugged to three-shell capacity.

Last year's hunting and fishing licenses expire August 31, so licenses should be purchased in preparation of the fall season. Resident hunting licenses cost \$3.25; exempt licenses for those under 17 years of age or over 65 are 25 cents, with fishing licenses \$2.15.

Deer season begins Nov. 18 this year, Davee reminded hunters, making the opening of the season later than usual.



Texans To Die Holiday Traffic

Austin--Colonel Wilson Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today estimated that statewide traffic accidents over the Labor Day weekend will claim 48 lives.

At the close of the Labor Day period last year, a DPS tabulation showed that 41 persons had died in 34 traffic accidents. Late deaths pushed the toll to 43 persons killed in 36 accidents.

Speir said the DPS and local law enforcement agencies would be taking all possible steps to reduce the holiday death toll. A special "Operation Motorcide" will be in progress over the Labor Day weekend and tabulations of rural and urban fatal wrecks will be reported to the news media of Texas three times daily.

As is customary on major holidays, all available DPS patrolmen will beplaced on duty throughout the state. They will make full use of radar and breath testing instruments in an effort to curtail the major causes of fatal accidents -excessive speed and drunk dri-

"These educational and enforcement programs will have an impact, but a great deal of the responsibility for accident reduction rests in the hands of individual Texans, I am appealing to all our citizens to join with us in saving lives by 'Driving Friendly,' both during the holiday and throughout the remainder of the year, " Speir said. --0--







From the Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

Two watch-words for the month of August are: watering and weed control. Since the late fine showers really soaked our area, it has been a pleasure to leave the hos e at ease for a few days.

Now, the weeds are growing by leaps and bounds, so keep up with them to prevent their Mrs. Ben Williams of Barksdale, taking over the town as they did last year.

Summer-prune when necessary -- trees and shrubs that have produced an excessively heavy summer growth need pruning to thin out unnecessary branches and foliage. If you have evergreen shrubs or vines trained in topiary or espalier pattern, prune them at any t time of the year, when you notice new growth that does not conform to the desired design. Give them the heaviest pruning in late spring, but light pruning during the growing

When your hydrangeas have finished blooming, prune way all faded flowers. Cut just above the first strong new shoot

If you want a toughie perennial ground cover, try ajuga. This plant hugs the ground, spreads rapidly and stands 4 to 6 inches tall with blue blooms in late spring. This plant will grow in bare spots beneath shade trees and shrubs where lawn grass will not survive. If you're establishing ajuga to cover bare spots in your yard, use 18 to 20 plants per square yard. It should cover in one season. I have found it has the best coloring if in the shade during the afternoon.

Don't forget to get your fall and winter garden started this month and especially so after the wonderful rain.







Tips For Gardeners

Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Two watch-words for the month of August are: watering and weed control. Since the late fine showers really soaked our area, it has been a pleasure to leave the hos e at ease for a few days.

Now, the weeds are growing by leaps and bounds, so keep did last year. Summer-prune when neces-

sary -- trees and shrubs that have produced an excessively heavy summer growth need pruning to thin out unnecessary branches and foliage. If you have evergreen shrubs or vines trained in topiary or espalier pattern, prune them at any t time of the year, when you notice new growth that does not conform to the desired design. Give them the heaviest pruning in late spring, but light pruning during the growing season.

When your hydrangeas have finished blooming, prune way all faded flowers. Cut just above the first strong new shoot or bud.

If you want a toughie perennial ground cover, try ajuga. This plant hugs the ground, spreads rapidly and stands 4 to 6 inches tall with blue blooms in late spring. This plant will grow in bare spots beneath shade trees and shrubs where lawn grass will not survive. If you're establishing ajuga to cover bare spots in your yard, use 18 to 20 plants per square yard. It should cover in one season. I have found it has the best coloring if in the shade during the afternoon.

Don't forget to get your fall and winter garden started after the wonderful rain.






