

**Cheese, Peanut Butter Good Protein Source**

Cheese and peanut butter making inroads on dinner table "welcome" mats have something going for them.

"First class protein" describes them, according to Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University.

She suggested them as "excellent meat alternates," as well as eggs, tuna and dry beans, during the weeks ahead.

"With food dollars stretched to the limit, it's certainly well worth the time and effort involved to become a good shopper," the specialist added.

"For an economy class main dish, serve a macaroni and cheese casserole, or serve apples and cheese for an easy, nutritious dessert.

"Cottage cheese, a relatively inexpensive protein food, served in one-half cup portions, contains only 120 calories with about the same amount of protein as three eggs or three ounces of meat.

"Peanut butter sandwiches, popular with most kids, served with a glass of milk, provides a goodly amount of protein, too."

Turning to vegetables, Mrs. Clyatt cited carrots as "excellent selection because of the extra plentiful supply on farms in South Texas resulting in attractive prices."

Other vegetable choices include cabbage, potatoes, turnips, beets, cooking greens,

rutabagas and broccoli. "Fruit counters boast first-of-the-season strawberries, usually luxury-priced, but looking very appetizing. Economical choices include bananas, pineapples, tangerines, grapefruit, oranges, apples and avocados."

In spite of increased prices, poultry remains one of the better protein buys, the specialist reflected. "Turkey and turkey parts are featured at some markets, and this meat can be used many ways."

Beef values in general will appear on chuch roasts and steaks, ground beef, round steaks, and beef and calf liver

Pork values are found on quarter loin sliced, shoulder roasts and steaks, smoked hams and picnics.

**Tips For Gardeners**  
From the Ozona Garden Club  
by Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that March is gone, we hope the winds are too, and that April will bring refreshing showers to help green up the country side and our yards.

I believe the flowering fruit trees and the rebuds have been lovelier than in several seasons. Now, if we can miss a freeze before Easter, maybe there will be a bountiful fruit harvest over the area.

Last week I forgot to mention that the many dead looking oleanders should be pruned back to near the ground and watered well.

If it doesn't rain soon all shrubs should be watered deeply. The high, dry winds have left the soil with very little moisture from our winter rains. Check your broadleaf evergreens for freeze damage. They may have dropped their leaves, but the full extent of damage will not show until new growth begins. Wait until then to prune out the dead branches. Cold-damaged plants will need extra care, during the spring and summer. Pay particular attention to watering, mulching and fertilizing.

Now is the best time to remove suckers that often grow on trees, shrubs and roses. They should be removed as soon as they are noticed, for they can weaken a plant in a short time. These suckers usually grow on the root stock of the plant, and have foliage that is different from the foliage of the main plant. Dig soil from around these shoots and trace them back to their origin. If tender, they can be jerked out with your hand or cut them out close to the root system.

If you have a good place where climbers are needed to shade, or to add a decorative touch, try the Carolina jessamine, roses, wisteria, clematis or bougainvillea.

Even though we are having warm days, the nights have been cool, so the ground is still not warm enough for seed to germinate well, or put out tender annuals. I would advise waiting until Good Friday unless you can provide a cover to protect from a freeze or high winds.

When going to a nursery to buy plants, get full information on their growth, size, soil requirements, and if hardy for this area. The nurseryman may have more time to give this information on a week day, for they are usually swamped on weekends. Be sure and check to see if plants look to be disease and insect free.

**Debra Says:**

Handle and store ground beef carefully to insure best cooking--and eating--results. Select ground beef--and all meat--just before checking out at the grocery store. Refrigerate it as soon as possible--that means don't leave it in a worm car too long.

Ground beef stores well--either frozen or simply refrigerated. If it will be used within a day or so, ground beef can be safely refrigerated by wrapping it loosely--allowing air circulation around it. To freeze, wrap tightly in moisture-resistant material--such as heavy-duty aluminum

foil or freezer paper. Frozen ground beef keeps for two to three months with little quality loss. To thaw, simply place package in refrigerator. If faster thawing is desired, put in a watertight wrapper and place in cold water. Both methods minimize bacteria growth.

When preparing a ground beef dish, mix it as little as possible. First blend seasonings and binding agents--such as eggs, evaporated milk and bread crumbs--in a mixing bowl. Then crumble in ground beef. Toss together lightly for a well-seasoned, tender food.

**Cheesy Meat Loaf**

1/2 Cup chopped onion  
1/2 Cup chopped green pepper  
1 8-oz. can tomato sauce  
2 beaten eggs  
1 Cup (4 oz.) diced process American cheese  
1 Cup soft bread crumbs (1 1/2 slices)  
1/2 teaspoon dried thyme, crushed  
1 1/2 pounds ground beef  
1/2 pound ground pork  
Cook onion and green pepper in boiling water till tender; drain. Stir in tomato sauce, eggs cheese, bread crumbs, 1 teaspoon salt, dash pepper, and thyme. Add ground meats mixing well. Shape into loaf in baking dish. Bake in 350 F. oven for 1 1/2 hours.



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**Rural Economic Picture For State Good**

A look at last year's balance sheets would generally indicate that the economic picture is improving for Texas farmers and ranchers, believes Tom Prater, economist in management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"When looking at the overall equity of Texas farmers and ranchers, their general financial positions are excellent. Deposits and savings have remained about the same in recent years although there have been some increases in investments," notes the Texas A&M University economist.

Assets of farmers and ranchers continued to climb. From 1970 to the present, total farm and ranch assets increased from \$28.8 billion to \$32.8 billion. About 85 percent of these assets are equity, which means that farmers and ranchers owe about 15 percent for various types of debts.

"One important factor with regard to overall assets is that land values continued to increase," Prater points out.

"Farm and ranch land increased in value 10 percent from March 1, 1971 to March 1, 1972. So, land holdings are providing a definite boost to the total financial situation of many farmers and ranchers include higher values for livestock, poultry and machinery.

"Even though the financial positions of Texas farmers and ranchers is improving, they still need to keep close tabs on the balance sheet. Record keeping and analysis plus a cash flow sheet of expenses and income are key management tools for a sound farm and ranch operation," contends Prater.

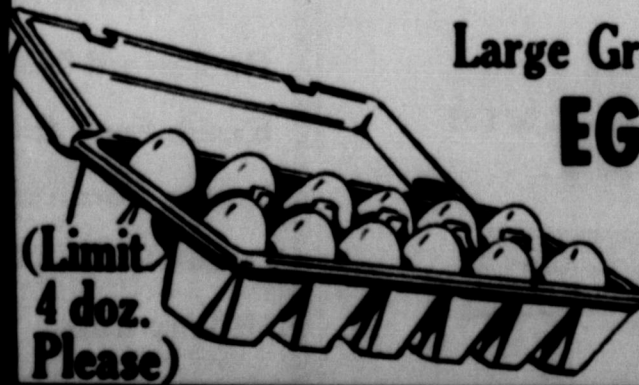
