## Three Elections This Month For Crockett County Voters

Crockett County voters have three elections coming up this month. Saturday the polls will open for the School Board Trustee election and for the election of three members of the Crockett County Water District board. The election for two proposed constitutional amendments has been set for April 22.

All precincts will consolidate and vote at the courthouse with the exception of the voting boxes at Powell Field and the Power Plant. These boxes will be open for all elections.

Absentee voting for school board and water board closed Tuesday. A check with the county clerk's office revealed an unusually large number of absentee votes for the school board, 97 as of Monday morning. There were no absentee votes for the water board.

The large number of absentee votes in the school board election indicates a great deal of interest and a heavier than usual turnout on election day. Three places are open for the school board and five men have filed for the positions.

The three incumbents are asking for another term. They are John Lee Henderson, Jr., John R. Jones and Luis C. Martinez. The two other men filing for places on the ballot are R. J. Everett, Jr. and Rober G. Flores.

Henderson, local rancher who resigned as a bank officer last year, is a graduate of Angelo State University and a lifelong resident of Ozona. He and Mrs. Henderson have two children in school.

Jones replaced Charles E. Davidson, III, on the board when he retired last year. He is asking for his first elected term. He is a rancher and a life long Crockett County resident. He and Mrs. Jones have a youngster in school and a pre-schooler.

Martinez owns and manages the Dina's Poco Taco here and is employed at the courthouse. He and Mrs. Martinez have five children, four in school and a graduate. Martinez is also a lifelong resident of Crockett County.

R. J. Everett, Jr. is also a lifelong resident of Crockett County and a rancher. He and Mrs. Everett are active as 4-H adult leaders. They have three children in school.

Robert Flores is another native of Crockett County. He is an employee of Southwest Texas Electric Coop. He and Mrs. Flores have three children in school.

Polls will open in the courthouse library at 8 a.m. and will close at 7 p.m.

The election for three directors of the water board will be held in the courtroom upstairs at the same time the school board election is being held. Three incumbents are up for re-election, Gene Williams, W. E. Friend, Jr. and Frank McMullan, Jr. There are no contested seats, as no other party filed before the deadline.

## License Check Turns Up Murder Suspect

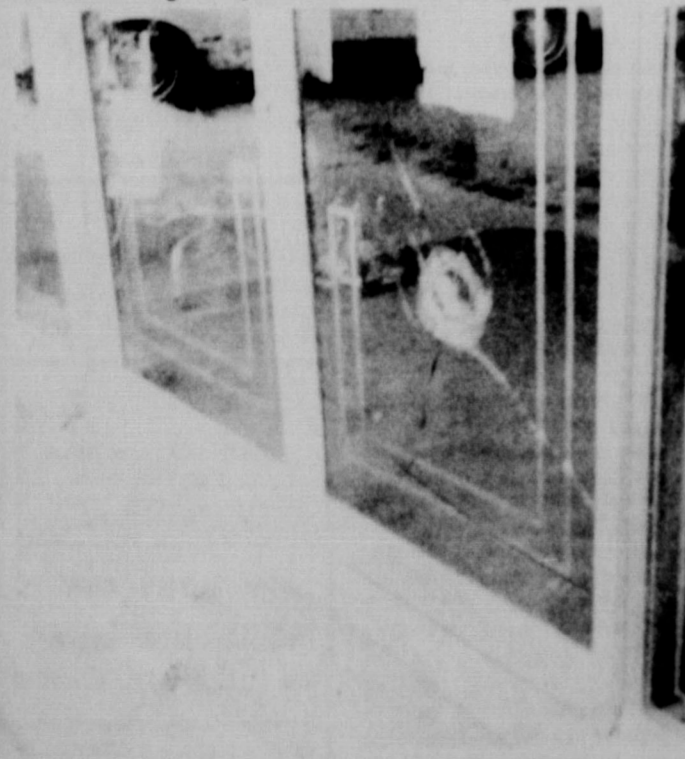
A routine license check last Tuesday night resulted in the arrest of a suspect wanted for murder and robbery in California and auto theft, armed robbery and kidnapping in Louisiana.

Patrolman Tom Finley, DPS, arrested Charles E. Waldon, 20 year old Negro male, after receiving information that the California car he was driving was reported stolen. Finley stopped the 1975 Lincoln Continental with Waldon at the wheel about one and a half miles east of Ozona on Highway 290.

A search of the vehicle turned up a can containing a substance believed to be marijuana. He was placed in Crockett County jail under an initial charge of felony theft over \$200 and possession of marijuana. Further investigation revealed the charges pending on Waldon in California and Louisiana.

After contacting authorities in California, Finley was asked to hold the subject and formally charge him with murder and robbery. The car Waldon was driving was reported stolen in California on March 14 and belonged to Lee Arter, who was found murdered about the same time in Los Angeles. Arter, a 62 year old white male, was a wealthy prominent citizen of Los Angeles. Credit cards and other personal effects belonging to Arter were found in Waldon's possession.

Waldon waived extradition and was escorted back to California Tuesday by the California authorities. Patrolman Finley will be required to attend both the pre-trial hearing and the trial of Waldon in Los Angeles.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

April is the month for enjoying the garden. This spring, flowering bulbs, shrubs, and trees have really begun to show off and lawns are beginning to turn a lush green.

And April is for gardening: seed sowing of more vegetables and annual flowers, rooting cuttings, finish pruning, and planting of shrubs and trees.

This month bluebonnets should reach their peak blooming season. There are several colorful spots in gardens and along hillsides in Ozona. You may want to join one of the many tours scheduled annually.

If you still have a gift poinsettia left over from Christmas, now is the time to either re-pot it or plant it outdoors. If re-potting, cut the plant back to 4 or 5 inches in height.

Shake the soil from the roots and replant in a fertile, well-drained soil to which two or three handfuls of peat or compost have been added. After re-potting, set the plant in a shady place for several days and water well. If planted directly into the yard, select a sunny spot with well drained soil. For a bushy plant, pinch out the tips of new growth during the growing season until about the middle of August.

Your established herbaceous perennials will benefit from being fertilized just as soon as the soil is dry enough to be worked. Use 20 to 25 pounds of 5-10-5 for each 1,000 square feet. Lift, divide and replant crowded perennials. When re-setting them, add a handful of bone meal to the soil mix at each planting site. Container grown perennials are available at garden centers and can be set out now. Good ones to select are dianthus, gallardia, rudbeckia, Shasta and Gloriosa

daisies and others. Gift pots of Easter lilies keep longer if they are placed in a cool room at night. Keep plants moist, but not wet. After the flowers fade, cut back the plant 3 or 4 inches and transplant outdoors. They will continue growing outside, but the annual flowering date will be later than the forced plants.

Don't be alarmed if evergreens such as abelia, live oak, photinia and others are shedding their leaves. The mature leaves are being replaced with new ones. Watch for aphids.

April planting days: Above-ground crops - 12, 13, 14, 17, 18, 23, 24. Root crops - 2, 3, 4, 7, 8, 9, 25, 26, 30.

What price will consumers pay for convenience? Foods with services added to the basic ingredients save time and trouble in home preparation. Convenience products save time, but sometimes cost more than the "from scratch" foods.

Some convenience foods enjoy such popularity and volume sales that they actually cost less. Some of the pie crust, cake, biscuit and bread mixes are sold in large enough volume that they may be a real bargain. These products may be as delicious as the homemade products.

Frosting mixes, although more expensive, are foolproof in flavor and texture. Other bargain convenience foods are frozen juices, especially the larger cans. Frozen orange concentrate is one of the cheapest forms of orange juice.

Refrigerated canned biscuits are much less expensive than those baked at home. The date code insures freshness for consumers. But frozen breakfast foods such as waffles or biscuits cost more than homemade ones.

More varieties of macaroni and seasoned rice as well as one dish skillet meals are available now. These convenience foods do have their place--especially for the inexperienced cook or working homemaker. But consumers can save money by using a favorite recipe to combine basic ingredients and spices to make the same dish.

Frozen vegetables in the boil-in-bags are definitely more expensive but do offer vegetables processed at the peak of the season throughout the year.

Consumers will have to decide for themselves if the extra expense of some convenience foods is worth the time saved in the kitchen.
