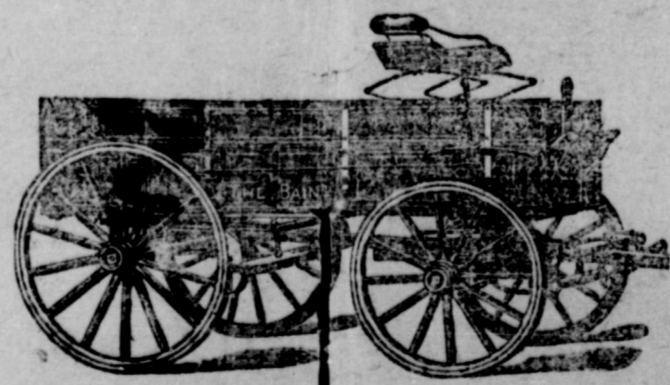

Downs of a Traveler.

Dear Kicker:

Most every body in Ozona feel more or less interest in how pews in the Methodist Church so far they would like to know something of the ups and downs of the committee that went to Dallas and Fort Worth to buy them.

In my dreams I was catching flies and trying to make first base. I might only learn on waking that the pillow I was trying to catch on. We left on the 10 a. m. train and stopped at Brownwood, where W. D. had some business to do, after which we went to Dr. S. A. Steel, pastor of the Methodist Church, and look for the church to see how they were arranged. By the way, Dr. Steel has promised to give a lecture for the benefit of the young people. Here we took the train for Dallas. Barton and I were fortunate in securing two berths but he gave his up for Sister Williams and took an upper. I read once of an instrument of torture too low to stand down in, well these tourist sleepers were copied from that.

They are one inch too short and two inches too low; look out for your head when you get in one. But here we are at Cleburne where we change for Dallas, which we reach at 10 a. m. and registered at the St. George. W. D. went to look up a friend and I got to see Dr. Rankin. He was glad to see me and asked much about Ozona, he thinks we have the most remarkable little city in Texas. The children all love Brother and Sister Mulkey. I found here where part of the money we gave Bro. Mulkey went to. He gave the orphans a nice piano for a Christmas present. In the afternoon I visited the candy factory where my brother-in-law is foreman. Did you ever see any candy? Well, there they make 4,000 pounds every day, all kinds of candy; it's every where in boxes, in barrels, in buckets; the steam puller is great, it pulls 100 pounds in three minutes. But my visit is up, I am longing for home and the pure air of our beautiful Ozona. An hour's run on the M. K. & T. brings me to Temple where I got




