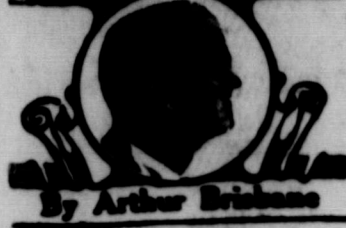

ROCKSPRINGS IS DEFEATED 13-7 BY OZONA LIONS

Locals Gather First Win Of Season From Edwards Lads

Ozons Shows Improvement In Offensive Play

The Ozona High School Lions tasted victory for the first time this season on the local gridiron Saturday when they defeated Rock Springs 13 to 7 in one of the best games of the season for the locals.

The Lions hatched up a rally in the fourth frame that overcame a 7 to 6 lead which the visitors had held from the first quarter and after putting across their second touchdown of the game, held their opponents a safe distance from the goal by consistent kicking.

Rocksprings drew first blood in the first few minutes of play, recovering the ball after Cam Longley at center had passed wild and racing across for a touchdown. An end run netted the extra point. A few minutes later, another fluke was in Ozona's favor and the locals put over their first touchdown of the game. Rocksprings was forced to kick but the kick was blocked by their own center and Dock Lee recovered and ran thirty yards for a touchdown. An attempted pass for extra point failed, however, and Rocksprings was left with a one-point lead.

The second and third quarters were scoreless, the ball see-sawing for the most part in mid-field, while Ozona fans were begging for another marker. In the last frame, the Lions opened up with a series of passes that put the ball on Rocksprings 40-yard line. Arthur Kyle gained 10 yards on a cross buck over right tackle. Again Arthur made 15 yards on a right end run and then the Ozona full-back took the ball in three straight bucks which drove the oval across the line for a touchdown. P. C. Coates went around right end for extra point.

Having thus gained a safe lead, Ozona took no further chances, kicking the ball deep into enemy territory every time it fell into their hands.

Arthur Kyle was easily the offensive star of the Ozona squad. He was able to make consistent gains through the Rocksprings line and showed considerable speed in end runs. The locals demonstrated some good defensive play also. Herman Chandler, who went in in the second half, showing a particular aptness in dumping interference and George Bunker and Carlton Phillips in tackling. The local team as a whole, however, showed marked improvement in both defensive and offensive play.

Famous Sheep Breeder Dies

W. S. Hansen Of Utah Succumbs While On Visit To Denmark

W. S. Hansen of Logan, Utah, one of the best known breeders of fine Rambouillet bucks in the United States, died October 19 in Copenhagen, Denmark, while on a mission there for the Mormon church, according to a letter received by T. A. Kincaid of Ozona, president of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association of Texas and a personal friend of Mr. Hansen's.

Mr. Kincaid was advised of the Utah breeder's death by his daughter, Miss Norma Hansen, writing from Logan.

Mr. and Mrs. Hansen went to Denmark last summer as representatives of the Mormon church of Utah. They were to have sailed for home on October 6 but Mr. Hansen was so seriously ill that the trip was not attempted. He grew steadily worse, Miss Hansen wrote, and succumbed on October 19.

The body, accompanied by the widow and two missionaries from the church in Denmark will be brought back to this country for burial at Logan, Utah. The funeral party is expected to land about the middle of November.

Mr. Hansen was well known through the sheep breeding sections of Texas, having attended in person many sales of the Sheep and Goat Raiser Association. Hansen bucks are popular among Texas sheep breeders and much of the stock is now on ranges in Crockett and nearby counties.

Joe B. Harrell Dies At Sanderson Home

Joe B. Harrell, 68, a brother of George Harrell and a former resident of Ozona, died at his home in Sanderson Tuesday morning of last week. Funeral services were held the following day.

Mr. Harrell had been in failing health for some time. He is survived by his widow, three sons, Roy, and Frank Harrell of Sanderson, and Milvern of Phoenix, Arizona, and four daughters. AD EXPERT "TOUCHES" TOWN

Another publicity expert blew into our quiet little city last week and offered to get up some new menus for a local restaurant by canvassing the merchants for enough advertising to pay the printer and keep a goodly rake-off until he could work the next town. Said publicity expert neither met defeat nor walked off with the boodle, as he disappeared with a nice folder belonging to the restaurant keeper and also forgot to pay his room rent with the local rooming house. These publicity "experts" are beginning to become numerous during the busy season, but are never on hand when a collection is taken up for any local enterprise. Moral: "Keep your advertising money at home and it will come back to you."

The woods are literally full of these alleged advertising experts these days—"lillies of the fields, they toil not neither do they spin"—yet they drag down great sums of easy "swag" from unsuspecting persons in the small towns.

Ozona has by no means been free of the fake advertising schemers. Just a few days ago, for instance, a woman breezed into town with the old reliable calendar scheme, where she sells about a hundred dollars worth of advertising space on the calendar, donates a certain percentage to a missionary society or some other organization and the rest presumably goes for printing the calendar.

The Ozona Stockman, through the kindly tip of M. A. Wilson of the Sonora News, saved the merchants of Ozona that \$100 and the local women's organizations the embarrassment of being a party to a plan that would benefit nobody except the organization which got the meager percentage at the ex-

pense of from 20 to 40 percent which went to the "promoter," and of course, the printer who did the work.

Advertising of this class would have been of no benefit to the merchants who bought the space. But they would have bought it for the plan is worked under the cloak of the church or some worthy organization.

But the merchants of Ozona had rather donate \$100 outright to these organizations than to buy worthless advertising and pay some fly-by-night grafter a big percentage of the total for taking up the collection. At any rate, that's how we believe they feel about it, and although The Stockman would have made a small profit off the printing work on this project, we got in touch with heads of local women's organizations and headed off this plan on information furnished by the Sonora publisher and heads of the organization through which the plan was put over there. We even offered to sell the advertising ourselves and print the calendars, if the local women were inclined to favor the plan, and to turn over to the organization the 20 or 40 percent the "promoter" would have carried off, and charged only for the printing. Any member of any organization in Ozona, except possibly the Cradle Roll in

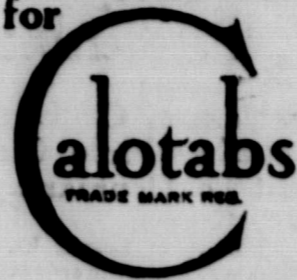
the Sunday Schools, could have put over this kind of project and saved the amount the woman would have dragged down as her share. Of course, they'll all tell you that the scheme is copyrighted, but that's all bunk—there are hundreds of others selling the same old "sell" in as many other towns and hundreds of still others selling hundreds of similar ones.

This particular woman selling the calendar scheme told the Sonora Missionary Society that she would give them 40 percent of the receipts, keep 20 percent and the rest would go for printing. She got the cheapest materials and the cheapest printing job she could find, however, the price of which was less than the 40 percent balance, gave the society its 40 percent and kept the rest herself. There you are, the merchants of Sonora donated \$100, the Missionary Society got \$40, some printer in another town got a small profit out of the job and the "promoter" got her percentage plus the difference in the cost of printing.

What Ozona needs and what every town needs is a Retail Merchants Association or a similar organization maintaining an advertising committee whose duty it is to investigate just such schemes as these and to pass their knowledge on to their fellow merchants. These advertising fakers do not "make" the big cities. They know that the Retail Merchants Assoc-

iations in those towns have these advertising committees to pass on their schemes and unless they are ckd by this committee not a member of the association in town will donate. Therefore, they work the small town where the merchants do not have the protection of such an organization.

Dr. Frank Crane Says



Learn From Elbert Gary's Life

The death of Judge Elbert Gary attracted attention to one of America's most picturesque figures. He drew attention to another one of those remarkable careers so characteristic of America. From a poor boy working for a few dollars a week to a multi-millionaire and to the head of probably the largest corporation in the world. Judge Gary never discovered anything new. In his resume of the elements of character, we are struck by his emphasis upon the old-fashioned virtues. About all the virtues there are are old-fash-

ioned. There has never been discovered any substitute that was workable for being honest and upright.

Gary's Ten Commandments of Success which he formulated for a man with a reasonably healthy constitution and average mentality, are as follows:

1. Be honest, truthful, sincere and serious. Being slippery and tricky may gain you temporary advantage, but in the long run it will be your undoing.
2. Be considerate of others. Do not try to get ahead by pulling somebody else down. The more

progress you make the less you will want to take advantage of others.

3. Guard your health, both morally and physically. The main thing to rely upon in a crisis or an emergency is being in fit condition.

4. Get an education. Know the fundamentals, such as arithmetic, spelling, grammar, geography and history. Also get all the technical education you can.

5. No matter how much natural ability you have, it must be stimulated by persistent efforts to improve the mind and store it with useful information. A good memory is of incalculable benefit.

6. Have clean habits of life and

select the right companions. You should know men of experience and higher rank than yourself. Nothing saps character like undesirable companions who are only bent on self-indulgence rather than self-improvement.

7. Be ambitious honorably and back this ambition up with energy, persistence and thoughtfulness. "I have had to fight steadily against laziness all my life," he says.

8. Be loyal to employers, friends and country. A reputation for loyalty induces people to give you positions of trust and responsibility.

9. Cultivate stability. Don't be a rolling stone.
