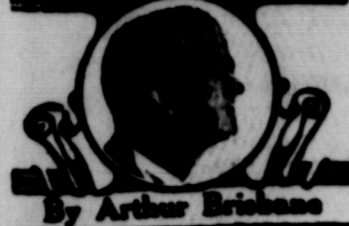

**A FRIENDLY FIGHT.
BE READY FOR WAR.
COLLEGES AND MEN.**

Dr. Aycock, chief of Harvard's Infantile Paralysis Commission, reports that the paralysis germ has been classified, and a suitable animal is sought to produce an antitoxin. Dr. Aycock agrees with Doctors Flexner and Nougchi, of the Rockefeller Institute, that the germ is so small that it would pass through any filter that can be made.

Some horse or other animal will supply the right serum for antitoxin, and then anti-vivisectionists will roar and another heavy load of fear will have been lifted from the hearts of mothers.

The big automobile fight, expected when Ford starts rolling out his new cars, will be a friendly enemies' fight, according to Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., president of General Motors.

Ford will make a good car, of good value per dollar of price, and will sell a great many of his new cars. General Motors will continue to sell great numbers of its cars in the various price fields.

The real fight will be, as it should, to increase quality, while cutting cost of production and giving the public the benefit of lower costs.

Another permanent fight is to make the public understand that a motor is as much a necessity as feet and hands.

A busy man should have his car always at hand, to save his time. A family needs two cars, at least. And that means no extravagance, for time is worth saving, and, unlike horses, cars do not eat when idle.

This country needs 30,000,000 cars now, and allowing five years' life for each car, that means 6,000,000 new cars a year indefinitely. There will be plenty of business for the man able to make the right car for that car's right price.

The United States should be ready, in the air and below the water especially. And there should be a separate cabinet officer, with complete control under the President, of the national air forces, interested in nothing but that air force.

International Harvester Company has a machine for picking, stripping and cleaning cotton that will do away with old-fashioned hand picking.

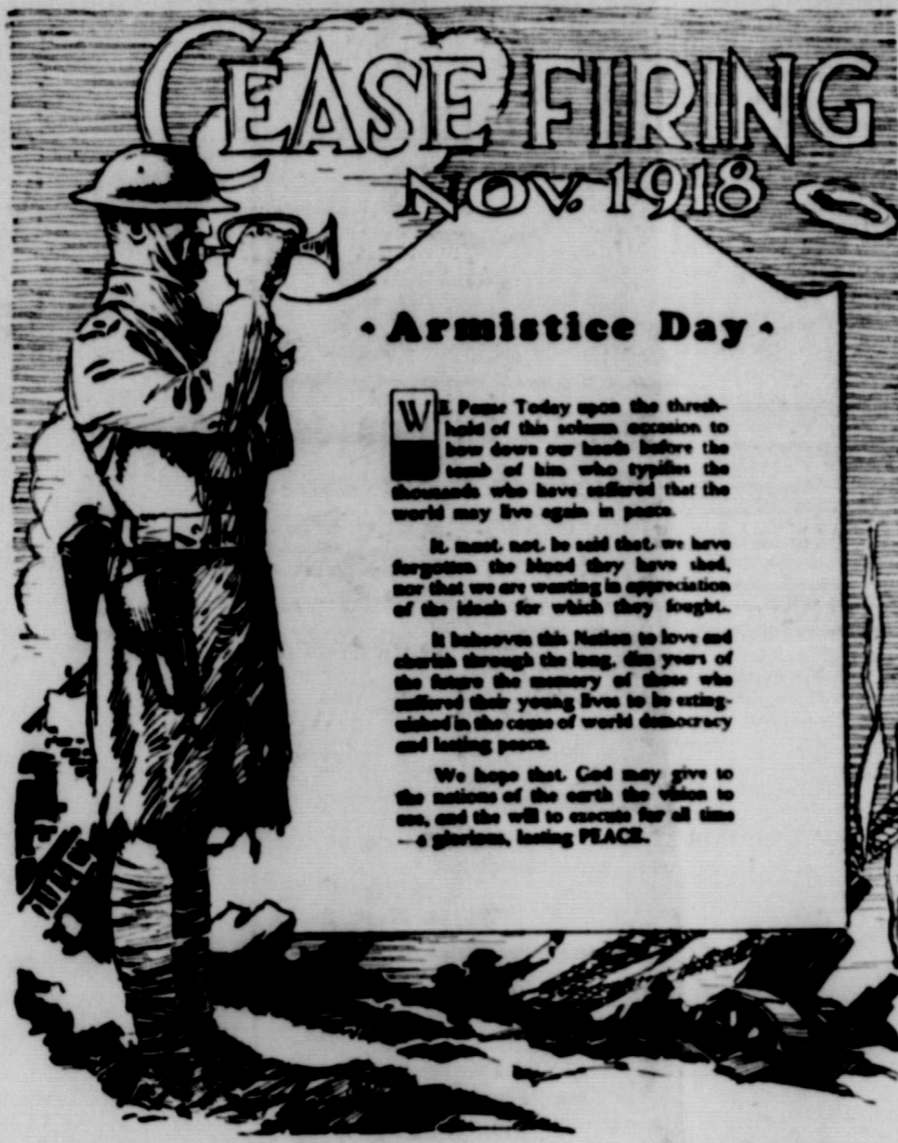
That will cut the production cost of cotton down for the "stripper" will strip five bales of cotton a day with only two men on the machine.

South Side Grocer Adds Cafe, Warehouse and Other Improvements

Twelve new tourist camp houses, a new warehouse and chicken house, a cafe and lounging rooms for tourist campers are among the latest improvements being made by Mike Couch, south side grocer and proprietor of Camp Mike.

New Vulcanizing & Battery Plant

Wilson Motor Co. To Install Modern & Complete Outfit

A modern vulcanizing plant and battery station is to be installed by the Wilson Motor Company at its Ozona shop at an early date. It was announced this week by Lee Wilson, proprietor.

The new station is to be in charge of Fisher Powell, formerly battery repair man and vulcanizer with the Ozona Garage. Mr. Wilson and Mr. Powell left Thursday for San Antonio to attend a meeting of General Tire dealers after which they will go to Dallas and other points in search of the latest equipment for the new plant.

The new plant may be housed in a small building already at the rear of the shop if it is found adequate, but if not a new building will be erected, it was announced.

Mr. Powell will spend two or three weeks at Dallas, San Antonio or wherever the equipment is purchased working in one of the big vulcanizing plants to become familiar with the operation of the modern equipment to be installed and to brush up on modern battery repair methods. By the time he returns, the station will be completely equipped and ready for operation.

All kinds of vulcanizing work on both casings and tubes and repair work on all makes of batteries will be done in the new plant.

Sonora Tramples Ozona Lions 13-6

"The Best Team Won" Is Only Alibi Offered By Coach Floyd

Sonora High School Bronchs stamped in their own lot last Saturday and trampled the manes of the Ozona Lions 13-6 in the first gridiron battle waged between the two teams in several years.

Although the locals admitted that they were outplayed through most of the scuffle, neither team was able to score for nearly three quarters. In the last few seconds of play in the third frame, however, a Sonora back fumbled the ball and Dock Lee was on it to scoop it up and race 65 yards for the first touchdown of the game.

The Bronchs came back with blood in their eyes in the last frame, however, and swept the visitors off their feet with a slashing line-back and passing game which netted two touchdowns in succession.

"We have no apologies to make, no alibi to offer," said Coach J. A. Floyd. "It was a good, clean, sportsmanlike game and the best team won."

The locals play their last game of the season on home soil a week from Saturday when they are slated to meet Big Lake for a return game and a chance to avenge the recent defeat administered to them by that squad.

Practically the same line-up was used by Coach Floyd against Sonora as was used against Rock Springs the week before.

Griffith Drops Suit Claiming Interest In All Of Shannon Land

A. B. Griffith, plaintiff in a suit filed in the district court of Sutton County at Sonora against J. M. Shannon and A. F. Clarkson, claiming a one-third interest in all of the land owned in West Texas by Mr. Shannon, took a non-suit when the case was called for trial in Sonora this week, according to Judge Chas. E. Davidson, attorney for Mr. Shannon.

By this action, Griffith withdrew from prosecution of the present suit, the second that has been filed on his alleged claim.

The suit involved more than 250 sections of West Texas land, much of it in Crockett County. The claim was based on an alleged partnership that existed between Mr. Shannon and Mr. Griffith approximately 30 years ago.

"Flying Ranchman" Arrives In Plane

Vernon Cox Achieves Boyhood Ambition In Owning Machine

The "Flying Ranchman" is here! It was "heads up, men" in Ozona Saturday afternoon when a screaming siren announced to the home-town boys that the "Flying Ranchman" had returned and a glance up among the clouds verified it, for those words were painted in big letters under one wing of the new plane piloted by Vernon Cox, its owner.

A boyhood ambition realized, the Crockett County ranchman landed his new plane on his landing field in the flat between Ozona and the Mexican suburb and at the door of a hangar just completed at the west edge of the field. On the ground to meet the rancher-pilot at his landing were several hundred Ozona people who raced in automobiles to the landing field at the screech of the siren. Mr. Cox made an almost perfect landing on the strange field and later as he tried it several times became even more adept at bringing the plane down in the restricted quarter. He spent most of Sunday taking up Ozona people for short rides.

The machine is a Travel Air, weighing 1,300 pounds, fully equipped. It has a speed of nearly 100 miles an hour, will carry more than its own weight, is a three passenger ship, and has a 46 gallon gasoline tank, giving it a cruising radius of about 500 miles. It is equipped further with a tachometer registering the revolutions of the motor; an altimeter showing the height; a compass, a clock, a Fahrenheit thermometer, and a screaming siren. He cut the siren on when he neared San Angelo Friday afternoon and hundreds rushed out to hear the novel noise for the first time. It was thus at Eldorado, Christoval, Sonora and Ozona Saturday morning as he made known "The Flying Ranchman," the one and only, had arrived. The machine has a wing spread of 34 feet, is 23½ feet long and 8½ feet high.

An eight cylinder Curtis motor of 90 horse power furnishes the propelling force for the machine, which will rise on a run of from only 100 to 150 feet, and Woodall, who came with the machine, says it will leave the ground below 100 feet. The compass and the gas gauge are the same kind as used by Lindbergh in his crossing the Atlantic and the plane is of the same make as that used by Art Goebel in his flight to Hawaii, though his was of the monoplane variety.

Determined to learn to fly and to have a plane in short time, Mr. Cox went to Dallas two months ago took lessons with the Travel Air Ways distributors at Love Field, Dallas, ordered his ship, and then came home to wait for delivery. Last week he and Mr. Woodall went to the factory at Wichita, Kansas, and secured the ship, flying from there to Dallas Tuesday at the rate of 90 miles an hour, and averaging twelve miles to the gallon of gas. From Dallas to San Angelo Friday they struck a strong headwind from the southwest, but took only three hours and ten minutes to make the cross country hop.

To care for the machine, which costs about \$3,000 delivered, Mr. Cox has a hangar here and a landing field and also on his ranch, he has grubbed out another field and erected another hangar, all the work costing about \$2,000. Travel from home to the ranch henceforth will be by air, he says, casting automobiles, horses, steers and other mounts into the limbo of the ranch discard, save as necessary though prosaic adjuncts to the trade.

The season's series of monotonous disasters would lead one to the conclusion that the reputed wild, ferocious mountain Lions of Ozona were in fact nothing but old Circus Lions.

Ozona's Mid-Winter Rodeo and Race Meet, to be staged this year the day after Christmas, will be a day packed with entertainment features and the event is expected to draw many hundreds of visitors here. Most every town will observe Monday as a holiday, since Christmas comes on Sunday, and the Crockett County Fair Association has arranged a program for its Mid-Winter meet that will attract the holiday crowds from all parts of West Texas.

One of the best one-day racing cards ever arranged will be one of the feature offerings of the entertainment feast for the day. Five races have been arranged on the program and owners of some of the best strings of race horses in this section are already inquiring about the racing program. Purses have been made unusually large for a one-day event and this fact is expected to lure many good race horses here for the meet.

Thousands of dollars were spent during the past summer by the fair association in putting the race track in first class condition and visitors as well as race horse owners are due for a surprise when they see the horses go around the track for the first time.

The track has been made practically level the entire distance around it. The hill on the south side has blasted away and the north side built up until the grade is now barely perceptible. The track has also been lengthened until it is now an even half mile in length and the curve into home stretch widened to provide faster finishes.

Workmen will be busy on the track about two weeks longer, according to Joe Pierce, and at the end of that time Ozona will have one of the best race tracks in this section.

The call of Christmas is coming early this year. Ozona merchants are already receiving initial shipments of holiday goods and are getting things in readiness for an expected Christmas rush that will outstrip anything of the past. In other words, local merchants are stocking heavily with holiday goods, broadening the range of selections and will be in position to offer lines of gift goods this year that will keep the local trade at home. Crockett Gets Two Producers

Gulf Thompson No. 2 & Allaman-Bell 3 Are Flowing

Eleven of thirteen tests listed as completion last week in the Trans-Pecos, on the Edwards Plateau and in far western Texas were producers. Five were in Pecos county, two each in Crockett and Crane counties and one each

in Sterling and Winkler counties. Pecos and Val Verde counties each had one wildcat dry and abandoned and Crane and Upton counties abandoned one location each.

Both of Crockett County's producers were near the river opposite the Yates producers in eastern Pecos County. Gulf No. 2 Thompson, 330 feet north of No. 1 Thompson in section 71, block 1, I-GN Ry. Co. survey, came in for 42 barrels an hour from 900-940 feet. It topped the lime at 837 feet. Allsman and Bell's No. 3 River Bed was completed for 15 barrels an hour from 936 feet. With a surface elevation of 2,154 feet, it topped the pay at 886 feet.

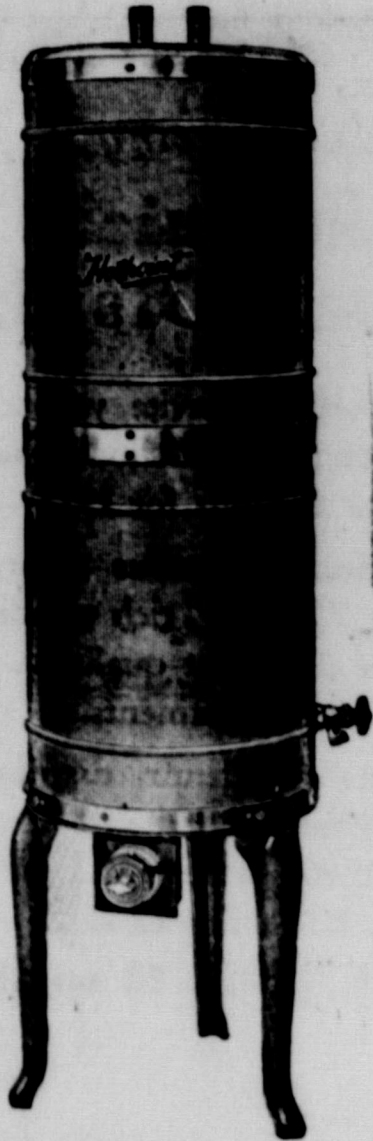



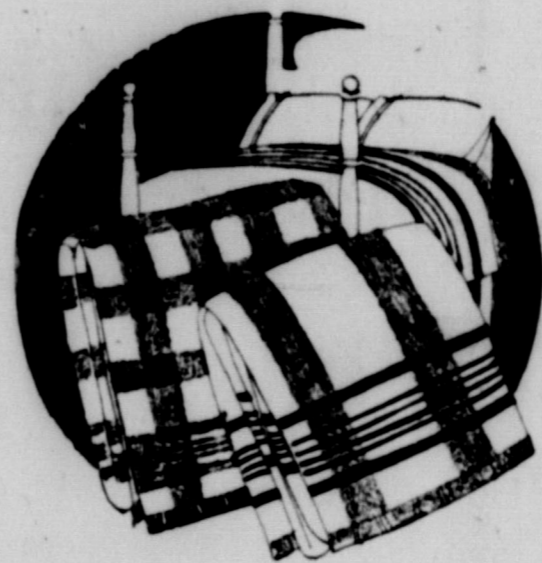
