Deposits Money For Guayule

Funds Realized From Sale to San Antonians Placed in State Depository at Austin.

The Austin correspondent to the San Antonio Express says the Land Commissioner has paid into the State depository the \$61,000 paid in certified checks by the Big Bend Manufacturing Company of San Antonio for all of the guayule or rubber plant on all unsold school lands, thus closing the deal. He also remitted \$600 paid by Van A. Webster of San Antonio for the lecheguilla, or fiber plant, on unsold school lands in Val Verde, Terrell and Brewster Counties. He also obligates himself to pay 50 cents per ton for all fiber shipped and is to furnish the commissioner with copies of bills of lading from whatever point the fiber goes.

He has three years in which to remove the plant and the 50 cents bounty fund will net \$10,000 in counties mentioned.



The Country Boy.
 No doubt the country preacher
 is often tempted to feel that
 he has a hard lot. He
 compares himself with the city
 pastor, and his privations and
 difficulties with the advantages
 and opportunities enjoyed by the
 city preacher and his family. He
 feels a touch of jealousy or envy.
 He may even be tempted to
 complain of the providence—di-
 vine, episcopal or sub-episcopal—
 which banishes him to the country
 and shuts him out from the
 charms and pleasures of the city.
 And as distance lends enchan-
 cement to the view, which, being
 interpreted, means that the imagi-
 nation always magnifies the

 been a circuit rider and a city
 pastor. And he knows what he

 inhere in himself, and not those of
