So it seems that President Roosevelt was not far wrong when he ordered troops to Goldfield. The legislature of Nevada has petitioned him to continue them there until they can pass a law providing for a sufficient police force or some other method of maintaining peace in Goldfield.

The stock industry of West Texas in general and Crockett County in particular was never in better shape. The mildness of the weather the past month, together with the splendid season in the ground has caused all the ranchmen of this section to wear that smile that won't come off.

Uncle Sam is in a quandary as to what to do to secure recruits for the army and navy. Every month there are large numbers of soldiers whose enlistment period expires, and who find it easier to earn and save out of the army than in. It is highly probable an increase in the soldiers' pay will have to be resorted to.

Dave Chapira, the smooth young country lad with a fine brain for air-castle building and making others believe him capable of building them, who located in Houston a few months ago, is a very much sought for individual just now by depositors and stockholders of the defunct House bank of Houston, a big ginning company and a Farmers' Union Warehouse Company. The young man is one of the smoothest swindlers of the age, and the exact amount of money he got away with and the many schemes he used to obtain it are set to be revealed to the public.

Of course everybody has been watching with the utmost interest the progress of the battleship fleet now on its way to the Pacific. The first leg of the voyage was finished at Port of Spain in the British islands of Trinidad and the second is now complete by the arrival at Brazil where the government authorities at Rio de Janeiro are laying themselves out to do honor to the fleet. Between New York and Rio there has been but one day lost from the schedule. This was due, it is said, to defective coal shipped at Trinidad. This speaks pretty well for the engineering end of the fleet, especially in view of the criticism that has recently been levelled at the Navy. But one of the equally pleasing things is the compliment that was paid the men by the Governor of Trinidad. The arrival of the fleet there was greeted with complete official courtesy but with mighty little general enthusiasm. It is hard to say just what the residents expected, but perhaps their experience with sailors of their own and other nationalities was not such as to cause them to welcome 15,000 strange sailors being turned loose ashore in large batches. It is fair to say Jack ashore is not always the most desirable citizen. But the men of the American fleet seem to have been on extra good behavior and before the squadron was ready to sail, they had been made thoroughly welcome in Trinidad. Before the vessels sailed, Gov. Jackson, of Trinidad wrote a letter to Admiral Evans, commenting among other things on the conduct of the sailors ashore. A part of this letter the Admiral signalled to the vessels after they were under way. The comment of the Governor on the men was that while on shore they had established a record that would be hard to equal and impossible to beat. That is the sort of an endorsement that the American people would like to hear from every port at which the fleet touches. There is more than a little relation between that sort of discipline and sobriety and the ability to attend strictly to the business that a navy is built for. Good work, Jack! Keep it up!

The new postoffice regulation governing the mailing of newspapers appears somewhat drastic and will work a hardship for a while on the country publisher as well as his city brother. It requires the discontinuance of weekly papers after a subscriber is as much as one year in arrears, and the dailies may send their paper three months before compelled to cut off a delinquent. It went into effect Jan. 1st. In the long run we believe the publisher will benefit by the ruling as there are many people who take a paper for years and when a bill is sent for subscription they mark the paper "refused"—and likewise refuse to pay their back subscription. If you are in arrears for subscription to The Kicker please come forward with amounts due, otherwise we will be compelled to cut you off in order to get our papers through the mail.

Our readers may have the idea that everything is in a thoroughly undeveloped state in Southwest Texas, but if they will examine the Herald, the News, the Uvalde Press, the Batesville Herald, the Hondo Anvil-Herald, the Carrizo Springs Javelin, the Eagle Pass Guide, the Moore Model, the Ozona Kicker and several others that come to our exchange table, they will see that no higher class lot of newspapers or more thorough service can be found elsewhere in the state. The Uvalde papers are extraordinarily high class.—Chrystal City Chronicle.

We are sorry we can't add the Chronicle to the above coterie, but we can't—not because it isn't in our class, but because we can't say—the first issue being the only one we've ever received of that newsy and neat little sheet.

The anti-Bailey organs are now grabbing at a very thin film, and are finding it very hard work to keep the people of the State sufficiently interested in the junior Senator and his alleged misdeeds to hope to win their fight against him. He was attacked in his private office at Fort Worth last Friday by two prominent Dallas newspaper men, one of them striking him in the forehead with a fifteen pound seal, while the other hurled a heavy glass paper weight at the rear of his cranium. He was not seriously injured.

We are in receipt of a call for a meeting of the Southwest Texas Sheep and Goat Growers Association, of which Judge Davidson is vice president, to be held at Del Rio on Feb. 1st. A number of very important questions will be discussed and everyone interested in the sheep or goat growing industry is invited and urged to be present.


**THE KICKER**
