Lometa Man Killed

W. I. Kirby of Lometa, who had been employed for the past few months in this section by the State Highway Department, was killed last Monday morning by falling from a tractor on which he had been riding. It seems that he fell onto one of the tracks and was carried up under the gasoline tank and was crushed to death in the narrow space. He never spoke, but lived about thirty minutes after the accident. The accident occurred on the Old Spanish Trail near Sonora, and was not witnessed, although three other men were working nearby.

The remains were taken from Sonora to San Angelo for embalming, and sent to Lometa, in Lampasas county, for burial.

Decensed had been in the employ of the State Highway Department under Aaron Cammins, supervisor in this section.

The range in Crockett county is suffering from a lack of rain, although grass in some sections is still plentiful and stock is not suffering to any great extent. Rain must fall in a short while, however, if Crockett county is to go into the coming winter with enough grass on the ranges to carry livestock without spending large sums of money for feed. This summer has been extremely dry, but the approaching fall months should show some rainfall, enough to start production of grass before cold weather.

North, south, east and west—they're all the same. We mean the streets in Ozona. They are as rough as any country road, and make riding for pleasure in town almost out of the question. Something must be done, since the streets are even rougher than any country road on the

Pecos river. No exaggeration, either. Money must be spent to repair Ozona streets, for there is no excuse or reason for having them in such condition. It will cost but little to level the streets so a car can travel with ease. A one-man grader such as is used by the State Highway Department in this county, would soon put the streets in fair condition at a small cost. Since the town is not incorporated, it naturally devolves upon the county commissioners to see what can be done in the matter of improving Ozona's streets and maintaining them to some extent. Whatever is done in improving the situation will meet with approval. Let's have a try at it.

Recent charges by Jim Ferguson and his friends that Dan Moody had violated the Texas election laws in accepting cam-

paign funds from other candidates should not cause undue worry to Moody supporters. To us it appears a last minute attempt to discredit the man who so decisively defeated the Ferguson forces in the recent primary, and the charges will be found without basis of fact when investigated. Two years ago we were for giving the Fergusons a second opportunity—a chance to redeem themselves and make good in the eyes of Texas citizens. They made a fiasco out of their opportunity. Mrs. Ferguson violated her former campaign pledge when she announced for a second term. Then she violated her present campaign promise when she did not resign her office as she had agreed to do when she lost to Moody. Then, in her post-election statement, she averred that she would enter no run-off campaign, since she "did not wish to further embroil the people in a political struggle." Yet her name has been certified as a run-off candidate, and she will wage a bitter and relentless campaign to the end. Since Dan's the man, we don't approve of Ferguson methods to belittle his victory.

Purity of Milk Protected Now By Scientists

Careful housewives constantly make it a point to ascertain the quality of each item that goes on their tables. Preparing food for the family is an extremely important job, for the proper selection and preparation of foods make in a large measure for the health and happiness of the family.

Milk is the most nearly perfect food, but it is a very delicate one as well. The keeping qualities of milk are slight. Danger from contamination is ever present. Evaporated milk, which is double rich because of the removal of 99 per cent of the water, is science's solution to these conditions.

Safeguarding evaporated milk is worked out as perfectly as man's ingenuity has been able to make the process. From cow to can, the milk which goes into the evaporated product is watched every step of the way.



Cows of the dairy herds are guarded with constant care and are subjected to regular inspections by veterinary surgeons. Herds are carefully groomed, and their yards and barns are kept scrupulously clean, as are all utensils. Milk condenseries are located in the heart of the big dairy regions to facilitate speedy handling, for this is essential if the milk is to be canned at "its moment of maturity." Canvas-covered trucks haul the milk to market, thus protecting the product from contamination on the way. Arriving at the condenser, the milk goes through tests for acidity, sediment, flavor and butterfat content before it is accepted.

Experts watch the progress of the milk through every step of its way. It goes into the evaporating machine, to the homogenizer, which breaks up the fat globules so that the milk may be easily digested by the consumer; by way of the almost human filling machine into sterilized cans; then into the sterilizer, where the cans are surrounded by steam and boiling water, destroying any possible bacteria. Inspectors handle the product as the last step to see that the canning job has been perfectly done. Labeling and packing follow. The housewife obtains the milk as fresh and sweet as when it came from the cow.

Livestock Quarantine

Be it remembered that on the 8th day of July, 1926, the Honorable Commissioners Court of Crockett County met at the Court House in Ozona in special session, all the members of said Court being present, whereupon the following order and judgment was duly passed by said Court and spread upon the minutes.

Ordered by the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas, that whereas this county has two resident cattle and sheep inspectors duly commissioned by the State Livestock Sanitary Commission and have heretofore been instructed by this Court zealously to protect the livestock of Crockett county from infection by foreign livestock, and whereas, it has come to the notice of this Court that stomach worm, a malignant disease, now exists among some of the domestic animals in certain counties in West Texas, and also that anthrax exists in a mild form among some domestic animals in West Texas, the said inspectors are ordered to inspect all sheep and cattle entering Crockett county, and to issue written permission to enter all found clean and free from scab, fever ticks, stomach worms and anthrax, but to refuse entrance of any animals, flocks, herds or droves of livestock found infected with one or more of such malignant diseases.

No further business appearing, the Court adjourned sine die.
