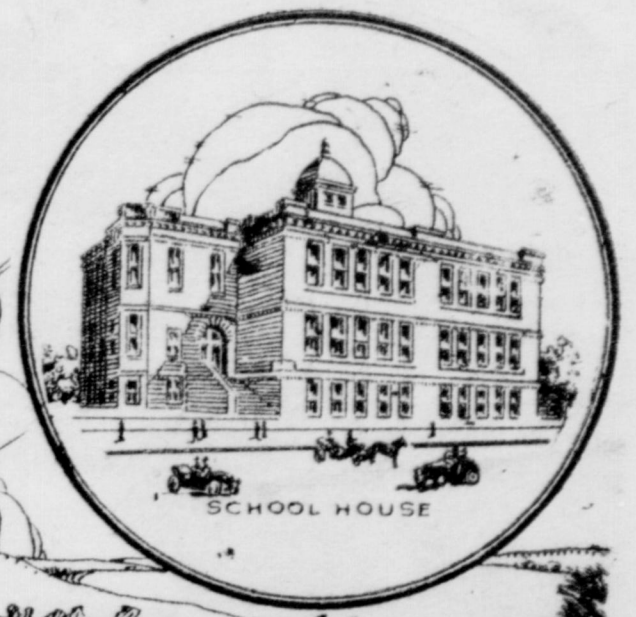

Menard No Match for Ozona Giants Captain Dozier Breaks a Leg

(Written by the Baseball Editor)

Thursday, the 17th, the Menard ball team, fresh from defeat at the hands of Eldorado, came to Ozona with the avowed intention of reaping sweet revenge for the drubbing they took from the Giants last season.

Buck Bailey and Bill Ray accompanied them—though they are supposed to know this bunch Ray was in the box for Me-

nard the first day and, for once, Ozona failed to score in the first inning. In the second, however, Bill allowed two hits which scored one run. O. Craig, in stealing second, slid into Dozier, striking him just above the ankle, and breaking his leg. Dozier was carried off the field and the game continued, but Menard's pep seemed to have gone with the unfortunate captain.

During the rest of the game Ozona walloped Ray for nine hits and five runs, while Smoky Joe allowed only three hits during the entire game and they were scattered. Not a Menard man reached third base and only one fly went to the outfield and of course Weaver.

Next day Menard came back with confidence. Bunger was twirling good ball and Menard hitters seemed to have picked up some. A hit or two and some errors scored Menard in the first and again in the fifth. But Ozona woke up in the fourth and bunched hits on Bunger for four runs. Another run in the seventh ran Ozona's score to five, while Menard failed to score again during the entire game. Bunger fanned fourteen men and handled the stick well, slamming out a single and double the first two times up. Sam pitched good ball and deserved better support than he had.

The third and last game of the series was a walkaway for Ozona, which scored four runs in the first inning and two in the second off Cortney. Cortney retired in the second with none out. Bill Ray allowed one run in third and retired. Carson of the third and retired. Carson of Mertzion pitched two innings, allowed two runs, and retired. Glasscock of Menard pitched two innings allowed four runs, and retired. Buck then surrendered his mit to Carson and wearily climbed up on the mound. He retired Ozona on four pitched balls.

Craig pitched a good game and was entitled to a shut-out, but errors in the ninth allowed Menard to score twice. Menard got five scattered hits during the entire game and made five errors, while Ozona clouted the pill for nine hits and made five errors. Buck says he is "shore comin' back an' clean up."

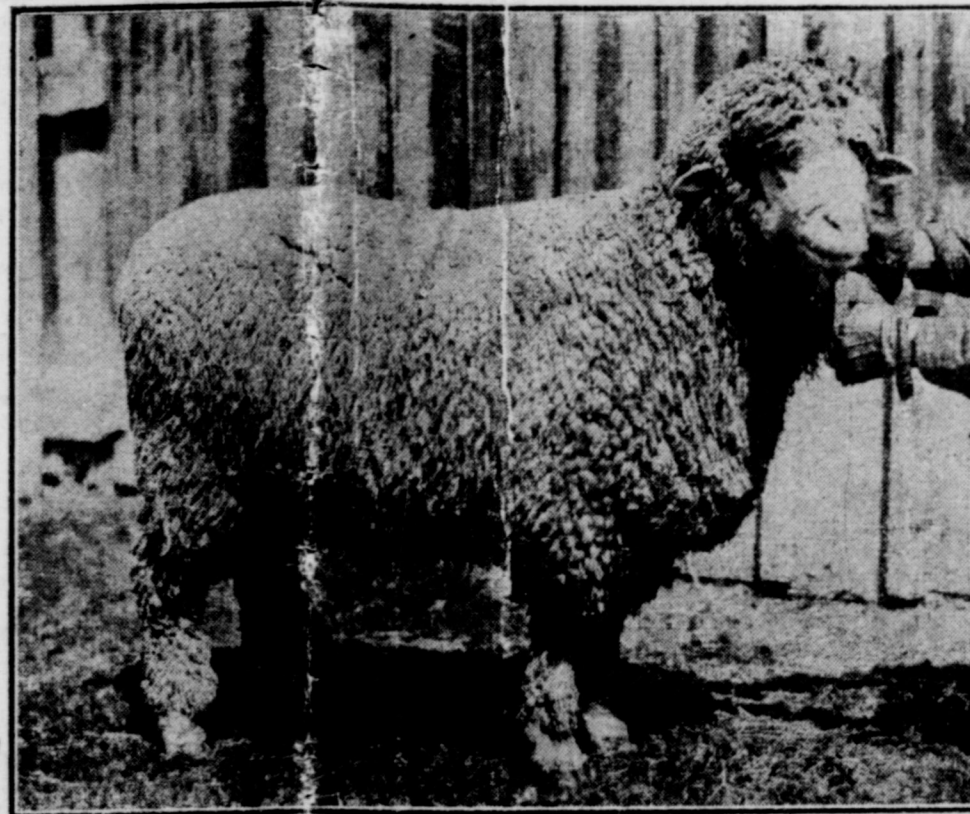
Mrs. Charlie Lindley and children were here from Barnhart last week the guests of Mrs. Haskell Cathey.

Fifth Annual Convention Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association of Texas

San Angelo is in the active this week for the occasion of the Fifth Annual Convention of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association of Texas.

In addition to the important business sessions being held, an unusually attractive program of entertainment is being enjoyed by members of the Association, their wives, daughters and sweethearts. Streets and buildings are profusely decorated.

The convention met Tuesday morning at ten o'clock and will adjourn this, Thursday, evening, so the so much and such important business is up for consideration that it is necessary to put much of the special work in the hands of committees which will later report to the Executive Committee.

It will take several days to conclude the Show and Sale, which is by far the largest ever yet held in Texas, not excepting that at the State Fair. Registered sheep and goats from a score of States, including nearly every State in the great West, number near two thousand. Premiums aggregate three thousand dollars, or more, of which amount Del Rio, San Angelo, Sonora, and Ozona are mentioned as the most liberal contributors. The American Angora Goat

Breeders' Association is also an active force in this convention, show and sale, and has been generous in promotive work and funds. This Association is also meeting in San Angelo extra-officially, with President Bob Davis and Secretary C. E. DeGroff in active direction of its affairs.

The Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association of Texas has grown from a small, but enthusiastic, beginning five years ago to an organization of National influence and importance. The officers and directors are men of vigorous and constructive executive ability, and they have taken a direct personal interest in the promotion of the Association, assisted heartily by a loyal membership of some seven hundred actual ranch owners and flockmasters.

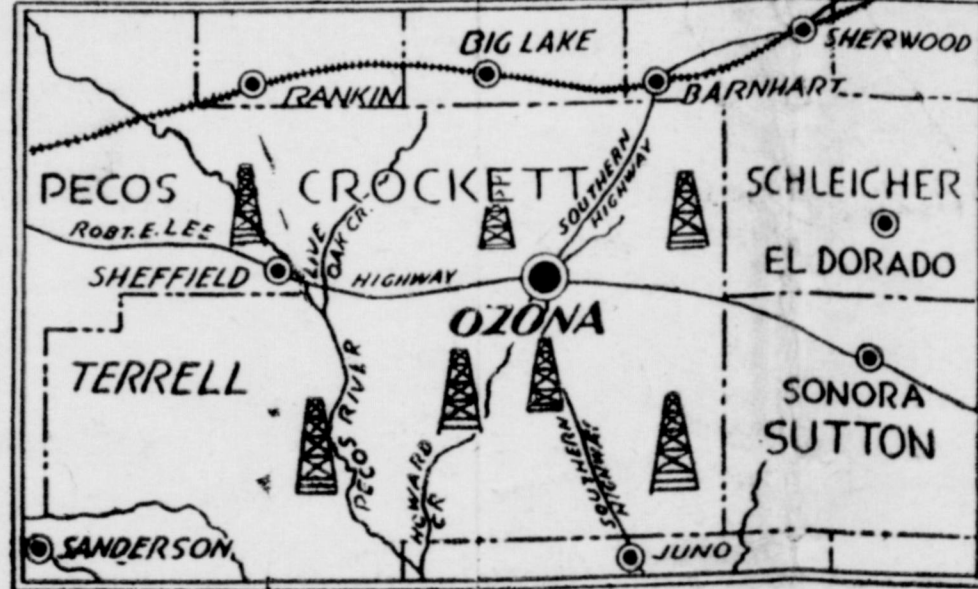

Promise Now Bright for Developing Great Oil Field in Crockett County

The Roy Henderson Well, 20 miles northwest of Ozona, is now down to the original contract depth of 3,500 feet. Drilling has stopped pending different arrangements and new contracts. The most optimistic hopes appear to be justified, not only for the early resumption of drilling, but for the development here of a great oil reservoir, the first to realize commercial oil in unlimited quantities.

This well is the contract property of the Morton Petrol Co., of Bartlettville, Oklahoma, and drilling is under the name of the Ryan Petroleum Co. A. D. Morton is president of both companies. These are big producers, having immense incomes from their own wells in Oklahoma, and in the Buckburnett and Ranger fields. This fact gives double assurance that, even if the promise here of oil were not so good, they will not abandon this field, since producing companies are allowed their excess profits for development (or wild-cattling) purposes.

The well is in splendid condition, and drilling could be resumed in an hour under the most promising and favorable conditions. Heavy Atlas casing is set down to the 3,500-foot point. This casing is the heaviest made and cost one dollar per foot more than any other. A California steel shoe has been placed at the bottom.

The drill has been in Pennsylvania shale for more than 1,500 feet, and the Permian rock never was encountered, except in eroded form, showing a vast distinction in this formation and in that of all surrounding counties. Water and Permian rock are the bugaboos of the drillers for oil.

As stated, the Permian is not apparent at this well and no water has been encountered since the drill left the 600-foot level. It is considered certain, by geologists, that it cannot be many feet to the black lime, where the great oil deposits of Eastland and Stephens counties were struck. The celebrated Barney Baruch is one of the principal stock holders in the company drilling this well. It is not thought possible that any abandonment of so favorable a prospect will be considered. Indeed, it is far more than probable that there will now be a number of wells begun by this company in Crockett county.

Some oil was struck at 3,400 feet in this well. The bituminous shales are growing richer with every foot penetrated. The 8-inch casing is down 3,500 feet. Several thousand six-inch casing is on the ground as well as a 5,000-foot cable. There is plenty of water for drilling operation.

Driller Pope has gone to Oklahoma to see the big heads of the company, and it is more than likely The Stockman will have some excellent news to publish next week.

The Frank Friend Well No. 1, 20 miles southeast of Ozona, after considerable labor and other troubles, is now drilling again with full crew and down a few hundred feet. More next week.

1. Selecting pure breeds that lay more and larger eggs, such as the White Leghorns, Wyandottes, Plymouth Rocks, Rhode Island Reds, Orpingtons, etc.
2. Giving better care, food, and shelter, with dry, clean, vermin-proof nests.
3. Confining males except in breeding season.
4. Collecting eggs frequently, especially in hot or muggy weather.
5. Storing eggs in a dry, clean, cool place.
6. Using small and dirty eggs at home.
7. Marketing frequently, with protection at all times from heat.
8. Selling for cash on a basis of size and quality, "loss off" instead of "case count."
9. Using an attractive package.
10. Combining shipments as a matter of economy.

PROPER CARE FOR GOSLINGS

As Young Fowls Grow Older They Consume Considerable Grass and Other Green Stuff.

The brooding and feeding of goslings is not much different from that of ducklings except as the goslings grow older they consume considerable grass and other growing green material and in that way cut down their feed bill. They can be allowed free range when they are two weeks old. Goslings are seldom brooded artificially but will do well with mother geese, hens or even ducks.

DOULTRY NOTES

- Provide a nest for each 4 or 5 hens.
- Feed table and kitchen waste to the hens.
- Give a light feed of grain in the morning.
- Begin marketing the cockerels as soon as they weigh one pound or attain a marketable weight.
- When selling eggs to the country merchant or cash buyer insist that the transaction be on a quality basis.
- Eggs from "stolen" nests should not be marketed; they are of unknown age and quality and should be used at home.
