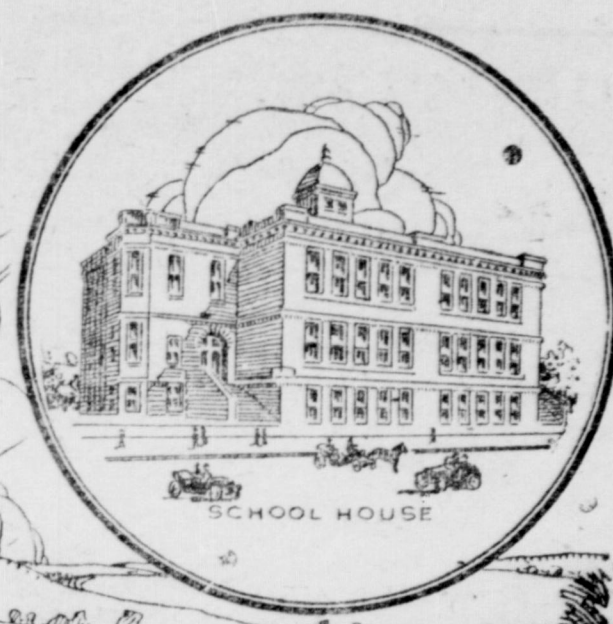
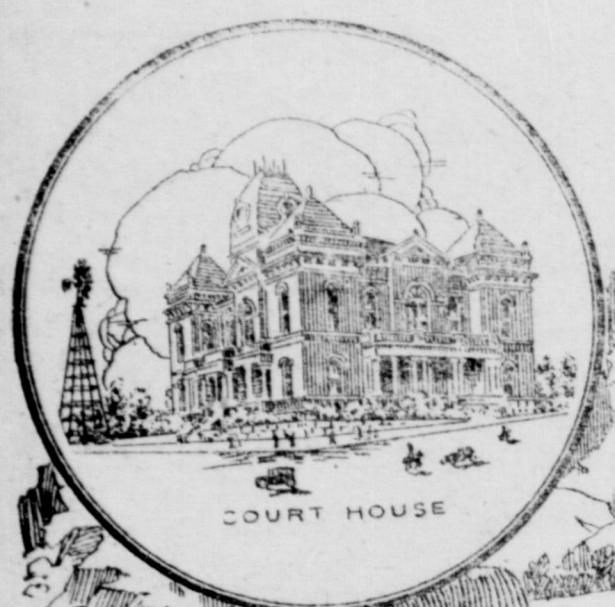

## News and Notes for Busy Readers

Owners and agents of wool and mohair stored at Del Rio refused 36 cents, which was the highest bid.

Rescoe (Fatty) Arbuckle was acquitted in San Francisco of manslaughter, on his third trial for causing the death of Virginia Rappe, beautiful film star.

Three soldiers were killed and ten others seriously injured as the result of an explosion of pyrotechnics in a signal pit on the Camp Bullis rifle range near San Antonio.

Fire on the San Pedro ranch, west of the Pecos, in Pecos county, destroyed range in a strip three miles wide and fifteen miles long. It is thought to have started from the backfire of an auto.

The Mississippi is on the biggest rise for many years and the Louisiana lowlands are flooded. Terrific storms raged throughout Illinois, Indiana, Kansas and Arkansas. Great loss of life and property reported.

Davis Sheen and O. L. Hopkins engaged in a shooting affray at the Sheen ranch in Schleicher county last Monday evening, but neither was seriously injured. The cause of the trouble is not known.

The big Del Rio-San Carlos celebration, scheduled for last Sunday, was again postponed until next Monday, April 24th, when assurance is positively given that the first train on the new railroad will run into San Carlos.

## Ozona Man Meets Death in Del Rio

M. L. Daniel, of Ozona, was instantly killed last Monday evening in Del Rio, when his car ran into a culvert and turned turtle.

Daniel had been in Del Rio several days. He was driving rapidly in Lover's Lane, in his Ford runabout, enroute from the river to town when the accident occurred. His neck was broken.

The authorities, being notified, took the body to the Doren undertaking parlors and got in touch by wire with Brady, having an idea that the man, unknown to them, was a resident of that town. As the news of the accident became current, however, John Burchett, of Ozona, went in to look at the body and immediately identified it as that of M. L. Daniel of Ozona, formerly an employee of the Dudley garage. Sheriff Whistler then telephoned Sheriff Augustine, and it became the sad duty of that officer and deputy sheriff Tom Casbeer to notify the young widow. She had just been looking for a letter from her husband, and was inexpressibly shocked and grieved. Beside his wife, the dead man leaves a nine-year-old boy.

W. P. Daniel, father of the dead man, lives at Wirt, Oklahoma. Sheriff Augustine wired him and received a message saying: "Ship body to Anna, Texas. If wife is without money, wire me amount needed." The Del Rio authorities, assisted by the Odd Fellows, of which lodge deceased was a member, prepared the body and forwarded it according to these instructions. Mrs. Burchett, until recently of Ozona, carried beautiful flowers and placed them on the coffin.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Cox, of Ozona, carried Mrs. Daniel and little son to San Angelo Tuesday, where they caught the afternoon Santa Fe for Anna, Texas, expecting to meet the body in Fort Worth.

## Blanton Alleges Rotten Congress

Following is an almost complete copy of the resolution introduced by Congressman Blanton:

Whereas on January 4, 1922, Congressman Blanton opposed the Ireland resolution to pay all losses of the restaurants operated by the House of Representatives out of the Treasury, and on Jan. 12, 1922, from the House floor, said Representative Blanton again spoke against the perquisites of Congressmen, asserting: That the members of the Texas delegation received a mileage check of \$700 three times in each Congress of three sessions, four of whom were bachelors; that the barbers in the House barber shop had furnished to them free by the Government their shop without rent, their furniture, fixtures, light, heat, hot and cold water, electricity, linen towels, and so forth, and besides were paid \$70 each per month out of the Treasury; that the chiropodist, William Richardson, and the body rubber Bruce, in the House bathrooms, each were paid \$95 per month out of the Treasury, and the assistant body rubber, Tompkins, in said bathrooms, was paid \$78 per month out of the Treasury; that each Congressman was furnished with a secretary and a clerk at a cost to the Government of \$3,200 per annum, plus bonuses; that each Congressman had a splendid office with the finest furniture and carpets, and the Government also furnished him with two typewriting machines, comb and brush, clothes brush, soap, hot and cold water, electric fans, telephone, and clean towels; that there was credited to each Congressman in the stationery room \$125 per session, or \$375 for each Congress of three sessions, ostensibly for stationery, but which \$375 any Congressman so desiring could draw out in cash or use to buy from the House stationery room any of the articles kept there for sale and sold to Congressmen at cost, among which articles were ladies' fancy stationery, carving knives, forks and steels, leather bound poker set, playing cards by the dozen, ladies' fine fancy manicure set with all pieces pearl handled, pocket pint whiskey flask covered with ostrich-skin leather, ladies' fine ostrich-skin handbags, ladies' toilet set with brush, comb and big fine mirror, electric chafing dish worth wholesale \$15, all of which articles were exhibited on the floor of the House, the speaker at the time stating:

"Now you know that they had so much demand for this little pocket pint whiskey flask, covered with ostrich-skin leather, during Christmas time, that they sold out," and illustrating the loss that could accrue to the Government on wastage of food, in case the House should unexpectedly adjourn soon after convening, the items of food contained on the Senate menu for January 10, 1922, was given, the said Representative Ireland when passing his restaurant resolution having asserted that he intended to bring the House restaurants up to the standard of the Senate, and that the main reason for having the Government pay the losses was that no private enterprise
