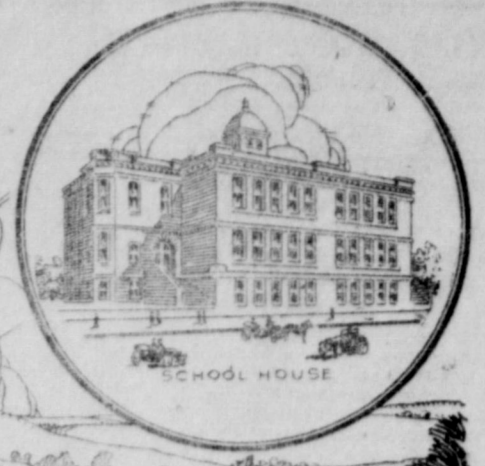
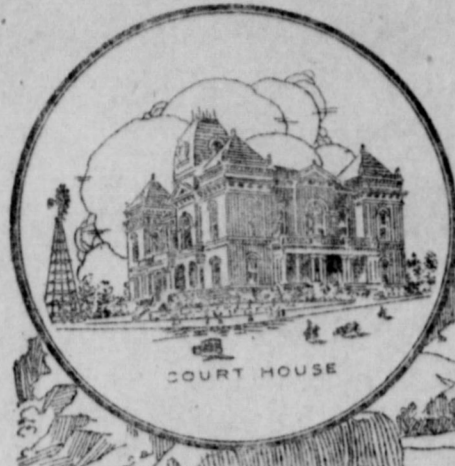

News and Notes for Busy Readers

Eldorado school board has elected W. H. Wilkins, of Mertzon, superintendent for next session.

Railroad employes generally have thought better of it, and the talk of a strike is dying down.

Slumps in wheat prices reported from Chicago, Kansas City and Minneapolis range from nine to ten cents per bushel.

Chas. J. Bonaparte, who was attorney-general in President Roosevelt's cabinet, died in Baltimore, age 70 years.

School census scandal at Corpus Christi. City claims several thousand more scholastics than appears at all reasonable.

Stated that old Europe is in a bad fix, financially, physically and mentally. Agonized cries to the United States for assistance.

Gov. Neff paid no attention to the numerous protests against the presence and activities of State Rangers at Eagle Pass and at Del Rio.

Two bandits dressed in "evening clothes" in the height of fashion held up the city hall at Miami, Florida, and escaped with five thousand dollars.

Edward Engers, who insisted on a grand jury investigation of the Dallas Ku Klux organization, and failed to secure it, was himself indicted under three different counts.

Carter Hudson, of Dallas, nineteen years old, spending his summer vacation at Greensboro, Ala., saved three lives in two days from drowning, and is in line for a Carnegie medal.

Charles Gaines was condemned to death at Dallas for the slaying of Geo. W. Street, the mail clerk who was killed at the time of the big postoffice robbery. The jury prayed several hours before rendering the death verdict, and the foreman then announced that "it was a verdict rendered by God."

Mrs. Eva Kaber is on trial at Cleveland, Ohio, for the killing of her husband. The lawyers for the defense contend that women as jurors are cold-blooded, cruel and heartless, and are trying to secure a jury entirely of men. The prosecuting attorneys tacitly admit the contention by making strenuous efforts to get a jury composed entirely of women.

U. S. at Peace With the World

Raritan, N. J., July 3.—The resolution of Congress declaring war with Germany and Austria-Hungary at an end was signed here late today by President Harding.

In signing the resolution the president used a pen sent him by Representative Porter of Pennsylvania, chairman of the House foreign affairs committee and joint author of the measure. The pen will be returned to Mr. Porter as a souvenir.

Now that this country is technically, as well as practically, at peace with the world, the following figures as to the costs of the German disturbance will be of interest:

The World War cost the United States \$24,010,000,000.

Troops furnished by the various American States for war service, 4,764,071.

American casualties: Killed in action, 34,248; died of wounds, 18,700; died of disease, 23,439; wounded slightly, 91,189. Total American casualties from all causes were 324,612.

Dempsey is Still Champion Pug

Jersey City, July 2.—George Carpentier, heavyweight champion of Europe and heralded as the greatest heavyweight that Europe has produced in all time, finished his bout this afternoon for the world championship with Jack Dempsey, flat on his face, his legs and arms outstretched, beaten to a frazzle and as lifeless as a corpse. The end came in the fourth round after Carpentier had been floored the second time.

Dempsey knocked him down a few seconds after the fourth round opened, sending him heavily to the canvas with a short right hook to the chin. The actual time of the fighting in the fourth round was one minute and sixteen seconds.

POSTOFFICE NOTICE

Box Rents are now due for the third quarter in the year 1921. They must be paid, or the boxes will be closed. This is fair warning. The postoffice regulations are very strict in this matter. Contrary to the public impression, the postmaster does not get a cent of the box rents. He must furnish the boxes and conveniences at his own expense, and the government gets the revenue. Moreover, if an inspector should visit the office and find a box in use and not paid for, he simply charges up the rent of the box to the postmaster.

If any patrons of the office are not getting their mail promptly, the postoffice employees will be glad to have instructions as to future handling of individual mails.

TO REDUCE U. S. ARMY

The administration on July 3 began cutting down the size of the United States army, in accordance with the provision of the new army bill.

Secretary of War Weeks the first step in this direction, issuing an order to the commanders of the nine army corps to discharge any man from the United States army who was to be discharged.

4th Celebration at Big Lake

Big Lake celebrated the birth of the Nation Monday and Tuesday by inviting her neighbors to join with her in a round of pleasures and jollification. The crowd was on hand by 10 o'clock Monday morning, and the fun began with the goat roping, in which men from every section of West Texas participated.

The annual contest between Jones and Holder was the feature of this event, both men claiming the championship of Texas in goat roping. Louis Jones carried off honors in eleven seconds.

The cats settled the goat roping for that day, and the crowd gathered round the little arbor where barbecue, pickles, bread and hot coffee were being issued in wholesale quantities. Beer and soda-pop were to be had for the paying and by one o'clock everybody was full to the top.

Things began to liven up a half-hour later when it was announced that pitching horses would be ridden at once.

Several horses were mounted during the exhibition, but only one was ridden. The first was a lively bay that lost his rider the sixth jump and made an honest effort to kick his head off as he hit the ground. The gentleman escaped, however, with a torn shirt and graceless fall, and went his way rejoicing. The next bronco did the tail spin, but the engine failed to sputter, and the fun came to an end so far as he was concerned.

Meanwhile, a beautiful gray mare had been pawing the earth inside the roped-off arena. She was introduced as Lady Blue Bird, and led around the pen for inspection. She was a magnificent specimen of horseflesh, made up from Percheron and Steeldust stock mixed with a little Mexican to insure complete meanness.

Her rider kept his seat three of the quickest jumps a horse has ever shown West Texas people. Then he incautiously turned the horn loose, and when he grabbed for it again, his eager fingers closed around a handful of dirt. Meanwhile Lady Blue Bird pitched all over the pen twice before they could stop her. As soon as she was quieted the performance was declared to be over and the crowd moved over to the next block to witness the calf roping.

Allison Harrison won first money in this event by a close score. His time was 45 seconds, but his calf got up, while Nix and Goacher finished in 46 and 47 seconds respectively, their ties.

NEFFITIS

Speaking to the Texas Press Association at McAllen on June 9, Governor Neff said:

"I personally do not think it would be a bad law if the Governor of Texas were given the power to remove officers without stating cause."

Concerning his desire to amend the Dean law so that the seller of liquor can be convicted on the testimony of the purchaser, he said:

"There are persons in this State who are going about declaring that the amendment of the law in this manner would shake the foundations of the Republic. Well, I say that if such a thing as this will shake the foundations of the Republic, let 'em shake."

Concerning enforcement of the Dean law, he said:

"How many persons in Texas do you think were sent to the 'pen' last year for violating the prohibition laws? Just fifty-eight. Why, more than that should have been sent from my town alone, and from yours, too."

The Governor's town is a sizable city, but some of the towns represented at the Press Association meeting are little more than villages. To send fifty-eight persons to the penitentiary from one of these small towns would make a very noticeable dent in its population, and if fifty-eight persons were imprisoned from each town represented—actually or virtually—at the Press meeting we should have between 50,000 and 60,000 convicts a year under the Dean law alone.

The Governor explained that the Johnson bill, which he advocates, does not allow removal of a local officer without charges brought against him, but gave it as his personal opinion that it would not be a bad idea to permit the governor "to remove officers without cause, just as the Federal government does." Now, the Federal officers who can be removed by executive order are appointed officers. They derive their authority from the executive, and the same power can be applied to them if. But our local officers are elected. They represent not the Governor but the people, and it is right that they should be retired in one of two ways: by the people's failure to re-elect them, or by the judgments of courts. To put them at the governor's mercy, by allowing him to remove them "without stating cause," would be to make them his creatures instead of the people's. Local self-government would not exist.

The hope was entertained in some quarters that the Governor's course with respect to a situation existing some time ago at Galveston indicated a change of heart on the question involved in the Johnson bill. That hope was shattered by the governor's speech at McAllen. The governor not only maintains that the Johnson bill should be passed, but thinks it doesn't go far enough. While he does not press the point, he believes that the governor of Texas should have power to remove officers without stating cause. He has a program in mind under which "Texas will be so dry that a man will have to prime himself to spit," but that is not all his program. After he has made Texas bone-dry, it cannot be supposed that he will be willing to give up the powers conferred on him by the Johnson bill. It cannot be supposed that he wishes the suspended sentence law repealed for the sake of prohibition alone. He, himself, has asked, "Why should one law be favored as against another?" The sending of 50,000 or 60,000 persons to prison under the Dean act would not, surely, end his activity. There are a great many violations of other laws to be dealt with. Our Sunday laws, for example, are not enforced in our largest cities, and are but partially enforced in smaller cities. It is reasonable to suppose that the governor will go after every violation of every regulation, on the principle that law enforcement necessarily means numerous convictions; that justice means the inflictions of many penalties. King Peter of Serbia once spoke of sitting under a favorite tree "inflicting justice." We may expect numerous "inflictions" if the legislature obeys the Governor.—Austin Statesman.

YOUR EYES

Article 2.
How often after reading or writing have you said, "My, how tired my eyes feel, I guess I will have to give them a rest." If the eyes are normal and have no defect, they can do a great deal of work without becoming unduly tired. If, on the other hand, they are even slightly defective, very little effort causes eye-strain with its resultant fatigue and discomfort.

It should be about 24mm, about one inch in length, and if it is either longer or shorter, perfect, comfortable vision is unlikely.

The possessor of such a pair of eyes may see perfectly, but in order to keep the picture on the back of his eyes clear, a little muscle is called upon to overexert itself.
