

147 Sections Of Pecos **County Ranch Lands Change Hands**

A deal involving a consideration of nearly a half million dollars was closed here Friday night whereby a quartet of Crockett County ranch men including J. C. Montgomery, Roy and Floyd Henderson and Wal ter Childress became the owners of 94,280 acres of land in Pecos County purchased from the Schar brauer Cattle Company of Midland, Texas,

Each of the four men will get approximately 30 sections each out of the total of 147 sections, with approximately 30 sections purchased jointly by the four. The land is in an almost square block and the entire block was sold, the purchasers planning to dispose of the 30 sections purchased jointly.

The land was purchased at \$5 an acre, the total consideration in the deal amounting to \$471,400. With improvements that are contemplated by the purchasers, the total outlay will easily reach the half million mark. The deal was consummated through Othro Adams of the T. L. Benson Commis-

infection. Then drink plenty of pure water. 


