## Light Rains In Parts Of West Help Ranges

### Ozona Receives Good Showers Ranchers Near Here Report Scattered Falls

Light, scattered rains that will be of great benefit in many sections of the county where a young drouth has prevailed for several months fell over portions of West Texas Sunday and Monday. Ranges are getting pretty dry in many sections and those fortunate enough to be among the chosen of the rain gods will be greatly benefitted by the light fall.

A soaking general rain this time would be worth hundreds of thousands of dollars to West Texas, ranchers say, for winter grazing. Grass is dry for the most part but a rain would produce a good crop of weeds. Stock is in good shape and except for the possibility of an unusually severe winter prospects are good for the season it is ahead.

The rains of this week centered to the north and northwest and south of Ozona. Ozona got several good showers. Barnhart reported the heaviest fall in this section: 1 1/2 inches falling three Sunday afternoon and night. Trucks operating between Ozona and Barnhart had difficulty in making the runs Monday. Mertzon reported a half inch fall as did Eldorado. Soper received only a light sprinkle.

A total of an inch and a half of moisture fell on the George Best ranch southwest of Ozona, according to reports, that being the heaviest fall reported in this territory. The rain extended from Pike's Peak draw to the edge of Ozona. The McIntire draw was running water Monday. S. E. Couch reported a fairly good rain on parts of his ranch as did Clay Montgomery. Joe Pierce, 35 miles south, also reported a good fall.

## Old Ewes In Demand

The sale of about 9000 old ewes during the week end at a price in line with those that have obtained through the season on \$2.50 to \$6.50, featured the livestock activities of the last few days. The demand for lambs seemed to be off somewhat and those in the market were those who have grass and who wanted cheap ewes. The old ewes will be turned with the bucks immediately in the sections to which they go. Some of these animals go to the Imperial Valley in California, some to Colorado, others to New Mexico and others to Central and North Texas. It is estimated by Robert Massey that 1,000 old ewes have recently been bought in this section. J. S. Allison has sold 100 ewes to a California buyer at \$6.50 and they will be delivered at Marathon between now and October 10. Joe Montgomery has also sold his old ewes for \$6 a head.

A feature of the activity of the feeder sheep market has been the buying of lambs by men in the Panhandle, and especially from those sections where oil has stocked the banks with money. Larger numbers than ever have gone to the Panhandle and others have gone to Central and Northern Texas. The feeder in the north who lost money last year has not been in the market so strong as before. In most states he has plenty of feed, but the banks are lending money on the basis of nine cents a pound for the feeders and the Texas sheepmen who have held out for the ten cents got that price. That was too high for the feeder in many instances but the lambs were bought by the Texans and there has been no trouble in disposing of them. —San Angelo Standard

## Chris Meinecke Is Recovering From Injuries

Local Merchant Seriously Injured When Car Crashes Into Light Post; Boy Hurt

Chris Meinecke, Ozona merchant who was seriously injured and his adopted son, Buster, 12 was slightly hurt early Monday morning when an automobile in which they were returning from a ranch south of town, crashed into one of the gas concrete light posts in the middle of the street near Mr. Meinecke's store.

Mr. Meinecke had been out to the ranch to put in some machinery and was returning late at night. Several miles out of town the light on his car burned out as the result of heavy pulls in the mud and as a heavy rain he attempted to repair them. Passing motorists seeing his plight offered to drive a front of his car to give him the benefit of their lights.

Mr. Meinecke and his son drove to town in this manner without mishap, but just inside the city the pilot car turned a corner and Mr. Meinecke's car turned to the street. Two cars coming down the street and meeting him blinded Mr. Meinecke and he turned out and crashed head on into the light post.

One of the prongs on the steering wheel struck Mr. Meinecke in the shoulder, breaking the collar bone and sticking a piece an inch and a half into the flesh. Dr. G. L. Goates pinned the wound and declared that it was a full inch and a half deep. Mr. Meinecke's chest and stomach were badly lacerated but fortunately he suffered no internal injuries and was able to go to a home Wednesday.

Buster suffered the loss of two teeth, one being knocked completely out and the other broken in half. His lip was also painfully cut and he was considerably bruised.

The car did not turn over but was practically wrecked.

PRAIRIE DOG NOTICE  
Be it remembered that on the 18th day of September A. D. 1926 the Honorable Commissioners Court met in Regular Session all members present except Com. J. W. Owens and the following Order was passed:  
It appearing to the Court that the prairie dog is populating Crockett County to a serious extent, and it seems to the Court judging from the complaints that this Court should take some official action under the statute to the end that this nuisance be wiped out of Crockett County; but the Court is of the opinion that the severity of the law if strictly followed by this Court might work unnecessary expense and hardship on owners and lessees it is considered best to make and pass this order rather by way of notice and warning, that all prairie dogs must be exterminated and that at the regular meeting of this Court in February 1927, this Court will pass an order under the Prairie Dog Statute enforcing same so far as Crockett County is concerned.

## TRAILINGS

As the shipping season draws near the close, movement of the Crockett county lamb crop continued with an unusually heavy late season volume and many local sales were reported during the week. The trail to the shipping yards has been dotted with flock after flock for most of the week. With good range conditions prevailing for the most part during the past year, the lambs are weighing out at top figures with Crockett county stuff in good demand.

J. W. Owens delivered 1600 wethers to W. L. Slaughter recently at 10 cents a pound.  
Clayton Bros. have delivered 700 head of ewes to Allen Roberson of Ozona at \$10.50 a head.  
Clayton Bros. purchased 2125 head of mixed lambs recently, 900 from Rowdy Hoover, 500 from Will Adams and 725 from Sherman Taylor. The entire lot was sold to Emmett Noelke of San Angelo at 10 cents a pound.

Dick Baker received a few hundred head of lambs from M. H. Goode several days ago. The price was not announced.

Crockett county ranchers shipping out of Barnhart during the past week include L. E. Cross, 502 head; R. R. Baker, 532 head; Will Odum, 110; head; Will Miller, 1058 head; Rob and Roy Miller, 2465 head on September 29 and 1555 head on October 1; Ben Robertson, 921 head.

Joe Cardwell, county inspector reports a heavy movement of stock through the county in the last few weeks. He has inspected several hundred flocks of sheep and goats moving across county lines recently, he says. Most of the stuff has been clean, free from stomach worms and scab. Each owner must have a certificate showing the animals free from communicable diseases before they are allowed to be moved across the county.

## GOAT BUSINESS LINE NOW

The goat business could not be better than it is now, according to J. A. Ward, breeder of registered goats in this section, who sold bucks to Frank Wilhelm of Menard, James Mann of Brady and Franklin Pierce Green during the AllWest Texas Exposition. Mr. Ward points out that the behavior is bringing almost twice as much as wool and that the goats are now bred to the point that they shear almost as much as the sheep. He sheared a spring kid this week got five pounds off him and only recently he sheared a billie getting 23 pounds off a less than twelve months fleecer.

Mr. Ward sold 65 billies to go to Goldthwaite in Mills County where Mr. Ward says the goat business is getting popular. They are fencing against varmints in Taylor County also and Mr. Ward predicts that within the next two years that hilly country in those two counties, which has heretofore not been very profitable will be a source of real money for the owners. He thinks within the two years that the wolf proof fencing in those counties will have covered practically all of the available range.

## Baptist Assn. To Meet Here

Del Rio Uvalde Association To Hold Annual Two Day Session Next Week

Approximately 50 visitors from the districts included in the Del Rio-Uvalde Baptist Association are expected to be in Ozona for the annual session of the association to be held here beginning Wednesday evening, October 13. Rev. H. C. Slaughter pastor of the First Baptist church, announced.

The meeting will be in session two days. Local Baptists are expected to entertain the visitors during their stay here and an urgent appeal has been made by the pastor to members of the church to assist in this work.

It is planned to furnish the visitors with a bus, and supper and breakfast. If there are any who will assist in taking care of the visitors they are asked to call Mrs. Roy Parker, who is in charge of this feature.

An election to decide whether or not the town of Ozona should be incorporated will be held here Saturday, October 16, according to notices posted this week by County Judge Chas. E. Davidson.

The election call was issued by Judge Davidson in response to a petition filed with him by a group of approximately 75 taxpayers of the area asking that such action be taken to decide the question.

The election will be held in the district courtroom, W. E. Smith, whose name headed the petition asking for the election, has been named by Judge Davidson as presiding officer to hold the election.

The order posted by the judge specifies that all persons 21 years of age who are qualified voters and have lived within the boundaries of the proposed town for a period of six months or more are eligible to cast their ballot in the election.

The election order specifies the boundaries of the proposed town as they were laid out in the original petition filed by voters. The boundary takes in practically all of what is now the present area of Ozona, extending in all directions to the limits of present property lines excluding the section of town known as Mexico.

Considerable interest is being manifested in the election and a big vote is expected to be polled. The ballots will contain but the one question with the words "For Incorporation" and "Against Incorporation". Voters will indicate their stand on the question by scratching out one of the lines, leaving "For Incorporation" if they favor the proposal or "Against Incorporation" if they are opposed.

One of the biggest questions that has ever come up for the people of Ozona to decide will be thrashed out at the ballot box Saturday, October 16, when the question of whether or not the town is to be incorporated will come up for a vote. The election notice has been posted by County Judge Chas. E. David in response to the request of a group of approximately 75 residents made in a petition filed with the judge.

There are many angles to this question and it is one that deserves the serious consideration of every qualified voter in the town. The outside world would be surprised, perhaps, to know that a town that has successfully financed the construction of a handsome \$150,000 hotel, a splendid new church, and is building five business houses and nearly a score of residence structures is not incorporated. Ozona is experiencing one of the greatest periods of progress in her history and if there is any means whereby that progress can be made even more far reaching, the opportunity should not be overlooked.

One of the city's greatest needs at present is a system of paved streets. No doubt the citizenry as a whole realize that fact and would be grateful for a suggestion as to how the end could be attained. There is no question in our mind but what the end could be attained, if it were in accordance with the proper determination, the same determination that erected the new hotel and the new church. If the town is incorporated an organization is perfected through which this work could be undertaken. There are many other things that Ozona needs, among them adequate fire protection, sewer system and many others, and if the pace that has been set is maintained, they will be realized before long.

These concrete light posts down the middle of the main drag—they're pretty but how much prettier they could be made if only an attractive light were mounted atop each. Anybody might be a little easier for motorists to see at night.

There are some pessimists who insist that Ozona's present prosperous era will be short lived and that when the present building program is completed, matters will slump back into their regular groove and be at a standstill for another decade.

sheep and goats and 150 cattle and its work will not be handicapped, Mr. Thomas stated.

He was here to ship 64 sheep and goats that were exhibited last week at the AllWest Texas Exposition to the Texas State Fair at Dallas. Of this number 25 Rambouillet sheep and 20 goats belong to the Sonora Ranch Station. The flock includes the grand champion C-type Rambouillet ewe, a 5-year-old and in the herd is the champion Angora doe.

There are about 100 sections in Sutton and Edwards counties, including the Sonora ranch station, that have had only showers since April, although Sonora had good rains up through part of August, Mr. Thomas reported. There also is a dry strip around

Juno. The Sonora Ranch Station has 60 tons of ensilage left from last season and will have available this winter several hundred tons of spineless cactus. 8 acres at the station are planted in spineless cactus and the crop that will be fed this winter has been growing almost four years. The cactus is considered especially good for cattle, and has the advantage over the wild cactus that is plentiful in West Texas in that the spines do not have to be burned off the pears with a gasoline torch.

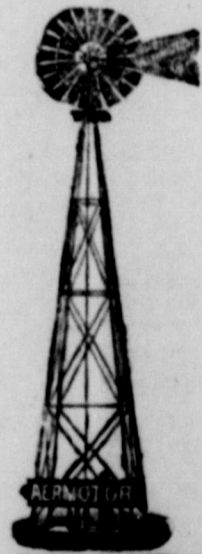
