Dr. Dundee, Chicago's Health Commissioner, says human life would last seven years longer, on the average, if nerve-destroying noises were eliminated.

We think we are "used" to a certain noise, but use up so much energy concerning noise, crowding it out of the brain, as in doing real work.

Millions of brains are cut down 60 to 80 per cent in efficiency by noise. Absence of noise means greater efficiency, less wear in machines. But men pay no attention to their own machinery, worn away by noise every day.

And to complain of noises is considered effeminate. If unnecessary noise were accurately classified with assault and battery, life would be longer.

When the Bible says jealousy hath a most vehement flame, it doesn't exaggerate. Horrible testimony given by a doctor as to the killing of Mrs. Mills, in the Hall-Bills murder case, proves it.

The unfortunate woman, after three bullets had been fired into her head, was dreadfully mutilated. Her throat was cut twice, her tongue cut out, and there were other horrible wounds inflicted on the dead body. The tongue is supposed to have been cut out because the woman's singing had charmed her clergyman from his straight and narrow path.

The horrible case will again remind men that whoever stirs up jealousy stirs up danger. They have been reminded of it, often enough, for five hundred thousand years, by blows on the head with sharp flints, by poison in the Middle Ages, by pistols later. But they never seem to learn.

Wall Street is very proud of having "supplanted London as the world's money lender." This year the United States will lend more than a thousand million dollars in gold to foreign borrowers. In three years past this country has lent Europe four thousand million dollars. Gratifying, of course, but when will they get that money back?

London as world money lender charged usually moderate, and always legal, rates of interest. Our financiers lend money to Europe on a basis that makes the borrower pay at the rate of 18 per cent for the first year, as much as 7 and 8 per cent thereafter.

The usurer in many States loses principal and interest. Some of those American lenders will get unpleasant replies later when they ask for their principal. Meanwhile it is profitable for middlemen that get the "rakeoff."

All farmers and some Congressmen are wondering what "can be done for the farmer." The farmer says: "Guarantee me a definite price for my crops." Common sense says that invites overproduction, such as now breaks the price of cotton.

With wheat at \$1.40, farmers will increase their acreage by 15 per cent. How much wheat would they plant were the price \$2.49, which the farmers feel they ought to have? And where would the Government get money to buy the surplus \$2.49 wheat?

Farmers can help their wheat situation by backing Secretary Hoover's plan for a canal to the Gulf through the Mississippi Valley and another from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic ocean.

That would make every bushel of wheat worth from six to eight cents more.

Since the war railroads have raised rates six to eighteen cents a bushel, and surplus American wheat on its way to Liverpool pays that tax.

A nine foot canal from the lakes to the gulf would send freight in barges carrying a thousand tons, or against box cars carrying fifty tons, hauled by a tugboat instead of a locomotive. And ten such barges, carrying ten thousand tons, would require no more men than one of the old-fashioned river boats carrying one hundred and fifty tons.

Ozونا May Get Modern Candy Making Plant

R. J. Cooke Proposes To Add A New Enterprise To Market In New Location

A candy kitchen is next in prospect for Ozona.

R. J. Cooke, proprietor of the Ozona Meat Market, has announced that he will in the next few weeks install a modern candy kitchen to be operated in connection with the meat market in its new location in the Perner building, recently completed.

A small section of the front part of the market will be cut off to accommodate the new enterprise. Mr. Cooke said, and modern equipment will be secured. Negotiations are now under way with an expert candy maker over the business and if the deal is closed the equipment will be ordered immediately. All kinds of home made and fancy candies will be manufactured and sold both wholesale and retail, Mr. Cooke said.

With his new and larger quarters, Mr. Cooke is contemplating a number of other improvements for the market. In a few months he will have one of the most unusual displays in his window of any meat market in Texas. A huge long horn steer, at present the property of Tom Smith, has been purchased by Mr. Cooke and as soon as he is fattened will be slaughtered and the head and hide mounted. The mounted animal will be placed on trucks and displayed in one of the windows of the market, if the plan is carried out, Mr. Cooke said.

A partition is being thrown up in the rear of the market and

Nephew Of Geo. Harrell Killed

Chas. Harrell Of Sanderson Victim Of Accidental Discharge Of Gun In Hands Of His Brother

Charles Harrell, 21, nephew of George Harrell of Ozona, was killed late Friday afternoon near Sanderson when a gun in the hands of his brother, F. N. Harrell, Jr., 17 years old, was accidentally discharged while the two brothers were returning to their home in Sanderson after a hunting trip in the country near by.

Full details of the accident were lacking here. It is understood, however, that the two boys had just finished their hunt and were returning to their car. The younger brother attempted to throw the shells out of his gun when in some manner it was accidentally discharged, the load striking the older brother.

Young Harrell had been married about two years. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. F. N. Harrell of Sanderson. Funeral services were held from the family home at that place Sunday afternoon.

CROCKETT FREE OF SCABIES

An 85 section pasture, which was quarantined in Peecos County near Girvin after an outbreak of the sheep scab would not have all been put under the ban, had not a few sheep strayed from the bunch and run all over the country, according to H. H. Cosper, inspector for the State Livestock Sanitary Commission. He has recently been inspecting sheep moving out of Barnhart and says that he has not found a case of scabies in Crockett County in more than five years.

A heavy show of oil from a deep strata of rich sand is reported to have been struck in the well being drilled in the J. W. Henderson pasture 15 miles west of Ozona Tuesday night.

The pay sand is said to have been encountered at a depth of 1750 feet and the bit is reported to have pierced the sand 40 feet. The well was standing half full of oil Wednesday, according to reports. The well has been shut down pending a full investigation of the showing, according to drillers.

Ozونا Hunters Kill 2 Bucks

Local Men Explore What Is Believed To Have Been Home Of Cliff Dwellers

Two big bucks, denizens of the Rio Grande hill country below Sanderson, were bagged by a party of Ozona hunters. Joe North, Jr., Early Baggett and George Harrell, who spent more than a week in that section. The party returned to Ozona the first of the week. The hunters were also fortunate in bringing down a quantity of smaller game.

While exploring the cliffs a long Rio Grande the Ozona nimrods discovered what is believed to have been the cave of Indians or cliff dwellers along the Rio Grande. Digging into the floor of the cave, the entrance of which was on the side of a high cliff, the hunters found bits of basket weaving similar to that said to have been made by both the Indians and the cliff dwellers who inhabited the North American Continent before the advent of the white man. Arrow heads, odd bits of wood and stone were other relics of early man found by the explorers. The cliff dwellers of Idaho are said to have had a custom of mummifying their dead and burying them in a sitting position with a large grass woven basket turned down over the body. The fact that the Ozona hunters found bits of similar has led to the belief that the cave might have been that of cliff dwellers.

The floor of the cave was composed of layers of ashes, grass, stone and decayed rubbish, according to Mr. North. The party dug down about four feet with a small shovel, the only implement at hand. It was declared that further explorations of the place might be made later.

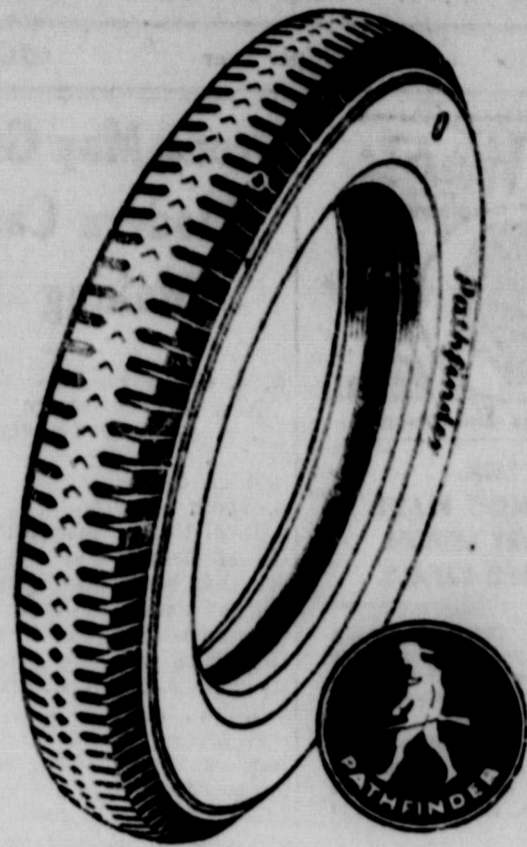

MUSICAL BUMP

The public school band movement now sweeping the nation is developing for America a "musical bump" that will even rival that displayed by the most colorful and tune-loving countries of the Old World, according to Frederick Nell Innes, Internationally famous bandmaster of the 87's and now head of the Conn National School of Music, Chicago.



"The time is near at hand when even the smallest of communities will have its band," says Mr. Innes. "And they will be capable organizations, too. Never has there been such an indication of a widespread interest in band music. A school is as proud when their band wins the state championship as they are when their football eleven cleans up on every other aggregation in the section.

"The students are seeing music not only as a cultural pastime, but as the possible key to a remunerative profession.

"It is time the tide was turning. A year ago the average American spent but 10 cents on band music, while \$1.50 was being spent on pianos, and \$1 on talking machines. Those figures are due for material changes, and it will be the boys of the land who will change them."

Music for "Sissies"?

Listen to These Boys

Elkhart, Ind.—The age-old contention that boys consider music as something for "sissies" is exploded in a survey brought to light by the Conn Music Center here.

More boys want to study music than do girls, questions put to 5,000 children between the fourth and ninth grades revealed. Forty per cent of the boys announced a willingness to study music if given an opportunity. Thirty-seven per cent of the girls manifested interest.

Parental influence was seen in the fact that while only 18 per cent of the musically interested expressed a preference for the piano, 50 per cent were studying that instrument. Only 12 per cent were interested in the violin, yet 20 per cent were taking lessons on the low and fiddle.

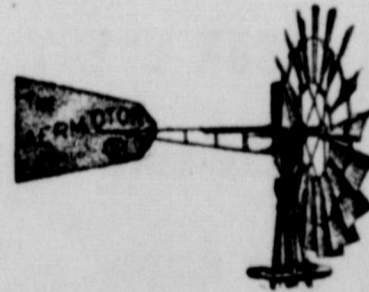

YOUR FRETFUL CHILD

The peevish, fretful baby is known to most parents. Given a new toy, or a piece of candy, he accepts it for the moment—to cast it aside, and resume his ill-tempered habit.

To assume that such a little one is only exercising a naturally bad disposition is a pitifully erroneous conclusion. The trouble is, he is not healthy, and no amount of spanking will cure him.

No child in perfect health will fret, unless his clothing may be so fitted or adjusted that it hurts him, or make him uncomfortable. To punish a baby, or to accuse him of being the possessor of a bad "temper" just because we didn't know what ails him, shows how incompetent even some mothers may become.

In case the baby is fretful, bear in mind that his digestive tract is the first thing likely to have gone wrong; see to it that his food is of the right kind, and given at proper times. Do not over-feed, as you are so prone to do yourself. It is baby's business to grow—and growth is painless; he will grow if you give him half a chance.

If you cannot find the cause of baby's fretfulness and apparent ill-temper, that doesn't mean that there is no cause for it. Don't let him grow into a spindling, ill-nourished, fault-finding neurotic, as he may do—if you and your family physician do not keep in touch closely.

"Doping" babies with soothing-syrups has been long under the ban; no intelligent, reading mother will resort to such lazy, criminal tactics; see that your baby is all right inside—then outside. There are no other sides to a baby.

MUSIC AN AID TO ADOLESCENT BOY

Also Found Effective as Discipline in Corrective Institutions.

Rapid progress in the use of music as a means of discipline in corrective institutions, is reported by the Conn Music Center of Elkhart, Ind. Music is not only being used successfully as a tonic for diseased minds, but is also being found effective in safeguarding youth passing through adolescence.



W. van de Wall, director of the Committee for the Study of Music in Institutions and a criminologist and sociologist who has spent a good portion of his life in experiments along this line, finds that musical work with the insane and mentally weak tends to make the inmates of such institutions forget their idiosyncrasies for a time at least. Musical exercises stimulate their mental activities, as well as their moral reflection. It makes them happier. Van de Wall tells of amazing transformations in patients brought about by music.

"Music does for the abnormal mind identically what it does for the normal," says van de Wall.

"It dispels the gloom of morbid isolation and resultant delusions and hallucinations. It creates a direct, pleasurable, congenial and beautiful environment in tones. It stimulates some of the drowsy patients to vigorous action and many of the anti-social individuals to constructive activities. Even those unfortunates who are too handicapped mentally and physically to fit into the normal scheme of society, under the influence of music quickly drop their pathological moods and reflections, throw off their eccentric behavior and sing, dance, act and talk with full concentration of mind."

PRAIRIE DOG NOTICE

Be it remembered that on the 18th day of September A. D. 1926 the Honorable Commissioners Court met in Regular Session all members present except Com. J. W. Owens and the following Order was passed:

It appearing to the Court that the prairie dog is populating Crockett County to a ruinous extent, and it seems to the Court, judging from the complaints, that this Court should take

some official action under the statute to the end that this nuisance be wiped out of Crockett County; and the court is of the opinion that the severity of the law if strictly followed by this Court might work unnecessary expense and hardship on owners, and less so if it is considered best to make and pass this order rather by way of notice and warning that all prairie dogs must be exterminated and that at the regular meeting of this Court in

February, 1927, this Court will pass an order under the Prairie Dog Statute enforcing same so far as Crockett County is concerned.

This Court believing and expecting cooperation of land and lease owners and desiring to assist in any reasonable way, has applied to the Commissioner of Agriculture for written formula and suggestions as to the best ascertained mixtures and methods proper and necessary leading to such extermination, and this asked for information when received will be placed on file in the clerk's office at Ozona subject to the inspection of all; and the Clerk of this Court is ordered to mail copies to any making written request for same. It is further ordered that this order be published in the Ozona Stockman for ten issues.

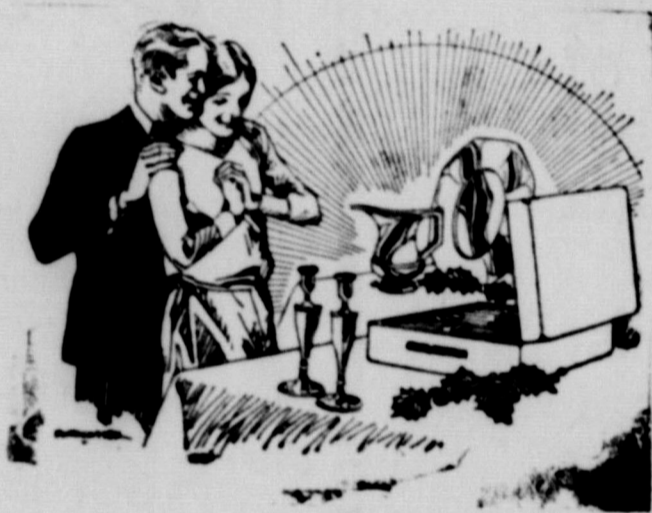

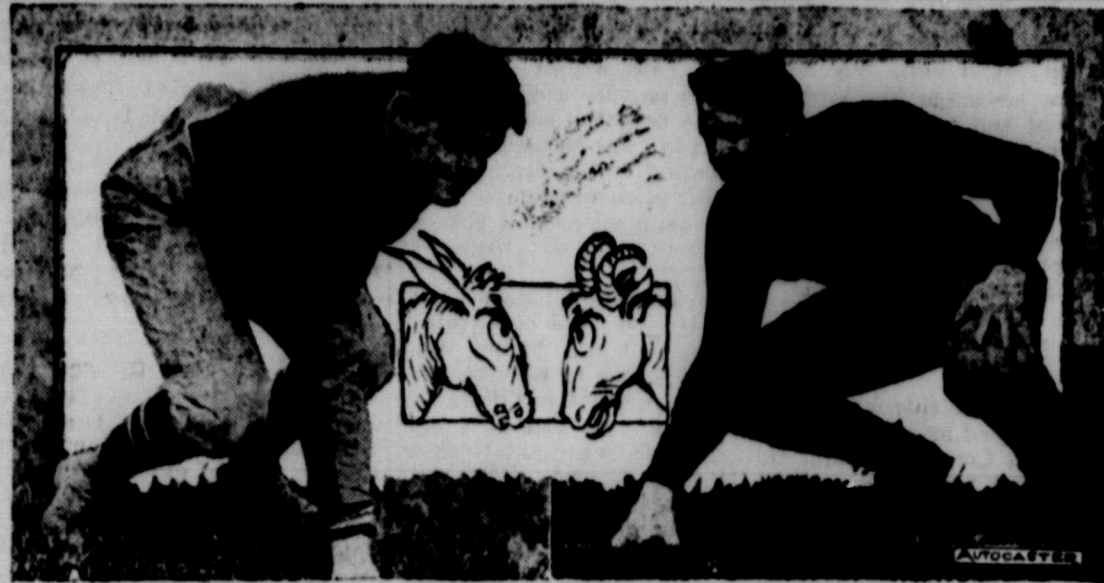


