**HOOVER'S PLAN.  
DON'T KISS THE BABY.  
CONGRESS MEETS.  
290,000,000 MAN POWER.**

Secretary Hoover's plan for waterways in the United States is a magnificent, common-sense presentation of what this country should do.

Mr. Hoover shows that 8,000,000 horsepower, more than three times the amount now taken from Niagara Falls, could be developed on the Tennessee and Cumberland rivers. Reservoirs and dams in connection with this development would check floods in the Mississippi valley, and provide a six-foot channel connecting the Tennessee and Cumberland with the Ohio and Mississippi.

The South knows what that power, now wasted, would mean to Atlanta, Birmingham, Chattanooga and Nashville.

That is only one item in a great programme that the will of the American people should put through.

**Sink Test On Pierce Ranch**

**Marlin Co. Contract For Deep Test In Three Months**

A deep test for oil on the J. S. Pierce ranch, 35 miles south of Ozona is in prospect, it became known this week.

A drilling contract has been signed by the Marland Company one of the big companies with holdings in various West Texas oil fields, to sink a deep test on the Pierce ranch within three months, it was learned this week.

It was also learned that the Marland Company has deposited \$10,000 in cash in the Ozona National Bank as a forfeit to carry out the drilling contract within the specified time of three months.

With entrance of the Marland Company near Ozona, prospects are brightened for further rapid oil development in Crockett county. Several other wells are going down in the county and prospect are excellent in a number of these.

At the close of the entertainment, members of the Women's Missionary Society served refreshments consisting of sandwiches, punch and coffee.

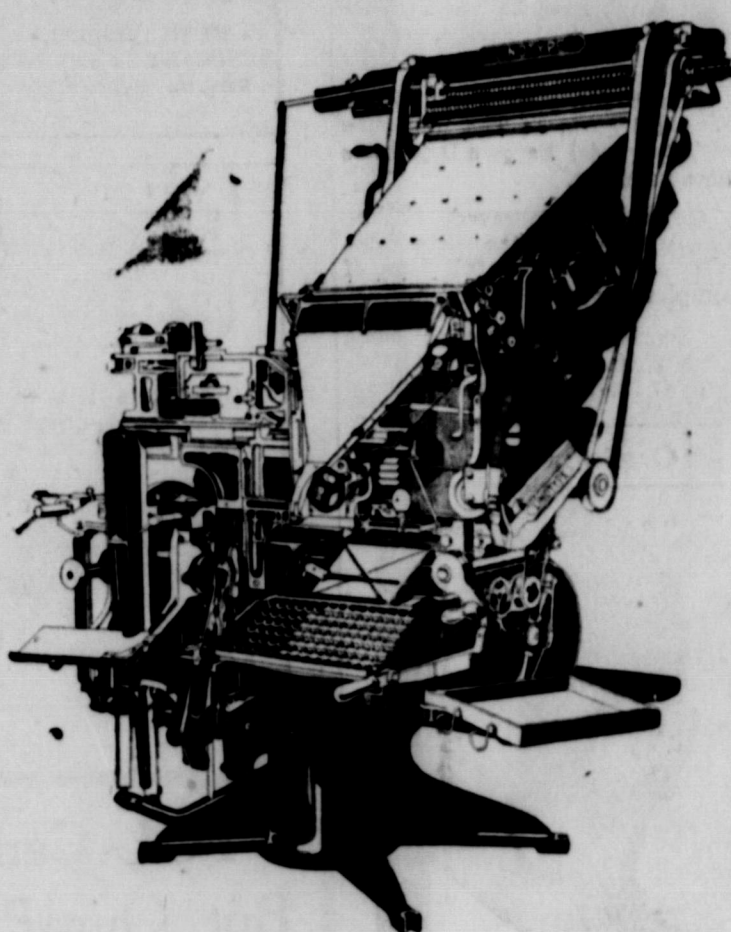

The new machine is the very latest model of the Linotype, fully equipped with five different type faces. Its installation will insure a clear print and attractive make-up for the entire paper, new type faces for advertising matter, new border and rule materials, all cast on the Linotype in a few minutes time.

Leonard Hensley, who took charge of the mechanical department of The Stockman with the recent change of management, will operate the new Linotype. Mr. Hensley has had experience in the operation of this type of machine and since assuming a position with the Stockman has operated a Linograph machine, which is to be discarded with the installation of the Linotype, a more modern and complete composing machine.

**Kincaid Buys McCollum Land**

**14 Sections Southeast Ozona Change Hands At \$10.50 An Acre**

A deal was closed recently in which T. A. Kincaid became the owner of the R. C. McCollum property southeast of Ozona. Fourteen sections were included in the deal, the consideration being \$10.50 per acre.

Mr. Kincaid also purchased approximately 1200 head of sheep on the McCollum land. Mr. McCollum will keep a remnant of his flock on the range until July.

Purchase of this land brings Mr. Kincaid's property up to the city of Ozona on the south and east, the land adjoining that already owned by him.

**Road Machinery Deal Approved**

**Commissioners Finally Close Deal For Two New Machines**

Purchase of several thousands dollars worth of road maintenance machinery for work on Crockett County roads was finally confirmed by the commissioners court at its meeting last week.

Machinery purchased includes an Adams road maintainer at a total cost of \$850, and a Best-5-ton caterpillar tractor purchased for \$3,750 from the R. B. George Machinery Company of Dallas.

Tentative contracts for purchase of this machinery were made at the last meeting of the court. Since that meeting the machinery has been delivered, demonstrated and accepted by county officials. The equipment is to be used largely in maintaining the north and south highway through the county and has so far proved entirely satisfactory, according to county officials.

"Maud" was once brand new and shiny in her own right, some several years ago when Kuzn Bill was engineering The Stockman and took "Maud" in charge during her hey-day. She served faithfully during her early life but her day of usefulness has passed and she has gone the way of all relics of by-gone ages. There was no weeping and wailing among the surviving members of the Stockman family at "Maud's" passing, for in her dotage she had become unruly and required much cajoling and petting, but her memory will linger long around her accustomed haunts—though it is not altogether pleasant.

"Maud" is no more.

**COLDS.**  
Colds are not "simple ailments." Here are some things to be remembered:  
(1) All colds are infectious—contagious.  
(2) The careless "sneezer" must be shunned carefully.  
(3) Colds are the result of germ invasion.  
(4) They are invariably carried from person to person.  
(5) They are not caused by exposure to cold, or by changes in the weather.  
The latter statement may be doubted; but the fact remains that prolonged exposure to cold and wet, weakens the resistance of the body, and permits the germs to multiply rapidly; we may carry germs for years, that never develop sufficiently to make us sick, because our resistance is capable of holding them in check. Then comes a prolonged effort, or exposure, and the enemy asserts itself.  
Colds are unlikely, if the body is in first-class condition. Good, wholesome, nutritious food is a preventive, if properly taken. Ample, comfortable clothing, plenty of rest and sleep and a tranquil state of mind, will keep colds in the background.  
If you have a cold, correct the bowels and kidneys, and stay indoors till well; you have no right to appear at gatherings, snort, sneeze and cough—to infect others. To sneeze in the general direction of everybody is a crime committed only by the very ignorant. Hot lemonades, teas and foot-baths are old remedies, but very useful. Surface circulation must be maintained and the cold skin brought back to normal.
