Old Spanish Trail Thru Ozona Designated Route

ENDS LONG FIGHT People Urged To Get Behind Road Build-

ing Plans

Old Spanish Trail headquarters announce receipt from Washington of the new "United States System of Highways." The Old Spanish Trail from San Antonio thru Junction, Ozona and Ft. Stockton westward is included. This confirms advices received two months ago by Harral Ayers, the Managing Director.

When the United States Highways were being designated in 19-25 only two routes across West Texas were included; the route from Ft. Worth to El Paso and the routes from San Antonio thru Del Rio. Mr. Ayers went to Washington last spring and re-opened the question. On the ground that the Hill Country was of too much importance to have all travel routed around it on the north or the south the designation of the O. S. T. route was put through. This Scott Peters, local agent. official map now issued definitely settles the Junction-Ft. Stockton route as a part of this limited system of super-highways. This makes the Old Spanish Trail completely a "United States Highway" from St. Augustine, Florida to San Diego, California. 

Power Line to Barnhart Soon

West Texas Utilities Co Has Purchased Site in City for Office

BARNHART, Feb. 5 .- The West Texas Utilities Company has bought three and a half lots here for the location of a substation, and is surveying its high power line to the Big Lake oil fields so as to go through this city. About two more weeks will be required to complete the survey it is thot.

Shipments of equipment for the laying of the line are understood to have been made. The route from San Angelo to Mertzon, to be followed by the line is thirty-one miles long but it takes in a number of irrigation pumps. There was no difficulty experienced in securing the right of way.

The new survey from Mertzon on, is following as near as possi ble, the section lines. It is understood that owners of the land through which the line passed between San Angelo and Mertzon received \$4 a pole when the land was ranch property, and ten dollars a pole when it passed through fields There are about seventeen posts to the mile.

Whether or not the line is to go from here to Ozona is not known, as that extension would cost about \$60,000, and would involve the purchase of the plant now in use at Ozona, but which has been outgrown by the city




