685 Polls Issued: Exemptions Estimated 50 to 60

665 AUTO LICENSES

89 Trucks; Polls Gain 204 Over Last Voting Year

Crockett County's voting strength will mount well over the 700 mark for 1928, the greatest it has ever been in the history of the county, according to reports made public today by County, Tax Collector W. H. Augustine.

A total of 685 poll tax receipts were issued by the collector during the tax paying period expir-ing January 31. The total represents an increase of 204 polls over those paid for the last voting year 1926, when a total of 481 receipts were issued. In addition to the 685 holders of poll tax receipts. the county's total voting strength will be boosted well over the 700 mark by exemptions, those over or under the age limit, and those suffering physical afflictions that entitle them to exemption. Total exemptions are estimated by the collector at between 50 and 60. The law does not require issuance of exemption certificates in a county this size. The total voting strength will be further swelled by those who have not been in the county long enough to pay poll taxes here but who will vote in this county on polls issued in the county in which they had their last residence No estimate is available on the number of such voters, but it is believed the total

Award Contract For First Unit Of Giant Quanah Power Plant

The plant, which will have an ultimate generating capacity of 60,000 horsepower, will be erected on the north shore of Lake Pauline, five miles southeast of Quanah. Construction of the building will begin February 1 at which time a three-mile spur track from the main line of the Fort Worth and Denver railway will have been completed. The building will be finished by July 15.

The unit to be erected this year is the first of three planned by the West Texas Utilities Company for the Lake Pauline site. The first unit will increase the company's generating capacity fifty per cent raising it to 60,000 horsepower.

The building to house the first unit will cost about \$250,000, including structural steel which will be furnished by Mosher Steel and Machinery Company of Dallas. When all units are completed the investment will be in excess of \$5,000,000. All machinery will be lled and the plant in or ation by September 1, under present plans.
