The movement has definitely taken hold in Ozona toward paving the two main streets through the town. Anxious inquiries are heard on every side on the streets "When is this paving plan to get started?" And immediately thereafter a fervent hope is always expressed that the movement will not be just another "pipe dream."

In other words, it is our observation that most of the people affected by this proposal, those who would be called upon to furnish the money for the improvement, are heartily in favor of it. And not only that, but a majority of the rest of the town is in favor of it.

for it will be a whole community improvement. Another view that is being taken of the matter is that if a part of the streets of the town are paved, that the other important streets will be paved in a short time.

In this matter of paved streets, our neighbors in Sonora have stepped decidedly in the lead. Sonora has been improved 100 per cent in appearance and in the comfort of its residents by the paving of the downtown streets, completed recently. Sonora people are proud of their streets and justly so. It is a wonderful improvement and should bring Ozona people to a realization of what they are passing up by putting off this paving project.

Just to get down to bare-faced facts, the streets of Ozona are a disgrace to any town. One might think while driving over the Sonora-Ozona or the Barnhart-Ozona road that these roads were "bad" but just let him continue on into Ozona and he will find out just how "bad" a "bad" road can be. The people of Ozona, many of them, have wonderful homes with a cow trail in front of them. They drive beautiful automobiles over the streets that would upset a mountain goat. If there is anything else the people of Ozona and Crockett County want they get—except good streets and good roads. While at the head of most counties in this section in many other respects, this county is decidedly at the tail end of them all in roads.

And while Ozona is talking street paving, the talk should be broadened into highway paving—paving the Old Spanish Trail from one edge of the county to the other and the Barnhart road from Ozona to the railroad. There are only two counties left along the proposed Petroleum Highway from Coleman through San Angelo to Fort Stockton that have not voted bonds for the paving of this road. These are Irion and Reagan Counties and those who know the situation in these counties declare that these gaps will be filled soon. If Crockett County does not connect up with this road she is overlooking the greatest opportunity ever

presented. That road is going to be completed and now is the time for Crockett County to build its connecting link. But if the Petroleum Highway is never completed, Crockett County would be doing herself handsome to build that Ozona-Barnhart road and getting an outlet to the world at large in wet weather.

There is already a paved road from Sonora to San Angelo and there is a movement in Sonora now to pave the Old Spanish Trail west to the county line. If Crockett County doesn't meet Sutton County at the line with pavement, we'll say we are the biggest bunch of

numbskulls in the United States.

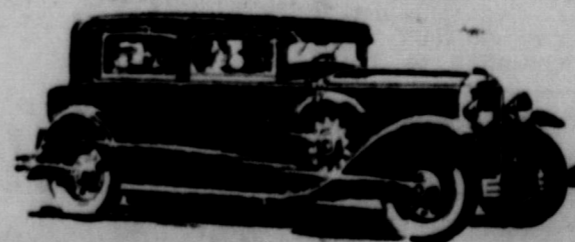

HJR No. 6 Legislature may provide.
A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.—
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."
"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warrants and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.
The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.
The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court, for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the

Section 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.", and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.
Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.
Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

Crockett Well To Be Deepened

Moncrief's No. 1 Todd Proves Failure After Thoro Tests

Pay from 1365-69 feet in W. A. Moncrief and others' No. 1 J. S. Todd, which early promised to bring about the opening of Crockett County's second oil pool but proved a failure upon testing, will be cased off early this week and the wildcat will be deepened. Its contract depth is 2,000 feet.

Operations were suspended late in the week at 1383 feet in lime for 53-16-inch casing, which will be run to the bottom. The well is 660 feet from the north and east lines of section 35, block WX, G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co. survey, 18 miles southeast of the Powell field and about 15 miles northeast of Ozona.

No. 1 Todd appeared good on the pump probably for 50 to 75 barrels daily when running of the bailer 17 times Tuesday afternoon lowered a 400-foot column of 27.5 gravity oil, free from water, only to 320 feet. These estimates, however, dropped to 10 to 15 barrels a day when the hole was bailed dry in five hours Wednesday, yielding only 47 bailers of oil, averaging a half barrel to the bailer. Drilling continued to 1383 feet without an increase.

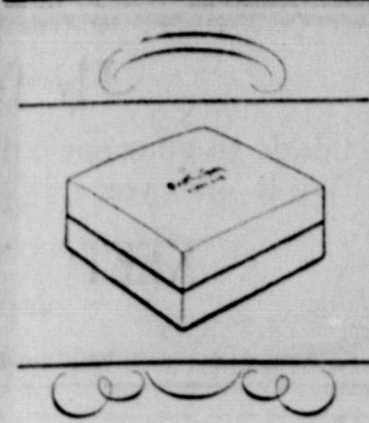

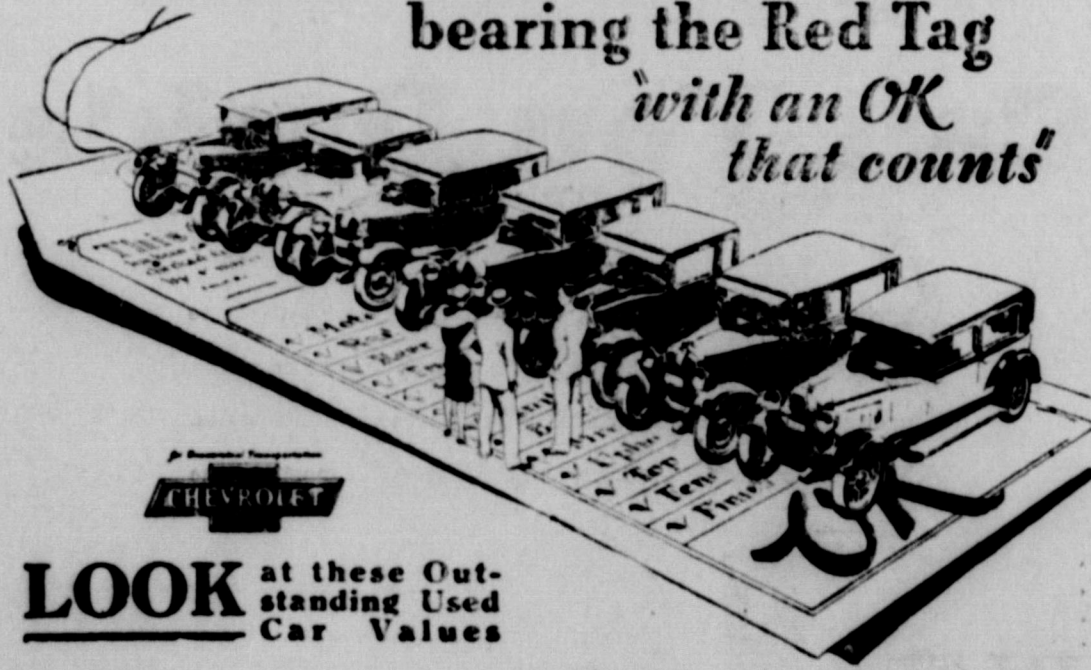

HJR No. 7.
A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

ing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture;

provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said

proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclama-

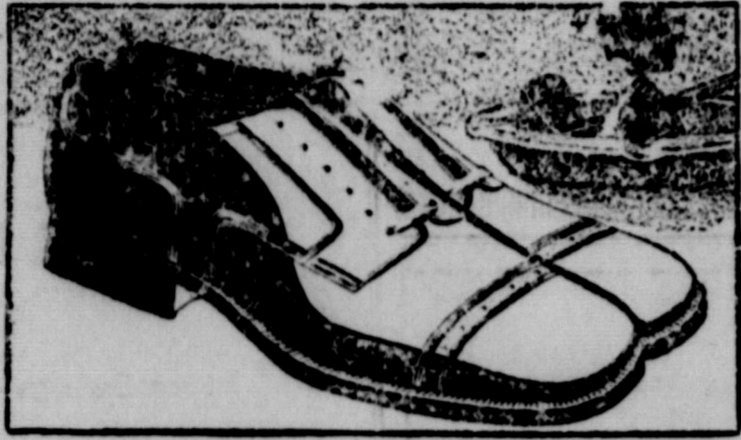
tion for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the

State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

To begin with, the average woman requires a shampoo once every ten days. Should your hair become either too oily or too dry before this time has elapsed, I suggest that you begin corrective measures to restore your scalp condition to normal.

In shampooing the first need is a good stream of hot water. A spray is really an essential to the success of a shampoo for I know of no other way to insure complete and thorough cleansing. Now as to the selection of your shampoo. You may purchase herbal shampoos designed especially for either oily, normal or dry hair. Should you need a corrective shampoo by

all means select the one suited to your condition. It will prove the quickest and most effective way of neutralizing your scalp trouble.

An egg shampoo is excellent for the hair and may be used as follows: Break the yolk of one or two eggs into a glass. Beat thoroughly; then add about two ounces of the herbal shampoo fluid and an equal quantity of warm water. Rub thoroughly into the scalp, using half of the mixture at each application. Finish by rinsing thoroughly with a steady stream of very warm water.

An olive or balsam oil shampoo is variation which will do wonders toward improving the growth of your hair. Warm about two ounces of balsam or olive oil in a small

aluminum sauce pan. When quite hot either rub it well into the scalp with your finger-tips or use a small stiff-bristled toothbrush for the purpose. Separate the hair into parts so that the entire scalp re-

ceives its portion of the oil. Bind up your head in a towel wrung out of hot water and cover with another dry towel. In half an hour shampoo with your herbal preparation—soaping the head two

or three times. Rinse thoroughly. If you are blonde, the juice of a lemon squeezed into the last rinsing water is very effective. If your hair is dark you may obtain that lovely glowing lustre, by dissolving one or two tablespoonfuls of powdered Egyptian Henna in warm water and using this in a last basin of rinsing water.
