BAPTISTS WILL DEDICATE NEW CHURCH SUNDAY

Rev. A. J. Carson, Former Pastor, To Preach Opening Sermon

BARBECUE DINNER

Building To Be Open For Inspection During Afternoon

The new Ozona Baptist Church, beautiful new brick house of worship which is being completed this week, will be formally opened with dedication services next Sunday morning at the 11 o'clock hour.

The program for the day includes, besides the formal dedication services at the church, a barbecue dinner in the city park at noon after which the building will be open for formal inspection by home-folks and visitors.

Rev. A. J. Carson, former pastor of the local Baptist church and now pastor at Victoria, Texas, has agreed to preach the opening exercises. Rev. Carson is well known throughout this section, spent many years in earnest endeavor toward building up the local church and it is appropriate that he should have a part in dedicating the new structure.

Committees have been named to complete arrangements for the barbecue dinner in the park and everybody in Ozona is invited to take part in this feed. Plenty of meat and all the trimmings will be prepared to take care of the crowd, the pastor, Rev. M. M. Fulmer, declared, and an enjoyable affair is anticipated.

At the evening services on the opening day the pastor will preach. Following the regular service, there will be baptismal services for those who are now awaiting this ordinance.

Both the other Ozona churches, the Methodist and Church of Christ, have suspended services at the morning hour Sunday in order that members of these churches might join with the Baptists in celebrating the opening of the new church. Word has been received by Rev. Fulmer from the Sonora Baptist church that members of that church are planning to attend the local dedication services in numbers. Visitors from other towns in this section are also expected.

The following order of services for the opening day has been outlined by Rev. Fulmer:

9:45—Teachers and Officers to be present for Sunday School.

10:00—Sunday School opens in the respective departments.

10:45—Closing exercises of the Sunday School in auditorium. The superintendent will be in charge.

11:00—Opening services. Sermon by Rev. A. J. Carson.

Noon—Barbecue dinner in the park.

1:30 to 3:30—Inspection of the building.

7:00—B. Y. P. U. meetings.

8:00—Evening service.

Kersey To Build New Corner Bldg.

Two-Story Structure Business Bldg. And Apartments

Work of razing the sheet iron building on the corner west of the postoffice building began this week in preparation for the construction of a two-story concrete building by J. R. Kersey, postmaster and proprietor of the Ozona Theatre. Another story will also be added to the present postoffice building, Mr. Kersey announced. The entire upstairs of the two buildings will be used as living quarters, apartments and rooms. Mr. and Mrs. Kersey will occupy an apartment in the building and the other rooms will be rented.

The new building will be of reinforced concrete stuccoed, 36 by 56 feet. The upstairs will be a total of 60 feet wide. The building will be steam heated throughout.

Several applications have already been received by Mr. Kersey to rent the downstairs business building, but no contract has been made. A part of the ground floor will be occupied by the Moore Cafe, now quartered in a small frame building adjoining the postoffice.

Ozona Girl Candidate For Baylor Degree

BELTON, Tex., May 1.—This year for the first time in the history of Baylor College for Women a woman will deliver the baccalaureate address. Mrs. W. J. Cox, Memphis, Tenn., president of the Woman's Missionary Union of the Southern Baptist Convention, and a principal speaker at the Baptist World Alliance in Toronto, Canada, last summer, has been chosen for this honor.

W. C. Easterling Buried In Del Rio

Veteran Publisher And Writer Succumbs After Gallant Fight

W. C. Easterling, former publisher of the Ozona Stockman and of a number of other newspapers and magazines in various towns in West Texas, an able writer and a familiar figure in Texas journalistic circles for the last thirty years, died in Del Rio Friday night following an illness of several weeks.

Funeral services were held from the Beran Funeral Home in Del Rio at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Among those attending the funeral were Tom Nolen of San Angelo and R. J. Cooke of Ozona, both former publishers of The Stockman, Evert White, present publisher, Miss Josephine Nolen of San Angelo and Mrs. Evert White.

Mr. Easterling, who wrote under the nom de plume of "Kuzn Bill," was 63 years, 8 months and 28 days old at the time of his death. He was born in Mobile, Alabama, August 28, 1865. He came to West Texas in 1887 as a telegraph operator for the Southern Pacific railroad, stationed at the mouth of Devil's River. In 1890 he started his journalistic career as editor when he bought the Del Rio Record from W. B. Stevens. In the succeeding years he edited papers in Ozona, Alpine, Fort Davis and other West Texas. He was a member of the Texas Press Association at the time of his death, having been a member of that body for nearly 40 years.

Surviving are the widow and two daughters, Mrs. W. B. Grannis of Del Rio and Mrs. Walter Young of Big Lake.

S. E. COUCH TO TAKE TO AIR; HUNT IS PILOT

Crockett Co. Ranchman, 72, Buys Big Ryan Monoplane

DELIVERED SOON

Former Local Pilot Will Operate Couch Ship

S. E. Couch, Crockett County ranchman and capitalist, past his 70th milestone but despite that fact one of the "youngest" and most vigorous town boosters and community builders in the county—with memories of the 70's but an open mind for 1929—will soon take to the air.

Mr. Couch has ordered a \$12,500 Ryan closed model monoplane for his own use. He has employed Embree Hunt, one of the best pilots in West Texas, former pilot of the Wilson Motor Company plane here, and former manager of the San Angelo Airport as his pilot.

Mr. Hunt was here this week making arrangements for the construction of a hangar at Mr. Couch's ranch home and as soon as this work is completed the plane will be brought here from San Angelo, where it is now stored at the airport.

The Ryan monoplane will carry four passengers and the pilot. It has a glass enclosed cabin and is exactly the same model plane as Lindbergh's "The Spirit of Saint Louis" except that the latter carried gasoline storage facilities where Mr. Couch's plane is equipped to carry passengers.

Mr. Hunt will be employed on the Couch ranch and also as pilot of the plane. He will also do some commercial flying here.

Mr. Couch will use the plane for both business and pleasure, making cross-country hops in it and flights between his ranch and home and over his pasture lands. Mr. Hunt expects to bring the plane here in two or three weeks.

How much longer will the people of Ozona live in a perpetual fog of dust, breathe the germ-laden dust from the streets into their lungs and pay out a king's ransom every year consulting physicians about their health?

How much longer will the women of Ozona toil like galley slaves day in and day out trying to attain the impossible—a clean house when dust is pouring in in clouds through every crack and crevice?

How much longer will automobile drivers have automobile chiropractors administered to them against their will over every foot of streets in Ozona? How much longer will these automobile drivers pay expensive repair bills every month from riding over the 18th century streets of a 20th century

town? How much longer will a few moss-backed conservatives rule the progressive majority in a town whose future, if any, is necessarily in the hands of those who are coming along to take up the reins that were well handled in the generation that is past?

A town either goes forward or backward. There is no such thing as standing still. No one can dispute the fact that Ozona has been definitely going forward, almost at a dizzy pace, in fact, especially the last three years.

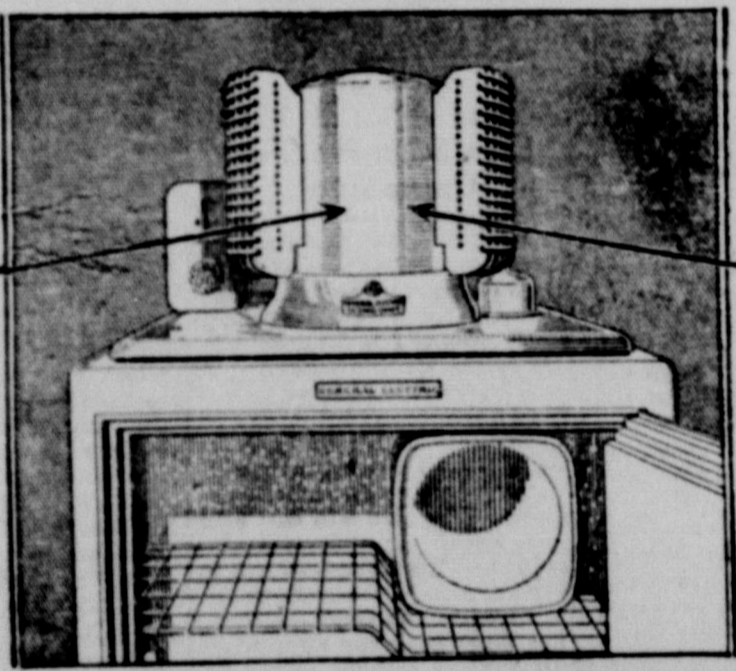

I intended to wait until my sword was at his throat, and then I would have said to him, 'Give up the woman whom I have loved all my life and go unhurt!' He himself should have chosen. Was not that fair?"

"Fair! It was generous! Go on! Go on!"

"The word had been given; our swords were crossed. And at that moment, she, Adrienne, the woman whom I loved, stood before us. With her were Italian police come to arrest me! There was one letter alone of mine, written in a hasty moment, which could have been used in evidence against me in my former trial, and which would have secured for me a harsher sentence. That letter had fallen into her hands; and she had given it over to my bitter enemy, the chief of the Italian police. I was betrayed, betrayed by the woman whom I had braved all dangers to see! 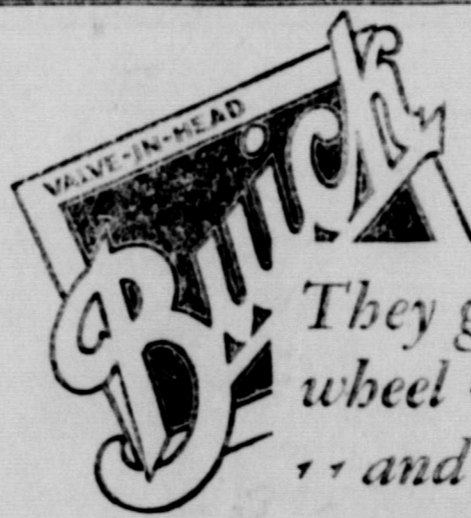

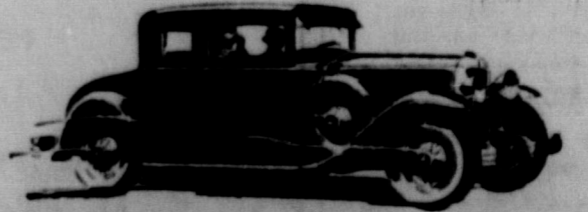

HJR No. 6 Legislature may provide.
A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.—
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."
"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.
 The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.
 The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court, for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the

Section 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

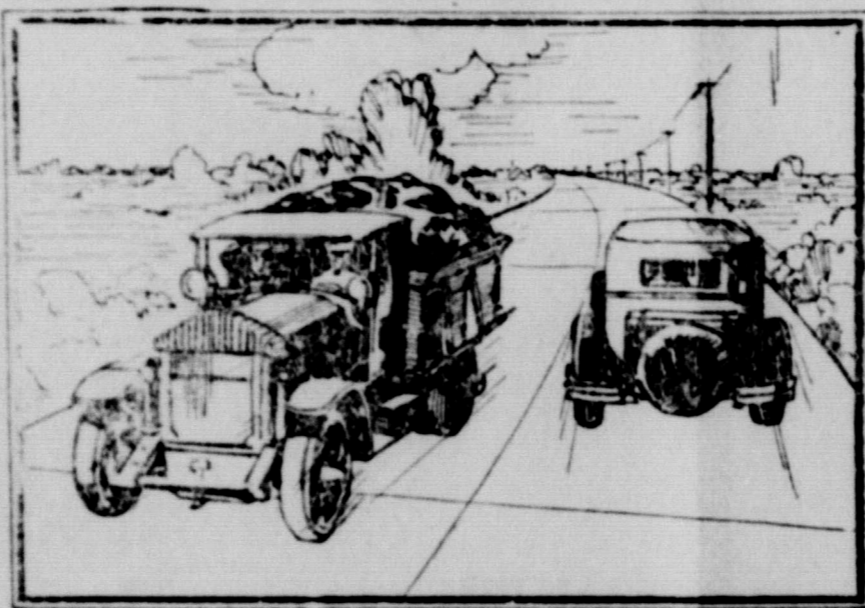

"Of course I have. Who has a better right, I should like to know?"

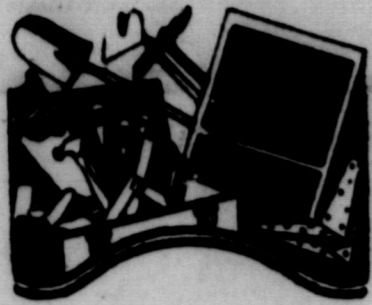
He sighed and closed his eyes. In a few minutes he was asleep.

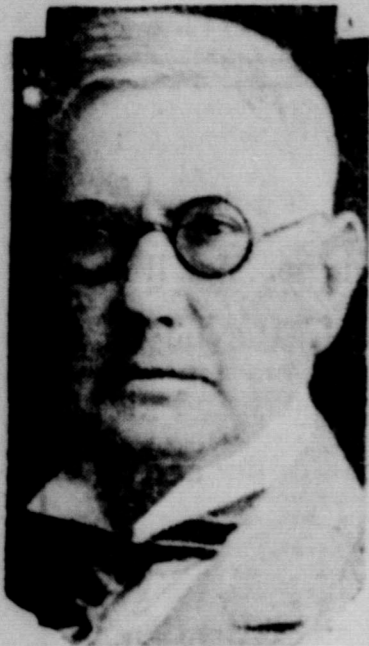

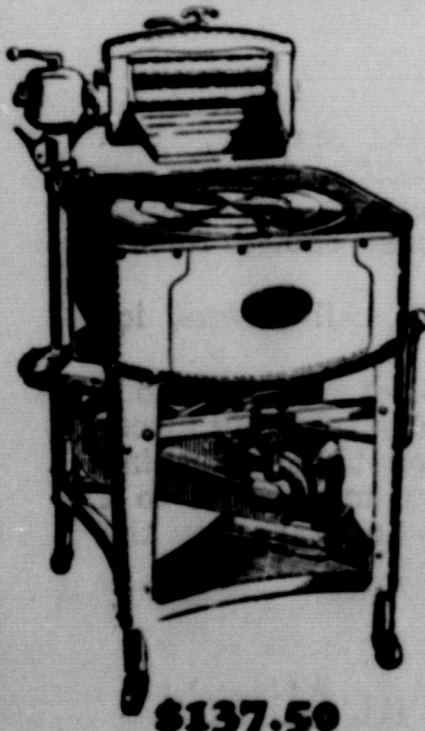

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

ing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture;

provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said

proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the

State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election. Approved March 19, 1929.

This notice is not meant to require operations at once, but merely as notice to all parties that the court will insist that every prairie dog in Crockett County be killed during the next six months.

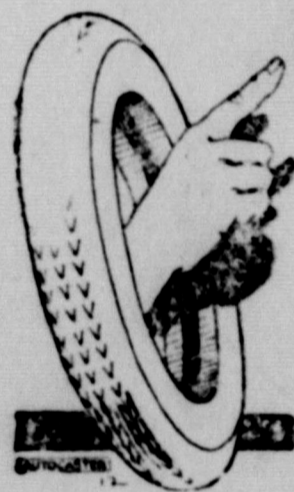
