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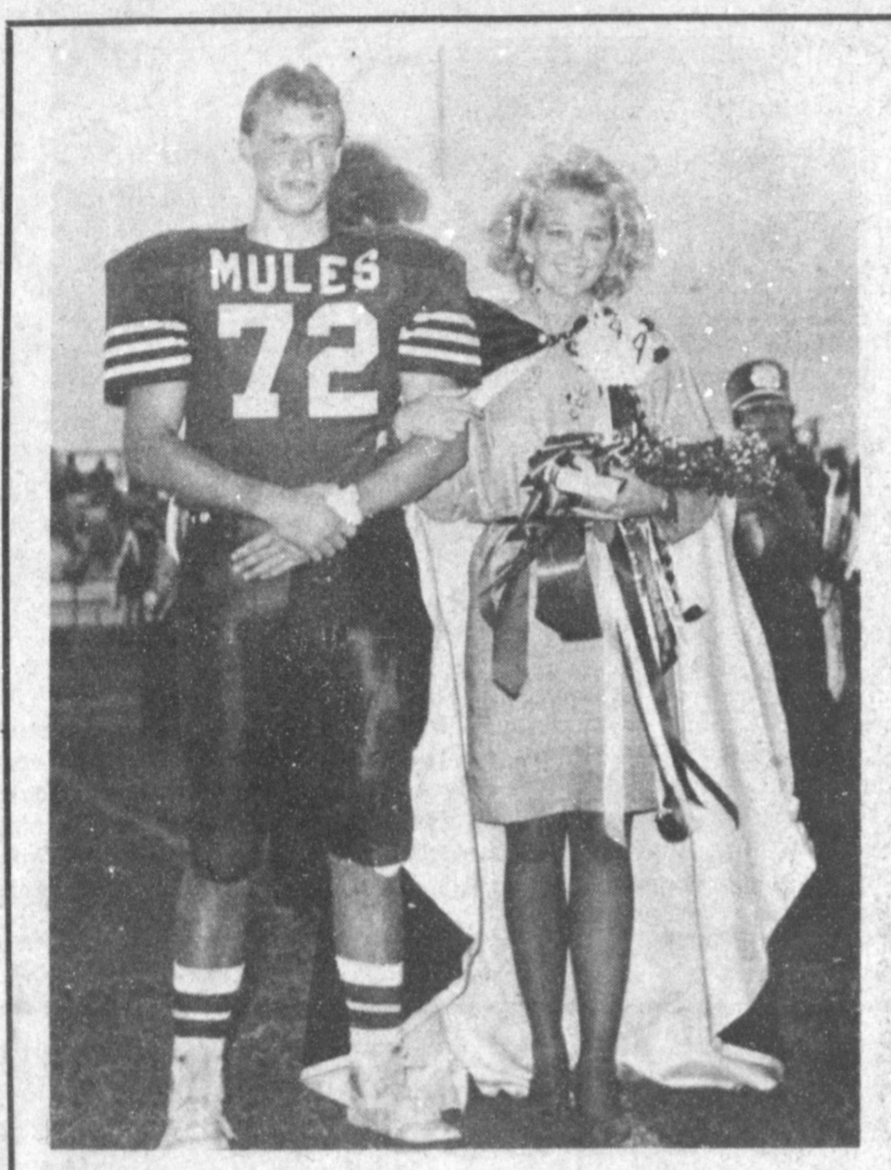

1987 HOMECOMING QUEEN--Preceding the 1987 Homecoming game Friday night, Debbie Brown, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Brown, was crowned Homecoming Queen. She was escorted by Bryan Swint, son of Kay Swint.

Several decisions were made by members of the Muleshoe Athletic Booster Club when they met in regular session Tuesday night.

They voted to purchase duffel bags for the football players; to buy materials for a timing stand to be patterned after the track timing stand at Texas Tech and to buy weight lifting equipment for the weight room.

They also voted to charter a bus from TNM&O to take the varsity players to Floydada on October 16.

During the meeting on Tuesday, September 29, the Athletic Boosters will spotlight the Cross County teams, at 7:30 p.m. All parents, and fans are invited. It will be held at the Muleshoe High School cafeteria.

On Friday night, October 2, it will be Parent's Night at the Muleshoe-Lockney football game. Parents of varsity players are asked to meet behind the home stands on the east side no later than 7:30 p.m.

Members of the Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District will meet in regular session at 8 p.m., Monday, September 28 in the administration building at 514 West Avenue G.

Items on the agenda following routine opening business include special reports from the board president on the Texas Association of School Boards Meeting-Project 200 Review; and the superintendent will report on Board Training for Credit on December 3 and 10 and MultiPRO update.

Jodie Wheeler, a Tarleton State University student at Stephenville, has been named to the cast of "Taming of the Shrew" which opens the TSU players season for 1987-88. William Shakespeare's comedy will be performed Thursday-Saturday, October 1-3 in the Theatre of the Clyde H. Wells Fine Arts Center.

Jodie is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Wheeler of the Maple-Goodland area.

Friday night, the Three Way Eagles soared over the Amherst Bulldogs, coming back from a 22-18 deficit at halftime to win with a final score of 44-22.

The Friday night victory widened out the Eagles' season record to 2-2 for the year and 2-0 in district.

Saul Guillen virtually put on a one-man show as he had 24 carries for 283 rushing yards and four TDs; completed 16-25 passes for an additional 241 yards and threw two TDs; he was intercepted twice and received one pass from Jarrod Sowder for 32 yards.

Jarrod Sowder threw the pass to Guillen, which counted for a 32 yard TD, making Sowder 1-1 for the night's action.

Guillen also had 21 tackles, with 12 of these being unassisted and nine assisted tackles.

Yes, there were other players in the game, as Albert received 4-43 yards; Kelly Tucker, 6-51 yards; Jarrod Sowder, 6-104 yards and two TDs; and Mario Guillen, 3-68 yards.

Three Way coach Greg Jeffcoat said the Eagles had three touchdowns called back on penalties, with two of them being in the first half of the game.

Next Friday night, October 2, will be homecoming for the Three Way Eagles.

It was a perfect night for football, cool, clean, little wind, and a large, overflow crowd -- it was Homecoming '87 for the Muleshoe Mules, and what a night it turned out to be.

The Mules were hosting the Springlake-Earth Wolverines on their home turf, and handily won the game, 39-0, with the stingy Mule defense showing up all the way through the game.

Preceding the 8 p.m. game, Debbie Brown, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Brown, escorted by Bryan Swint was crowned 1987, Homecoming Queen. Other candidates were Jennifer Green, escorted by Russell Brown, and Michelle Cox, escorted by Armando Del Toro.

For the first half of the game, the Mules failed on a first quarter field goal attempt by Ronnie Perez at 7:13 of the first. His try fell just short of the goal posts.

But, speedy Daniel Olivas raced to his right on a pitchout for seven yards and paydirt, putting the Mules on the scoreboard at 1:51 of the first. Ronnie Perez put the extra point kick right through the middle of the uprights.

Richie Tillema, Mule guard, who has been out on the injured list, saw limited action in the game, and really made his presence known, managing two quarterback sacks on the Wolverines, both in the second quarter.

Tillema moved through the Wolverine offensive line so fast when the ball was snapped, it was instinctive to glance around to make sure no flags were thrown for illegal motion.

The Mules went into halftime as 14-0 leaders, after Michael Dunham watted through at 3:19 of the second quarter on a short TD scamper. Perez again made the extra point kick good.

In the third stanza, the Mules exploded. Daniel Olivas, who needs very little room and virtually can't be caught if he breaks free, took a handoff on the Mules 10-yard line, broke into open territory and outraced his pursuers 90-yards to a TD at

Miami Warriors Slammed Hard By Longhorns

Friday night, the Lazbuddie Longhorns blasted the Miami Warriors in six-man football 62-12. Under the six-man, 45 point rule, the game ended in the third quarter.

On the way to their impressive victory, Coach C. W. Williams' Longhorns racked up 56 points in the first half of the game.

Their season record is now 4-0, while Miami dropped to 3-1.

Lazbuddie had 392 offensive yards, while the Warriors had 224.

Longhorn quarterback Tim Lust lobbed TD passes of 30, 6, 40, 30 and 55 yards, while Omar Sanchez did his own form of damage, racking up 49 yards in 10 carries, and scored touchdowns of 11, 4 and 11 yards.

Thusfar in the young football season, the Lazbuddie Longhorns have scored 236 points.

General telephone customers in Muleshoe will have access to several new and expanded special long-distance services beginning September 30, 1987, as the result of the company's continuing network modernization program in the South Plains.

Muleshoe and several neighboring cities in the South Plains became a reality in early to mid-1986, Hearn explains. "At that time, General Telephone placed a state of the art digital switching center in Levelland, the hub of General Telephone Telecommunications for the area.

"This sophisticated and versatile digital system gave customers faster, more accurate and reliable direct dialed long-distance services as calls were routed through the Levelland switching center to destinations over the most efficient and direct route," Hearn said.

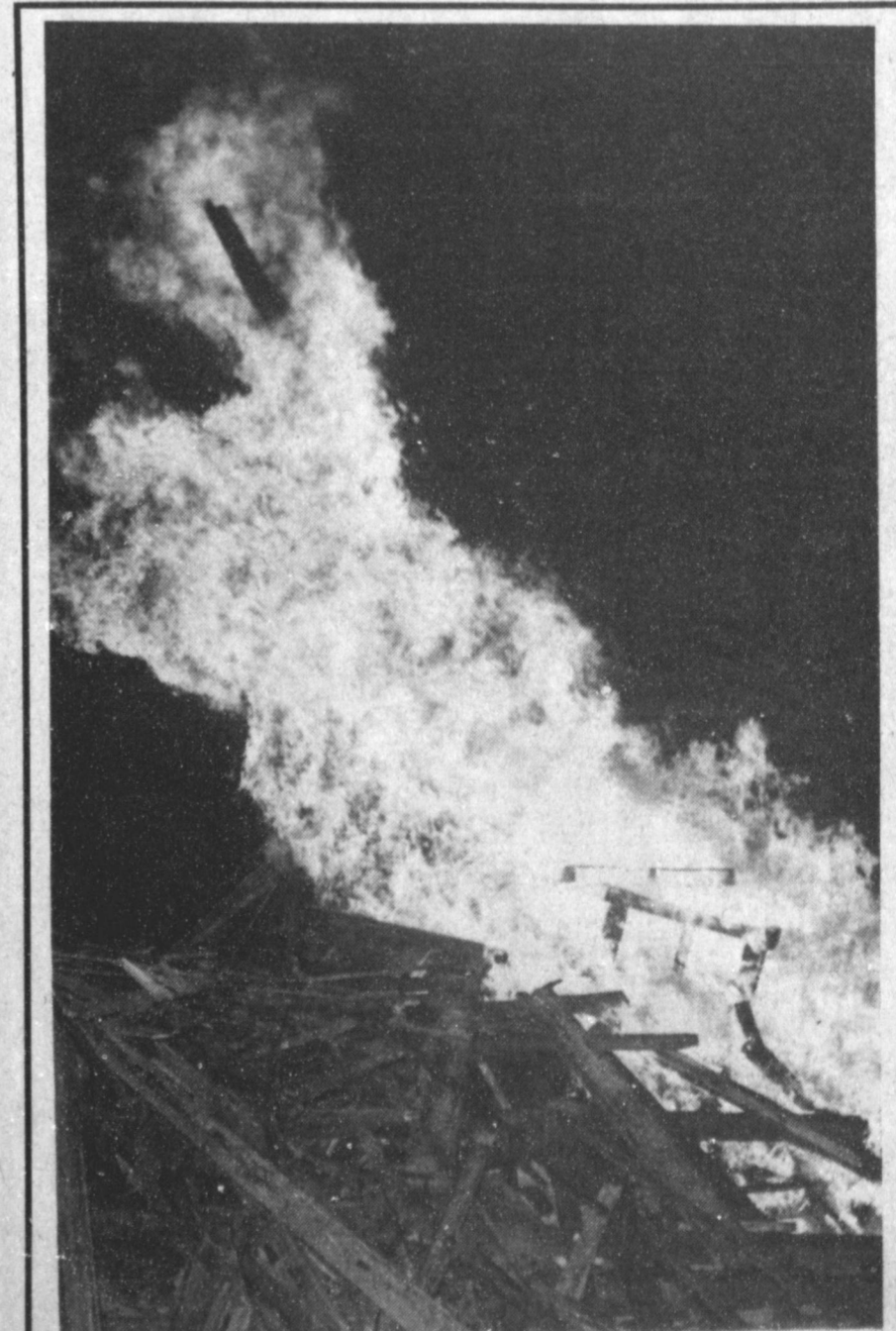
The speaker says the Bailey County Ambulance Service is widely recognized as a 'role model' for other ambulance

# 1962 Sale Of Crops Tops \$26 Million Mark

In Bailey County there are 532,480 acres of land, with more than two-thirds, or 371,323, acres in cultivation. The cultivated land includes acreage in the soil bank. Grass acreage is 148,065; with townsites, roads and other facilities covering the remaining 12,855 acres, according to J.K. Adams county extension agent.

This year about 165,000 acres on 650 farms in Bailey County are being irrigated by 1,800 wells.

Bailey County farmers pump water from the Ogalalla formation which is believed to be the largest interconnected underground body of water in the world.

In 1954 Bailey County had 884 farms and only 711 farms in 1959. The decrease in the number of farms is attributed to the increase in the size of farms, Adams' figures show. The average size of farms increased from 474 acres in '54 to 609 acres in 1959.

Crop allotments for 1963 include 94,855 acres of cotton; 200,669 acres of grain sorghum; 1,700 acres of corn; 2,518 acres of barley, and 16,354 acres of wheat. Reapportionment could change these figures, Adams stated.

The allotted crops total 316,096 acres which leaves some 27,000 acres taken out of production by government contract making a total of 343,096 acres, leaving about 28,000 acres of land for other crops or "wild acres."

The 21 gins in Bailey County ginned over 116,000 bales from about 98,000 acres planted in cotton in 1962. The cotton compress here received 65,000 bales in 1962 and had 5,000 carry over which crowded its 75,000 bale capacity.

The 164,492 allotted acres, plus acres planted beyond the allotment, probably exceeded one-half billion pounds of grain sorghum in 1962, according to Adams. Most of this production was handled by six elevators which have almost a half-billion pounds storage capacity.

There are three commercial feed lots in the county with a yearly capacity of 60,000 head of cattle which could eat from 30 to 40 per cent of the county's annual production of grain sorghum.

### SALES \$26 MILLION

Figures compiled by Adams further show total sales of crops in 19. estimated at \$26,060,000 and total sales of farm and ranch livestock at \$1,740,000 for a gross of \$27,300,000.

Figures on crops under irrigation and dryland acreage show a decrease of acreage for 1963 as compared with 1962 for the following crops: cotton, 5,000 acres; grain sorghum, 15,000 acres; oats from 500 acres in 1962 to no acres in 1963; barley

from 400 acres in 1962 to no acres in 1963; vetch from 100 acres in 1962 to no acres in 1963; sugar beets from 10 acres in 1962 to no acres in 1963; onions decreased 130 acres; other vegetables from 20 acres in 1962 to no acres for 1963.

Increased acreage for 1963 over 1962 are shown by Adams' figures as: alfalfa increased 3,000 acres; irrigated pasture, 1,500 acres; wheat 2,500 acres; castor beans, 500 acres; Madrid clover increased from no acres planted in 1962 to 500 acres planted in 1963; tomatoes 100 acres; watermelons 200 acres, and cantalopes 100 acres.

Acreage which remains the same in 1963 as in 1962 is that of corn, soybeans, and potatoes.

Crops under irrigation and dryland acreage figures for 1963 are cotton, 103,000; grain sorghum, 135,000; alfalfa, 8,000; irrigated pasture 3,500; sudan 15,000; wheat, 18,000; corn, 4,000 acres; castor beans, 1,000; Madrid clover, 500 acres; soybeans, 700 acres; potatoes, 1,300; onions, 20; tomatoes, 500 acres; watermelons, 200; cantalope, 100 acres; for a total of 371,323 cultivated acres. Of this number 149,020 acres are irrigated and 141,500 is dryland acreage. There are 40,000 acres in the soil bank, and 40,803 acres leave out land.

### POWER PLANTS

There are 180 irrigation power plants using butane; 795 using electricity, 825 using natural gas and one using diesel fuel.

The number of wells with pump lifting under 125 feet and the number with pump lift over 125 feet are the same, 900 each.

Wells with pumping capacity under 700 gallons per minute number 1,250 and there are 550 with pumping capacity over 750 gallons per minute.

Other statistics compiled by Adams show 235 sprinkler irrigation systems, 10 wheel roll systems, and three drag line systems; 30,000 acres irrigated by sprinkler; land leveling acres 250; six saline lakes; one lake from which water is pumped on fields; 330 miles of underground pipe system; 60,000 acres irrigated from underground pipe and 240 farms having underground pipe systems.

### DAIRYING

As farmers become more involved in the government crop program farmers turned all their attention to the agriculture commodities with guaranteed prices; consequently, specialized farming shoved poultry and dairying to one side, according to Adams.

The few dairies in Bailey County are highly specialized with the largest one in the county being the Moss Dairy at the Old Muleshoe Ranch headquarters.

Moss Dairy has over 200 head in the milking string during all

seasons of the year. The dairy plant is considered a show place with its ultra-modern walk-in-type stanchions and stainless steel milk holding equipment, Adams stated.

### 4-H Program Continues To Play Vital Role

No one can question the fact that young people are the future of America, and the 4-H program is continuing to play a vital role in preparing youth for the future by providing training in leadership, citizenship and coping skills.

Thus the theme of the upcoming National 4-H Week Oct. 4-10, "4-H for Youth for America," points to this country's richest resource, its young people, says H.T. "Tom" Davison, state 4-H program leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. The Extension Service is the parent organization of the 4-H program, an informal, out-of-school educational program for youth between the ages of 9 and 19 that is based around local

clubs. "Through 4-H we try to provide youth with opportunities to learn and experience what life has to offer," Davison points out. "We also lay the groundwork to help 4-H members explore opportunities for personal growth and to gain skills that will be useful in later life. 4-H also helps youth to deal with stress and to learn to help others. We like to say that 4-H takes up where school leaves off."

Texas boasts some 305,000 4-H members; nationwide, 4-H is more than 4.5 million members strong and is the nation's largest youth organization. More 4-H members today live in suburbs and cities of more than 50,000 population. Recent research shows that

former 4-Hers are more likely to assume community leadership, political and other citizenship roles than people who participated in other youth organizations. "4-H membership teaches youth that the community and giving to the community are important," says Davison.

Vital to the 4-H program are volunteer leaders.

"Volunteer leaders are the backbone of the 4-H program as they provide the organizational leadership for local 4-H clubs as well as training and resources in a host of subject-matter areas," notes Davison. Almost 620,000 volunteer leaders support the 4-H program nationwide, with more than 30,000 of those in Texas. Davison estimates that the time, travel and support contributed by these volunteer leaders across the U.S. is valued at more than \$1 billion a year.

Looking at the 4-H program in Texas, Davison notes that the most popular project area is foods and nutrition. Other projects that attract large numbers of 4-Hers include energy, embryology, health (eye care) and safety.

The number of 4-H clubs and special interest groups in the state total more than 3,300.

### Adult Education Night Classes Start Tuesday

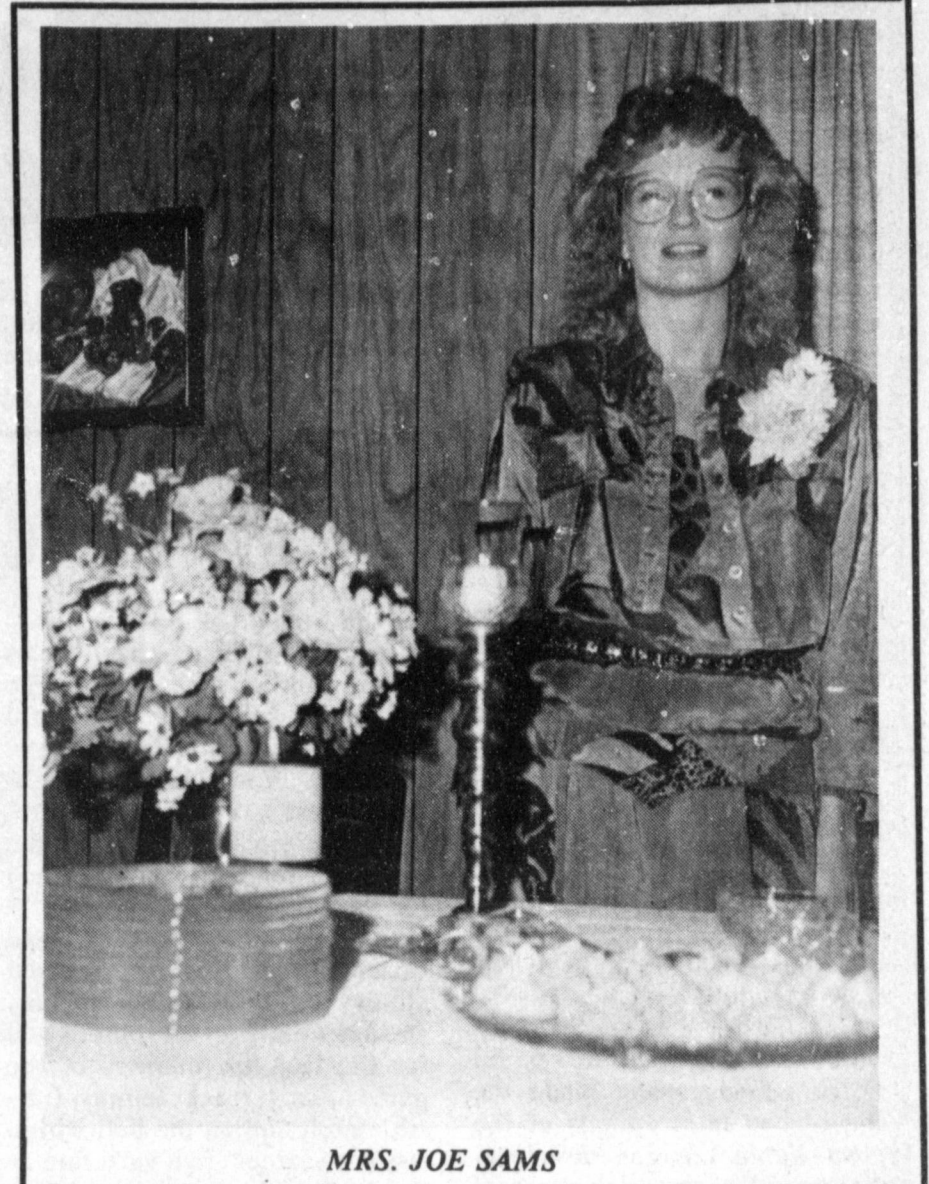

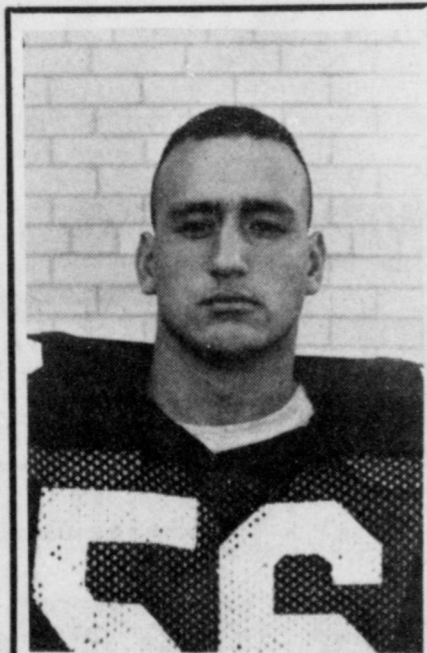
Jeff Hicks completed three of five passes for 51 yards, and Johnny Garcia was 0-3 passes in the game.

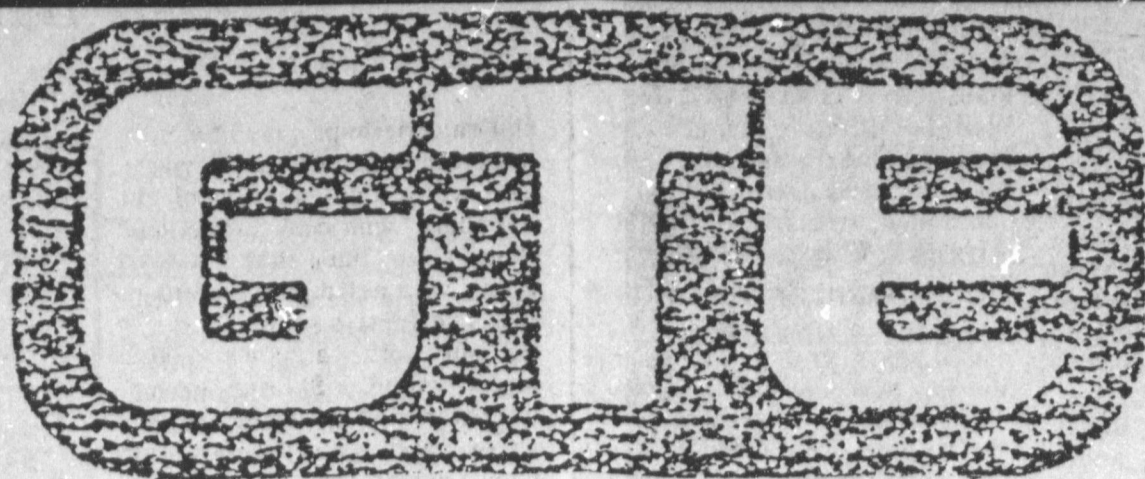

**Texas A&M researcher finds tenant organizations tend to reduce crime**

**COLLEGE STATION** — An effective way to reduce slum conditions in public housing is to organize tenants and let them make and enforce their own rules, concludes a study on low-income housing problems in the United States.  
 The research, which focused on slum minimization in the United States, was conducted by Damien Ejigiri, a graduate architecture student in urban planning at Texas A&M University. It involved 16 urban housing projects in three cities.  
 Ejigiri found a strong correlation between a good tenant organization and low incidence of crime. Dr. Gordon Echols said Ejigiri's study proved a point and perhaps tenant organization lends itself to communication and that leads to avoiding the problems of crime and vandalism.

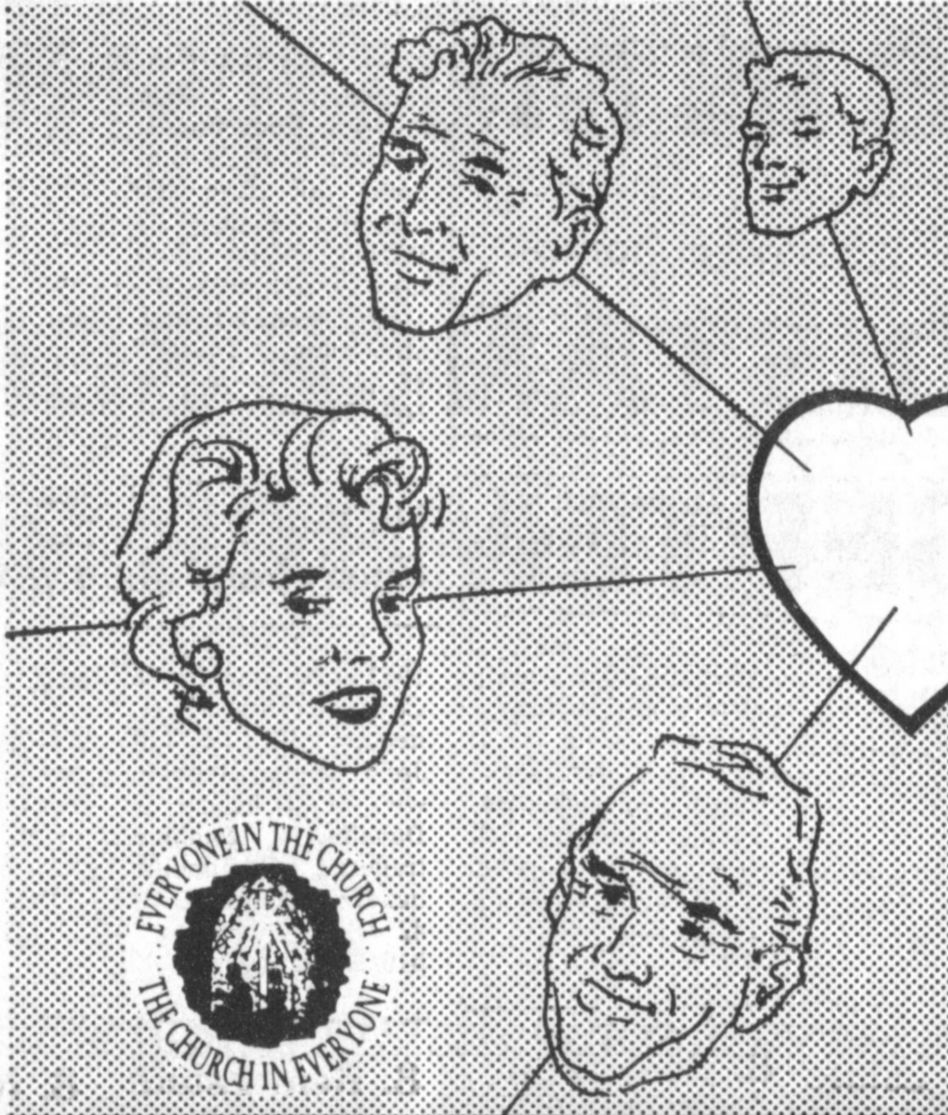
