## GREATEST FAIR IN HISTORY IS ASSN'S. PLAN

Plans Perfected For Celebration Here July 3, 4 & 5

### EXPECT BIG CROWD

Big Improvements To Be Made In All Departments

Final plans have been perfected by officers and directors of the Crockett County Fair Association for the best fair in the history of the association on the occasion of the Fourth Annual Rodeo, Race Meet and Stock Show to be held in Ozona July 3, 4 and 5, 1929.

Assignment of working committees and arrangement of other details in connection with the 1929 celebration were completed at a meeting of stockholders and officers and directors of the Fair Association held Friday night at the Stock Exchange.

Approximately \$5,000 in purses and premiums are being offered by the association this year in the rodeo and horse racing events and in the stock show. Officials of the stock show are predicting one of the best shows in history this year. V. I. Pierce, chairman of the sheep show, declares that there will be approximately 1,000 head of the best Rambouillet sheep in America entered in the sheep show and sale here this year. John K. Madsen, Day Farms Co., White & Son, McIntosh and other famous Utah breeders, and a number of Texas breeders have already entered animals in the show and sale. Mr. Pierce says. Joe T. Davidson, chairman of the registered Hereford show and sale, has also received an unusually large number of entries in his department. Five hundred dollars in premiums is being offered in both of these departments, with \$200 offered in the horse show.

Fully 10,000 persons are expected to visit Ozona during the three days rodeo, race meet and stock show. There will be a free barbecue with all trimmings at noon on each of the three days, and a dance each night on the open-air platform at the fair grounds.

Better horses than ever before are expected to be entered in the races this year, according to Joe Pierce, president of the association. The Fair Association is offering a total of \$1700 in purses in the three-days race meet, a \$250 purse on both Fourth and Fifth of July in the derby races featuring the purses. A \$250 bonus purse offered to the biggest money winners in the West Texas Racing and Fair Association circuit, comprising five towns in this area, is expected to go far toward bringing better horses and larger entries in each race in all of these towns. Towns composing this circuit, with the dates of their 1929 meets, are as follows: Menard, June 20 and 21; Sonora, June 26 and 27; Ozona, July 3, 4 and 5; Eldorado, July 11 and 12, and San Angelo, September 16 to 21. A total of \$10,000 in purses is being offered in the race meets in these five towns.

## MRS. FRANK F. FRIEND IS MADE HONORARY MEMBER BY OZONA WOMAN'S CLUB

Charter Member Who Conceived Local Club Is Honored

At their last meeting of the season, members of the Ozona Woman's Club elected Mrs. Frank Friend to Honorary Membership.

There are two other Honorary members in the Club. They are Mrs. Kate Baggett and Mrs. J. B. Smith.

The idea of the Ozona Woman's Club originated in the mind of Mrs. Friend while on a fishing trip on Devil's River in the summer of 1910. Mrs. Friend and Mrs. R. Lee Black discussed the question of organizing a woman's study club, deciding to call a meeting of women for that purpose, at the opening of the fall term of school.

In due time this meeting was held in the dining room of the Ozona Hotel, with Mrs. Black, Mrs. Minnie Olson, Mrs. Kate Baggett, Mrs. Will Baggett and Mrs. Frank Friend present.

Soon afterwards Mrs. W. E. West and Mrs. A. W. Clayton joined these women in their efforts at organization. The result of this meeting was the Thirteen Club, with a limited membership of thirteen, whose object was the study of Shakespeare's plays.

In 1915 this club was federated with the state organization under the name of the Ozona Woman's Club.

A few years later at the time the Universal membership went into effect, the club became federated with the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mrs. Friend was one of the committee which drew up the Constitution and By-Laws of the Thirteen Club and her interest in the welfare of the club has grown with the organization.

The principal idea in the organization of the club being to make it a study club, it has been only when the community need was very urgent that the club has resorted to anything for the purpose of making money.

Two outstanding achievements of the club have been the bringing of the Ben Greet Shakespearean Players to Ozona, and entertaining the District convention.

Among other worthwhile accomplishments of the club are bringing Lyceum and Chautauqua programs, buying a piano, and a Victrola for the school, and buying stage scenery for the school auditorium.

The beautification of the cemetery first began with the Cemetery Committee of the club; likewise the annual Cleanup Campaigns.

The retaining curb around the park was the result of the efforts of a committee of club women working with the County Commissioners.

The club women started the movement for playground equipment for the school grounds, and at different times secured a health nurse for the school.

The Ozona Woman's Club has furnished a number of District and State officers.

Mrs. A. P. Utterback was one of the first district appointments.

Mrs. J. B. Smith, Mrs. B. B. Ingham, Mrs. H. B. Cox, Mrs. B. I. Mauldin, Mrs. Frank Friend, Mrs. Joe Davidson and Mrs. A. C. Hoover have held District offices.

Ozona has been honored by State appointments. Mrs. H. E. Cox, Mrs. J. B. Smith, Mrs. Frank Friend and Mrs. A. C. Hoover have helped in a material way in the Texas Federation. Mrs. Friend is at present serving in a very capable and dignified manner as Second Vice-President of the State Federation.

Mr. and Mrs. Mark Taliaferro, former residents of Ozona but now of Fort Stockton, are the parents of two boys, born April 30, according to an announcement received by The Stockman. The boys weighed in at 7 and 8 pounds.

## Urge Payment Of Cemetery Dues

Donations Must Be Asked Unless Members Pay Up Dues

Unless members of the Ozona Cemetery Association who are now in arrears with their dues make payments at once, it will be necessary to solicit donations to the association treasury for the 1929 program of the organization is to be carried through, Mrs. B. B. Ingham, chairman of the Cemetery Association, announced this week.

The association has collected to date a total of \$933.82, the financial statement showed. A total of \$1200 will be necessary to carry out the program outlined for cemetery improvement this year, Mrs. Ingham declared, and unless the dues of the entire membership is paid this amount will not be realized.

## Sulphur Water In Moncrief's Well

Well On Todd Ranch Is Flowing Barrel Hourly; Plan New Test

Chances of shallow production in W. A. Moncrief's No. 1 Massie apparently had been blessed Friday with sulphur water flowing in the Crockett test from 1220 feet. The test had drilled to 1233 feet in sand. It had a show of gas from 1151-74 feet and an estimated 3,500,000 cubic feet of gas at 1198 feet, which cleaned the hole.

No. Massie is 1170 feet north and 1320 feet east of the southwest corner of section 47, block UV, G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co. survey, and about three miles east and slightly north of Moncrief's No. 1 J. S. Todd.

One barrel of oil had been bailed hourly in No. 1 J. S. Todd after cleaning out following a 15 quart shot from 1363-78 feet.

Production, if maintained at this rate of 24 barrels a day, would be worth while. The well before shooting plugged back to 1378 feet from 1400 feet, where it encountered sulphur water. No. 1 Todd is 660 feet from the north and east lines of section 35, block WX, G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co. survey, 18 miles southeast of Powell field and about 15 miles northeast of Ozona.

Moncrief and the California Company have made a location for a test two miles northwest of Moncrief's No. 1 Todd, in the center of the southwest quarter of section 57, block UV, G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co. survey. It is scheduled to be started immediately, contract depth to be 2,000 feet. Moncrief sold to the California Company his entire interest in the east half of section 45, and the east half of section 57 and an undivided one-half interest in the southwest quarter of section 57, on which the joint test is to be drilled.

## Million Pounds Wool Sold At 32½ Cents By Del Rio Warehouse

DEL RIO, May 16.—The Producers Wool and Mohair Company of Del Rio, today announced the sale of a million pounds of wool at 32½ cents, the deal having been consummated Friday morning, marking the first sale of short wool in Texas this spring.

The name of the buyer was not announced by the company.

## \$286 Subscribed Toward Sign Fund

Lions Hope To Have Sign Installed Before Rodeo

Popular subscriptions amounting to \$286 had been collected by a committee from the Lions Club up to Monday toward the purchase of the electric sign to be erected in the downtown section, carrying the name of Ozona and its slogan, "Biggest Little Town In The World."

Most of the amount signed up was by voluntary subscription, and most of it came from members of the Lions Club. Of the amount subscribed, \$200 is from the business and professional men of Ozona, \$85 from ranchmen of Crockett County and \$1 subscribed by an out-of-town Lion.

It is estimated that between \$300 and \$325 will be needed to purchase the sign and have it installed. The cost of the sign f. o. b. Dallas is \$195. It is to be mounted on a concrete block and iron post at the southwest corner of the city park, setting at an angle of 45 degrees, to be visible from all three roads leading into town. If there is a surplus in the fund raised to buy the sign, it will be used solely for community betterment projects, it was explained at the Lions Club luncheon Monday noon.

## More Than \$72,000 In County & School Taxes Are Collected

Total county and school taxes for 1929 amounting to more than \$72,000 have been collected to date by W. S. Willis, sheriff and tax collector, according to a report filed with the commissioners court at its meeting this week. School taxes reported amounted to \$34,215.36 and county taxes \$37,815.56.

The court sat as a board of equalization for a part of its meeting this week and went over a part of the tax assessor's roll for this year.

County Clerk George Russell and Treasurer Tom Casbeer were appointed by the court to make a complete list of the delinquent taxes in Crockett County. It is estimated this work will require two or three months.

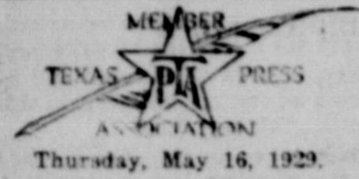

The airplane and municipal airports are among the latest forward steps in a fast moving world. It used to be, long, long ago, that good roads were the big talk of progressive communities. But these progressive communities took care of that step in the distant past—modern things are occupying their attention now.

But Crockett County! Poor, poor, poverty-stricken Crockett County is still in the mud, still

wrestling with a problem that belongs to a past decade. Abilene became a city by reason of the spirit shown in the election which provided \$100,000 for a municipal airport. That same spirit prevailed in the dark age (the same one that Crockett County is now suffering through) and Taylor County got good roads and kept step with the rest of the world in the march of progress.

But Crockett County is all out of step. In fact, she's dropped by the wayside, in the matter of good roads—and schools—at least. Silent as the tomb, with nothing to say for themselves and apparently satisfied to let the rest of the world say what it will about them, the people of Crockett County are sitting back in their own smug self-satisfaction and letting the world go by—bye.

A county government that is hell-bent on keeping the tax renditions low and the tax rate lower with the result that the county treasury is eternally impoverished and the county unable to perform the functions normally expected of it is a picture of the local situation. A healthy bond issue for good roads and another for good schools might serve to allay the fears of Crockett County people that a few cents increase in the tax rate would throw them into immediate bankruptcy.

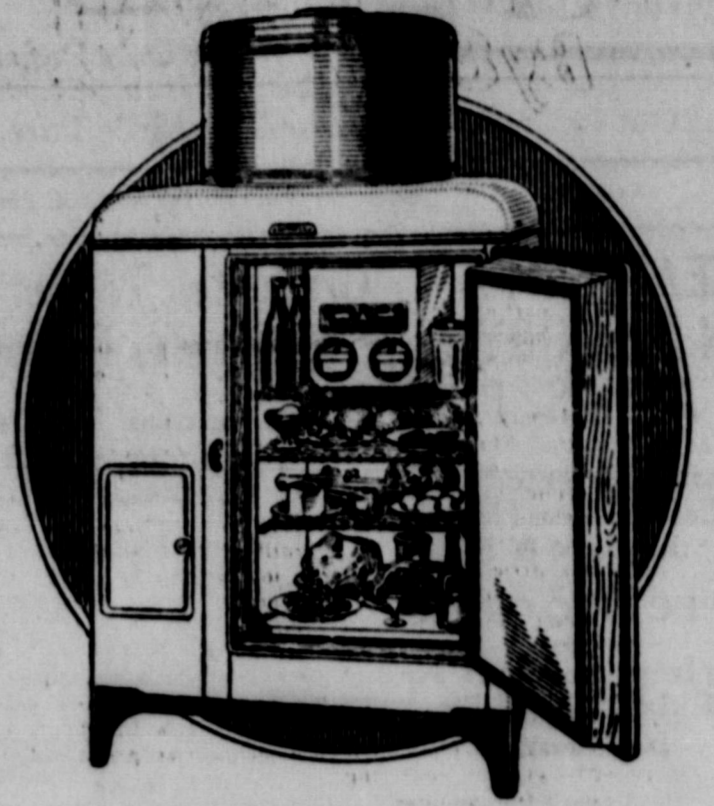

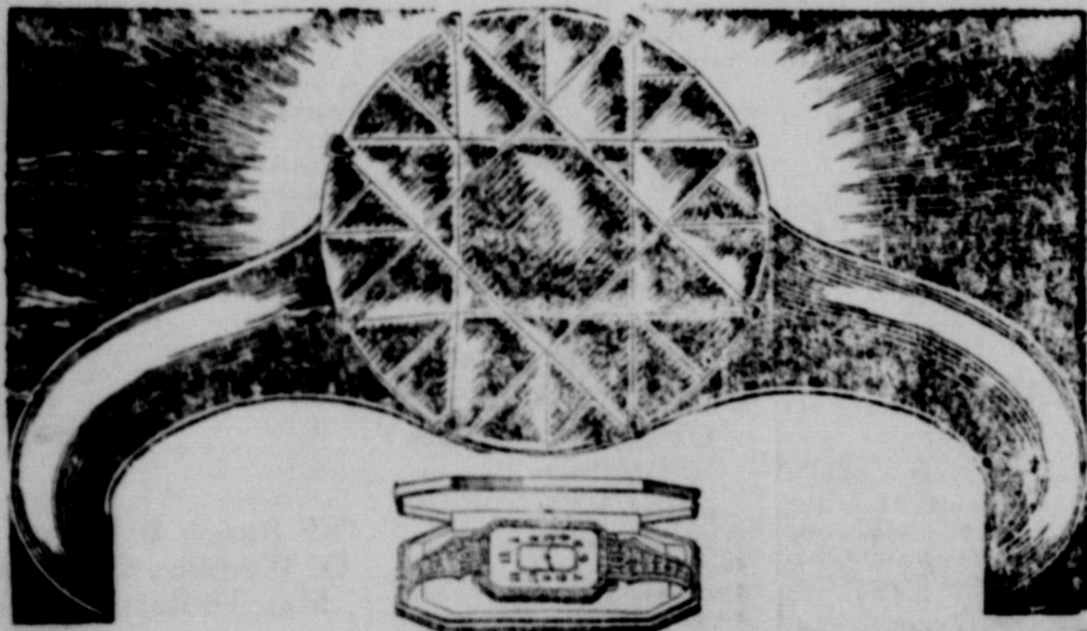

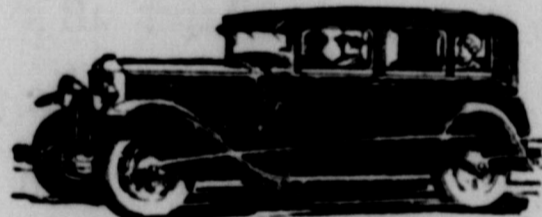

I leave all fearlessly in your hands, at your entire disposal. Only one thing I beg of you, and that without fear of refusal. Marry not an Englishman. Marry one of the nobility of our own island, if you can find one worthy of you; if not, there are nobles of Italy with whom your alliance would be an honor, and also a profit. You will be rich as you are beautiful; and the first lady in Italy, our distant kinswoman, Angelo di Carlotti, will be your guardian and your friend. May you be very, very happy, dearest; and all that comes to you you will deserve, for you have lightened the heart of a weary old man, whose blessing is yours, now and for ever.

"Leonardo di Marioni."

(Letter from Margharita Briscoe to the Count Leonardo di Marioni, care of the Princess di Carlotti, Palazzo Carlotti, Rome.)

"My Dear, Dear Uncle: I am inclined to scold you for your letter, for it made me very sad. Why should you be so sure of dying just as the vengeance which is your due becomes yours? "Lady St. Maurice tries to be kind to me in her way; but when the honeyed words are upon her lips, I think of you and my heart is steel. She must have been a very beautiful woman—nay, she is beautiful now! You asked me in your first letter to watch and to tell you whether they were happy together. You asked me, and I tell you the truth.

"Yes! I think that of all the women whom I have ever seen, her life seems to have flown along the most calmly and peacefully. I have never seen a cloud upon her brow; I hate her for it. She has no right to be happy; she who by such treachery condemned you to a living death. Once my anger rose up so fiercely that I nearly struck her, and I had to hurry from the room lest I should betray myself before the time. Truly she deserves punishment, and my hand shall not shrink from inflicting it.

"Yet, after all, is death the most complete form of punishment. Sometimes I doubt it. I would mar the beauty of her face for ever, and laugh. I would strike her blind gladly; I would make her a cripple for life, without remorse, without hesitation. To see her suffer would please me. I should have no pity!

"But death, uncle! If anything of our religion be true, would death be so terrible a thing? Against my will I see that her life is good. She has made her home what it should be, and her husband happy. She is a devoted Christian, and, wet or fine, every Sunday morning before breakfast, she goes to the little church in the village and kneels before the altar. She visits the sick and the poor, and they love her. For me, religion has become something of a dream. I was brought up a Roman Catholic. What I am now I do not know! When I vowed my life to its present purpose I filled it with new thoughts; I put my religion away from me. I could not kneel with

hate in my heart; I could not confess, with the desire to kill in my bosom.

"Yet let that pass. Supposing there be a heaven, if we kill her for her treachery to you will not that be wiped out? May she not gain heaven? And if so, what of our vengeance? Death is swift! What will she suffer? It will be those who are left behind who will feel the pain; for her, there will be a happiness beyond even the happiness of earth. She will be shriven of her sin by our vengeance.

"Think of this, my dear uncle! Do not imagine that I am growing faint-hearted; do not imagine that I am drawing back from the task which I now claim as my right. Death, or some other sort of punishment, shall surely fall upon her; she shall not escape! Only think what is best.

(Letter from the Count Leonardo di Marioni, the Palazzo Carlotti, Rome, to Miss Margharita Briscoe, Mallory Grange, Lincolnshire.)

"Beloved Margharita: I will confess that your letter troubles me. If there be heaven for the woman who wrecked my life; there is no heaven for me, no religion, no God. You say that she is a good woman. She is then a good woman through fear. She seeks to atone, but she can never atone. "Can you wonder that my hand is shaking, and that there is a mist before my eyes! I am an old man, and great joy is hard to bear; harder still after a weary, wretched life such as mine. You will understand, though—you will be able to decipher this faint, uncertain handwriting, and you will forgive me if it tires you. Ay, you will do that, Margharita, I know!

"Let me tell you how I found him. It was by the purest accident. I turned aside into an old curio shop to buy some trifle for you which took my fancy, and it was Paschuli himself who served me. Thus you see how indirectly even your star always shines over mine and leads me aright. If it had not been for you I should never have dreamed of entering the place, but I thought of you and your taste for Roman jewelry, and behold, I found myself in the presence of the man for whom I was making vain search. My Margharita! my good angel! I have you to thank even for the successful accomplishment of my part in that edict of our Order which you and I are banded together to carry out.

"At first, Paschuli did not recognize me, and it was long before I could make him believe that I was indeed that most fortunate of men, Leonardo di Marioni. But when he was convinced, he promised me what I sought. That same evening he gave it to me.
