On the front page of this issue is the most important announcement this paper has been privileged to make in the span of tenure of its present editorial directorate—the announcement that a petition asking for an election to decide whether or not this county shall issue \$375,000 in bonds for the purpose of building a modern highway across the county east and west and from Ozona to the Irion County line near Barnhart will be presented to the Commissioners Court at its November term Monday.

This announcement carries great import for the future of Crockett County. If the voters approve this issue at the polls when

the election day set by the Commissioners arrives, it will mean the greatest forward step this county has ever made. It will mean that Crockett County is getting out of the mud and getting out in grand style. It will mean that one of the greatest nuisances to be found in Ozona will be allayed—that of dust from unpaved streets.

It will mean that Crockett County is on its toes enough to accept a most generous proffer of aid by the state and federal governments—three dollars for every one we put up. It will mean that Crockett County will have a connecting artery with the outside world in fair weather or foul. It will mean thousands of dollars saving each year for Crockett County citizens, savings from wear and tear on cars bumping over unpaved and sometimes almost impassable roads, savings on livestock shipments and savings on freight hauls from the railroad. It will mean that the most notorious link in the transcontinental Old Spanish Trail will be made an all-weather road and another reason for routing tourist traffic on other routes removed. It will mean that Ozona has asserted another and a powerful claim to its slogan—"The Biggest Little Town in the World."

The biggest taxpayers in Crockett County, the men who will actually pay out the greatest amount each year toward paying off the road bonds, have signed the petition asking for the election call. Only one man has been encountered by those circulating the petition who refused to sign the document.

That's the sentiment that is back of this forward move. The people of Crockett County have come to a realization of the vital necessity of building good roads in the county and that realization has brought fruit in the form of this petition. This newspaper, believing that the building of good roads is a necessary step in this modern world and not through any spirit of dictatorship, will wholeheartedly favor and boost the success of this movement. We will attempt to give our reasons for this stand from

time to time, in the editorial columns, but the readers of this paper have free access to its columns at all times to express their views on this or any other issue, either to take issue with the editorial pronouncements or to state their side of any question, regardless of whether or not their views coincide with those of this paper.

We would welcome, then, a free discussion of the present project through the columns of The Stockman. If you are opposed to the issue, feel free to express your views in print, for the columns of this paper are open to both sides of the question. Let's have your views

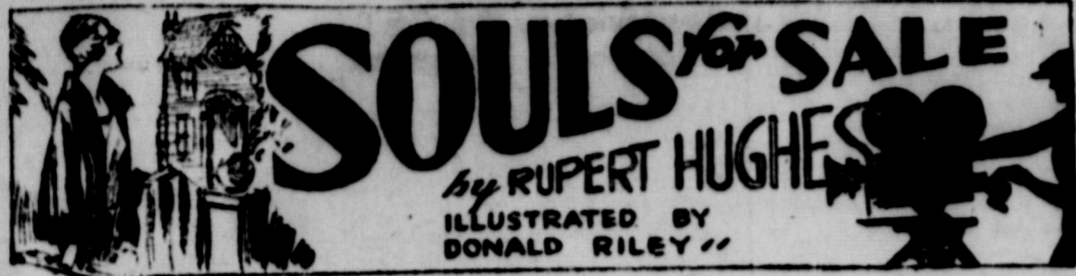

Dear Wife, he wrote her mother—The Lord giveth and taketh away. I have lost you and my darling daughter and my loneliness, but I can still say, "Thy will be done."

I think you should know, however, how things are here. Otherwise I should not write you. But I am afraid that the daughter that was once ours might tire of the husks of sin and wish to come home repentant.

Bitterness filled my soul when I learned that she was leading a life of riotous mockery, and when I saw the picture of her smiling in wanton attire at the side of that smirking French general, I had it in my heart to curse her and I wrote in haste, I repented my hardness of heart and bowed my head in humble shame when I read your angry reply. I had lost your love and your admiration, but that was deserved punishment for the idolatry that had grown up in my heart towards you; and for the mistakes I must have made in not giving our erring daughter a better care.

But now it has pleased the Lord to pour out the vials of his wrath on my gray hairs. The old mortgage on the church fell due long ago, but foreclosure had been postponed from time to time. We gave a benefit to pay it off, but everybody was too poor to respond, and it did not pay expenses.

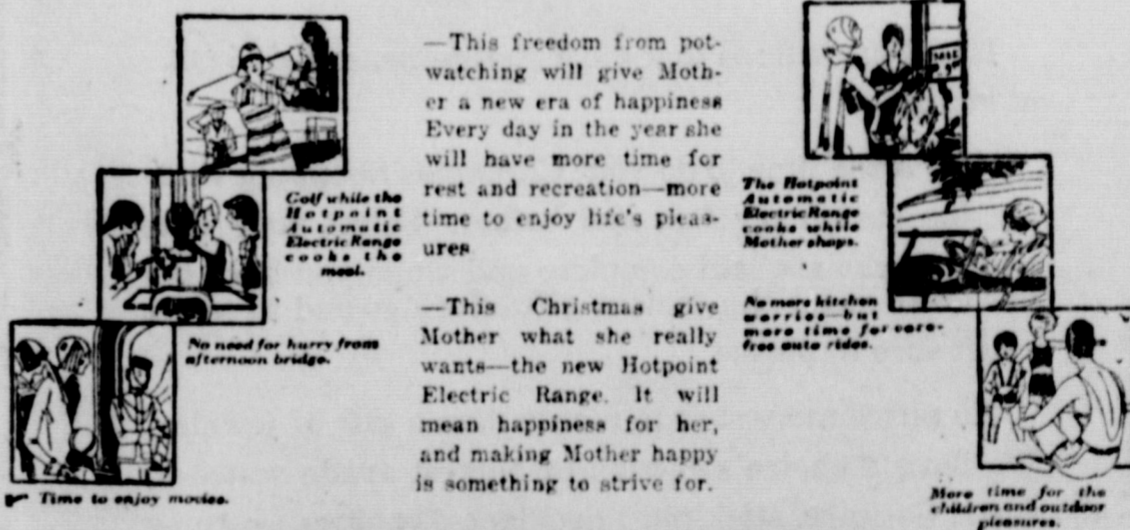

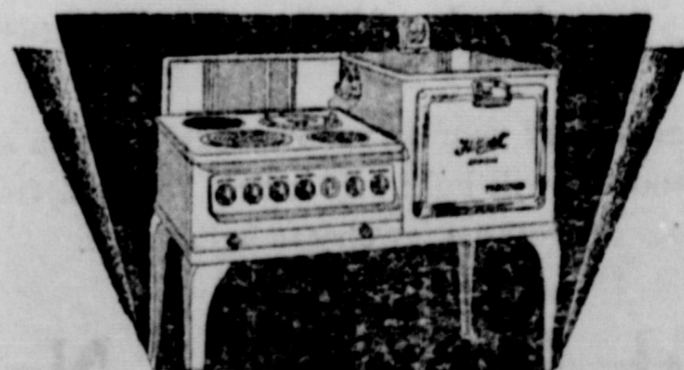

Exercise For Character Building

Many people think that the purpose of exercise is for body-building only; that it simply strengthens the muscles and speeds up the vitality generally. The truth of the matter is that in any good newspaper there is more valuable reading in good advertisements than in the news columns—in fact, the advertising columns are the real news columns.

Your newspaper—this newspaper—is the catalog of all those things offering for sale by the merchants of Ozona. Consider it as such. Read and study those columns of each page that tell what you may buy and where and how you may buy it—and remember, that when you do this you are not doing the paper or the merchants any favor—you are doing yourself a good turn, and proving yourself a wise business man.

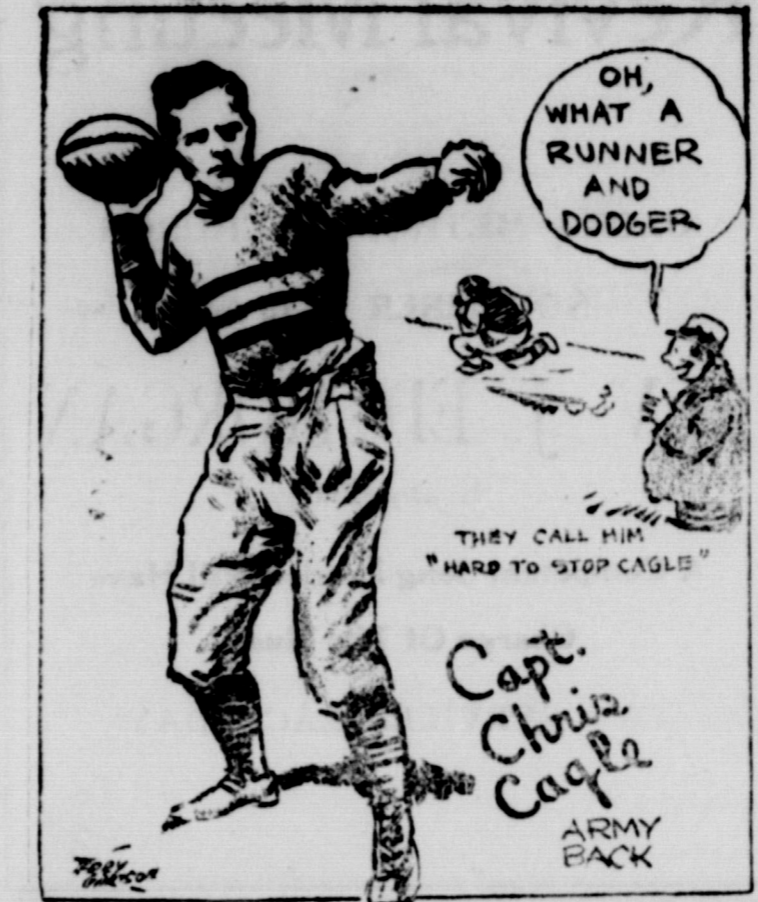

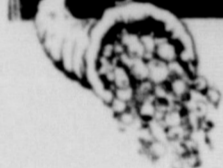

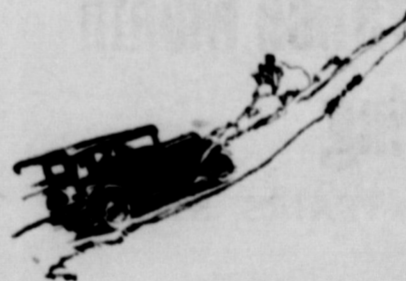

States To Name OST Directorate

Junction Man Nominating Committeeman For West Texas

With the return from California of the members of the Old Spanish Trail Motorcade the word is brought that at the convention meeting at San Diego a nominating committee was appointed for each OST State to select a State vice-president for the new national board of directors. Under the OST constitution the vice-president is

the State leader and State directors are elected to serve with the vice-president. The State groups constitute the national board of directors with a managing director as the interstate contact official. The nominating committee chairman for East Texas is T. H. Nees, president Security Bank of Beaumont and delegate of the Chamber of Commerce and the Sabine-Neches automobile club. The West Texas nomination was referred to the Hill Country OST group of which Emil A. Loeffler of Junction is chairman. West Texas is entitled to a vice-president and to a national director. It was recognized at the San Diego meeting that the work of

road improvement and of pavement is now well looked after by the state highway departments and local people, but drawing travel south to the Old Spanish Trail and its territory is a work that must be coordinated in the interest of all the territory from Florida to California. The San Diego meeting decided the primary work was to mark the Old Spanish Trail and thus preserve its name and capitalize its historical allurements and to cou-

ple with this the distribution of travel information to the northern people. The Old Spanish Trail Association has already built up a national distribution system. "The Old Spanish Trail," according to Herral Ayres, the managing director, "should not be thought of as a mere highway with a selfish interest, but as the southern travel artery that can be made noted throughout the whole continent and as travel is drawn to it the whole southern borderland

country will be served by it. No single highway," he says, "is sufficient for this far southern country, but the Old Spanish Trail name and its historical back-

ground will be the drawing power to bring people south and all highways are needed for the distribution of these travelers after they get south."


