Not A "Scratch" Is Unique Accomplishment Of Popular County Clerk

George Russell, serving his first term as county and district clerk of Crockett County. hung up a record in the primary election in this county Saturday which, according to old timers, stands without an equal in the county's history. Out of 582 votes polled in Saturday's election Mr. Russell received a 100 per cent vote, not a single voter in the county scratching his name from the ballot.
