The art of throwing a rock when he breathed the air of the with accurate aim, learned in rabbit hunting days of youth, served Sheriff W. S. Willis in good stead Christmas morning when he called upon his trusty rock-heaving right to stop a fleeing prisoner who made a break for liberty from the Crockett County jail while doing an errand on the outside.

Whether or not Sheriff Willis hails from Coke County, the fact remains that he must have been somewhat of a rabbit hunter in his youth. Bowling bver a cotton tail or a jack rabbit at a high run is somewhat of an accomplishment, but to bring down a dodging, sidestepping and more or less belligerent man is something too, and that after a quarter of a mile foot race across a none too smooth hill top.

Lem Watson, who is being held pending action of the next grand jury on charges of rape and wife desertion, was the prisoner who attempted the break for liberty. Sheriff Willis was feeling somewhat the spirit of Christmas good will and thought to give Watson a little exercise and air and allowed him to go down stairs to bring in a scuttle of coal for the jail fire.

The sheriff was unarmed and the prisoner was evidently aware of that fact. At any rate,

outside, the call of freedom was too much and he made a dash for it. He took off at a high lope across the hill to the east of the jail. Sheriff Willis debated a moment whether to go back for his gun or give chase unarmed. The latter course was decided upon and the big minion of the law, in boots and big hat, whipped up his "dogs" and the chase was on.

Over the rock-strewn hill racing prisoner and keeper went, the former with a fair start gaining on the upgrade. But once over the hill, the Sheriff hit his stride and the distance between him and his quarry shortened rapidly.

When Watson reached the draw to the east of town, his steam pressure had lowered considerably and from his position he could not detect a weakening in the big sheriff. Consequently, he sought protection of the small shrubbery in the vicinity, but the officer had not lost sight of him. As the sheriff drew nearer, the prisoner was seen to scramble over the ground, evidently hunt ing for a rock to halt his pur-






