



Additional Tax Burden

The average citizen who owns property that is not exempt under the present homestead amendment, in order to be relieved of some five or six millions of state taxes, would have a burden of some twenty-five millions put upon him under a consumers' tax. The average homeowner, particularly would be a victim. Where he is now exempt from state taxes. he would pay an average of some annually under a 2% sales \$30 tax. This is nearly 50% more than he paid in state property taxes before the adoption of the Home stead Exemption Amendment.

But this is only half the story. These would be the victims; but who would reap the benefits? It would be chiefly those interests which will be relieved from their present state property taxes, and at the same time, will be exempt from the sales tax.

The oil companies, for example, chiefly the majora, would save approximately \$3,451,000, which they are now paying in state tax-
