Women with babies in their arms laugh as an insane mob beats and lynches two self-confessed kidnappers in California.

Governor Rolph is thinking of paroling all the state's imprisoned kidnapers to "those fine patriotic citizens of San Jose who know how to handle such a situation." He further states he will pardon any who may be arrested for the hanging.

Other national leaders condone the actions of the lynchers.

All this serves to illustrate the attitude of the people toward this most fiendish form of crime. To those who would deplore such action, it might be pointed out that San Jose is not likely to have another kidnapping this generation. If all the kidnappers of the country were given the same tonic, 'the snatch" soon would cease to be the occupation of those gangsters hat beer and prohibition repeal are driving out of the rackets.

It, however, is too bad that kidnapers can't be strung up legally. Inadequate penalties, crooked and smart lawyers and weakkneed juries are to blame for the California lynching. Until the system under which the law operates s changed, we shall continue to have more of the same.

Nothing short of the death peralty by fed al statute will do the session of Congress and rushed Fulmer, Lon Freeman and Misses through to enactment if possible. The government proved in the Urschel kidnaping case that it can catch kidnapers and convict them speedily. Diptheria is increasing in Texas and strenuous efforts must be Entered at the Post Office at made to combat it or there will be an epidemic, according to a bulletin received by Dr. F. T. McIntire, county health officer, from the state health department at Austin.

In September, 498 cases were re ported in the state and in October this total climbed to 701. On the tenth of November, 542 cases had been reported to the department, the bulletin said. If the rate continues through November, that month will show a total of 1500 cases in the state, the department
