PASTORS TO SPEAK Annual Observance To Start At 7:30 At Baptist Church

Messages of Thanksgiving by Rev. J. H. Meredith and M. M. Fulmer, as well as personal testimonies, will be the order for the annual Sunrise Thanksgiving Service to be held at the First Baptist Church at 7:30 a. m. Thursday.

This will be the seventh of these annual Sunrise services, and it is expected that a large crowd will be in attendance. A poll of the audience last year indicated that quite a number had not missed a single one of these services, and their testimony was unanimous that the services had been a great blessing to them.

The early morning hour, it is stated, was adopted because it enables busy housewives to worship before preparing Thanksgiving dinner, gives an opportunity for Thanksgiving worship to those who plan to visit for the day, and offers to everybody the blessing of starting this day of thinking right.

Revs. Meredith and Fulmer, who are scheduled for brief addresses, are well known to Ozona whom they have served in the capacity of Methodist and Baptist pastors for six and seven years respectively. You are invited and urged to put "thanksgiving" in your holiday program.

Health Survey At Live Oak Planned

Lions To Co-Operate With P.T.A. In Relief Work

A survey of the needs of children attending the Live Oak school in this county is to be made by a committee from the Ozona Lions Club with a view to developing a means of bringing relief to those children who are in ill health, insufficiently clothed or undernourished.

Reports reaching here from recent visits of Parent-Teacher Association members has resulted in action by the Parent-Teachers in supplying milk for the undernourished children. Mrs. Lowell Littleton, teacher in the school, had been supplying some of the children with milk each day and was sharing her lunch with some who did not bring lunches from their homes, mostly in the nearby road camp.

With the co-operation of Dr. F. T. McIntire, a health inspection of all children of the school is to be made, and where conditions that need correction are found, these will be given attention without charge if the parents are unable to pay for medical service.

Although the Parent-Teacher Association is taking care of most of the clothing needs of the children, the investigating committee will confer with that organization and if further need is found, efforts will be made to supplement relief given.

Sewer Extension As CWA Project

Application Made For Funds To Extend Local System

Extension of Ozona's sewer system to serve the entire town, including the Mexican suburb, with funds from the Civil Works Administration used to pay labor, is a project for which Crockett County is making application to the Civil Works administration.

The Commissioners Court, in called session this week, prepared its application for work relief funds from the government agencies, and the application will be considered by the Texas administrators at Austin.

If the project is approved, the local sewer system will be extended to serve the entire town and the project will provide every unemployed man in the county will work during the winter months.

Another project for which application for government funds is to be made is the landscaping, paving and beautifying of grounds and drives around the school building. This project will also provide work for a large number of unemployed. The county is to furnish all materials for both projects in case they are approved.

Christmas Seal Sale To Start Next Week Under Direction PTA

The annual sale of Christmas Seals, sponsored by the local Parent-Teacher Association, is expected to get under way early next week.

The Seal sale, proceeds from which are used in combatting tuberculosis, in children particularly, will be open from Thanksgiving until Christmas.

A goal of \$150 has been set by the local P.T.A. committees for this year's local sale. Sixty per cent of the proceeds from sale of the gay little stickers stays in a health fund retained and administered by the Parent-Teacher Association, provided as much as \$100 is realized from the local sale.

Ozonan Injured In Auto Wreck

Father Joe Oberkamp And D.K. McMullen Hurt In San Angelo

H. Oberkamp, father of Joe Oberkamp, Ozona merchant, was injured in an automobile wreck in San Angelo Saturday at noon. Mr. Oberkamp's car collided with one driven by S. G. Boynton and the Ozonan's father was thrown from his car, his head striking the pavement. He was unconscious for more than an hour, but his injuries were not serious and he is now well on the way to recovery.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Oberkamp left Ozona Saturday afternoon upon learning of the accident and remained with the injured man until Monday, returning to Ozona Monday night.

D. K. McMullen, young Crockett County rancher, was seriously injured in another accident near San Angelo on the Mertzon road Saturday when the car he was driving struck a concrete culvert and overturned. The car McMullen was driving belonged to Austin Millsbaugh, son of S. S. Millsbaugh, rancher between here and Big Lake, young Millsbaugh being ahead of McMullen in another car.

McMullen was reported here to have suffered a broken leg a deep cut on his head and other injuries. The car was completely wrecked. The injured man is in a San Angelo hospital recovering from his injuries.

Farmer Charged After Family Disappears

A year ago J. W. McGehee, his wife and two little sons disappeared from the home of George Patton, bachelor, with whom they lived on a Henderson county farm near Athens, Texas. A blood-stained mattress, rotted and blood-stained clothing, and buckshot imbedded in the walls of the house where the McGehees lived form a chain of circumstantial evidence against Patton, who says that he parted friends with the McGehees, who went away. Released on a \$1,000 bond after being charged with murder, Patton cannot be tried until the body of one of the missing family is discovered.

Baptist Building Drive Nears Goal

Only \$150 Needed For Attainment Of Goal Of \$2,538

Lacking a bare \$150 of having the goal of \$2,538 subscribed, the campaign committees of the Baptist Building drive are going quietly but steadily about their task with full confidence that the amount needed will be subscribed by December 1, the date due, it is stated by Rev. M. M. Fulmer, pastor and leader of the campaign.

A total of \$2,378.55 has been subscribed from a total of 133 separate gifts. Less than twenty families of the resident membership here have failed to subscribe, and many of them have not been seen by the committees as yet. The committees are pledged to continue their work until every member who has an income has been solicited.

With the payment of this year's obligation, the principal on the indebtedness of the church will be reduced to \$9,000. The Baptist church edifice was erected in 1929 at a cost, including furnishings, of \$43,600. The original amount borrowed was \$23,000.

"In spite of depression times, in each year save one, since the erection of the building, with the payment of this year's installment the church will have reduced its building indebtedness \$14,000. With humility of spirit, and determination of purpose, we 'thank God and take courage,'" Rev. Fulmer added.

"We have solicited no gifts from friends outside of the church yet there have been three such gifts, for which we are grateful," he pastor said.

Schools Grant Two-Day Holiday

Several On Local Faculty To Attend State Teachers' Meet

Students of Crockett County schools will enjoy a four-day holiday after the close of schools Wednesday. A two-day holiday has been granted for Thanksgiving, schools dismissing Wednesday afternoon until Monday morning.

Many of the teachers on the local faculty expect to attend the Texas State Teachers Association convention in Austin Thursday, Friday and Saturday, according to the superintendent, John L. Bishop. Mr. Bishop plans to attend the state meet and several other teachers are making plans to be on hand for the three-day session.

125 Crockett County Ewes Are Donated To Methodist Orphanage

One hundred twenty-five Crockett County ewes will soon start for their new home on acreage owned by the Methodist Orphanage at Waco, the gift of Crockett County ranchmen. Approximately 100 of the desired number have already been donated for the purpose, around 60 head being held in the fairgrounds trap pending shipment.

The ewes will be shipped by rail to Waco, the railroad offering to take the consignment at half price.

The Crockett County ewes will form the nucleus of a herd to be maintained by the orphanage. A group of ranchers from Midland County contributed a herd of calves and the sheep will be added to the other livestock pastured on the 1200-acre tract owned by the institution.

Red Cross Nets 178 Memberships

Goal Of 150 Passed In Annual Roll Call Drive

The annual Red Cross Roll Call Drive, concluded here last week by the Crockett County chapter, went over the goal set by chapter officials, a total of 178 dollar memberships being enrolled according to the report of A. W. Jones, county chairman. The goal had been set at 150.

There are still a few additional memberships that are yet to come in, Mr. Jones said, but these will not change the total appreciably.

There were several 100 per cent enrollments among the business houses of the city, Mr. Jones said, but few residences displayed the 100 per cent signs. Mr. Jones asked the Stockman to express his appreciation for the co-operation of the people of Ozona in the Roll Call drive. Many volunteered for service in conducting the drive and the results show the liberal response of the public to the call.

Half of the total amount collected in the solicitation will remain in the treasury of the local Red Cross chapter, the other half going to the national organization.

The locals apparently had the game sewed up for a certainty after they had started a touchdown march from the 50-yard line in the second quarter after playing the visitors to a standstill earlier in the game. With Westfall and Jake Miller accounting for most of the yardage in that march, this combination looked invincible.

They looked even more so in the third quarter when they started another scoring journey from their own 38-yard line where the locals received an Eagle punt. Westfall ripped off 21 yards around end and Miller countered with 7 the same route. A pass, Westfall to Miller was good for another 8 yards and Westfall made it a first down on the 19 yard line. Westfall took up another 5 through the line and Jake made it first on the 9. Westfall plunged at the line four times for the touchdown. The kick from

STRING 'EM UP

Women with babies in their arms laugh as an insane mob beats and lynches two self-confessed kidnapers in California. Governor Rolph is thinking of paroling all the state's imprisoned kidnapers to "those fine patriotic citizens of San Jose who know how to handle such a situation."

Other national leaders condone the actions of the lynchers. All this serves to illustrate the attitude of the people toward this most fiendish form of crime. To those who would deplore such action, it might be pointed out that San Jose is not likely to have another kidnaping this generation.

It, however, is too bad that kidnapers can't be strung up legally. Inadequate penalties, crooked and smart lawyers and weak-kneed juries are to blame for the California lynching. Until the system under which the law operates is changed, we shall continue to have more of the same.

Nothing short of the death penalty by federal statute will do the trick. It should be taken up next session of Congress and rushed through to enactment if possible.

Until this is done the "necktie route" seems none too severe for proved kidnapers, regardless of whether they mistreat or slay their victim. To those to whom such tactics appear too harsh, we can only ask how you would feel were some of your loved ones treated like young Brooks Hart—San Angelo Times.

Diphtheria Epidemic Threatened in Texas As Spread Reported

Diphtheria is increasing in Texas and strenuous efforts must be made to combat it or there will be an epidemic, according to a bulletin received by Dr. F. T. McIntire, county health officer, from the state health department at Austin.

In September, 493 cases were reported in the state and in October this total climbed to 701. On the tenth of November, 542 cases had been reported to the department, the bulletin said. If the rate continues through November, that month will show a total of 1500 cases in the state, the department pointed out.

"The death rate for diphtheria for the past five years has been: 1928—7.3 per 100,000; 1929—7.8; 1930—6.0; 1931—9.3; and 1932—13.4. Last year the neighboring states of Arkansas and Louisiana had rates of 9.9 and 6.7 respectively. Just think, Texas had a death rate from this disease exactly twice that of Louisiana.

"We know that the death rate and the morbidity of diphtheria can be lowered, and we will appreciate your assistance. After your community has been thoroughly immunized, a Schlick testing campaign might not be amiss to pick up the few that did not receive an immunity."

Basketball Takes Stage As Football Prepares To Vacate

Austin, Texas, Nov. 29.—Basket ball is already attracting many high schools over the State, according to Roy Henderson, athletic director of the University of Texas Bureau of Public School Interests. Approximately 1,400 schools are expected to participate in interscholastic league basketball. Schools may enroll in this sport without penalty until December 15, while a penalty is imposed from that date until the final dead line on January 15.

A slight change has been made in the operation of the basketball tournament of the League this year, Mr. Henderson said. A regional championship has been interpolated between the bi-district championship and the State meet. The State being divided into eight regions, one team from each region to compete for the State championship.

placement was good after the first touchdown but failed at the second and the score stood Ozona 13 and Eldorado 0—and just about a quarter and a half left to play.

The Eagles' fighting spirit had not dimmed and they were charging and slashing at every hint of a hole in the Ozona line. The locals were holding their own in an exchange of kicks, with the visitors unable to get far in their passing and running attack. But, came one of those moments when over confidence exacts its devastating toll. With the ball on the 50 yard line, fourth down and six to go, the Eagles upset the Lions defense by pulling an off-tackle play where by precedent they had been expected to kick. The Eagle ball carrier wriggled through the fingers of more than half the Lion team for a 45-yard run to put the ball on Ozona's 5-yard stripe.

Break Nets Touchdown

The Lion defense stiffened in this dangerous territory and they held the Eagles to gains of only

a few feet at a time until the fourth try netted the touchdown and the kick was square between the uprights to make the score 13 to 7.

The Eagles second touchdown came even easier than the first. It came in the fourth period after the visitors had uncorked a passing and running attack that had an edge on the Ozona offensive. Taking the ball on the mid-stripe the Eagles heaved a 15-yard pass, the receiver galloping the remaining distance for a touchdown. The kick was low and the score was knotted.

But the Lions still had the edge on the visitors, penetrations being even and the locals with one first down in the lead. The visitors kicked after the touchdown to Westfall who brought the ball back to the 38-yard line. A pass failed but a second, Westfall to Miller, was good for another first down.

That Fatal Pass!

Then came the incident that lost a ball game. Eldorado intercepted another Ozona pass in midfield and brought the ball back to Ozona's 22-yard line. A line play failed to gain, another picked up one yard and an off-tackle thrust

did the job by seven yards. The Eagles then tried a field goal, but the kick was wide and the ball went over to Ozona on the 20-yard line. Another first down was accounted for by the locals before a pass was intercepted on the 45-yard line and two more plays ended the game—and Ozona's hopes for a district championship in the good year 1933. Meanwhile, great tears stream down this scribes cheeks as he performs the painful duty of recounting the gloomy tale of how a two-touchdown-superior team was eliminated in the semi-finals and from an almost certain championship by a mighty, mighty lucky break for the victors.

Beware of Common Cold Is Warning Of Health Officer

Austin, Texas, Nov. 29.—"Beware of the common cold," Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, in a statement issued here today, cautioned the people of the State of Texas. "This is the season of the year when colds are most prevalent, and their consequences more far reaching. The organism causing the disease is not known, but every individual is acquainted with its effects."

Not a little of the susceptibility of catching colds can be overcome by a gradual acclimating to lowering temperatures and inclement outdoor weather. This hardening should begin now, and consist of regular exercise—walking is good—to be continued throughout the winter, in weather of every kind. Some things to avoid are wet stockings, drying on one's feet; over-heavy clothing; over-heated rooms.

There are two broad principles to observe in the treatment and prevention of colds. The first says "Let the patient keep to himself, and keep his oral and nasal discharges to himself." This includes indiscriminate spitting, kissing, and other forms of contact.

The second principle requires doing away with coddling and over-protection of the body against the elements.

"The cold is a common disease," Dr. Brown said. "But every cold is important enough to justify careful attention and treatment, for its immediate cure. Death-dealing pneumonia and tuberculosis may begin with colds that did not receive care and attention."

"Over-indulgence of de-vitalizing stimulants, such as alcohol, tobacco, tea, and coffee do much to lower the resistance to colds."
