#### Henderson White Suffers Injury In Unusual Accident

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Henderson White, about 17, suf Monday morning when an explosion of unslaked lime placed in a face, filling both eyes. The accident happened on the Jeff Owens owners. ranch on Live Oak Creek about 35 miles west of Ozona, where young White is employed.

Mr. Owens and young White were mixing the lime with other ingredients for stock medicines. The boy failed to notice a small amount of water in the bottom of a bucket when he poured a quan-tity of lime into it. When he stooped to pick up the vessel, the action of the lime and water at the bottom of the bucket caused an explosion which threw the dry powder into his face.

#### Jumbo, Huge Bull Of Gist Herd, Shown Here, Is Slaughtered

ODESSA-Jumbo is no longer the largest Hereford bull in the world, for he is dead. Owned by John M. Gist, veteran breeder at Odessa, Jumbo gained the 3709 pound mark before he was shipped to Fort Worth for slaughter. This huge piece of meat, measuring fourteen feet from the tip of his nose to the root of his tail and six feet from the high point of his shoulder to the bottom of his hoof. carried more weight than any oth-

er Hereford bull in the world. Kept in a double stall at the Gist Hereford farms, Jumbo attracted nationwide attention. Gist two-ton mark. Coming within 291 pounds of the goal, Jumbo started weight placed on his hoofs.

Gist said he would attempt to raise another bull surpassing the record that Jumbo made. Other cattlemen over this section of the country are endeavoring to gain the distinction of raising such a Hereford, but so far have not come near the mark set by the veteran breeder.

The tax of three per cent is levied on the consumer and will be collected by the distributing company which must transit it to the treasury once a month.
