Seniors Score Hit With Play

Unusual Talent Combined In Three-Act Comedy-Drama

With a brilliant array of talent, a splendid vehicle and the earmarks of careful coaching in every line, the Senior Class of 1933, Ozona High School, did themselves proud in one of the most entertaining class plays presented here in years last Thursday evening when they presented the 1933 play, "Who Wouldn't Be Crazy?" before a comparatively small audience in the High School auditorium.

One of the worst sandstorms of the year combined with the topsy-turvy condition of the street in front of the school building accounted for the comparatively small crowd. The auditorium was a little more than half filled and the crowd enjoyed the evening's entertainment to the fullest.

The play was a rollicking comedy centered around the antics of one "Speedy" Marshall who was incarcerated in a private sanitarium for the mentally unbalanced through an error. "Speedy" was the son of the chairman of the board of directors of the sanitarium and the latter, seizing on the opportunity to tame the young man down a bit, pretended not to know him and turned a deaf ear to his pleadings. There being many winsome lassies in and about the sanitarium and "Speedy" having an eye for feminine pulchritude fell in love with the place and when his father did seek to oust him, he turned the tables and pretended not to know his father.

The abduction of Lois Meredith, a visitor and friend of Evelyn Winslow, a wealthy and very beautiful patient, which stirred "Speedy" to the rescue, the antics of Pluribus, general utility of the sanitarium, and Pendie, Miss Meredith's colored maid, the loudly proclaimed accomplishments and reputation of a special policeman, "Hardboiled" McCafferty by name, wound through a maze of funny situations until the kidnappers were finally overhauled, the kidnapee rescued and the two "inside" accomplices, pretending to be patients, arrested.

Ben Williams as "Speedy" Marshall, Joe Glen Rape as his father, Tommy Smith as Lois Meredith, Carolyn Montgomery as Evelyn Winslow, Ernest Van Zandt as Pluribus, Totsy Robison as Pendie and Joe Billie Keeton as Hardboiled McCafferty composed the battery of big-time laugh makers in the rapid-fire barrage of mirth and amusement. Buddy Moore as Reggie Mortimer, beset by women on all sides but devoted to only one, Eugene Montgomery as superintendent of the hospital and an ardent admirer of the pretty head nurse, Neva Sorrels, Hubert Westfall as the fiance of Evelyn Winslow whose timely arrival restored her to good health, Joe Friend and Frances Green as the supposed hospital inmates who were in fact crooks in disguise, and Edna Billings, Ellen Schauer and Margaret Butler as friends of Miss Meredith's turned in splendid performances in the supporting cast.

The play was directed by Mrs. W. Jones and Guinn Carruthers and their splendid work was reflected in the smooth manner in which the big cast moved through the intricate developments in the play.

A reading "Bobby's Cottontail" by little Stanley Lemmons and a piano number by Miss Aleen Hampton constituted the between-act numbers enjoyed by the audience.

RAINS LAY DUST

Light showers here Wednesday afternoon served to settle the dust and give Ozona residents much needed relief from the dust clouds that have hung over the city for weeks. High winds and torn up streets had made the dust almost intolerable and residents were offering up thanks for even temporary relief.

Highway Work Reaches Town

Contracts For Application Of Caliche Near Complete

Road work, which has been in progress in three directions from Ozona for the past several months has reached the city and surfacing of the two highways connecting in the downtown section got under way within the city limits this week.

Cage Brothers, who have the contract for caliche surfacing of Highway 27 from the Sutton County line to Ozona, expect to finish their contract for this work by the end of this week or early next week, it is announced here. Colglazier and Hoff, contractors on the Barnhart road, are also surfacing with caliche within the city limits and also have recently started application of the double bituminous treatment, or black top, provided for in their contract.

Ozona residents along the route of Highway 27 through the city have been concerned with the matter of topping that highway, no contract having been let for the asphalt surfacing. County officials have been advised by the State Highway Department that an oil coating for the caliche base is being contemplated by the department, the maintenance division to apply the oil. It is possible, however, that some plan for an asphalt surface may be devised instead of the oil treatment. It is said that caliche dust is very harmful to shrubbery and it is feared by residents of the city that much damage will be done by the dust unless some action is taken toward surfacing the highway and for this reason the county is making every effort to induce the department to finish the road.

Curbs and gutters have been laid on most of Powell Avenue from the north edge of town to intersection of the highway with No. 27, and curb and gutter work has been started on Broadway from Powell Avenue east to the edge of town.

Removal of the handsome street lighting standards along Powell Avenue was necessary in order to install the curb and gutters. It is understood the West Texas Utilities Company will replace the standards in proper place as soon as the street work is completed.

Announce Honor Grads Of 1933

Eugene Montgomery & Margaret Butler Are Highest Ranking

Eugene Montgomery, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Montgomery, was announced as valedictorian of the graduating class of 1933 of Ozona High School, and Miss Margaret Butler, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Butler, as salutatorian following computation of averages for selection of honor graduates made the first of this week and announced by Supt. John L. Bishop.

These two students held the highest scholastic averages for their high school careers of any members of the class and rung up the highest averages recorded in the local school in many years. Eugene Montgomery scored an average of 93.07 and Miss Butler was a close second with 92.85.

An examination of grades for the two honor students reveals that save for one B plus grade, neither of them ever drew a grade of less than A minus in their entire high school work. This is considered a remarkable record. There are at present 26 candidates for high school diplomas from Ozona High School this year, the largest class ever recorded in the local school.

Cheaper Telegraph Service For Ozona

Western Union To Pay Phone Message To Barnhart

Arrangements were completed here the first of this week for a considerable saving for Ozona folk in the dispatch of telegrams, according to announcement of J. F. Wilson, superintendent of the Western Union system at Dallas, who was here to inaugurate the new plan.

Effective at once, local telegrams will be received at the Ozona Drug Store for dispatch by long distance telephone to the Western Union office at Barnhart. Under this arrangement, the telegraph company will pay the phone charges on all messages.

Heretofore, it has been necessary to telephone messages to the San Angelo telegraph office and the customer paid all telephone charges. The new plan will result in a considerable saving for users of this method of communication. Messages to the Barnhart office will be dispatched during office hours of the operator there, from 8 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon, and from 1 to 5 p. m. Rush messages at other hours will be sent to the San Angelo office as usual.

AMERICAN MORALE

The state bank holidays, culminating in the national holiday declared by the President, and events as they followed, have provided good insight into the national character.

There was no widespread eagerness whatsoever. In not a single instance was there anything resembling panic. The public realized that the holidays were essential to protect the interests of depositors, and made the best of it. It showed a splendid spirit of cooperation. It showed, too, that it is willing to do what the President recently asked—make necessary personal sacrifices in the national interest.

Any country's best asset is the morale of the people. The state of the public morale in this country is the most reassuring sign we have for future stability and recovery.

FAITH

A senator in opposing the emergency beer bill stated that President Roosevelt would have been elected in this last campaign even if he had advocated the repeal of the law of gravitation.

That is an exaggeration, but the faith the American people have in the president is sometimes startling. When the banks closed, many predicted that thousands would withdraw their money, but to their surprise the greater part of business for the first day was deposits.

President Roosevelt has made the people have faith in him and lose much of their cynical attitude. This faith in him will in time grow until man will again have faith in his brother. Then perhaps nations can again resume friendly relations and forget their selfish interests.

Perhaps Roosevelt means peace somewhere in the Great Far-Off. Who knows?

Austin—It is known that the costs of the State government for the next two years will be substantially lower than for the past two years. The single uncertainty is what may be done with reference to appropriations for support of the public schools. Other major appropriation bills have been finally passed by both houses of the Legislature. They represent reductions varying from 25 to 40 per cent. The aggregate reductions will probably be from 30 to 35 per cent.

However, the possibility of upsetting the results of the start toward economy—and it is only a start, notwithstanding the impressive savings made—is by no means remote. There are two very pressing influences that may supply the necessary support to bring about the enactment of laws that will open new sources of revenue, which would eventually neutralize the progress already made. These are the insistent demands of public schools for liberal appropriations and the desire to balance the State budget and wipe out the existing deficit during the next year or two at most.

Thus far, no general new taxes have been levied. The sales tax, which was the most important means suggested for raising new revenues, has been killed again. This time, its death is supposed to be final, but it is known that plans are being made to revive the idea, dress it up in a fresh Spring outfit, bring it out as the angel of public school education and the Santa Claus for sadly depleted county and city treasuries, through an ingenious proposal to split the proceeds between the schools, counties and cities. Basically, this is the familiar "aid" method of increasing taxes, which has been a prolific cause of the increase in the cost of government in this country for the past ten years.

Those who oppose new taxes

will need to be alert during the closing days of the session of the Legislature. It is also well to bear in mind that up to the present time the fundamental causes of high taxes have not been removed. Nothing has yet been done that will provide effective barriers against a return of extravagance, once the present emergency is passed. Changes have been proposed, which, if finally adopted, will give some degree of permanence to measures of economy. The fate of these really constructive changes is still uncertain and there seems to be possibility that some of them will fail.

The amendment in the Senate proposing to reduce the State ad valorem tax for general revenue purposes from 35 to 15 cents has been engrossed in the Senate but apparently lacks the required two-thirds support to submit it as a constitutional amendment.

The amendment placing an arbitrary limit on total expenditures of the State government has been finally passed by the Senate by the necessary two-thirds vote. It is yet to go through the House. The judiciary reorganization amendment, making drastic changes in the set-up of the courts and promising important economies, which passed the House some time ago, awaits an uncertain fate in the Senate.

Amendments proposing reorganization of costly county government are yet to be acted on. This is also true of a bill which proposes county unit system of public school administration. These latter two subjects are vital because local taxes are much more burdensome than State taxes.

The Senate has passed unanimously a bill limiting the amount of compensation which would be allowed county and precinct officials. The reductions will radically affect official incomes in counties of populations above 25,000. The top compensation allowed any county official in Texas would be \$5,000, and this would be possible only in counties above 150,000 population. The following

maximums have been set: Counties under 10,000 population, \$3,000; between 10,000 and 25,000, \$3,250; between 25,000 and 37,500, \$3,500; between 37,500 and 75,000, \$4,250; between 75,000 and 150,000, \$4,750; above 150,000, \$5,000. The rates do not apply to all fee officers alike. The maximums are for more important county officers. Lower figures are fixed for justices of the peace, constables, etc.

Typhoid Fever Is Classed "National Disgrace" By Brown

Austin, Texas, April 19.—Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, characterized typhoid fever as a National disgrace and an unnecessary evil, while discussing this preventable disease. He said, "Each year about six hundred Texans die of this disease and approximately six thousand are sick with it. The average duration of illness is about eight weeks; this means that the disease is responsible for the loss of 336,000 days in Texas each year.

Typhoid vaccine is a harmless solution. This is injected under the skin in the upper part of the arm, in three doses, usually at weekly intervals. It ordinarily protects against the disease from two or three years or longer, although one who is definitely exposed to infection should be re-vaccinated more frequently.

Typhoid fever can be controlled by the use of pure water, pasteurized milk or clean milk, clean foods, proper disposal of sewage, screening against the fly and destroying its breeding places, by search for and care of human carriers, and by the general practice of vaccination.

Certain people, apparently healthy, carry the germs of typhoid in their intestines or urinary tract and cause many cases of typhoid each year through handling foods with unwashed hands. They are called typhoid carriers and many cases result from personal contact with these carriers.

In selecting a place for a vacation choose one where you know that the water and milk supply is pure. Be sure that the kitchen and dining room are screened to protect food from flies. When camping it is best to boil water used for drinking, unless you know that it is pure. Clear, sparkling spring water may be polluted by drainage.

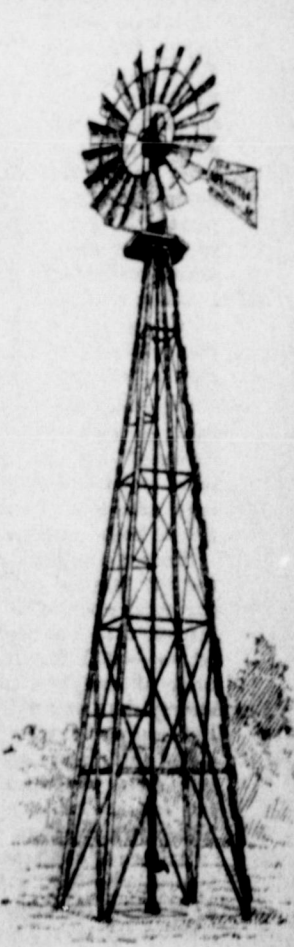

State Highways Bring \$28,800 In Extra Business To Crockett County Annually, Association Survey Shows

Austin, Texas, April 19.—Crockett County's state highway brings \$28,800 a year in extra business to the county in the form of tourist trade, the Texas Good Roads Association has estimated from a survey of the state's last official traffic census.

This business, the survey points out, does not include "natural" trade from local cars or those of adjoining counties, which obviously would increase with improved roads.

State checkers, from four days' actual count, found the average daily traffic of motor vehicles on Highway 27 to be 175.

Motor traffic in Texas is divided, the experts have found, in two almost equal classes. Roughly, half are local cars or from adjoining counties. The other half are from beyond the state, or from Texas points at least two counties distant. The latter are genuine tourists.

"On this basis, some 80 outside cars cross Crockett each day," the Association's survey said, "and if they spend as little as \$1 per vehicle within the borders of the county at tourist camps, hot dog stands, filling stations and stores, then Crockett County's highway means \$2,400 in added business per month, or \$28,800 a year. This is in addition to the convenience and saving to her own 2500 people, who operate some 1,000 cars themselves."

The survey, conducted by the Association for every county in Texas, was designed to show the importance of good roads to each community, and thus arouse public opinion against any further diversion of gas tax money, which would cripple the highway program.

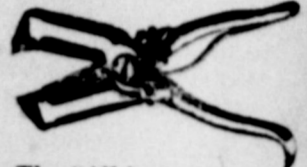
