





MEASLES

Few persons reach adult life without having measles, and one attack is usually the limit. In view of these facts many people have the idea that one might just as well expose himself to it and be through with it, as he is bound to get it sooner or later, anyhow.

While measles is not a serious disease we never know what case may terminate fatally. Its general mortality rate is about 5%.

Very brief exposure will communicate the disease to others; nor is it necessary to come into close contact with the patient.

More Than "Skin-Deep" Most people think of measles only in terms of the rash, whereas skin-deep. The changes in the mucous membrane lining the mouth, nose, eyes, throat and bronchial tubes are just as much complications and after-effects that go with measles. And the unfortunate part of it is that these complications occur mostly in callaren under four, who are the

The most common complications are broncho-pneumonia, in-The most dangerous of all is, of course, pneumonia-which occurs most often in children under two years of age.
