THE KILLER'S WEAPON

Fort Worth Star-Telegram: Asserting that the cost of crime annually in the United States has reached the tremendous total of \$13,000,000,000, Senator Copeland of New York has introduced a series of bills designed to give a more effective and unified control. One measure, regarded by the Department of Justice as the key bill, is designed to regulate commerce in small firearms.

First, the manufacturer would be licensed. He would sell only to licensed retailers, and the retailers in turn could sell only to persons authorized under the law to purchase pistols. The manufacturer would file with the Secretary of Commerce one bullet fired from each gun he manufactures, so that firearms in the hands of criminals could be traced. Each gun would be serially numbered.

Ammunition makers and dealers also would be licensed to supply ammunition only to persons legally in possession of guns. Purchasers would have cards with their photographs and fingerprints so there might be no mistake as to identify. Bases of bullets would be marked to distinguish various regions of the country. If a person were murdered in one region with a bullet from another region, the area of search for the criminal would be cut down.

What can be done about the 20,000,000 pistols now in the United States is another matter. And 79 per cent of the country's 12,500 annual homicides are committed with this type of weapon.

Production Loans Interest Rate Cut To New Low Level

HOUSTON, March 21.—Beginning March 16 and until further notice farmers and stockmen throughout the entire State of Texas securing production loans through the 50 Production Credit Associations which were recently established and embrace every county in the State, will have the benefit of what is probably the lowest rate of interest in the history of Texas agriculture, it was announced here Friday by Tully C. Garner, President of the Production Credit Corporation of Houston. The Production Credit Corporation provides the initial capital of production credit associations and supervises the organization and operation of these associations.

In referring to the low interest rates now available, Mr. Garner said: "The Production Credit Associations were recently set-up to

give the farmers and stockmen of Texas a reservoir of credit in good times and bad times at a low rate of interest. Up to the present, the rate of interest had been 6 per cent per annum, now the discount rate of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank has been lowered so that the associations can make loans to the farmers and stockmen at 5 1/2 per cent interest. This is probably the lowest rate that has ever been available to Texas farmers."

Mr. Garner pointed out that many applications for loans were being received daily by secretary treasurers of the local production credit associations throughout Texas. The latest reports received by the corporation at Houston indicate that approximately 9,000 applications for crop and livestock production loans amounting to \$2,900,000.00 have been made to the associations.

Historical Pageant Of Big Bend Honors West Texas Pioneers

ALPINE, Texas, March 21.—More than 300 students and citizens will participate in the Historical Pageant of the Big Bend, which will be presented by the Dramatic Department of Sul Ross State Teachers College on the night of April 28, honoring the pioneers of West Texas who have been in this section since 1890. This Pageant was written by Mr. W. A. Stigler and Mrs. Jamie M. Frank of the El Paso City Schools, and is to be given as a part of the dedicatory exercises of the college Outdoor Theatre at Kokernot Park. The theatre is built of native stone as a CWA project, will seat 1600 people, is fitted out with the most modern lighting equipment, and is located amid ideal surroundings.

These Duchesses will participate in the ceremonies at the crowning of the Sul Ross Queen, who is to be selected from the degree graduates of the institution by a vote of this group.

In connection with the Pageant Sul Ross will hold its first Home Coming for the more than 400 different students that have enrolled since the institution was established in 1920. A free barbecue will be given at Kokernot Park on Saturday afternoon, April 28th, in true Western style and in keeping with the genuine hospitality of the Big Bend people.

The Board of Regents for the State Teachers Colleges of Texas has chosen four of its members to represent the Board officially on this occasion.

Don't Levy Additional Taxes Is Slogan Of Campaign To Secure Payment Delinquent Taxes

WORTH—Salvation of local government by collection of delinquent taxes, not by levying of additional levies, is the keynote of a statewide campaign which is being sponsored by the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce in an effort to secure efficiency and solvency of governmental agencies.

A committee composed of Junior Chamber members from all parts of the state has been appointed to direct the educational campaign during the week beginning March 19. Newspaper editorials, radio speeches, chamber club meetings will be employed for the purpose of convincing the delinquent taxpayer on the necessity of paying back taxes and of not levying additional taxes when the legislature meets again in September.

The committee is headed by Bouldin of Mineral Wells. Bouldin pointed out that those who are financially unable to meet their taxes are not to be punished for payment, but every effort is to be made to encourage those who can pay to send their checks to the tax collectors, as a part of the campaign the Junior Chamber has been asked to set aside the week of March 19 as "Delinquent Tax Week," and every effort in the state will be made to issue a proclamation asking persons, where possible, to meet their unpaid tax obligations.

"The state today has over 120 millions in delinquent taxes," Bouldin said. "If this were not paid and local governments could not operate for an entire year without levying any additional taxes."

"Some of this old tax asset that is paid up it appears that the near future will be a heavy burden placed upon the effort to make up for the past few years."

"The Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce realizes that something must be done immediately to reduce outstanding tax debt and adopted this method of showing the people of Texas why delinquent taxes must be paid to prevent the future welfare and development of the state."

Bouldin pointed out that the program would not touch up-reform measures and that

the Junior Chamber would not take part in any political movement for collection or assessment of taxes.

Evaders Of Gas Tax Cough Up 3 Million As Result New Law

AUSTIN, Tex., March 21—Gasoline tax evaders "coughed up" more than \$3,000,000 in extra revenues to the state during the first nine months the new enforcement law was in operation, the Texas Good Roads Association estimated today from Comptroller George H. Shepperd's complete report for 1933.

Three hard-pressed state departments—schools, bond-refunding and highways, share in the captured bounty, the first two at the rate of \$750,000 each and the last named at \$1,500,000.

The impressive sum, regarded at the capitol as "just like finding money" because it took nothing from any other bureau and required no new taxation, came entirely from sources which had been able to avoid gas tax payment until violation was made a felony and the comptroller provided with adequate enforcement machinery.

A comparative table of gas tax payments, month by month, for both 1932 and 1933, compiled by J. W. McReynolds, the comptroller's chief of gas tax operations, shows vividly the value of new law.

Gasoline tax collections fell \$200,000 a month below 1932 during the first three months of 1933. The law was enacted March 21. April payments were off only \$63,000, while in May they jumped \$33,000 ahead of the previous May. June was \$122,000 ahead, August \$189,000, September \$303,000, and December \$465,000.

The improvement in tax payments ranged from a 10 per cent decrease in January to a 20 per cent increase in December.

An additional \$189,000 is involved in gas tax claims now in the courts, the comptroller reported.

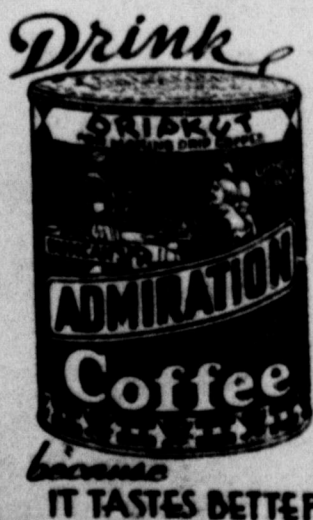

Fed. Intermediate Credit Bank Lowers Its Discount Rate

HOUSTON—The Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston has fixed its discount rate effective March 16, 1934, at 2½ per cent per annum. It was announced here Friday by Dwight P. Reordan, President of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank. The new discount rate of 2½ per cent is the lowest rate charged by the bank since its organization June 19, 1923. Since December 19, 1932 the rate had been 3 per cent per annum.

Mr. Reordan explained that these rates of discount are governed by the interest rate paid by the bank on its debentures and the favorable market for these securities is due to the recognition by investors of the fact that the Intermediate Credit Bank system has during its more than ten years existence been conducted along sound business lines.

"The Federal Intermediate Credit Bank does not make loans directly to individual farmers and stockmen but extends credit to financing institutions, which make loans for agricultural and livestock production purposes, such as production credit associations, State and National banks, livestock loan companies and agricultural credit corporations. This bank also makes direct loans to farmers' cooperative marketing and purchasing associations on the security of warehouse receipts or shipping documents covering staple agricultural commodities. The rate of interest which a credit institution may charge the farmer or stockman on a note discounted with the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank may not exceed the bank's current discount rate by more than 3 per cent per annum. While the new discount rate of the bank is in effect the maximum interest rate to the farmers and stockmen will be 5½ per cent per annum," Mr. Reordan said.

At the close of business Thursday, the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston had outstanding loans and discounts totaling approximately \$2,000,000.

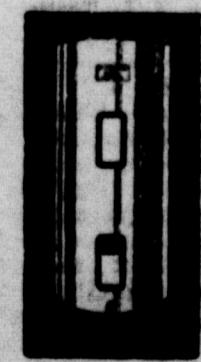
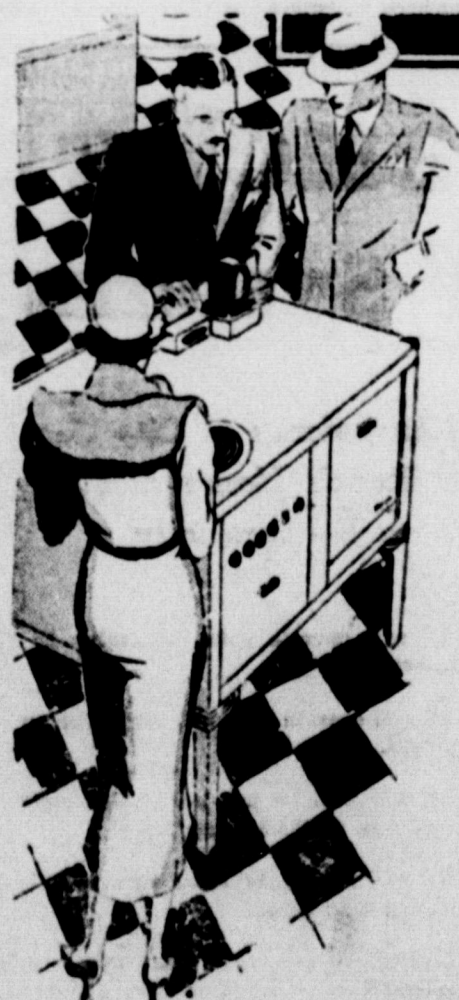
