## RELIEF WORK TO SUPPLANT CWA PROGRAM

Those Actually Needy  
To Be Cared For In  
New Set-Up

## SUSPEND PROJECT

No Jobs Available;  
Able Bodied Must  
Work For Relief

The complete termination of CWA activities on April 1st, will place the burden of supplying relief to indigent families of Texas on the shoulders of the following programs to be conducted by the Texas Relief Commission; Work Division (Work Relief), Direct Relief, The Subsistence Home-lands and the Rural Rehabilitation Projects.

The successful carrying out of these programs in Crockett County has entailed the creation and installation, by the Auditing Department of the Texas Relief Commission, of a materially changed accounting system. The new system, known as the Donnell Installed System of Relief Accounting, was made under the supervision of George R. Donnell, auditor of the Commission.

**Able Bodied To Work**  
Of particular interest in the new set-up is the new "Work Relief" card which will enable the administration to properly supervise the "Work Division" activities. Those unemployed, who are actually destitute and are physically able to work, after a thorough investigation has been made, definitely establishing their relief needs, will be given the opportunity to work and earn up to their stipulated relief need requirements. This work card is so designed as to limit the Payrolls to the actual relief requirements for such particular individual employed. Pay to persons not eligible for relief, or to relief clients in excess of the requirements of the individual family will not be approved in Austin. The new work card, though simple in form, will permit the definite placing of responsibility and indicate who is at fault if a client is allowed to earn from relief funds more than his relief budget requirements.

Staff Auditors, D. O. Harper & J. D. Montgomery of the Texas Relief Commission announced today, after a conference with County Relief Administrator, R. O. Smith, of the Crockett County Relief Board, that a thorough study

## Paving Program Near Completion

Rock Asphalt Surface  
To Be Used Around  
School Bldgs.

Rapid progress is being made toward completion of the paving program around the High and Grade school building here. The street from the Baptist church north to the foot of the hill and the short street between the high school building and the Church of Christ are to be paved under the program.

Purchase of a compressor machine for use in drilling blasting holes in the paving work was recently completed by the county and negotiations are now under way for the purchase of a power shovel for use in this and future road and street work in the county. Judge Charles E. Davidson was appointed by the court to negotiate for purchase of the shovel.

Uvalde rock asphalt is to be used as surfacing material on the two streets. The caliche base is now being placed and rolled ready for the topping. The work is being directed by Engineer J. S. Barlow, in charge of CWA improvement projects here.

## Unique Bell Ringing Service To Be Held By Baptist Church Sunday Commemorating 42nd Anniversary

Something unique in the way of religious services is announced for next Sunday by Ozona Baptists. Commemorating the forty-second anniversary of the church here, there will be a public bell ringing service, the first ringing of a Baptist Church Bell in Ozona for five years.

When the local congregation erected the present building five years ago the bell alone of the old property was retained. Due to economic conditions the bell was not erected at that time, but within the last month a beautiful concrete pedestal, conforming to the architecture of the church edifice, has been erected and the bell placed thereon. As a precautionary measure the clapper has been taken from the bell and will only be replaced when the bell is officially put into service next Sunday.

The bell-ringing service will begin at 11:00 o'clock Sunday in the church auditorium where the pastor will preach on the subject, "When Church Bells Ring". Following the sermon the crowd will repair to the church yard for the bell ringing. Mrs. W. E. West, only living charter member of the church, is scheduled to be the first to ring the bell. Others who will ring the bell are the oldest member of the church; members who came into the church prior to 1900; present pastor and deacons.

Appropriate music will mark the occasion including a special musical number, "When They Ring Those Golden Bells for You and Me," by a male quartet.

With this public function the bell will be regularly put into use and will be rung for each service of the church as a reminder and a call to worship. The church extends cordial invitation to the community to attend the bell ringing.

## Two Indictments Returned By Jury

Birdsong Negro Charged  
With Murder, An-  
derson With Theft

Two bills of indictment were returned by the grand jury impaneled Monday morning by District Judge Joe Montague at the opening of the regular April term of court here.

One of the indictments charges murder against Cecil Birdsong, negro, in connection with the fatal shooting of Gene Williams, another negro, on an Ozona street the night of January 29. Birdsong, who came here from El Paso to persuade his wife, Cassie Birdsong, to return to El Paso with him, he told officers, found her with Williams at the picture show and followed them home, the shooting resulting from an argument during that walk.

David Anderson is charged in the other indictment with theft of property over the value of \$50, a felony offense. Anderson is charged with the theft of a bag of wool from P. T. Robison.

Grandstand May Be

With a new grandstand at Powell athletic field in prospect for the season, a potentially powerful team in daily workouts in preparation for the season's chase, and a well-balanced league of four teams entered, Ozona baseball fans are licking their chops in anticipation of the opening game of the West Texas Independent League pennant chase on the local lot the first Sunday in May, the champion Texon Oilers opening the season here on that date against the Giants.

Plans have been drawn up for a 60-foot grandstand to be constructed along the first-base line, on the west side of the athletic field, and it is understood that financing of the project has reached such a stage that officials are about ready to award contract for its construction. Scott Peters, secretary-treasurer of the West Texas Independent League and a strong backer of the Giants, is heading the campaign for construction of the grandstand.

Jess Wade, who played second base for the Giants last year and was one of the leading hitters of the team for the season, will be back in Giant uniform this season, if negotiations now under way are successful. Mr. Wade, a member of the contracting firm of J. S. Wade & Sons, highway contractors, has been offered a position with the road maintenance division of the county and is expected to accept it. Four other recruits, sought from the San Antonio league, may be added to the string before the season opening to make a strong Ozona aggregation in the pennant gallop.

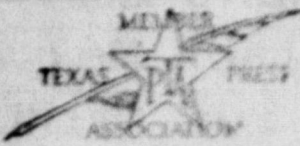

ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

One of the most difficult problems industry and government have faced during the past year is how to finance business expansion. Many industries would like to build and improve plants, believe that conditions justify it. But the eternal question of "What shall we use for money" has been unanswered. Very few private issues of securities have been floated since Mr. Roosevelt took office. The stringent securities act has prevented the issuance of a number that were planned. And tremendous governmental borrowing through sale of bonds, has taken about all the investment capital the nation has been able to provide.

Consequently, there has been talk of direct government loans to industry for some time. First tangible manifestation came on March 16, when Jesse Jones, able RFC head and Texas millionaire, sent a bill to the senate. Most of the bill dealt with routine RFC matters—buried almost out of sight, is a subsection, was as time put it, a "whole new world of government money lending."

The proposal would permit any business to borrow RFC funds "for the purpose of furnishing working capital, reducing and refinancing existing indebtedness or making plant improvements or replacements." Industries receiving loans would have to be NRA plants, would have to employ ten or more men. The RFC would thus go into general commercial banking on an unprecedented scale.

Another and similar bill followed Mr. Jones' proposal. It is different in this respect—while it would make possible direct governmental loans to industry, it would not create so complete a banking structure. Its method would be to set up intermediate credit banks in each Federal Reserve District which would discount or purchase long-term obligations issued by companies to produce working capital.

Industry's reaction to either bill is liable to be mixed. Executives would like the money, and they need it. But there will unquestionably be considerable fear that it would give government a remarkable opportunity to further cement its control over industrial management.

Since the war major labor strikes have been almost unknown. Now spurred by the NRA, with its collective bargaining guarantee for labor, the unions are out to organize American industry 100 per cent.

Result is that the entire automobile industry, which has always been open-shop, is threatened with a shutdown. A. F. of L. Automobile Workers' Union demanded a 20 per cent wage increase—and recognition. The National Automobile Chamber of Commerce replied that it would advise its members to cut hours from 40 to 36 a week and raise wages to compensate, even though pay is now higher than it was in 1929, when changes in cost of living are considered. Ford, which is not a member of the Chamber, announced resumption of the \$5.00 a day minimum, bringing the entire industry into line so far as better pay is concerned.

When it came to recognition, however, matters were not so easy. General Motors said that its employe-representation plan, through which workers bargain

with executives, was going well, that it had never discriminated against union-labor and so could not be expected to discriminate against non-union labor. The Automobile Chamber became audible again, saying that it would not recognize the A. F. of L.

The Administration, which has a strong voice in deciding such matters, is left in a tough position. The automobile industry is the best example of better business—it can't afford to have it disrupted. On the other hand, it is sympathetic to union labor. There will be many weeks of talking, threatening and plain ordinary bluffing on all sides before the problem is definitely settled.

POLITICAL NOTE: A few months ago "everybody" was forecasting that this Congress would be as rubber-stamp as the last—that the President would have no trouble in running the show. "Everybody" was wrong. The St. Lawrence Waterway Treaty is near to the heart of the Administration—and the Senate turned it down. And House and Senate have refused Presidential decrees opposing the soldiers' bonus and restoration of federal workers' pay-cuts—both are contained in the Independent Offices Bill.

The morning after also brings good hope.

### Oil Production Shows Increase

#### Records Hike Of Over Year Ago, W. T. Declines

Austin, Texas, April 4.—Daily production of oil in Texas in February was 919,350 barrels compared with 812,450 in February, 1933, a gain of 106,900 barrels, or 13 per cent, according to the report of the University of Texas School of Business Research. Production was divided by region as follows:

Permian, 49,350 barrels as compared with 43,050 in February of 1933; North Texas, 54,500 compared with 46,238; West Texas, 26,150 compared with 26,150; East Texas, 128,950 compared with 157,738; East Central, 43,150 compared with 58,430; West Central, 413,900 compared with 299,513; Southwest Texas, 250 compared with 49,575; Gulf Coast, 160,000 compared with 133,462.

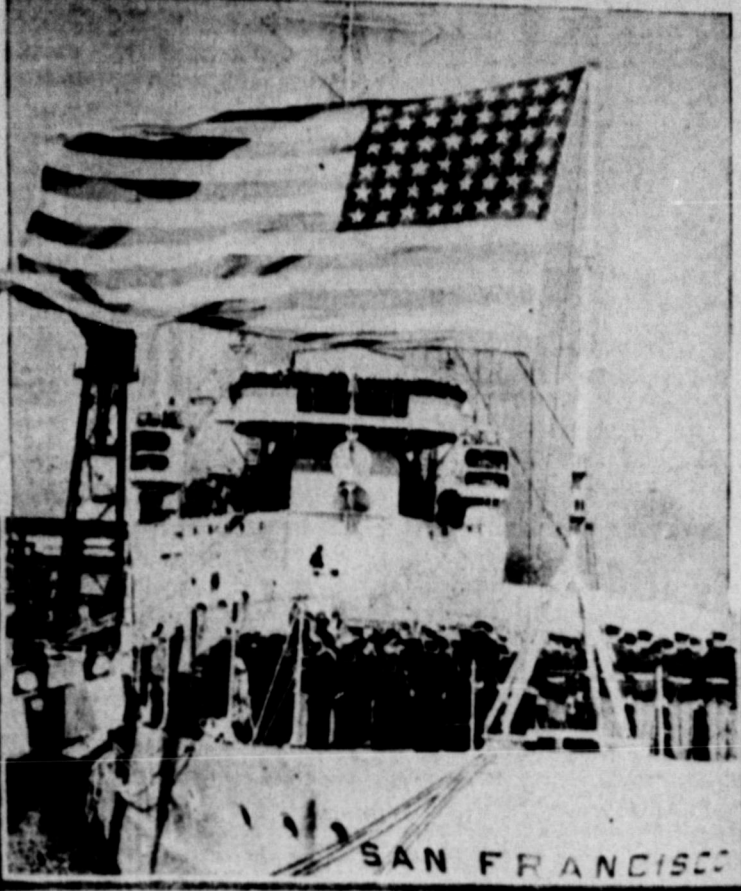
Production in the United States in February averaged 2,245,000 barrels daily, compared with 2,250,000 during February last year. While imports averaged 127,000 barrels daily, compared with 134,000 during the corresponding last year.

A total of 783 permits were issued in February for new wells in Texas, as compared with 783 in February last year. Completed numbered 627 as compared with 443. Oil production obtained in 442 wells during February as compared with 291 in February, while gas was produced from 30 wells as compared with 26 in the corresponding last year. ### Auto Accidents More Lethal Than Diseases In Texas

Austin, Texas, April 4.—A herd of wild horses was responsible for approximately one thousand deaths in Texas last year, according to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. Under the hood of the automobile are from 40 to 100 horses. Whether these are tame or wild and dangerous to human life depends to a large extent upon the drivers. Pedestrians, also, must be "safety minded," if the number of lives lost in fatal automobile accidents is reduced.

In cities, hundreds of thousands of people in the aggregate deliberately and habitually throw caution to the winds by jay walking, by crossing streets at all points but at intersections, by dodging around street cars and even by deliberately disregarding traffic signals. And highway walkers also are more likely to move with, rather than against traffic, which of course results in greater risk, especially at night.

The automobile driver himself, intoxicated by the joy of effortlessly stepping up his machine to an excessive speed, and in hundreds of other ways violating the rules and the ethics of the road, makes of this magnificent invention the Frankenstein it has so sadly turned out to be.

It needs to be more emphasized upon the average brain than it is today, that all the healthful living in the world is of no avail when one either as a driver or as a pedestrian takes chances with the automobile and loses. Moreover, proper water and milk control, as well as the many other safeguards to health and life, mean absolutely nothing to a dead man killed by his or another's automobile.

**Form Legislation Causes Uncertainty In Business Activity**

Austin, Texas, April 4.—Uncertainty regarding the immediate trend of business and industrial activity has been gradually developing during the past few weeks as a result of impending reform legislation in Washington, according to Dr. F. A. Schell, assistant director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. In his monthly review of general business conditions, written for the Texas Business Review, which is published by the bureau, he said:

"During last week this situation was intensified and reached acute stage because of the crisis which threatens to disturb industrial relations at a time when outputs in the important automobile and steel centers are approaching their seasonal peak. Although the government ending program may offset the respective decline in private initiative, a pause, at least, is likely in the general upward trend of business."

"The attitude assumed by the administration in settling the threatened automobile strike has extraordinary significance at this time. Any evidence that the administration distinctly favors union domination would stimulate strikes throughout the country and greatly prolong the duration of those now in progress. Significant also is the fact that hours of work and rates of pay are not at issue in the present crisis, for the automobile industry apparently has met the demands of labor and the NRA in these respects. On certain features involving the principle of open versus closed shop are still in dispute."

"Industries connected with the production of consumer's goods have already traveled a long way toward recovery. The heavy industries, however, and especially those engaged in the production of capital goods continue to lag behind. Employment conditions in private industry from which recovery may be expected to improve largely in proportion to the extent that the capital goods industries get under way."

had been made of Crockett County Relief Problems and the new system installed. Miss Mildred Davis will take charge of the new set-up here effective April 1, as Certifying Officer under R. O. Smith, Administrator.

**Relief, Not Project Program**  
The new relief set-up to be used in this county has the specific approval of Washington officials, and it is believed that Kansas and Oklahoma, who recently sent officials to Austin to confer with State Relief Officials and to study the Texas Relief Accounting Set-up, may install this system in the relief work in their own respective states.

Chief Auditor Donnell emphasizes that this is a Relief Program, not a Project Program. Under the CWA, group employment was provided which approximated current business wages, whereas the present Relief Program can only supply Relief to the Destitute. When the building of roads, school-house construction or other projects takes the place of the first objective, that of giving relief, the relief program has gone astray, and such expenditures constitute an erroneous expenditure of Funds according to the terms of the Relief Acts under which Relief Funds are made available.

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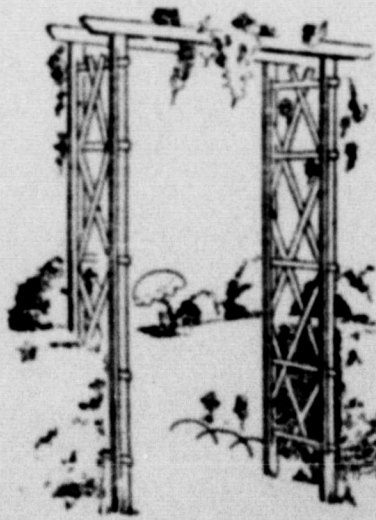
