Drouth Break-Up With Good Rains

Temperature Drops As Drouth-Parched Areas Are Soaked

Although scattered, rains which visited this area early Monday morning were bountiful in some ward reviving the drouth-parched torium Monday morning. ranges, and raised hopes that the long-awaited break-up of the long drouth is at hand.

The rain came on the wings of the first norther of the season which swept down in the early morning hours Monday to the accompaniment of violent electrical disturbances. The enrollment gains were made in the kindergarten, with an increase of four, a hike of four in the second grade, twelve in the fourth grade, one in the sixth grade and fifteen in the seventh grade. The third grade lost seven and the fifth grade lost eight, making a net gain of 21 pupils. The first grade enrollment was the same as last year.

Total Enrollment 285

The opening-day enrollment by grades was as follows: Kindergar ten, 18; first grade, 24; second grade, 29; third grade, 19; fourth grade, 29; fifth grade, 18; sixth grade, 28; seventh grade, 30. The high school enrollment was 90. the same as a year ago, the total for the eleven grades being 285. Enrollment figures were not available for county schools outside of the city.

In his introductory remarks, Superintendent Denham called attention to the fact that this is the 43rd annual opening. that the first opening, in 1891, was in a frame structure, with three teachers and approximately 50 pupils. 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

645 Deaths In Texas Last Year Due To Pellagra

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 5-Six hundred and forty-five Texans died last year of pellagra, declared Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, Pellagra is a disease that it caused by lack of proper foods. It comes on slowly and may not be recognized until the victim begins to have a sore mouth, stomach trouble and reddening and scating of the skin. When these symptoms appear the disease has been present for some

The longer a person has pellagra the harder it is to cure, so one should be on the lookout for the early symptoms such as nervousness, indigestion, and burning of the feet and hands. The disease may become so severe as to affect the mind.

Pellagra is not contagious. As long as a person cats enough of the right kind of food and is not otherwise diseased, he is in no danger even if he lives with a pellagra patient.

The prevention of pellagra depends upon eating the right kind of food at all times. To make sure that the diet is right, it should alfresh vegetables as possible.
