Austin, June 16--A child's habits are responsible, in a large measure, for their mental actions in later life, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. A child of five or six years may have a bad temper. He can be taught as he grows older, to exercise self control so that it will not often be manifested. It would be better for him had he acquired a good temper instead of a bad one.

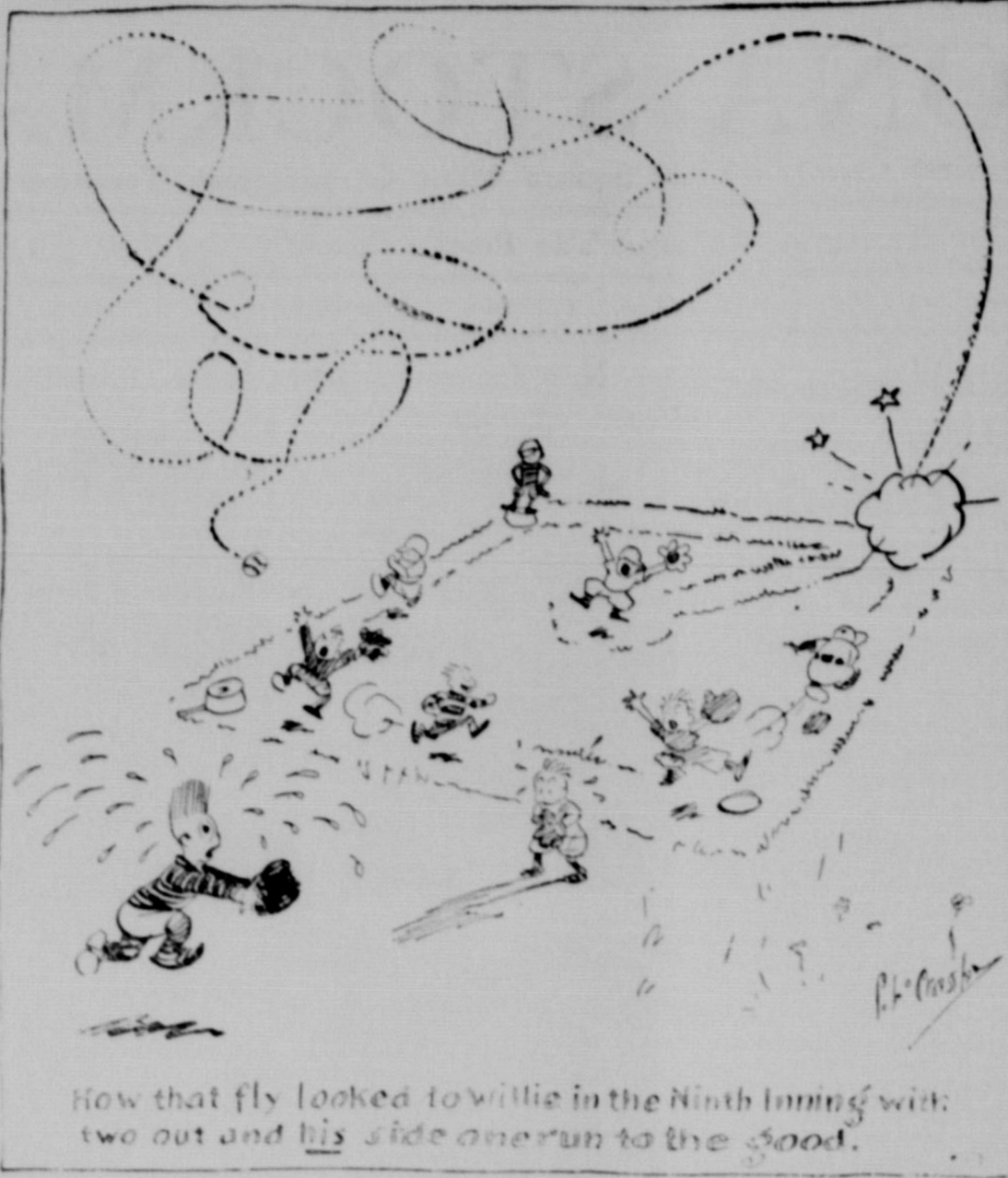
Today the medical profession understands more fully the enduring influence of habits that begin in the earliest years of life, in the nursery, or even in the cradle. In the young child, as a result of habit, certain types of behavior become established.

Perhaps the child had learned while yet an infant, that he could get what he wanted if he cried long and loud. Perhaps he had learned, when a little older, that bad behavior, as tantrums, screaming, rolling on the floor or sulking brought him what he wanted after his request had been refused or ignored.

Other behavior habits, good and bad, are acquired from imitating older children and adults. Calmness and poise, as well as nervous and panicky behavior habits established by imitation and made permanent by repetition. The elders are responsible far more than they realize for the conduct of the child in the family. In this we see a new meaning of the old adage, "As the twig is bent, the tree is inclined."

Move University Land Office From Angelo To Midland

Austin, June 16--The University of Texas lands geological division has been moved from San Angelo to Midland, it has been announced. Practically all of the major companies and many independent operators have located their division offices at Midland, and it was to be near them that the change of headquarters of the geological division of the University has been made, it was explained by Dr. H. P. Bybee, head of the division and professor of geology at the main University at Austin.

The corps of surveyors who have been making a re-survey of the two million acres of University lands in West Texas, will continue to make headquarters in San Angelo until they have completed compiling their field notes, the actual running of the lines having been finished. Frank F. Friend is in charge of the survey.

The geological field staff of the University has examined more than fifty thousand well samples and plotted one thousand well logs. There is oil production in seven fields in five counties on University lands, from which there has already been recovered approximately 150,000,000 barrels of oil of which the University has received a royalty share.

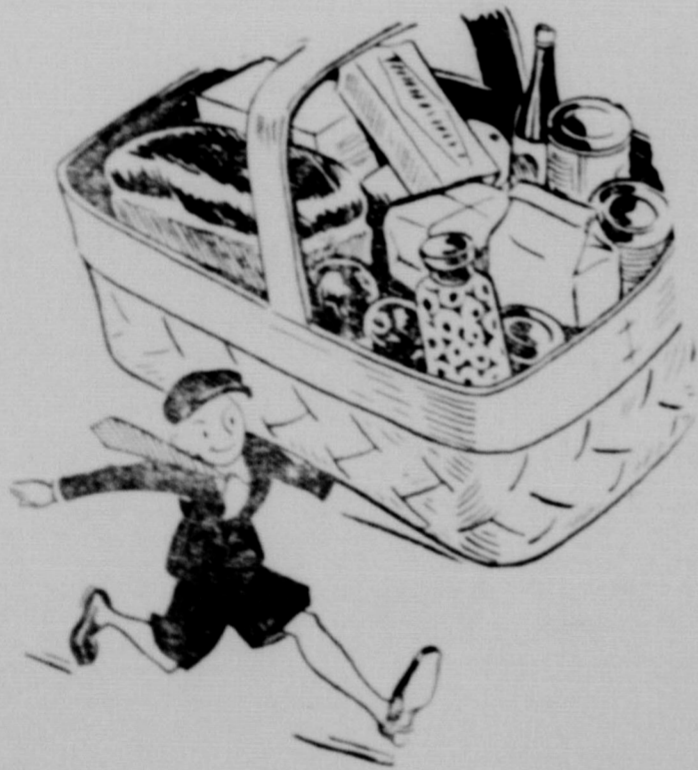

Texas State College for Women

Denton, June 16 — A strange combination of deserts, canyons and fertile valleys awaits the visitor who heads down from Lubbock to the land "West of the West." Possibly the most interesting route is across the line into New Mexico, where Carlsbad Caverns provide interest and beauty. Swinging back into Texas by way of Guadalupe Peak and into Paso, the traveler may catch the first view of Old Mexico in the city of Juarez, with its ancient missions and motley population. Immediately south of El Paso the cultivated areas of the Grande Valley appear, and in the midst of the oldest community in the state are the missions of Santa Rita and Socorro.

Southeastward the Davis mountains, rising a mile above sea level, are famed for their scenic beauty, healthy climate and historical importance. Here also is Mount Locke, where the University of Texas is building the McDonald Observatory with the second largest telescope in America. No good Texan can skip a detour into the Big Bend country in the southern tip of this western section. The continually producing Shafter silver mine is located here, and farther on are the impressive Los Chisos (The West) mountains.

After a good look at the Santa Elena Canyon of the Rio Grande, with its 1,800-foot walls, the visitor can well understand the state's trying to acquire enough land in this territory for a state park. Two hundred and fifty thousand acres of the proposed 1,000,000-acre tract has already been acquired, and the Mexican government is planning to match the Texas acreage with land just across the border. The completed international park will include 2,000,000 acres.

Practical Cookery

Dept. Home of Economics

Denton, June 16— Since breakfast time is one of the loveliest hours of a summer day, its possibilities should not be wasted. While the sun is bright but not hot and the air is still a little crisp, the smart housewife can serve a cheerfully simple meal that is guaranteed to contract any amount of "getting up on the wrong side of the bed."

Many fresh fruit can be obtained at reasonable prices throughout the summer, and one cannot serve too many of them. Nor is it necessary to stick to one particular kind of fruit every morning, when with a little effort berries, peaches, apricots and others can be found.

Menus

1. Cantaloupe, French toast, butter, poached eggs, coffee.
2. Fresh peaches with sugar and top milk, Post Toasties with milk, scrambled eggs, buttered toast, coffee or milk.
3. Blackberries with sugar and top milk, shredded wheat with milk and cream, bacon, toast, coffee or milk.

4. Cantaloupe, bacon and eggs, popovers, coffee, milk.
5. French figs, toasted rolls with strawberry jam, creamed cod fish and boiled potatoes, milk, coffee.

Recipes

FRENCH TOAST: 3 eggs, 6 t. milk, 6 slices of bread about 3/8 in. thick, 1/2 t. salt and pepper. Beat eggs together in a pan. Add milk and seasoning; dip slices of bread in egg mixture and fry in rather large amount of fat until golden brown. Serve with syrup or honey. Butter is not needed since some fat was absorbed in the cooking process.

SCRAMBLED EGGS: Eight eggs plus 1 t. milk for each egg plus 1/2 t. salt plus 1 t. butter plus 1/2 t. pepper. Beat eggs lightly to mix yolk and white; add salt, pepper and milk. Heat French pan and put in butter; when it is melted add the egg mixture. Cook until of a creamy consistency from 3 to 5 minutes, depending on the surface of the pan. As eggs cook, stir to allow the uncooked to come in contact with the pan. Do not overcook.

POPOVERS: 2 c. flour, 2 c. milk or milk and water, 1 t. salt, 3 eggs, 1 t. butter. Beat the eggs until light and then add liquid and flour alternately (salt is added to flour). Melt butter and add to mixture. Heat pans and grease well with fat. Fill pans only half full of mixture. Place in hot oven. Bake 45 minutes. Heat may be reduced when popovers expand after 15-20 minutes. These are very crusty with hollow centers and if cooked too short a time will have a layer of raw dough on the inside. Will make 12 popovers.

CREAMED CODFISH: 1 pt. water, 1 lb. codfish, 1 pt. milk, 2 T. butter, 2 T. flour. Shred the fish and put into frying pan. Cover with water and cook until tender. When done and water is boiled out, add 1 pt. of thin white sauce (omit the salt); heat all together and pour into hot serving dish. Garnish with slices of hard cooked eggs.

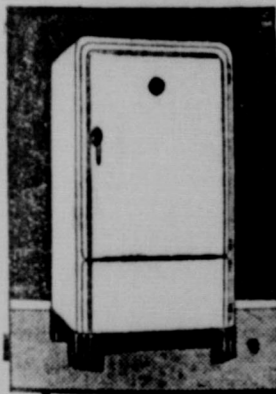

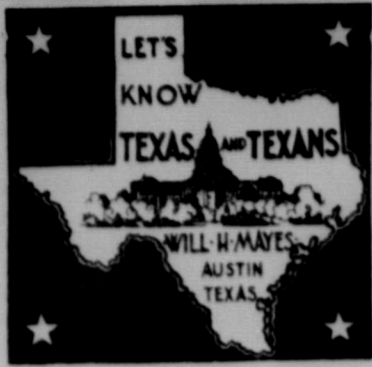

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Q. In what way did George Fisher make himself especially objectionable to Texans?

A. When the Mexican General Teran, found it impossible to enforce customs collections at Galveston, Fisher was without a position, and offered his services, which were accepted, as secretary of the ayuntamiento at San Felipe. He was soon caught doctoring his reports and was discharged in disgrace.

Q. Where and when was the Huston-Johnston duel fought?

A. At Chalk Bluff, near Texana, on the Lavaca River, Feb. 7, 1837.

Q. How many and what provisions of the Social Security Act are now in operation in Texas and how many are beneficiaries of the act?

A. Eight of the ten provisions now apply to Texas, under which about 956,000 Texans are directly benefited. Those in operation cover unemployment compensation; aid to the needy aged; maternal and child health service; services for crippled children; child welfare services; vocational rehabilitation and public health service. Constitutional amendments will be voted on in August to permit Legislative compliance with requirements in regard to the needy blind under 21 years of age and assistance of destitute children.

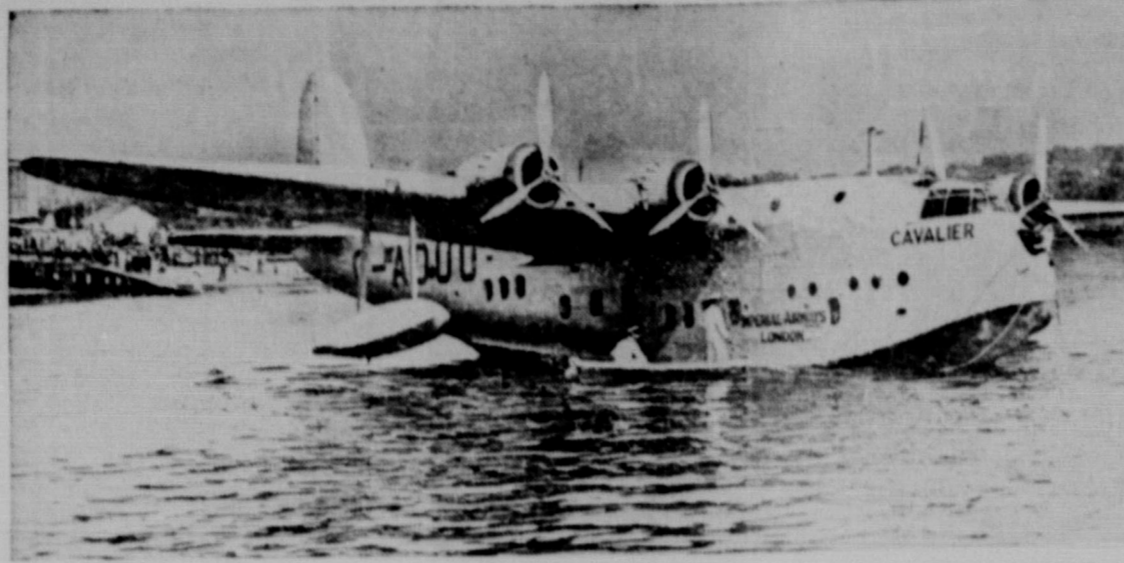
Q. What prominent Mexican official in 1830 laid before the Mexican Congress a plan to establish penal colonies in Texas?

A. Lucas Alaman, minister of relations, alarmed by the rapid colonization of Texas by families from the United States, proposed Feb. 8, 1830, to increase the Mexican population of Texas by making it a penal settlement, the convicts to be employed in agriculture. He also proposed to suspend the colonization laws as applied to Texas and place that department under the general government. Other radical suggestions for preventing Americanization of Texas were proposed by him.

Q. Under whose administration were Anglo-Americans practically excluded from Texas, and overtaxed, and for what reason?

A. Under Bustamante in 1830 under fear that the United States was planning to get Texas from Mexico by settlement and purchase. Bustamante attempted to enforce his decrees by placing garisons and posts at various Texas points, notably at Nacogdoches, Anahuac, Velasco, San Antonio and Goliad. He made his plan more impressive and objectionable by giving many of his forts Aztec names, such as Tenoxtitlan, Lipantitlan and the like.

British Plane Blazes Trail for Overseas Line



Pictured at the airways base at Port Washington, L. I., is the British 15-passenger flying boat "Cavalier" after completing the first east-west survey flight from Bermuda. These survey flights are in preparation for the eventual trans-Atlantic passenger service which will be jointly operated by the Imperial Airways and Pan-American Airways. Simultaneously with the Cavalier's flight, a Pan-American Sikorsky clipper made the west-east flight to Bermuda.

Q. What two Americans were given important positions in the Mexican effort to nationalize Texas?

A. George Fisher, native of Serbia, but naturalized in 1822, was made "administrator of the port of Galveston," and John D. Bradburn, a Kentuckian, who had been a Mexican officer for a number of years, was placed in command at Anahuac. Both proved obnoxious to Anglo-American Texans.

Q. What Texas A. & M. College students will tour European cotton centers this summer, for what purpose, and how will the trip be financed?

A. H. E. Hampton, College Station; R. N. Connolly, Corpus Christi; and Bailey Carnahan, San Antonio, chosen as high-ranking agricultural students of the college, will tour England, Belgium, Germany, France and Switzerland to study problems in research for the cotton industry, sailing June 19. They will be conducted by Dr. L. G. Jones, the college agronomist, and the trip will be financed by the college style show and the Texas cotton trade.

Q. When does the Texas teachers' retirement insurance law become effective and how is it to be financed?

A. Teachers may pay 5 per cent of their salaries into the fund, beginning Sept. 1, 1937. Payments will be compulsory after September 1, 1938. The state will match these teachers' payments. Those who do not wish the insurance may claim exemption from the payments within 90 days from Sept. 1, 1937.

Q. What were the leading inducements for Texans to side with Santa Anna in his revolt against Bustamante?

A. They thought that the quickest way to secure separate statehood for Texas was to get rid of obnoxious garrisons foisted upon them, to avoid payment of customs duties and to secure nullification of the ban against Anglo-American immigration.

Q. By what name was Market street, San Antonio, once jocularly known?

A. In the early days when the jail was on Main Plaza, San Antonians often referred to Market street as "Calaboose street."

Q. Is there available a list of

Texas cities with planning boards or organizations?

A. In 1936 the following cities reported such boards: Amarillo,

Austin, Beaumont, Brownsville, Brownwood, Bishop, Childress, Cleburne, Coleman, Corpus Christi, Corsicana, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Fort Worth, Graham, Grand Saline, Galveston, Highland Park, Hereford, Houston, Jasper, Longview, Marshall, Mount Pleasant, Pampa, Paris, San Antonio, Sherman, San Angelo, Sweetwater, Taylor, Tyler, Waco, and Wichita Falls.

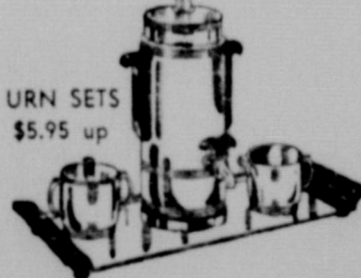

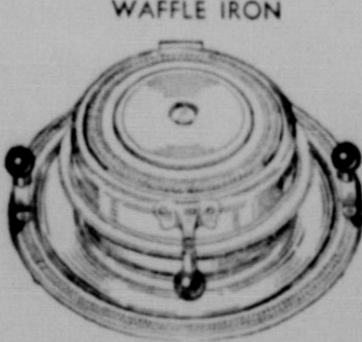

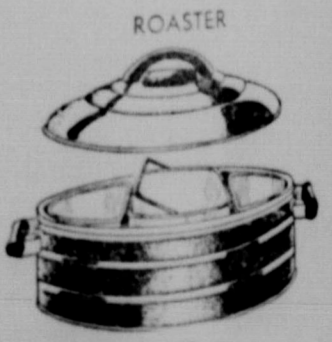

Funeral For Capt. J. B. Gillett, Father Of Ozonan, Held Sun.

Funeral services were held Sunday in Marfa for Captain J. B. Gillett, widely known West Texan, former Texas Ranger and author of "Six Years a Texas Ranger," who died in a Temple hospital Friday from a heart ailment. Hundreds of friends from throughout the area attended last rites for one of the most colorful characters in West Texas.

Captain Gillett had resided in Marfa for many years, and until recently operated his famous Barrel Springs ranch, now managed by his son, Milton. His latter years were spent in pursuit of his hobby of collecting relics of early days in the Big Bend.

Steer Unbelling Thrill Feature Of Celebration

Wild Mare Race Daily Another New Thrill For Stands

Of the many new features in store for visitors to Ozona's tenth annual rodeo and celebration here July 1, 2 and 3, one that gives a great promise as any for a super thrill for the grandstand is the steer unbelling.

Cowboys alighting from horses to tackle the horns of a badly frightened and decidedly peevish Brahma steer, with intent to remove a bell from the animal's neck, constitutes this new thriller on the menu for this year's show. To those who have seen the vicious Brahma in action in the rodeo arena, there is no need to call attention to the fact that the hapless cowboy whose lot it is to dismount and remove the bell has his hands plenty full of trouble. In the first place, the full grown Brahma steer can make it uncomfortable for even the biggest horse in a tug of war with a lariar rope, and a lone cowboy trying to hold a big fellow's head still enough to unbuckle a bell presents a picture of trouble. And in the second place, the Brahma is notoriously bad tempered and handy with his horns, and that's something else the cowboy has to worry about and the stands to thrill over.

The steer unbelling will take the place of the wild cow milking contest that had featured rodeos of the past. But this year instead of a dribble of milk in a bottle from a wild, bucking cow, the bowlegged cowboy will race back to the judges stand with a bell taken from a wild Brahma steer's neck—that is, provided he is able to get the bell.

This year, again, rodeo visitors will get an extra thrill in a wild mare race each afternoon of the three days. Heretofore, this feature has been a one-day affair. Rodeo judges this year will be E. W. Hutcherson, sheriff of Sutton County, Ray Willoughby and Len Mertz of San Angelo.

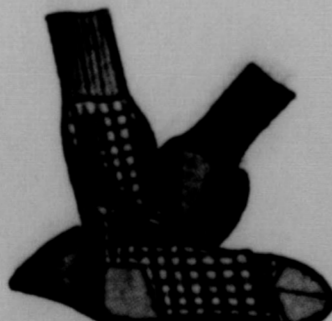
