> The local parent-teacher group of each community endeavors to ready to enter school next fall. take these children to their family physician for a physical examination so that any defects they might have may be corrected during the summer months. It takes the special knowledge which a physician has acquired to discover and remove any physical or mental handicap which threatens a child's well-being. A fall check up is made of these same children, with the result that the child entering school for the first time may be as free from physical and mental handicaps as possible.

> It is a most essential factor in the life of each child that he be free from all physical defects in order that he may do his best work when in school. The child has been allowed to play most of his time until he comes of school age, so it is most important that all handicaps be removed when he is asked to take up that part of his career which has to do with his mental training. The child who does not hear or see well would not be able to get the same benefits from his school work as the child who does not have these

> handicaps. Each child entering school should be immunized against diphtheria and smallpox.

As the child begins to mingle with numbers of other children, it is also necessary that he be instructed as to personal cleanli-
