## Giants Pointing To Topple League Leading Gultmen

### Locals Seek To Salvage Old Wound Of Early Season Drubbing

New confidence and two new recruits that will be eligible for competition in the pending week-end campaign against the Permian Basin league leaders from Crane, together with a new determination manifested in the daily work-outs, are factors that followers of the Ozona Giants are counting on to bring the locals back in the second-half Basin running next Saturday and Sunday.

Charlie Bryant, fresh from setting 'em afire in the East Dixie league under the Palestine colors, and Otto Robertson, catcher and utility man, farmed out by the Boston Red Sox, with whom he has just signed a contract, are the new faces that are to be seen in the Giant line-up on the coming week-end. Bryant won five and lost one game in a short sojourn with the Palestine team in the East Dixie league, where he went after a few weeks with the Giants during the first half of the present season. Robertson went thru the East Dixie league spring training period, played with the Odessa team early in the season and went to the McCamey Refiners when the Odessa team went virtually in a body to that team upon disbanding of the Odessa line. He was recently signed up by a scout for the Boston Red Sox, but in the Permian Basin league he is reasoning the balance of the present season.

The tough Crane aggregation, league top-notchers after knocking off the until-then-undefeated Texon Oilers two in a row last week-end, are due for a bouncing at the hands of the Giants if there is any justice of reciprocity. The situation was identical but positions reversed late in the first half when the Giants were leading the league and the Cranes were well down in the standing column. At Crane on that memorable week-end the locals were downed two in a row, which defeats seriously threatened their league lead.

With that black Saturday and Sunday in mind, Ozona partisans are likely to be on hand in numbers on the coming series to see their Giants apply the salve to that old wound by smacking the hard-hitting Cranes for a brace of games. Saturday's imbroglio is slated to get under way at 4 p. m. and Sunday's at 3.

## Giants Get Back In Running With Twin Win Sunday

### Locals Hitch Up, Take Pair From McCamey Refiners

Swinging back into old form, the first-half champion Ozona Giants took a new lease on life and a new hope in the second half Permian Basin pennant chase last Sunday when they plastered the McCamey Refiners two games in a double-header bill on the McCamey diamond.

By reason of their double win, the Giants have a firm hold on fourth place in the second half standing, a game behind the third place Iraan team. Crane's Gultmen took a commanding lead in the final half chase the week-end by defeating the Texon Oilers two games. Iraan continued to show the league leaders a threat with a double win over the Wink Cats.

The pending week-end holds promise of plenty of fireworks in the Permian loop, with Ozona tangling with the league-leading Cranes on home soil, the fast-traveling Iraan nine invading the stronghold of the long-reigning

## Six Amendments To Be Voted On Next November

### Publication Proposed Changes In Constitution Begins

Publication of the text of the six proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on by electors of Texas in the general election next November began this week in newspapers in the several counties of the state. The complete text of the six amendments may be found on page six of this issue of The Stockman.

One of the amendments, Senate Joint Resolution No. 14, proposes to raise the salary of various state officers, fixing the Governor's salary at \$12,000 a year, the Attorney General at \$10,000, the state comptroller, treasurer, commissioner of the general land office and secretary of state at \$6,000 each. Another proposed change is that setting up a state monopoly on the sale of liquor. This is Senate joint resolution 3-a.

Senate joint resolution No. 18 proposes to set up a system for a teachers' retirement fund, providing that the state contribute a sum to match that contributed by the teachers to pay the retirement pensions.

House joint resolution No. 23 would authorize the legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the state.

### Limit Pardon Power

One of the most important of the amendments is that creating a board of pardons and paroles composed of three members, one appointed by the governor, one by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and one by the presiding justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, and serving overlapping terms. Under the terms of this amendment, the much debated subject of the governor's pardoning power would be limited to recommendations of the board of pardons and paroles, with the governor given the unrestricted power to grant one reprieve of not more than 30 days in any capital case.

House joint resolution No. 9, proposes to limit representation in the house of representatives for the large counties, limiting the number to seven to any new apportionment unless the population of the county exceeds 700,000, and allotting one additional representative for each 100,000 population in excess of 700,000.

## Leather Worker Revived After Set Of Buggy Harness Submitted For Repairs

Gear That Would Have Been Pride Of Swain 30 Years Ago Now Pulls Cart

The well known "horse and buggy days" are not gone altogether, even if the highways are lined with "gas buggies," and a horse drawn vehicle a curiosity to the younger generation.

One of those "believe it or not" things was in the making a few days ago when a set of buggy harness was brought to the Jones Saddlery here for repairs. A. W. Jones, whose first leather work was mostly harness making and harness repairing, had to dust off the almost forgotten tricks of his trade to satisfy this customer.

"It's a pretty set of harness," said one old timer, a little wistfully, perhaps as he recalled the days of his courtship. One of those "dude" harness sets in its day, it now sees service, not on a well groomed buggy horse, proudly drawing a shiny new buggy while some stiff-collared swain goes ga-ga with a shy little maid, but on a ranch animal, pulling a ramshackle cart, hauling salt, feed, windmill parts and doing other chores on the Boyd Clayton ranch. Such is evolution—but still, as the old timer said, "It's a pretty set of harness."

## Constable Tom Smith Re-Elected To Post By One-Vote Margin

Believe-It-Or-Not Officer On Top Of Heap As He Gets Only Vote Cast For Office

Constable Tom (Believe-It-Or-Not) Smith will be the next constable of Precinct 1, Crockett County, as he has been for the past quarter of a century.

This time Constable Smith will go into his new term by the grace of a one-vote margin of victory. Since the Democratic nomination in this state is tantamount to election, and since Constable Smith won the nomination by one vote, the conclusion is that that one vote will carry him through another full two-year term in the service of the peep-ul.

But Constable Smith's narrow margin of victory was not so narrow as you might think. In fact, it was a walk-away for the constable. The one vote he received was the only one cast for that office, which does not appear on the ballot, and although there was a difference of a mere 680 votes between Constable Smith's total vote and that accorded N. W. Graham, county attorney, who led the ticket, his election to the post was just as thoroughly cinched as was Mr. Graham's.

Constable Smith denies casting the lone ballot for himself but says that if everybody who claims to have been the one who marked the ballot for him had done so, he would have led the ticket by a wide margin.

## Ozona Girl Hangs Up Shooting Record In Summer Camp Contest

Miss Maggie Seahorn, daughter of Mrs. Pon Seahorn, who is enrolled in the summer camp at Camp Mystic in Kerrville, showed the girls from other parts how they shoot out in the cow country recently in a camp shooting contest.

The Ozona miss cracked a camp record with a score of 99 out of a possible 100. Later, in a match with a boy camper from Camp Stewart who held the Stewart shooting record with a 99 for the previous year, Miss Seahorn beat the boy with a score of 94 to 90.

### SENATOR-ELECT



H. L. Winfield, Ft. Stockton oil man and business man, is the nominee for the office of state senator from the 29th district. Mr. Winfield defeated former Senator B. F. Berkeley of Alpine by more than 5,000 votes. Berkeley carried only four of the 27 counties in the district. Crockett County favored the Pecos County man by a little less than two to one.

## Winfield Wins Nomination For State Senator

### Pecos Man Given Majority of Nearly 5,000 In 29th District

H. L. Winfield, Fort Stockton oil man and business man, received the Democratic nomination for the office of state senator from the 29th district, to succeed Senator Ken Regan of Pecos, by a majority of more than 5,000 votes over former Senator Benjamin F. Berkeley of Alpine, according to a tabulation of votes counted in the twenty-seven counties composing the district.

Only four counties in the district went for Dr. Berkeley. El Paso county, largest in the district, was nearly evenly split between the two candidates, Winfield having a margin of a little over 400 out of the 12,500 votes counted.

Crockett County went for Winfield by a vote of 345 to 193, the complete unofficial vote count reveals. Former Senator Berkeley's home county, Brewster, voted for him better than four to one, while Winfield's home county, Pecos, made it nearly six to one for its favorite son.

### LEADS OPPONENTS



Ernest Thompson, railroad commissioner, was far in the lead of the strongest of his four opponents in his race for re-election, but will have to enter a run-off campaign with Frank Morris of Dallas apparently his opponent.

## THREE RUN-OFF RACES SLATED FOR CROCKETT

### J. P., 2 Commissioner Races Must Be Decided In August

### "INS" TO REMAIN

### Willis, Casbeer Named; Com. Ingham Nosed Out Of Running

Three run-off races for precinct offices in Crockett County are slated for the August 22 primary as a result of the outcome of voting in the Democratic primary election in this county Saturday.

Two of the races in which nominees will not be decided until the August election are for posts on the county Commissioners Court and one for Justice of the Peace for Ozona precinct. Nominees were decided for all other county and precinct offices by majorities.

For Commissioner of Ozona Precinct, No. 1, Rob Miller and O. W. Smith will battle it out on August 22. B. B. Ingham, incumbent, being nudged out of the running by his two opponents. Miller led the field with 237 votes, Smith followed with 174, and Ingham received 155.

Glover vs Johnigan  
J. T. Glover will contest the incumbent, W. M. Johnigan, for the nomination for the office of Justice of the Peace, having led the field of four candidates for that office with a total of 176 votes. Johnigan was second with 157, Drennan Slaughter stood third with 131, and Walter Capps, fourth with 89.

A headache for the Democratic executive committee is presented in the outcome of the balloting in Precinct 4. In that box, E. R. Kinser, Commissioner, lacked four votes of polling a majority over his two opponents. But those two opponents ran a dead heat, each receiving 11 votes, to Kinser's 19. Since the election law does not provide for such a situation, the two second-place candidates must decide between themselves which is to oppose the leader in the run-off. The law provides that the committee shall decide the nominee by lot in case of a tie between the two leaders, and

It is presumed that such a method would necessarily have to be adopted in this case to reach a fair settlement. Commissioner Kinser's opponent for the August race likely will be decided in some manner before the end of this week.

Sheriff W. S. Willis and Tom Casbeer had easy sailing in winning nomination for re-election to their respective posts, both polling majorities of better than four to one. Sheriff Willis received a total of 546 votes to 133 for his opponent, R. F. Powell. Treasurer Casbeer polled 546 to 134 for his opponent, Bob Weaver.

N. W. Graham led the ticket in his race for re-election as county attorney, receiving a total of 681 votes. He was unopposed.

By the narrow margin of 17 votes, C. E. Grimmer, county surveyor, nosed out Bill Conklin for re-election to that office. The vote was 320 for Grimmer and 303 for Conklin.

Owens Re-elected

J. W. Owens, commissioner for Precinct 3, received a clear majority of 17 votes over his two opponents for that office. Commissioner Owens received 34 votes, O. W. Parker 15 and Mike Friend 2.

Houston Smith, county Democratic chairman, was re-elected to that office when 60 voters wrote his name on the ballot in the space provided.

Among the state and district candidates, Governor Allred was favored by Crockett voters with a total of 358 to 108 for his nearest opponent, Tom Hunter. Senator Morris Sheppard polled 451 votes in this county, with 80 votes being scattered among his five opponents.

Ernest Thompson was the favored candidate for railroad commissioner, the chairman of that state agency receiving a total of 231 to 121 for his nearest opponent, Frank Morris. Other state candidates who led in this county were George H. Sheppard for State Comptroller, John W. Hawkins for Commissioner of the General Land Office, Charley Lockhart for State Treasurer, L. A. Woods for State Superintendent, J. E. McDonald for Commissioner of Agriculture.

H. L. Winfield of Pecos County was the choice of this county for state senator over former Senator B. F. Berkeley. Judge Joseph M. Nealon was favored over Judge Will H. Pelphrey for the office of chief justice of the Court of Civil Appeals at El Paso.

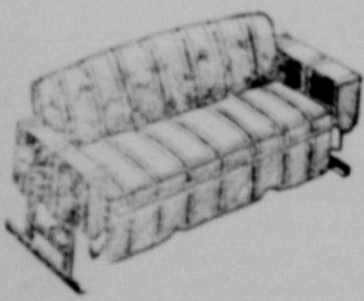

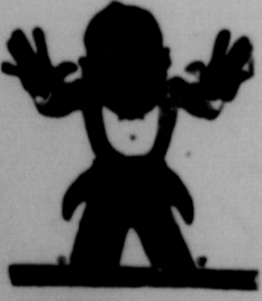

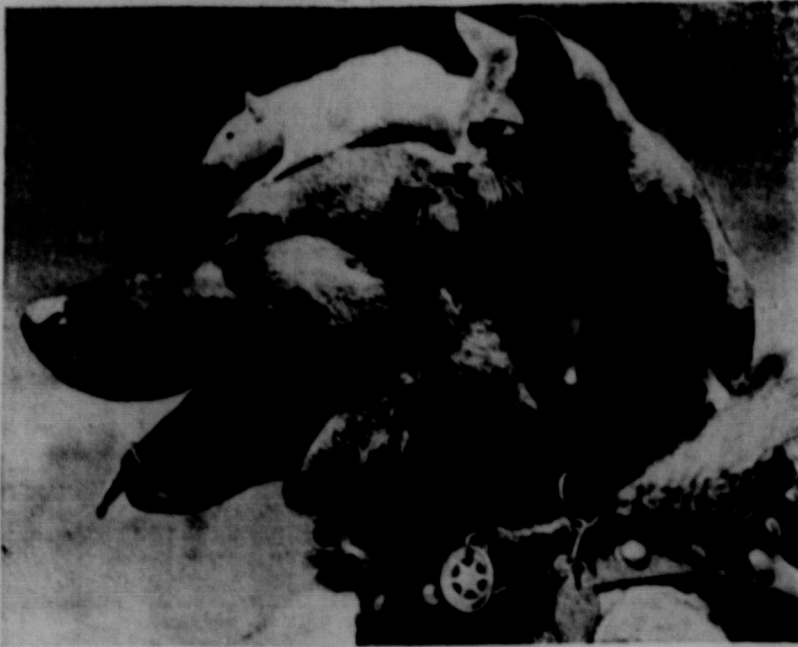
