Officials Issue Warning Against Cars Racing Ahead Of Fire Engine To Blaze

An appeal for cooperation from the public with members of the county fire fighting force on calls to country fires has been issued by members of the Commissioners Court and Fire Chief Joe North and his crew.

Particular attention was called to the practice of motorists in racing ahead of the fire engine to the scene of a fire, which practice, in the case of dirt roads, makes it difficult and hazardous for those on the fire engine. Dust from racing cars ahead blind drivers of the fire engine and results in the loss of considerable time in reaching the fire, to say nothing of the danger to the fire fighting crew in creating a wreck hazard.

Motorists are urged to consider the danger and delay caused by their racing ahead of the engine. If you know the fire truck is behind you, stop, pull to the outside of the road and allow it to pass, is the request of authorities.

A warning was also issued regarding infraction of laws against cars passing over fire hose stretched by the fire crews. Serious damage to hose may result from cars passing over it, and since the fire hose is public property, a fine may result if such incidents occur again, it was stated.

Great Array Of Talent Expected In Cage Tourney

Coach White Anticipates More Than Dozen Entries Jan. 15-16

With the greatest array of trophies ever offered, Coach Ted White is looking forward to one of the biggest tournaments in Ozona's history when the annual Ozona invitation basketball tourney is held January 15 and 16.

More than a dozen of the top teams of West Texas are expected to be entered in the tourney, with some of the finest talent in the area in action. "An ideal week-end of merriment and a whirl-wind of basketball games," is the way Coach White describes it.

Two of the most outstanding of Texas athletes have been secured for officials in the tournament, Coach White announced, with Pittman, one of the greats of Simmons University, and Wallace Myers, T. C. U., with an outstanding record in Southwest Conference athletics.

Every team entered in the tournament will receive some trophy, either to the group or to an individual, Coach White announces. Ten outstanding players will be selected to receive individual trophies. In addition to these, an outstanding player on each team not recognized in this selected ten will be awarded a trophy. The tournament winner will receive a silver "life-size" basketball, while the runner-up will receive one slightly smaller. Large 15 - inch loving cups with basketball statuette on top will be awarded winner and runner-up in the second bracket. Coaches will come in for trophies with a gold basketball for the coach of the winning team and for the outstanding player in the coaches game. In case both should go to the same person, the second coach in the "feature struggle" will receive the award.

Ozonans will be asked again to open their homes to the visitors on Friday night of the tournament week-end, in order that Ozona might properly entertain the coaches and their players.

Pioneer Rancher Died In San Antonio; Father of Mrs. J. L. Martin

A number of Ozonans, friends of the family attended funeral services in San Angelo Monday afternoon for J. M. Puckett, 66, pioneer West Texas rancher, who died Saturday afternoon in San Antonio after a brief illness. Services were held from the First Methodist Church, with Rev. Grady Timmons of San Antonio, and Rev. K. P. Barton of San Angelo officiating.

Mr. Puckett operated large ranch holdings in Crockett County for twenty years. He married Mrs. Puckett here in 1893. In 1916 he established a ranch in Sutton County, which he operated until last July, when the 5,786 acre ranch was sold to Sutton County interests. Mr. and Mrs. Puckett moved to San Antonio after selling the ranch. Mrs. Puckett's health being such that it was hoped the move would prove beneficial to her.

Surviving are the widow, two sons, Dow Puckett, who ranches in Pecos County, and M. C. Puckett of San Angelo, and a daughter, Mrs. John L. Martin of Ozona, and five grandchildren.

This column answers will be to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people.

Q. What were President La... views with reference to relations with the Indians? G. D.

A. They were expressed as follows in his inaugural address: The only means by which Indian hostilities can be brought to end are the extinction or the expulsion of United States Indians who are domiciled in Texas.

Q. Did John W. Smith hold any position in the Republic except that of Mayor of San Antonio? T. E. J.

A. He was elected to Congress from Bexar and met with the Congress at Washington in January, 1841, but became suddenly ill and died within a few days. He was buried in the little cemetery at Washington.

Q. Were the presidio of La Baha and the Espiritu Santo mission established originally near the present town of Goliad? M. G.

A. Built by Marquis San Miguel Aguayo in 1722 on the site of the old Fort St. Louis, they were removed to the valley above Victoria in 1725, and to the Goliad sites in 1749.

Q. What were "Turtle Bayou resolutions"? T. W.

A. Resolutions adopted by Texans in 1832, declaring opposition to the policies of Bustamante, elected president of Mexico in 1830, and affirming allegiance to Santa Anna in his efforts to sustain the Mexican constitution of 1824 as it related to Texas.

Q. How old is the Menger Hotel at San Antonio? F. C.

A. It opened for business, January 31, 1859. The original building cost \$16,000.00.

Q. How did San Antonio secure its Federal military post? J. W. M.

A. In 1870, the city council passed an ordinance donating 40 acres of land to the military for use as post and corral, following which the post was moved from Austin.

Q. Where did Larry Chittenden, the Texas poet, live? B. K.

A. He began ranching in Jones County in 1886 and wrote most of his poems there. He donated a great part of his unusual library to the Anson schools.

Q. When was Jackson county organized and who was its first presiding judge? H. J. K.

A. It was organized Dec. 29, 1836 with Patrick Usher, a San Jacinto soldier, as chief justice. It was named for Pres. Andrew Jackson, for whom the municipality of Jackson had previously been named.

Q. Where is La Lomita Mission and what is its history? T. B. N.

A. It is a small chapel, recently restored, five miles south of the present town of Mission. The first chapel was built in 1845 by the Oblates of Mary Immaculate and was replaced by the present chapel about 1889-90. Its use was discontinued about ten years ago, some years after St. Peter's Novitiate was built on a nearby hill overlooking La Lomita. The town of Mission was named for the old chapel.

Q. Who was Father Keralum? T. B. N.

A. A beloved Catholic priest who disappeared from sight in 1872 while on his way from Brownsville to Roma. Ten years later his bones were found by cowboys, his saddle hanging from a mesquite tree, his belongings undisturbed. It is thought he died of illness. His remains were buried at Mercedes and his belongings placed in a case at Immaculate Conception in Brownsville.

Q. Where was Mound Prairie located? K. L.

A. Near the present town of Neches, Anderson County. It was an important trading point about 1848, and was the site of a machine shop that made guns for the Confederates during the Civil War.

Prevention Is Cure For Auto Accidents

Austin, Dec. 23—"The only way to avoid the useless waste of life due to traffic accidents is to prevent the accident," reads a warning issued by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"It is not a question of who is right and who is wrong after the accident has occurred," he said, "and automobile accidents never happen merely because of 'bad luck,'—there is a definite cause of every one of them, although it is not possible to determine the precise origin of every mishap.

"Leaders of the safety movement agree that the most funda-

mental approach to the solution of our national accident problem lies in the education and training of the individual. Safety education includes the training of individuals to avoid accidents to themselves and to prevent accidents to others. It involves the acquisition of a certain fund of information, the ability to apply this information to concrete situations, and the building up of habits which will make the application of knowledge to situation automatic.

"The dangerous curves and intersections on the highways of this State are distinctly marked, and automobile drivers can assist greatly in the reduction of deaths from automobile accidents by carefully observing these warning signs.

"Some motorists rely too much on traffic rules and regulations, thinking that if they are obeying the rules of the road at the time when an accident occurs, no blame can be attached to them. This is not true. The only man who can consider himself blameless in case of an accident, when he was obeying the rules of the road, is the one who did everything possible to avoid that accident.

"The consequences of an automobile accident are so disastrous, that only when we have done everything in our power to avoid such accidents, can we consider ourselves, or expect others to consider us, blameless in the case of an accident.

"When each individual does all that he is able to do toward avoiding an accident of any kind, then, and then only, will our traffic accidents be avoided."

year, will play in his high school career, the squad thought it a gift she might treasure above any other they might select.

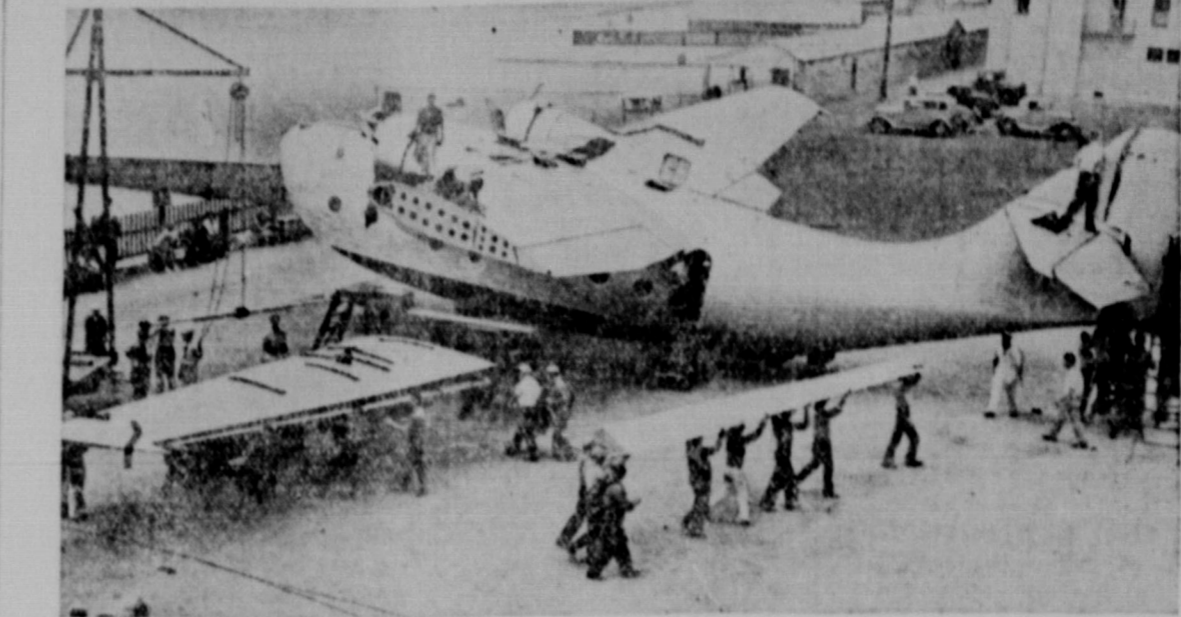

Federal-State Market News Service

San Antonio, Texas, Dec. 21—Cattle and calves on the San Antonio market Monday sold fully steady with last week's close. Fed steers and yearlings were scarce. Estimated receipts 700 cattle, 700 calves.

Good fat calves and light weight yearlings cashed at \$5.25 to \$5.75 with odd lots up to \$6.00. Medium calves brought \$4.50 to \$5.25 with common calves down to \$3.50; few "rannies" down to \$3.00, and below. A few short fed yearlings brought \$6.40 to \$7.00. Odd truck lots of plain grass steers cashed at \$4.50 to \$5.00, few above; medium to good kinds scarce. Common to medium cows sold at \$3.25 to \$4.00; few fat kinds up to \$4.25 and \$4.50. Cut-tery grades brought \$2.50 to \$3.25, few below. Bulls ranged from \$4.25 and down to \$3.25 for light weights. Stocker calves sold mostly at \$4.00 to \$5.25 with a few above. Prospects are that demand for all classes cattle and calves will be slow after mid-week in anticipation of the holidays.

Hogs, 700 head. The market was active on the better grades but slow on light weights and pigs. Price levels held generally steady with last week's close. A top of \$9.25 was paid by packers and shippers. Good to choice 180 to 250 pound butchers sold at \$9.00 to \$9.25; best 140 to 160 pounds, \$7.50 to \$8.50; 160 to 180 pounds, \$8.50 to \$9.00; 260 to 300 pounds, \$8.75 to \$9.25. Packing sows mostly \$8.00 and down.

A Peculiar People

One of the most peculiar of religious sects is the Doukhobors, members of which have recently clashed again with the authorities in Canada, as the result of parading nude in protest against their expulsion from certain communities.

At Thrums, British Columbia, 84 men and 33 women were arrested in a single day, after resisting the police, who finally subdued them by spraying "itch powder" on their naked bodies.

Aside from their hobby of going without clothing, the Doukhobors are said to be unobjectionable, being ordinarily quiet, honest and industrious people.

Their religious and political views are primitive, and communitarian. They accept certain portions of the Bible, but have no preachers or priests. When they assemble for prayer, all members are considered equal. They have no ceremonies at marriages, which are contracted on conscience only. Wives and husbands are "sisters" and "brothers"; parents are addressed as "old man" and "old woman". They do not approve use of the labor of animals.

The Doukhobors migrated to Canada in 1898 from Russia, where the sect originated about 200 years ago, and where it had been subjected to governmental persecutions at various times.

To anyone not inspired with fervent religious zeal, both Russia and Canada would seem rather cold countries in which to practice the habit of going without clothes.

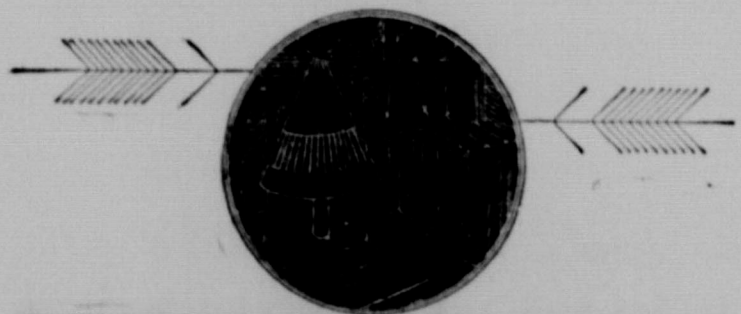
