Texas To Use Only U.S. Highway Marks To Avoid Confusion

Austin, Oct. 27 - Motorists traveling United States designated highways in Texas no longer will be puzzled by a multitude of highway markers in thickly populated areas, according to instructions just issued by the Texas Highway Commission through Julion Montgomery, State Highway Engineer, ordering state markers taken down on such routes.

"After an exhaustive study of this whole matter of highway markings we have found that by simple using U.S. route markers it is much easier for the traveling public to follow such highways," says Mr. Montgomery. "With the trend toward simplicity and elimination of confusion caused by duplicate markers some thirty-


