





In small hurricanes, Schnur busch said, the diameter of the area of destrictive winds may not exceed 25 miles, while in some of the greatest the diameter may be as much as 400 to 500 miles.

"Winds of a hurricane blow around and incline toward the center. Their direction in the Northern Hemisphere is counter clockwise. The "law of storms", accepted by meterologists, is that the observer, standing with his back to the wind, will find the storm center on his left. Since the winds have some incurvature, the center will be on hsi left and slightly to the front.

History of hurricanes dates back to Columbus' voyage to America, the meterologist said. A study of fragmentary records reveals that the frequency of hurricanes, their intensities and movements, while variable from year to year, have not undergone any pronounced Veteran Meterologist W. Huge plow constructed at a cost of \$3,400 which is designed to cut furrows six feet deep. It will be used in the Santa Ana river plains of California to recover rich loam soil buried under sand deposits by the 1916 flood. 




